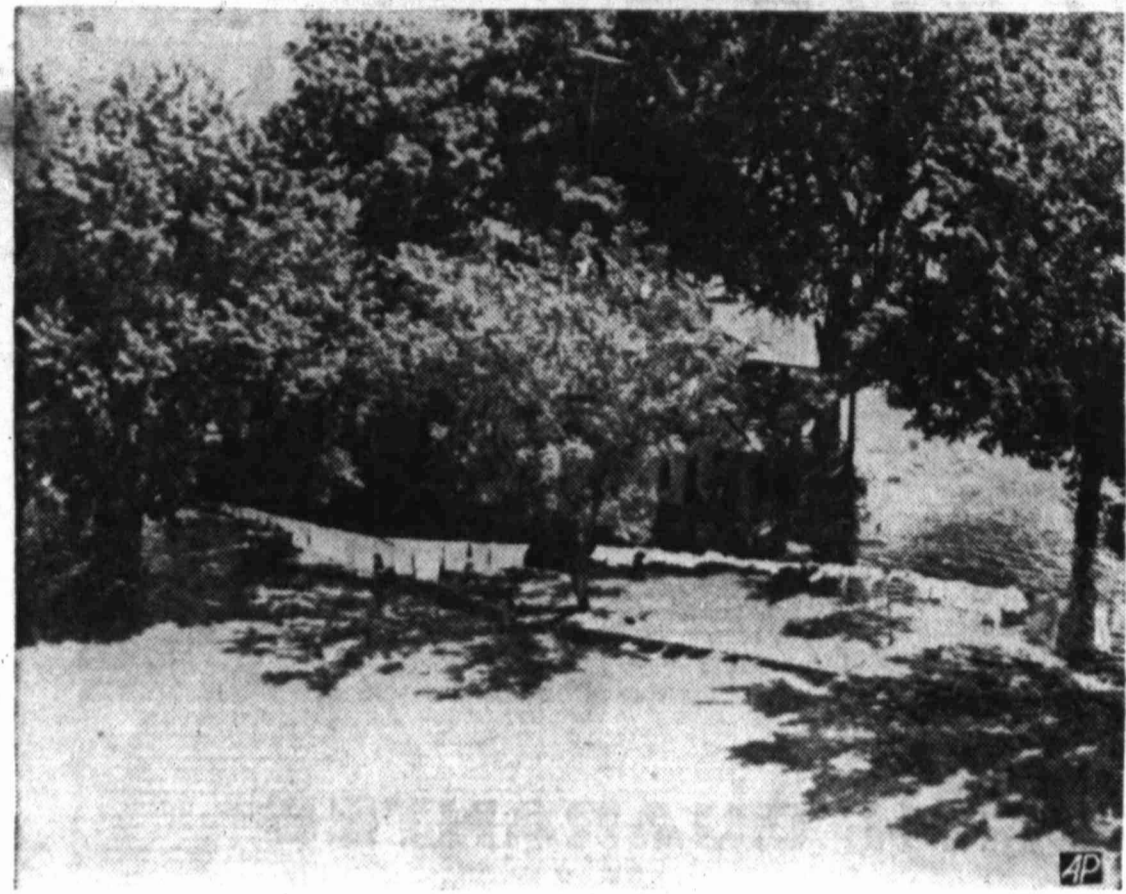

No One Killed When 3 Jet Craft Collide

Three aircraft—a pair of F-102 fighter interceptors and a T-33 jet trainer—collided northwest of here Thursday morning.

Neither of the pilots involved was a student.

Webb AFB personnel moved to the place where the planes crashed just east of the Knott school.

Three of the men parachuted safely and the fourth brought his F-102 in to a safe landing although it had suffered major damage. All three of the aircraft were based at Webb.

The F-102, from which the pilot had to eject, was flown by Capt. Glen A. Fletcher, 36, of 46-B Chantue. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Fletcher, Route 1, Shallowater, Texas.

The plane came whirling around and smoking through the air, and it hit all of a sudden in a plowed field on the Mr. Claude King place," said Juan Rodriguez, who farms southwest of Knott and was en route to Knott to get his mail.

Factors leading to the mid-air collision have not been fully determined, however an investigation is being conducted, authorities at Webb AFB said.

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
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
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DEAR ABBY

Demos Close Ranks Behind Sen. Blakley

Democrats closed ranks in Texas Thursday as John Tower and William Blakley neared a showdown in their U.S. Senate race next Saturday.

Maury Maverick Jr., San Antonio, became the last of the major losing candidates in the April 4 election to announce his support of Blakley. Maverick, a liberal, who previously had said he might "go fishing" on election day, endorsed the interim senator from Dallas.

The state Republican chairman, Tad Smith, said in Houston he will address a group of Republicans converts Thursday at a meeting in Harlingen.

Tower was to hold a news conference in Waco and campaign in

Temple, Bryan, Freeport and Brazoria County.

Blakley was flying to the Panhandle-South Plains for appearances at Pampa, Borger, Amarillo and Lubbock.

Eleven state legislators visited the Beaumont area on behalf of Blakley's campaign Wednesday.

Blakley and Tower are fighting it out for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont introduced the senator during a television program at Port Arthur.

Maverick telegraphed Edgar Berlin, Jefferson County campaign manager for Blakley: "Out of loyalty to the Democratic party, of which I am an official as a state committeeman,

I will vote next Saturday for Bill Blakley, the only candidate in the runoff who says he is a Democrat."

Before coming to Port Arthur for a reception and a televised speech, Blakley went handshaking in shopping centers at Beaumont, Orange and Bridge City.

Blakley said that as a member of the Senate's Judiciary Anti-trust subcommittee he will use his influence to protect housewives and farmers from any illegal price fixing.

He said this pledge was prompted by the findings of an investigator last week in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, where growers said tomatoes they are able to sell for only 2 cents a pound bring up to 39 cents a pound in retail markets.

Blakley said a probe continues to determine whether price fixing has affected the tomato market.

Republican John Tower said Wednesday night in Brownsville that he "was a conservative April 4, will be a conservative Saturday and a conservative when I come back and ask for re-election."

"I can sense victory over the state," he told 400 at a barbecue. The Senate candidate again hit at what he termed Sen. William Blakley's "absenteeism in the Senate."

"My opponent said he went to Washington to fight federal aid to schools and he is back in Texas and the fight is still going on," Tower said.

"I believe he went to Washington, and then, because his campaign was looking so bad, he wanted to get away from it for awhile."

Lyndon Finds Asia Prefers Freedom

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson reported to the Kennedy Cabinet today on his first-hand conclusion that embattled Asian countries can win their struggle against communism if they are properly supported with U.S. advice and aid.

Back from a 29,000-mile trip that took him through a half-dozen Asian countries, Johnson told a news conference late Wednesday: "Communism is not riding a tide of inevitable triumph in Asia. In the lands we visited, Asians have both the will to resist tyranny and the determination to make whatever sacrifices are called for."

The ingredients for a successful resistance to Communist terror, threats and pressures against the free nations of Asia, in Johnson's view, include adoption of "sly sleeve diplomacy" by U.S. representatives, a stepped-up aid program and extensive social reforms within the countries.

He foresees the possibility of a summit conference of President Kennedy and Asian leaders—though that would be sometime in the future.

Throughout his trip, Johnson reported, he did not encounter a single request for U.S. troops to be sent into the area and he declared there "is no plan and no intention at this time" to dispatch troops there.

The fact is, Johnson said, that "the free nations of Asia have the manpower." What they want from the United States, he said, is financial support and "technical guidance" that will make it possible for their own forces "to meet an unscrupulous enemy whose stock weapon is terror."

But they also need more than dollars, weapons and training, the vice president declared. They require "social and governmental

reforms to make certain that the benefits of economic development reach all the people and not just the dictators and the aristocrats."

"I know," Johnson said, "that given something for which to fight the peoples of Asia will man the ramparts of freedom and they will man them with valor. But you know as they do, that people do not fight in the steaming jungles to preserve hunger and squalor and oppression."

For its part the United States can do more not only by stepping up its military and economic assistance, Johnson continued, but also by developing new approaches to the peoples of Asia.

"We must get out of the air-conditioned and stately comforts and go among the people as the friendly, straightforward men and women the world believes that we are in America, and that we in America want to be," he said.

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Storms, Twisters Bounce Over State

Thunderstorms moved eastward across the state Wednesday night while tornadoes skipped over the Texas Panhandle and South Texas. No injuries or damage was reported.

Thunderstorms extended early in the day from Central Oklahoma southward along a line from Wichita Falls to Abilene and San Angelo.

One twister hit the ground west of Bula, 16 miles southwest of Littlefield. It moved to the northwest, touching ground several more times but was in the air when it passed over Littlefield.

Littlefield's residents took shelter in the courthouse and in the basements of the First Baptist Church and the General Telephone Building.

Another tornado funnel appeared briefly near Fieldton, 12 miles northeast of Littlefield, but it broke up before touching ground. There were other reports of twisters sighted northwest of Lubbock, near Cotton Center and Abernathy.

Rains up to an inch and a half accompanied the turbulent weather.

Earlier in the evening, three twisters dropped out of black clouds south of Victoria but only one of these touched the ground. It swirled young cotton plants and dirt 200 feet in the air.

And still another tornado was reported high over Austin about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday but it broke up after a few minutes.

Scattered thunder showers ranged over the area from the middle Gulf to Waco, Wichita Falls, Lubbock and the Big Bend Country.

South of San Antonio, Pleasanton had 1 1/2 inches of rain. Up to 2 inches of rain and some hail fell around Alpine, in the Big Bend Country, got only .37 of an inch of rain.

Thundermen welcomed the rains. The Kimball Ranch, 20 miles northeast of Alpine, reported the 2 inch rain while 1.15 inches fell north of Alpine.

Hail a half to three quarters inch in diameter fell at Amarillo.

Jury Rules Death Penalty For Pair In Torch Slaying

HOUSTON (AP)—An all-male jury Wednesday night sentenced a female impersonator and his girl friend to death in the electric chair for murdering a real estate dealer.

Both Leslie Douglas Ashley, 23, and Carolyn Lima, 19, appeared to take the verdict calmly.

Their lawyer, Jack Knight, said he will appeal.

The pair was convicted of the Feb. 6 murder of Fred A. Tones, 46, whose bullet riddled body was found burning in a ditch after being doused with gasoline.

Dist. Atty. Frank Briscoe praised the jury's verdict.

Neither Ashley nor Miss Lima would comment as they were taken back to their jail cells.

The case went to the jury at noon after Briscoe demanded death sentences for the couple.

Knight challenged the morals of

Tones and said the couple killed Tones only after he threatened them during a sex party.

"These defendants should be executed as they have been tried," Briscoe told the jury.

"It is inconceivable this prostitute and homosexual, with murder on their conscience, could point a finger at the man they murdered and burned and say he is immoral."

Ashley and Miss Lima were arrested Feb. 26 in New York City. During testimony, Ashley said he fired the first shot at Tones and that Miss Lima fired five more. Miss Lima agreed.

Moore Beefs About A Dig

NEW YORK (AP)— Archie Moore gazed into the audience at a press luncheon. He spied one writer who had been critical of him.

"You took me apart the other day," he said then, turning on the charm he added, "You said I was greedy. I wasn't greedy, just hungry."

That was the way it went with Archie, the ageless one, talking about himself and his June 19 title defense against Giulio Rinaldi of Italy at Madison Square Garden. The title is Moore's share of the world lightweight crown. He is recognized in New York, Massachusetts and Europe. Harold Johnson is recognized in the National Boxing Association states.

Moore's opponent, Giulio Rinaldi, is a 22-year-old Italian who has won seven titles as the Missions won 3-0.

By HARRY JUPITER SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—They don't call Willie Mays the "Say Hey Kid" anymore and there are two reasons.

When Mays first joined the New York Giants, 10 years ago today, he had a hard time remembering the names of his new teammates.

"If I couldn't think of the fellows name, Willie says, 'I'd say, uh, 'say hey'."

But it's been a long time since I didn't know the names of the fellows I play with and I haven't said 'say hey' in years."

As for calling him a kid, Willie says, "When you reach 30, it's time folks stopped thinking of you as a kid."

Like the oldtimer he now is, as baseball lifetimes go, Willie reflected on how times have changed since he's been in the National League.

"A lot of things are different since I broke in," Willie said, "It used to take a long time before you were accepted. I was really lucky but most rookies really got a hard time."

Mays is the only Giant left from the 1951 team that won the National League pennant in a thrilling playoff with the then Brooklyn Dodgers.

Some fans and writers have suggested that Mays lacks just one quality—leadership. But Alvin Dark, the Giants' shortstop when Willie broke in and his manager today, doesn't agree.

"He's definitely a leader. There is no substitute for ability. Willie's greatest leadership quality is his ability. He inspires us all with his plays—even the ones he does not make."

Mays has won all sorts of honors already in his spectacular career. He's a cinch to be named to the National League All Star team, which will make his eighth time on the squad. He's led the

major leagues in batting (.345 in 1954), in home runs (51 in 1955) and he's still the most exciting base runner in the game.

Last month he smashed four homers in a game at Milwaukee, the ninth player in the history of baseball to accomplish the feat.

What's left for this young man named Willie Mays? "I don't set goals," he says. "I don't try to hit 40 homers or try to hit .340. The only thing I try for is to be among the top 10 hitters in my league. If you're up there, you're usually up in everything."

The big thing is winning games and I just try to do my best every day."

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Coast Runner Breaks Mark

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)— Dwyol Burleson, warming up for his biggest mile tests next month, showed he is near or at peak form by cracking the U.S. and American citizens' standards with a 3:57.5 performance here Wednesday evening.

Two timers even caught him at 3:57.4 as he breasted the tape far in front of Archie San Romani Jr., a Wichita University transfer and son of a great miler of the 1930s.

The other four had him 2 of a second slower.

For Burleson, 20, a University of Oregon junior and member of the 1960 U.S. Olympic team, it was his fastest mile and the third time he has been under four minutes.

He broke an American record in April, 1960, in beating Eric Cunniff in 3:58.6. A month later Jim Beatty of the Santa Clara, Calif., Striders Club and formerly of North Carolina, smashed that record in defeating Burleson in a California race, although Burleson was 3:59.2.

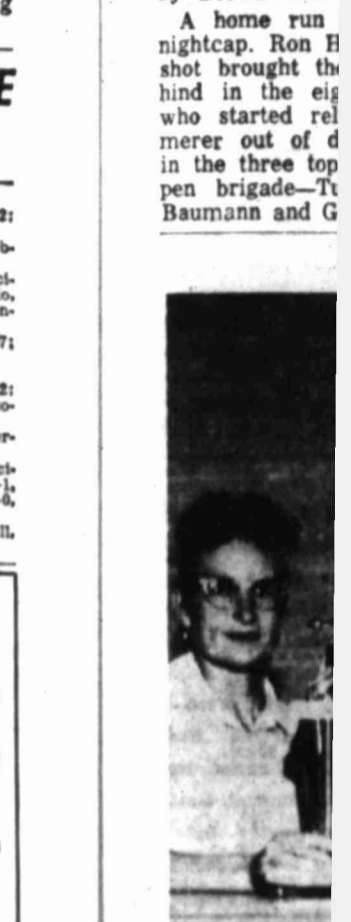

Sen. Byrd Challenges IRS On Possible Trade Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., said today the Internal Revenue Service will have to answer to Congress if it rules that tractors-for-prisoners donations are tax deductible.

President Kennedy called on Wednesday for contributions to a private committee he helped organize to buy 500 tractors to send to Cuba's Fidel Castro in exchange for 1,200 prisoners taken in the ill-fated invasion.

The statement touched off bitter debate in the Senate Wednesday night, with the Democratic leaders defending Kennedy's stand against Republican critics.

As a part of a policy in which Kennedy said the government is "putting forward neither obstacles nor assistance to this wholly private effort," the President noted that "tax exemption is granted as a matter of course to any charitable organization engaged

in the rehabilitation and assistance of needy refugees."

Challenging this, Byrd said representatives of the IRS will be called before the Senate Finance Committee, which he heads, to justify any such formal ruling.

"A ruling of this kind would be a distortion of existing regulations," Byrd said. "This is not charity, it is blackmail."

The IRS has drafted a letter to the citizens committee, presumably saying that it can have the tax deduction privilege if it meets certain conditions.

Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., said in a separate interview that until the IRS makes its ruling formally, Kennedy's statement that contributions would be tax exempt is not binding.

"This is just the expression of the President's opinion, which he has a right to have, but with which I differ," Williams said.

The challenge to making dona-

tion tax deductible reflected what amounted roughly to about 3-1 opposition to the tractors for prisoners deal among Congress members publicly expressing an opinion.

In other developments, newspaper publisher John S. Knight Wednesday declined an invitation to join the Tractors for Freedom Committee.

Knight, publisher of the Detroit Free Press, Miami Herald, Akron (Ohio) Beacon Journal and Charlotte (N.C.) Observer and News, said he received the invitation in a telegram from the committee. Invitations were sent to 50 prominent people, the committee said.

In his telegram from Detroit to the committee, Knight said, "I vigorously oppose any deals, however well intended, which would strengthen Castro in Latin America and subject the United States to further scorn and ridicule."

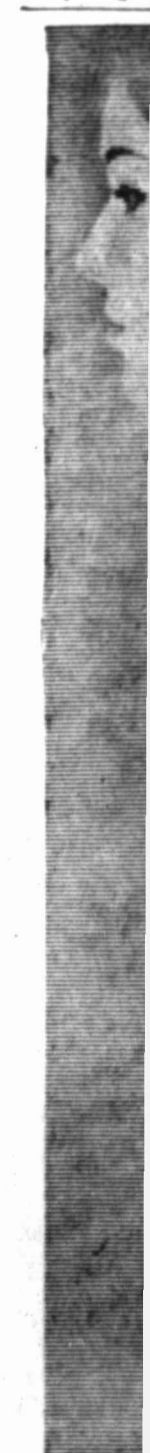

New Linecasting Machine Helps Herald Meet Deadline

Another linecasting machine was added to the Herald battery last week, giving the men in the "back shop" seven of the highly complex machines.

Of all modern innovations in the printing industry, probably none was so important as the linecasting machine.

After Gutenberg's invention of movable type, the printing industry developed around the typesetting press. Presses were modernized and changed regularly, but the type that made the impression remained relatively static.

HAND PICK

This required men to pick up each letter and place it in position for printing. This was a long, slow process and was a principal factor in any printing operation's deadline. No matter how fast the press could print a newspaper, it still required a long time to set the type. Adding more typesetters reached the point of diminishing returns.

Then, before the turn of the century, Otto Mergenthaler invented his Linotype machine. It was a fresh start at the typesetting problem and did not involve conventional setting type at all. Mergenthaler's machine operated from a keyboard, similar in appearance to a typewriter keyboard. But when the operator punched a key, a matrix fell into a selection rail and held it while the remainder of the letter matrices (type molds) are selected for the line. When the line is filled with matrices, the machine holds them while molten metal is forced against them making a line-of-type, hence the name.

RETURNED

The mats are returned to channels in a magazine to be used again. The lines-of-type (such as this story is composed of) are given to the operator to be taken to make-up tables.

This method of preparing type for the newspaper, completely revolutionized the industry. Batteries and batteries of type cases were no longer needed. Instead, a few machines could set type faster than squads of hand typesetters and insure that the paper would be out on time.

The machine, as Mergenthaler invented it, still stands about the same. Minor changes have been made and today there are two firms who produce them. One is the Linotype firm which still carries his name. The other is the Intertype Corp. which started out repairing Linotype machines. In fact, the first products of the latter firm were rebuilt Linotype machines.

CRANKY

Having the machines to do the work is only part of the job, however. Linecasting machines are cranky and cantankerous and some operators swear that they have a will of their own.

At any rate, most shops have a full time employe who does nothing but care for these machines. At the Herald, he is Bill Unger. After the paper has been put to bed for the day, usually about 2 p.m., Unger begins maintenance work on the Herald's seven machines.

This can involve anything from cleaning up the molds to a complete overhaul of some part that has been giving the composing room operators trouble. This maintenance insures the men that the machines will be ready to put out the following day's paper. The machines are located in the composing room of the Herald.

This is the area where the editorial and advertising staff send copy to be prepared for the day's paper.

FOREMAN

In this room, Carroll (Rusty) Smith is foreman and has the responsibility of seeing that all copy for the day's edition is properly handled so that it is ready on time, put together in pages, and delivered in time to the stereotype and press departments.

It isn't an easy responsibility. There are 11 men in the department to take care of all the chores that come up. Operating the various linecasting machines are Bob Clark, Ed Maedgen and Tommy Jordan. They handle the preparation of advertising copy type, considered one of the most difficult jobs in the composing room.

Leo Gonzales has charge of the teletype - setting machines, four linecasting machines that are almost robots. These set type from strips of perforated tape and require no operator at the keyboard. But they must be watched constantly to insure that there's no slip-up in the works.

IN FORMS

Once the type has been set, it must be placed in forms called chases. These are the same size as this newspaper page and hold the type rigid so the page can be

made ready for the stereotype room.

The first step is making up (or assembling) ads and placing them in the pages. This is done by Granville Glenn and Jimmy Jones. Larry Smith has charge of the classified make-up section.

Ready for the editorial matter, the chases are turned over to Coy Loving, assistant foreman, and Bob Rogers, who complete the make-up by adding editorial matter according to dummies (charts).

MOST ALL

Although the composing room work is distributed among the personnel, most of the Herald's back-shop employes can operate most of the equipment in the shop. Smith, the foreman, can operate the linecasting machines, which he does in times of emergency. Usually, he is helping on the make-up bank.

The Herald composing room is typical of all newspaper plants, although some are larger and others smaller. The speed with which these men can complete a page make-up is indicated by the fact that some stories can get in the day's paper no matter how late they occur.

For instance, the Herald's daily oil news is usually written between noon and 12:30 p.m. each day. From this typewritten copy, the composing department, by virtue of the linecasting machine, can have the lines-of-type set, placed in the page, and turned over to the press room by 1 p.m.

HARD TASK

Before the day of the linecasting machine, this would have been an almost impossible task.

The Herald's additional machine will mean even more speed and economy for the department. Indirectly, it means a better newspaper for Big Spring.

3 Navy Planes Break Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Three Navy jet fighter planes streaked from coast to coast Wednesday, all breaking the transcontinental air-speed record.

Lt. Richard F. Gordon, 31, Seattle, Wash., piloted the fastest plane (3 hours, 47 minutes); an average speed of 871.38 miles per hour.

Accompanying Gordon was Lt. Bobbie R. Young, 34, Modesto, Calif., a radar-interceptor officer. In winning the Bendix Trophy Race, Gordon made the run from Ontario, Calif., to Floyd Bennett in about the same time it takes to go from Pelham Bay to Coney Island by subway.

The previous record over the same course was 3 hours, 7 minutes, 44 seconds, set in 1957 by Air Force Lt. Gustav B. Klatt.

Deadline Nears To Sign For Grain Program

Deadline to sign intentions to participate in the 1961 feed grain program in May 31, Gabe Hammack, manager of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, reminded today.

The office will be closed on Tuesday, Memorial Day, hence it would be wise to sign in advance of that date if possible, said Hammack. He anticipated that the office force would be busy on the final day.

The 1961 feed grain program is voluntary. Its framers say it is designed to halt the buildup of feed grain surpluses.

Producers who have a grain sorghum base established for a farm must reduce at least 20 per cent in order to be eligible for CCC loans on oats, barley and grain sorghums. Payments may be made in cash or grain, and a producer may receive an advance payment, if he desires, when he signs the intention to participate.

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Art Of Old West Gets A New Home

FORT WORTH (AP)—A significant segment of Western culture lives in a handsome new home. Select works by Charles-Maria Russell and Frederic Remington, two of the world's most famous artists, are housed in the new Art of Old West museum, the Amos Carter Museum of Western Art.

Russell, a Missourian, went west at 16 to become a cowboy in Montana. He sketched and painted constantly but did not abandon his cowboy life until 1893, when he settled down to a full-time career as an artist. Remington, a native New Yorker, headed west the same year as Russell—1890. He roamed the West and Southwest working as a cowboy, scout, prospector and sheep and mule rancher. In 1885 he returned East to sell his sketches.

sell and Remington paintings—oils, water colors, blacks and whites, pen and ink drawings and illustrated letters. The Russell canvases alone number more than 40 major works, including most of those ranked as the top artistic achievements of his career. There are more than 60 Russell bronzes, comprising the only complete collection in existence of original Russell castings.

More Rain Would Probably Do More Harm Than Good

Men are guiding tractors methodically over most of the (armlands) in Howard County, breaking up the moist earth and dropping in seeds for the 1961 crop. After a long wait, toward the end of which some farmers were beginning to look at the gray sky anxiously, the rains came and spread enough moisture over most of the county. Only a few areas could use more rain. Jimmy Taylor, county agent, said: "A strip about 10 miles wide and long between the Lamesa and Snyder highways north of Big Spring needs more rain, he said. "If we get more rain soon, farmers in that area will probably plant again," he said, "but most are planting now." Most parts of the county, especially around Lomax, Elbow and Vincent, should yield a good crop if all else stays in the farmer's favor. Taylor said the rain came just right for most of the farmers. In most cases, additional rain, especially if there is quite a bit of it, could do more damage than good. The water could carry sand over the planted seeds or pack down the earth so the seeds could not grow. Taylor noted that grass is beginning to green the pasturesland. Most of the weeds were gone before the rain, he pointed out, and the grass can grow without much competition.

Why Did Noted Trio Decide To Break Up?

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Why would three young fellows take the ax to a golden goose that has been bringing them a million dollars a year? That's what folks have been asking since the announcement that the Kingston Trio is breaking up. The news came with a terse "conflict of interests" explanation, which didn't explain much. The split is puzzling not only because the Kingstons are one of the greatest successes in recent show business, but also because they have always displayed the greatest of affability on stage. The major issue appears to be this: Dave Guard, crew-cut leader of the trio, wants to aim toward better music. Handsome Bob Shane and stubby Nick Reynolds, plus the trio's bearded manager, Frank Werber, want to stick to the pop songs that made them famous. Speaking from his Palo Alto home, Guard said: "Our problem is a matter of ambition—where we want to go and how we get there. I want to make good music. The other two aren't dedicated musicians. I feel very strongly about this; otherwise I wouldn't be turning away a huge guarantee. Speaking for the other camp from his San Francisco office was manager Werber: "It's a matter of selection of material. Dave feels his whole interest is music, and he is very scholarly about it. The other two are more happy-go-lucky. They'd rather do the simple songs. When we started out, the organization was fairly democratic. But it has gotten to the point of Dave forcing his will, so to speak." James Saphier, the Kingston's Hollywood mentor who first took them to Capitol Records, observed: "In every act, there has to be a take-charge guy. That has always been Dave. It is not unusual that the other two would develop a conflict with him. "But they have a long cooling-off period and I think they might patch it up."

100 May Die Over Holiday

CHICAGO (AP)—The National Safety Council estimated today as many as 100 persons might be killed in traffic over the Memorial Day holiday. The estimate, which the council stressed was not a prediction of that many deaths, covers those occurring in the 36-hour period between 6 p.m. local time Monday and midnight Tuesday. NEW YORK (AP)—The television channels are due for drastic dredging operations during the summer and when the new season opens in September the viewers are sure to miss some of their old favorites. Network schedules for fall are now pretty well filled and, by my count, at least 38 weekly entertainment programs out of some 109 current shows will be among the missing. Among them, according to present plans, will be such established, long-playing favorites as the Groucho Marx, Ernie Ford, Loretta Young, June Allyson and Shirley Temple shows. Death, as it must, will visit "This Is Your Life," a herd of horse-herders, too, will move onto that big coral in the sky: "Wyatt Earp," "Bat Masterson," "Stagecoach West," "The Deputy," "The Rebel," "Gunsmoke" and "Whispering Smith." Mortality will be high among the situation comedies, too. Departing are "The Tom Ewell Show," "Bringing Up Buddy," "The Tab Hunter Show," "Peter Loves Mary," and "Guestward Ho." "Peter Gunn" disappears after three seasons; "Michael Shayne" after one. The end, too, is in sight for "The Law and Mr. Jones" and "Harrigan and Son." The trauma of breaking viewing habits may be compounded by confusion due to many shifts of programs. "Maverick" will be seen an hour earlier. "Bachelor Father" moves from NBC to ABC; "Robert Taylor's Detectives" goes from ABC to NBC. "Checkmate" jumps into a Wednesday night spot and Dinah Shore goes bi-weekly—on Fridays. Steve Allen will make a comeback on another network—ABC—fighting the ratings battle with "Wagon Train" instead of Ed Sullivan. Johnny Carson is one of two or three hot candidates to replace Arthur Godfrey next season on "Candid Camera." Keefe Braselle may be under consideration for a regular part in next season's "Checkmate."
