## Korea Rebels Gain Support

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Radio Seoul said today Lt. Gen. Lee Han-Lim, commander of South Korea's powerful 1st Field Army, has pledged full support to objectives of the military junta now running the government. If true, this is a setback for both the elected regime of Premier John M. Chang and for U.S. Lt. Gen. Carter B. Magruder, the commander of United Nations forces who had urged the rebel junta to return power to the regular authorities. The radio station, controlled by the military committee of Lt. Gen. Chang Do-Young, broadcast what it said was a statement of full support by Lee. The statement declared all officers and men under Lee's command, which helps guard the Korean truce line as part of Magruder's forces, would wholly cooperate to complete the junta's revolutionary task. That task, as outlined by the junta, is to wipe out political corruption and incompetence and rebuild South Korea. The radio said the statement was issued through the information officer of the 1st Field Army's headquarters in Wonju, 60 miles east of Seoul. Unconfirmed reports said Lee made the statement after he held

### Building Permits Show Increase

Building permits in Big Spring, through May 16, now total \$2,414,625, only \$713,116 under the entire total for 1960. Sixty new residences have accounted for \$1,561,000. Eighteen new residence permits have been issued during the first half of May, amounting to \$220,750. Other May permits called for 15 additions to residences, \$10,500; five residences remodeled, \$1,081; four residences moved, \$1,440; two new business buildings, \$187,750; and one addition to a business building, \$133,000. An addition will be built to the Lakeside High School, running to \$133,000, the new Jacobs apartments will total \$187,000 and the new building at 14th and Main for the Church of Christ to \$140,000. All of these permits have been taken out in May.

# Senators Tentatively Okay Sales Tax Plan

## Daniel Package Is Knocked Down

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas senators tentatively approved today a sales tax-heavy \$326 million tax package that had been opposed by Gov. Price Daniel. The voice vote of preliminary approval came after the senators knocked down Daniel's pet \$10 deductible sales tax plan by a 17-14 vote. However, an immediate final vote was delayed when Sen. Wardlow Lane, sponsor of the committee recommended measure, failed to get the necessary two-thirds permission for the last ballot.

Jack Coughlin, hospital communications officer, said an 18-year-old youth who received a fractured leg in a gang fight Sunday told a nurse he thought some of the youths were from him. Police Sgt. Frank Hinojosa, however, quoted the youth as saying the boys were his friends and he "knew them by sight but not by name."

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## JFK Studies Summit Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under Secretary of State Chester Bowles said today President Kennedy has "under consideration" a meeting with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. Bowles told the Senate Foreign Relations committee that the decision is up to the President. He said no decision has been made. Bowles talked with the Senate committee members in a closed session. Word of what he said was given to newsmen later by Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark. Fulbright said it was his first official confirmation that negotiations looking to a conference between the two leaders were under way. Bowles himself had told reporters when going into the commit-

## Rusk Demands All Troops Leave Laos

GENEVA (AP)—U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk today demanded the withdrawal of all military forces from troubled Laos and charged the Communists are violating the cease-fire there. Rusk told the East-West foreign ministers' conference on Laos that the United States is willing to pull out its military mission from Laos if Communist North Viet Nam does the same. Rusk offered the conference a three-point plan to turn Laos into a neutral country removed from the pressures of the cold war so it can make "progress toward more stable political institutions, economic well-being and social justice."

## Water Line Being Tested

The City of Big Spring and Colorado River Municipal Water District jointly were making pressure tests today on the 14-inch line between Big Spring and Moss Creek Lake. The tests are to determine condition of the line and its capacities in anticipation of making dual use of the supply. Moss Creek is used for peaking purposes, and contracts are expected to be executed soon for utilizing the surplus water for repressuring in the East Howard oil fields. In that event, the line could be used to pump water to as well as from the lake.

## Absentee Votes More Regular

Absentee ballots are arriving at the County Clerk's office with more regularity as the deadline nears for voting in the coming U. S. senatorial election, set May 29. To date, 29 ballots have been cast and more are expected. Voting began May 4 and concludes May 23.

## Mrs. Read, Pioneer Citizen Of Big Spring, Dies At Age 95

Mrs. Lillie A. Read, 95, who came here as a bride when Big Spring was little more than a tent city, died at 3:15 a.m. today in a local hospital. She had been in failing health for several years and seriously ill for months. Since Saturday afternoon, shortly after her daughters arrived from Cleveland, Ohio, she had been in a coma. The funeral has been set for 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Christian Church, to which she gave so many years of devoted service. The Rev. John Black will officiate, and burial will be in the Masonic section of the City Cemetery under the direction of River Funeral Home. Mrs. Read was one of the dwindling, small band to whom the name "pioneer" could be aptly applied. Born in Bloomington, Ind., on July 12, 1865, she was married on June 4, 1884 in Bowling Green, Ky. to H. Clay Read. Mr. Read had come to the barren West Texas village as recently established by the coming of the T&P railroad in 1882. It was a jolting change for the cultured young bride, but she pitched in with her husband to carve a foothold. They operated the old T&P home in the western part of town,

applying savings to land which long since has become part of the center of the city area. They lived in a home at Second and Gregg until it was destroyed by fire one summer, while the family visited in Kentucky. Pending the time they could build a home, they lived in such historic residences as the Hayden, Birdwell and Albert Fisher homes. Nearly 45 years ago they completed their stately home at Second and Scurry where she lived until her health broke completely. Mrs. Read had been organist for the First Christian Church when it was located just south of where Montgomery Ward Company now has its store. After the church was enlarged, she continued as the organist and again when it was re-established at 5th and Scurry she played. Little more than a decade ago, when the church was moved to its present location at 19th and Gohard, Mrs. Read responded to an invitation by Mrs. Gail Bonner to play on the church organ at the dedicatory service. When she came here, there was no doctor in Big Spring, and Mr. Read was instrumental in persuading Dr. J. H. Hurst to come from Bowling Green ahead of the time Mr. and Mrs. Read's son,

## C-City Pushes Can Ordinance

COLORADO CITY (SC)—The Colorado City administration opened fire on violations of the city ordinance on trash cans this week, lining eight in corporation court Wednesday morning. Twenty-six complaints had been filed. Twelve pleaded not guilty and were released Wednesday morning. Six had not been tried at noon. City Manager Earl Keaton had informed the city council at the last open meeting, May 8, that the crackdown was planned and that home owners with cans not meeting city regulations would be brought into corporation court and fined after an initial warning was attached to garbage cans. Most of the complaints were against citizens of the Eastover Addition, but Keaton told the council that he would proceed against other areas as fast as possible. The majority of complaints concerned garbage cans without covers, or open oil drums and garbage containers used for trash and grass cuttings.

## 'Copter Sighted

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — An American-piloted helicopter, missing since Monday, was spotted seemingly undamaged in Communist rebel territory north of here today. Search planes were reported fired on and there was speculation the helicopter's occupants had been taken prisoners.

**Dinner Set For Blakley**

High officials of the Texas Democratic party are planning a big dinner in Austin Friday night for U.S. Sen. William A. Blakley.

The dinner comes eight days before the run-off election May 27 in which Blakley is opposed by Republican John Tower for Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson's old Senate seat; Blakley was appointed interim senator until an election could fill the post.

Gov. Price Daniel, Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Speaker James A. Turman of the Texas House are hosts for the dinner.

The dinner was moved from Wednesday to Friday when Blakley suspended his campaign to return to Washington for the debate on federal aid to education.

Tower, meanwhile, continued to stump the state. He made hand-shaking tours of factories in Galveston and Houston Tuesday and then flew to Austin for a big chicken dinner on the grounds of the Lamar Junior High School. About 700 persons attended, paying 50 cents per plate.

Tower again renewed charges that Blakley had not attended enough roll call votes while a senator. He also restated his claim to being a conservative—"wherever I go"—and added:

**'Macbeth' Wins 5 TV Awards**

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Macbeth," William Shakespeare's tragic play, won five Emmies Tuesday night and stole the 13th annual TV awards show.

But there were other moments of low comedy and high drama: Barbara Stanwyck, who has lost her sponsor, won her first TV award, and—in the excitement—tore her dress. Bob Hope, nominated for the first time, suffered a stunning disappointment—but bore up manfully.

Macbeth won for best direction—George Schaefer; best actor—Maurice Evans; best actress—Judith Anderson; outstanding drama; and program of the year.

Miss Stanwyck, nominated for four movie Oscars but never a winner, won on her first try in television.

As her name was called for best actress in a series, her beige dress caught on her coat.

She finally tugged away her coat and walked up to the podium with a torn dress. There she thanked everybody connected with her show.

Later she confided to a newsman: "I wanted to say I was the first Emmy winner to ever have her show dropped."

Her anthology series has not been renewed for next year.

Raymond Burr, the defense attorney who never loses a case on the Perry Mason TV show, was named best actor in a series.

Fred Astaire, who has nearly as many Emmies as the television academy, won two more to make a total of 11 in his collection.

The veteran dancer seemed embarrassed to win again for outstanding performance in a variety show and outstanding variety program.

In other awards, the NBC news team of Chet Huntley and David Brinkley beat out President Kennedy's news conferences for best news program.

The President and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, however, did get a special Emmy for "the great debates." Neither showed to accept the award.

Bob Hope suffered what was probably the biggest disappointment of the night.

Hope, nominated for the first time in his 25 years of stardom on talent alone, lost out in the humor category to Jack Benny, who has won before.

Benny, a pallbearer at Gary Cooper's funeral Tuesday, didn't show up to accept his award. It was accepted by Irving Fein, executive producer of the Benny show.

Hope quipped that he should move from the San Fernando Valley to Beverly Hills—where all the votes are concentrated.

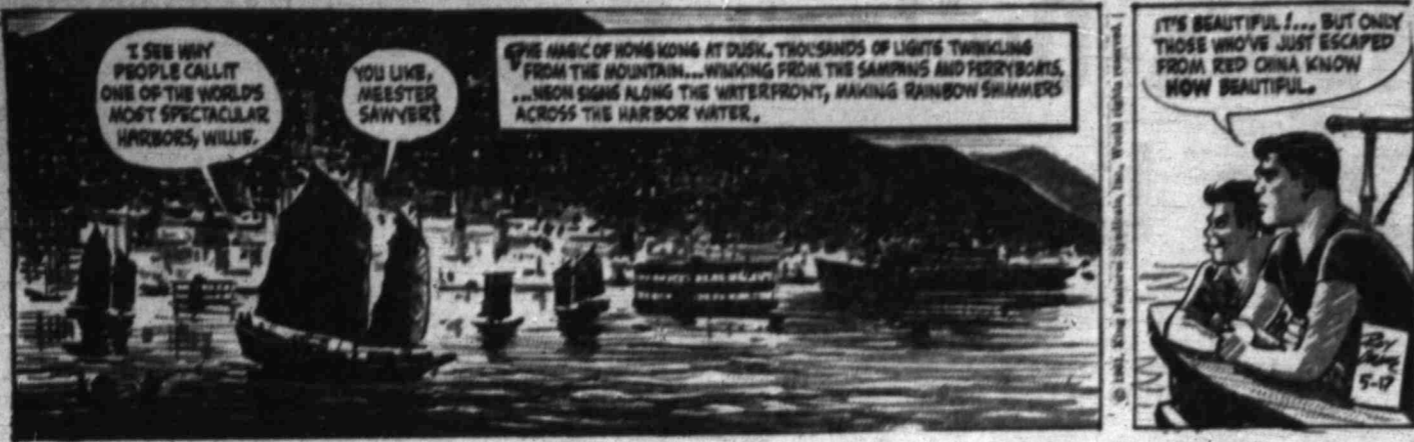

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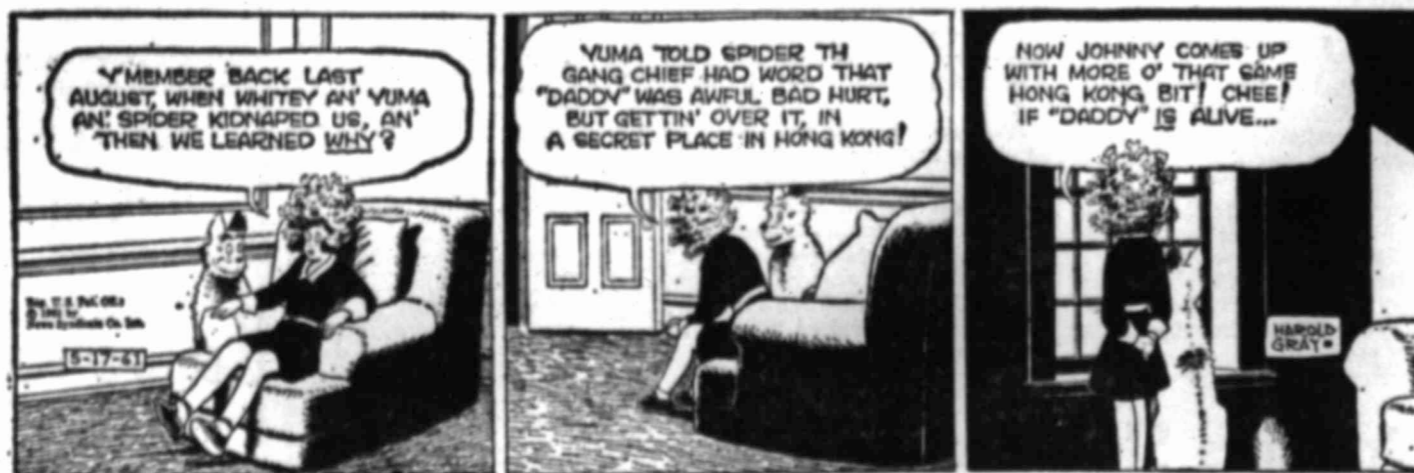

### 2 Top Yanks Out Of Country

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the first time in more than four years both the President and vice president of the United States were out of the country Tuesday.

President Kennedy arrived in Ottawa for a two-day goodwill visit. Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson flew to Thailand on his six-nation goodwill tour of Southeast Asia, which began May 9.

The last time the nation's two top leaders were outside the United States was in March, 1957, when former President Dwight D. Eisenhower went aboard the cruiser Canberra for a six-day rest cruise that took him to Bermuda for talks with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan. Richard M. Nixon, then vice president, was in Africa on a goodwill tour.

There will be no acting president during the Kennedy and Johnson trips. Kennedy is still the President wherever he may be.

Of course County Judge Jim McCoy could take away the feature billing by roping and tying a buffalo calf. Hackberry Slim has offered to give him the calf if he does.

Events on the program include calf roping, steer riding, girls barrel riding and ribbon roping.

Dan Saunders, sheriff, is to be the announcer for the show, and all the members of the sponsoring Roping Club will be at work on the project.

NEW YORK (AP)—A rush to buy low-priced stocks and new issues of unseasoned companies has brought the second warning in six weeks from Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange.

Funston said Tuesday such a concentration of demand "makes a mockery of the word 'investing.'"

### Fire Test Proves Out Helicopter

The effectiveness of the helicopter in aircraft fire-fighting and aircraft crash - rescue operations has been clinched at Webb Air Force Base.

Demonstrated recently at the base was the fact that no aircraft fire may be too large to be controlled by ground units (with the help of the downwash from helicopter rotors).

Climaxing a series of routine fire exercises, two H-43 "Huskies" and two 0-10 crash-rescue fire trucks were called to the biggest fire to be lighted at the base. It was "The Works" — a 10,000-pound spill of fuel, oil and magnesium on a stripped B-47 bomber. Trapped inside the burning aircraft was a "dummy" pilot.

**BIG FIRE**  
In magnitude, the fire was much bigger than any likely to be encountered at this base.

The operation was two-phase. First was to determine the penetration the 0-10 fire truck could

make in an inferno this size—with the help of helicopter ground sweeps.

As soon as the Huskie took position, the 0-10 was able to move to wing root of the B-47. The cockpit was sprayed with foam and the truck withdrawn after 30 seconds.

No heat was felt by the crewmen, they reported. The hand linesmen could have gone into operation at that point. Also, someone from the aircraft could have jumped on the fire truck during the 30 seconds.

Phase Two followed: One helicopter took position to the right of the aircraft and the other to its left, a few seconds apart. The fire was controlled immediately, simulated rescue effected in 30 seconds, and the entire blaze (including magnesium) was put out in seven minutes.

#### MORE EFFECTIVE

"The whole thing is fantastic," Capt. Tom Seebo, helicopter pilot remarked. As far as controlling the fire is concerned, Seebo observed, "two choppers are 10 times more effective than one."

For Webb Fire Chief Peter J. Perring "it was out of this world." In going all out, authorities at Webb were only testing out the maximum capabilities of this type operation.

The cooling effect of the helicopter's downwash is of tremendous importance, not only in crash rescue, but in the ultimate saving of the aircraft. In big fires, Chief Perring explained, the foam is usually fired against the fuselage. The downwash, he said, renders the foam effective.

Lt. William F. Glover, pilot; and Lts. James L. Butera and Keith H. Ricks, co-pilots, took part in the twin-chopper operation.

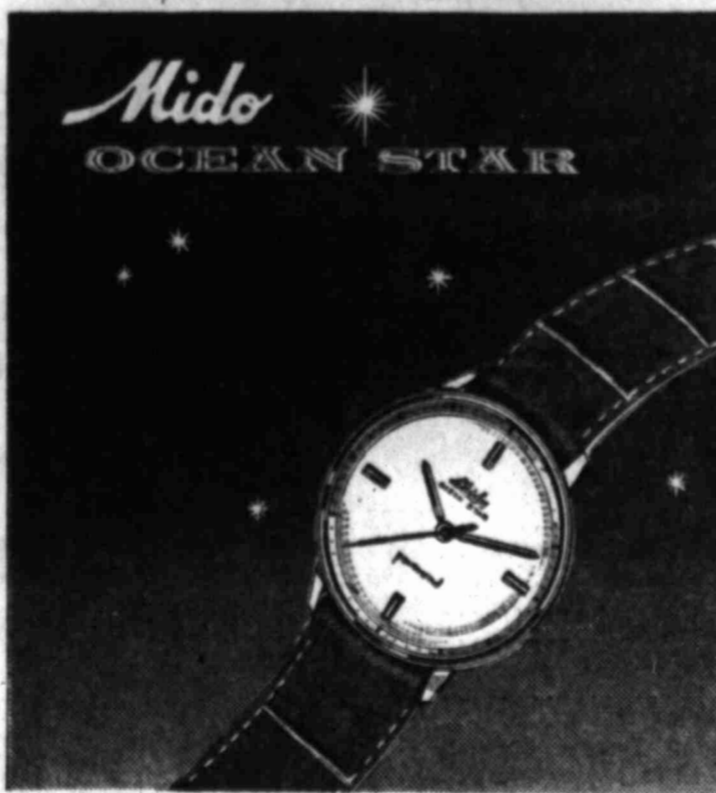

One of the two helicopters on display at Webb AFB Saturday, Armed Forces Day, will be the H-43B "Huskie." Webb has two H-43's which are used by the helicopter rescue section in crashes, rescue, and fire fighting. The jet helicopter's crew may consist of 3,000 pounds split between crew, two fully garbed firefighters and 1,000 pounds of firefighting and rescue gear. The "Huskie" is powered by the Lycoming T-33 turbine engine and has a maximum speed of 120 m.p.h. The "chopper" reaches altitudes above 25,000 feet and can fly 232 miles at its cruising speed of 114 m.p.h. The 12-ft., 7-in. tall "Huskie" reaches 25 ft. 2 in. in length and spans 51 ft. 5 in.
