

State's Eastern Turkey program slowly growing at Tyler station

Slowly gaining momentum each day, Texas' program to TO DATE, biologists and best brood stock available for

restock the eastern turkey is progressing with every turkey egg that is hatched at the Parks and Wildlife Department's Management and Research Management and Research

At 12 to 14 weeks of age, the turkey will be released at selected sites in the eastern half of Texas.

Wildlife biologist Horace Gore of Austin says that pure strains of eastern turkeys will be released east of a line running from Longview to Baytown - prime eastern turkey habitat.

A SINGLE hybrid stocking will be made in Wharton County.

"Any of the pen-raised eastern turkey gobblers left from the stockings," said Gore, "will be released with wildtrapped Rio Grande hens in the post-oak area of Texas to the east of a Dallas-Victoria line and west of the Longview-Baytown line."

This area, according to Gore, is suited to neither pure Rio Grandes nor easterns. However, past releases of a combination of the two birds were successful in East Texas.

"In 1970," said Gore, "we released a total of 32 Rio Grandes-and-easterns in the Angelina River watershed. The flock has now grown to some 150 birds.

"A similar release of 34 turkeys was made in early 1973 in the Neches River watershed. We have no exact count of the offspring produced by the birds but fledgling turkeys have been spotted in the Neches River release site."

Survival and reproduction of wild-trapped birds is much higher than with birds reared in pens but there are so few wild eastern turkeys left in Texas that biologists are forced to work with pen-raised birds. "IN THE 10 years we have been trapping eastern turkeys," said Gore, "we have managed to get only 111 birds, which should give some idea of how sparse the turkeys are in East Texas. Wild-trapped birds are much less dependent on man and their survival rate is higher. The birds currently being reared in Tyler are kept in large flight pens with a minimum of human disturbance. SHEEP SALES in Texas were 151,000 head in June, one percent below a year ago and five percent above the previous



For model A, multiply all three figures - \$.04 x 600 x 1,000 = 24,000 or \$24 average for the year.

For model B, multiply all three figures - \$.04 x 600 x 1,500 = 36,000 or \$36 average for the year.

SO MODEL A is cheaper, as the difference of \$40 initial cost will be made up in about three years.
