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## **New Linecasting Machine** Helps Herald Meet Deadline

Another linecasting machine was added to the Herald battery last week, giving the men in the "back shop" seven of the highly

complex machines. Of all modern innovations in the printing industry, probably none was so important as the linecasting machine.

After Gutenburg's invention of movable type, the printing industry developments primarily resolved around the printing press. Presses were modernized and changed regularly, but the type that made the impression remained relatively static.

### HAND PICK

This required men to pick up each letter and place it in position for printing. This was a long. slow process and was a principal factor in any printing operation's deadline. No matter how fast the press could print a newspaper, it still required a long time to set the type. Adding more typesetters reached the point of diminishing returns

Then, before the turn of the century, Otto Mergenthaler invented his Linotype machine. It was a fresh start at the typesetting problem and did not involve conventional setting type at all.

Mergenthaler's machine operat ed from a keyboard, similar in appearance to a typewriter key-board. But when the operator punched a key, a matrice fell into a selection rail and held it while the remainder of the letter matrices (type molds) are selected for the line. When the line is filled with matrices, the machine holds them while molten metal is forced against them making a line-of-type, hence the name, RETURNED

The mats are returned to channels in a magazine to be used again. The lines-of-type (such as this story is composed of) are given to the operator to be taken to make-up tables.

This method of preparing type for the newspaper, completely revolutionized the industry. Batteries and batteries of type cases are Bob Clark, Ed Maedgen and were no longer needed. Instead, a few machines could set type faster than squads of hand typesetters and insure that the paper

### CRANKY

Having the machines to do the work is only part of the job, however. Linecasting machines are cranky and cantankerous and some operators swear that they have a will of their own.

At any rate, most shops have a full time employe who does nothing but care for these machines. At the Herald, he is Bill Unger. After the paper has been put to bed for the day, usually about 2 p.m., Unger begins maintenance work on the Herald's seven machines.

This can involve anything from cleaning up the molds to a complete overhaul of some part that has been giving the composing room operators trouble. maintenance insures the men that the machines will be ready to put

out the following day's paper. The machines are located in the



Private Individuals and private groups are free, so long as their activities are not contrary to the law, to appeal for funds for their causes. Such is the instance of the committee, led by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Walter Reuther and Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, in spearheading a nationwide campaign to raise funds to meet demands of Fidel Castro for heavy machinery in return for political prison-

The barter of human life for material things certainly makes a tremendous appeal to compassion, yet it is well to pause and give thought to the end result. The blood of this calloused demand is not of our doing, and it is an out-and-out bit of blackjacking.

We are not insensitive to the welfare of the Cuban patriots who sought to overthrow the iron rule of Fidel Castro, but they made the sacrifice with full knowledge of the potential consequences. They took the step gladly, and having failed, they probably are not whimpering about

To encourage Castro in his repugnant demands is to sow the seeds of future whirlwinds. If he can hold one batch of his own flesh and blood for ransom, why not conjure a pretext for holding others for

Obviously, our government cannot play a part in meeting the demand. The President, therefore, has taken a course of the heart rather than of sound logic, in our opinion, in encouraging the private compliance with Castro's ransom demand. In effect, he is saying that our government would, if it could. We can't agree with that. We feel that Castro should know that we wouldn't if we could.

Virtually everyone feels a keen sympathy with the self-exiled Cubans, and many, many people would like to help them. We suggest that these are a far sounder object of benevolence and compassion than to contribute to a cause, however humane in intent, which is in fact knuckling under to a repulsive de-

### David Lawrence Stretching The Law Pretty Far

WASHINGTON-There is a constitutional right to free speech, but-as the Supreme Court has said-there is no right falsely to cry "fire!" in a crowded theater.

There is a constitutional right to demonstrate, but not a right to provoke or incite people to riot,

There is a constitutional right to assemble in a hall to espouse any cause, but not a right to organize a "sit-in" demonstration for the express purpose of using private property-against the wishes of the owners-to stir up passions and create incidents of disorder.

For decades now the American people have been denouncing "lynch" rule and mob action, and the cry has been for adherence to constitutional law and the orderly procedures of the courts.

But what happened in Alabama over the weekend reveals clearly that incitement to riot is the fundamental cause of the trouble. Mayor Robert Wagner of New York, not many months ago, rightly refused to give a permit to a rabble-rouser who wanted to defend the Nazi point of view at meetings in the heart of the metropolis, where the bulk of the population was bound to resent such statements and perhaps be stimulated to mob action.

IT WAS ALL very well for civic groups later to argue that a permit should have been granted by the mayor and that the champion of Nazi doctrines had a right to free speech, but the mayor knew what the consequences would be and acted wisely. Alabama's attorney general has just told the same rabble-rouser to keep out

of the state. Today the federal government under the Kennedy administration has made the same mistake at Montgomery as did the Eisenhower administration at Little Rock. Both refused to let local authorities deal with the situation. The more than 400 federal marshals, fully armed, who were mobilized in Montgomery last Sunday were, as Sen. Dirksen of Illinois says, hardly different from federal troops.

There are, of course, plenty of legalisms involved. At Little Rock the governor of Arkansas ordered out the National Guard to prevent mob violence around the school. But the federal government construed this as an impediment to the enforcement of a federal court order on desegregation of public schools.

In Alabama a court order issued by an Alabama state judge had called on the so-called "freedom riders" to abstain from their demonstrations on buses which had been advertised in advance and were certain to stir up trouble. Notwithstanding the existence of this state court order, the federal government intervened

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with federal marshals, claiming that "law and order" had broken down.

INDEED, AN 1871 federal statute was cited by the U.S. Department of Justice as authority for the step, though this law specifically refers to federal intervention only where there is "insurrection" or "domestic violence" due to a refusal or inability of a state to grant protection. It can hardly be said that the action of a mob, even though some negligence is temporarily displayed by local police, constitutes such an "insurrection" in a constitutional sense. On the contrary, the governor of Alabama recognized the right of the bus to engage in interstate travel and the right of passengers on the bus to be protected. Just how this gets to be "insurrection" is hard to understand. Neither the governor nor the legislature requested the federal intervention as the Constitution prescribes must be done when "domestic violence" develops beyond the

It is true that the U.S. attorney general and the governor of Alabama discussed beforehand the events leading up to the crisis on Saturday, but this does not justify federal intervention any more than it justifies mob action. Unless the regular processes of the law are permitted to take their course, the whole thing just becomes an emotional spectacle with politics and the bid for votes in the populous northern states playing its part, both under a Democratic and a Republican national administration.

If, as Supreme Court decisions in the past have indicated, there is a right of any citizen to travel through a state or inside a state without color discrimination on vehicles of transportation, the proper course for the aggrieved parties is to apply for court orders. Long drawn out as the cases might be, the necessary court support would be forthcoming and arrests for contempt for violating court orders would follow as a routine procedure.

TO SAY THAT "all this takes too much time," and that "we have waited long enough" is exactly what the mobsters used to argue passionately as they prepared to lynch a rapist. The cry was then heard: "He's guilty anyhow, why wait for the

Unfortunately, the Fourteenth Amendment, under which "equal protection of the law" has been fostered, was itself "ratified" at the point of the bayonet when, three years after the Civil War was over. the Southern states were coerced-by militiamen sitting in the state legislaturesinto "ratifying" the amendment. The Constitution itself prescribes a proper method of ratification, and the present generation is suffering 100 years later the consequences of the disregard of the Constitution in the period immediately after the Civil War. The Supreme Court has ruled on many Fourteenth Amendment cases but has consistently refused to pass upon any case involving the legality of the "ratification" of the Fourteenth Amendment itself (Copyright, 1961, New York Herald Tribune.Inc.)

I still maintain that the greatest show on earth is a political race as practiced in our country. No other field of entertainment can offer the explosive excitement of a politician as he primes his horn when spotting a chance to make a speech. No matter what we say, most of us believe portions of a television show, or a movie, or a play. The competence of the actors can easily lead us to vicarious enjoyment of the production as though we

were actually living in it. But few of us ever really believe what a politician says when he is coaxing us to vote for him. Most of them will go to any lengths by promising such and such when he gets into office. After election day, the candidate and the people who voted for him, have forgotten all of that and settle back for several dreary years until campaign fun time begins again.

FOR THIS REASON, I am often amazed to see people getting exercised over a couple of politicians feuding. In fact, many supporters actually get hot under the collar during a campaign, losing friendships due to differences of opinion.

On many issues, they might as well get mad because Marshal Dillon spurns the affections of Miss Kitty; it's all a show to be enjoyed and not to be taken too seriously. It would seem that the better attitude for both candidate and voter would be to encourage a sense of humor in the face of it all.

Perhaps it is a bit severe to lump all politicians together and classify them as

a group. Certainly there are some, though I doubt they are in anything like a majority, who are sincere office-holders, or office seekers, who seek to see that the taxpayer gets a square shake, and who earnestly attempt to complete a good job. But unfortunately, many are looking for a job or a position of power,

FOR PROOF, listen carefully to the next speech of a politician. Is he talking about the sacrifices he is going to make for his constituents, or is he asking that constituents make sacrifices so he can stay in a comfy, political job? Is he serving the taxpayer or does he want the taxpayer to serve him?

Does he talk about his position on local concrete problems, or does he confine his political talk on the situation of wheat growers along the Yalu River? Does he have a specific platform or does he repeat the national platform as though he wrote it?

I GUESS SUCH questions could go on and on. But it's remarkable how many successful politicians are still running on the success of their grandfather who died in the Alamo, or who came over on the Mayflower, or some other historic incident that has little or no bearing on 1961 problems. It's frightening how many of them enjoy fabulous success with no more than this to back them.

### Much Learning Sometimes Makes Men Mad

WASHINGTON - On May 10, 1961, Dr. Linus Pauling got a favorable write-up such as he only rates by the Lunatic Leftist press back home) in the Communist publication called Pravda. The occasion was Pauling's ban - the - bomb rally of 15 scientists from 65 nations at Oslo (Norway) University on the eve of the NATO Conference in that city.

Pauling handled the propaganda stunt skillfully enough to set off a torchlight parade, which NATO's new Secretary-General Stricker mistook for a turn-out in honor of NATO.

"What a mistake Secretary - General Striker made!" jeered Pravda, "At the present the hearts of the people are open to the ideas of Pauling, but tightly closed to the policy and propaganda of Rusk.'

DR. PAULING has earned himself one Nobel Prize in chemistry and umpteen black eyes through adverse criticisms by the sovereign government and Congressional committees of his indignant country. At times I have heard him testify he was garrulous rather than wise, the two extremes to which aging savants commonly go.

It is understandable, I suppose, that much learning makes men mad, and that they often wander into the political mystic philosophers' stones to restore their wisdom, or seeking newspaper publicity to restore their self-importance.

Also, it is appropriate, in a left-handed way, that such tired old men get their puff stories in Pravda and in equivalent journals of the Free World. We tolerate dangerous writings from incendiaries to aphrodisiacs in the name of civil liberty. This is as it should be.

BUT THERE ARE other matters, relating to Pauling and his ilk, which are not so easy to accept. Pierre Salinger. White House press secretary, has lately confirmed a published story to the effect that President Kennedy wants a press censor or "czar" to block news that might endanger the national safety -or, as some of us believe, might endanger the Administration's sinking prestige.

DESIRE FOR PRESS chesorship comes strangely, it seems to me, from the President and the all - powerful Democratic party which are so accommodating to mischief-makers like Pauling. Some years ago the Supreme Court found it "impermissible" for Secretary of State Dulles to stop passports on those who go abroad to mock the American foreign policy and to do their country harm. But Congress could stop this rat-hole in a jiffy — and would do so — if it weren't for the quixotic liberalism of the majority party. One word from Mr. Kennedy would snap the House and Senate out of the tomfoolery of Federalaid-to-everybody and cause the enactment of a passport law that would send Pauling back to shaking his test tubes in college laboratories instead of publicityhounding around the world.

THERE IS SOME unflattering commentary which rises from these facts as naturally as smoke rises from fire. Pauling's intellect has reached a state of unreason. In the name of peace and liberalism, he is supporting the Russian policy of disarming the United States. For this he is lauded by Pravda - which seems logical enough - but at the same time he is protected by a decision of the Supreme Court and his behavior is condoned by the inaction of Congress and by the apparent approval or indifference of the President.

Mr. Kennedy's attitude toward press censorship, I'm afraid, is related to his well - known desire to be a strong and powerful President. Two of these, Congress and the Courts, no longer seem minded to do their duties in this respect.

That leaves only the press, the "fourth estate" of government. But now the talk is that we're to be muzzled - although the Paulings, of course, are free to wag their jaws around the world, under protection of the American flag and the armed forces.

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
