Panel Considers Mercy For Convicted Killer

AUSTIN (AP)—The State Pardon Board today will decide whether Howard Stickney will go to the electric chair early Saturday or have his sentence commuted to life imprisonment. Stickney's attorney and family made a dramatic presentation to the board Thursday in a last grasp attempt to save the life of the convicted killer.

from Stickney was offered. It states that Stickney admits taking a gun wrench out of the trunk of the car and beating Barnes with it. Then he said in the document that he struck Mrs. Barnes and pushed her head in the water. He then returned to his home in Houston where he lived with his mother, the statement said.

other men who said they saw Stickney lying on the beach and another man arguing with Barnes. One of the two men later refuted his first affidavit on the stand during a federal court hearing and the presiding judge held the other statement to be "fantastic and false."

He was sentenced to die for the murder of Mrs. Clifford (Shirley) Barnes, May 24, 1958, on Galveston Beach. He was implicated but never tried for the murder of her husband, whose body was found a month later at the Brazos River near Sugar Land. Mrs. Barnes' nude body was discovered in her Houston home several days after her murder. Stickney was a Highway Department co-worker with Barnes.

Looney argued Stickney said he signed the confessions as dictated by Houston police officers because they threatened to prosecute his mother as an accessory to murder unless he confessed.

Stickney, according to Looney, awoke from an apparent blow on the head to find them dead. Looney said he has pressed Stickney to recall any details of what happened that night but his reply is that "all those things in the confession were what the officers told me had happened. I don't remember anything."

Stickney made the statement to Heard in the presence of Asst. Warden Joe Byrd and Don Reid Jr., editor of the Huntsville Item. "I will answer the questions to the best of my ability, and then Reid can hand the answers to the group," he continued.

Stickney said he would permit one newsman to visit him on death row today to verify the requests.

He spelled out his requests regarding interviews and death chamber witnesses to Jack Heard, assistant director of the Texas Department of Corrections.

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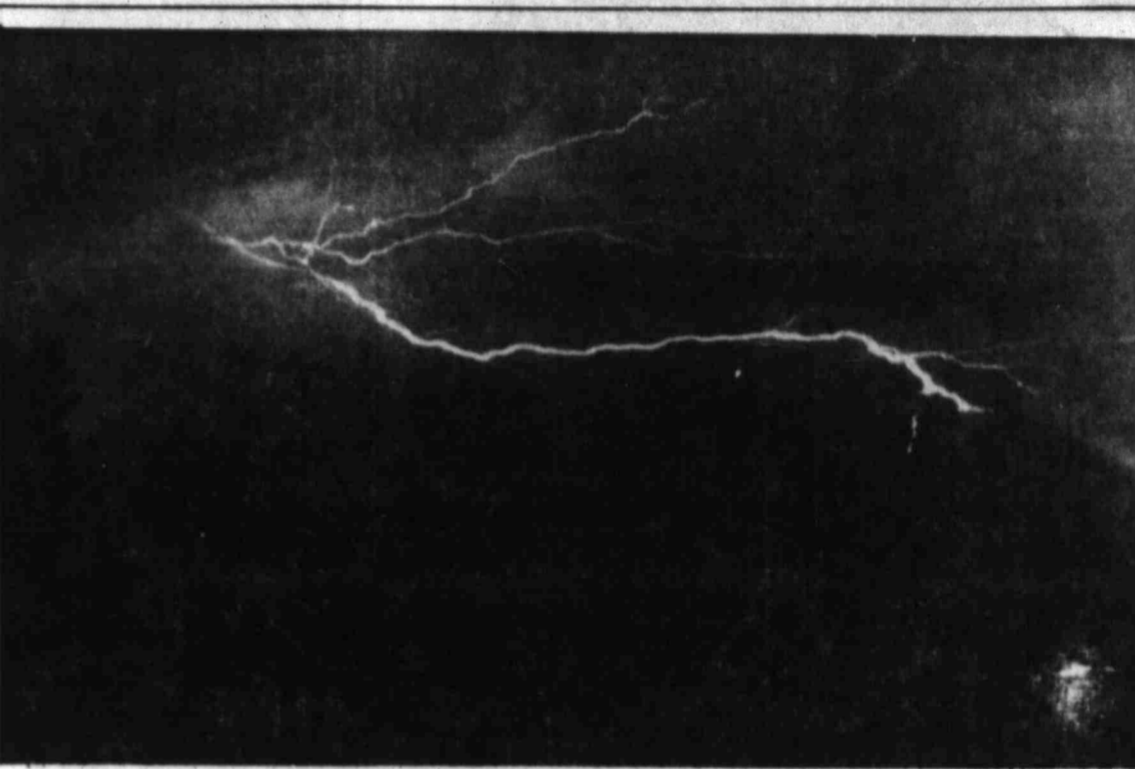

Center Studies Trends Of Texas Growth

AUSTIN — Will Texas' largest cities—Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth—grow larger and larger, or will new metropolitan centers rise to compete with them? What major factors are influencing growth trends in the state's smaller cities (under 50,000 population)?

What is the relation of urban functions (retail stores, churches, hospitals and other services) to population growth or decline in Texas cities?

These and other questions are the concern of the University of Texas Population Research Center, which will complete its first year of operation Sept. 1. It is one of the University's combination research - training - public service agencies, which generate knowledge, give advance research training and experience to graduate students and provide a basic service to Texas industry and governmental units.

One of the Center's reports will be an annual population estimate, first for counties and later for major cities, for the years between Federal census reports (made every 10 years). Some of the indicators used in making such estimates are school enrollment figures, statistics on births and deaths, and vehicle registrations.

Dr. Leonard Broom, sociology department chairman and ex-officio director of the Center, and Dr. Jack P. Gibbs, associate director, emphasize that the Center will not attempt to influence any policy decisions by business or government, although interpretation of data will be an integral part of the Center's reports. Nor will the Center attempt studies for individual firms or agencies—that is a job for private enterprise.

"Texas is probably the most dynamic state in the Union, populationwise, presenting more trends than other states," says Dr. Gibbs. "The state as a whole is growing at a tremendous rate. At the same time, a large proportion of counties are rapidly losing population."

First Solo Made By Lt. Childers

Lt. Childers received his B. A. Degree and his Air Force commission at North Texas College, Denton, in January, 1961. He studied air science through the college's AFROTC program.

Lt. Childers checked in with Class 62-G on April 15, and went into primary May 15. He should advance into basic by Oct. 26, according to his instructor Capt. James Hayes.

Personnel Begins Checking Records Of Webb's Airmen

Wing Personnel has tackled the task of verifying and bringing the records of over 1,000 Webb AFB airmen up to date.

Already going full blast, the Records Perfection Program has a deadline on July 15. To achieve this task in seven weeks, Wing Personnel Officer Lt. Col. John F. Holt instituted, for the first time at this base, the line processing system. It follows the personnel processing pattern at induction centers, replacement depots and military availability survey centers.

Twelve stations are set up in the Airmen's Division, and day by day a steady stream of men make short and long halts as they check each item in their files, making necessary entries or deletions, and producing supporting papers when necessary.

Lyndon Says Reds Must Fight To Take Over Asia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson said today the United States will not surrender the free people of Asia to communism "without putting up a fight."

He said it was his judgment that "freedom in Asia is worth fighting for" and that the American people, once they understand the tremendous stakes, "are ready to follow the path that means freedom—not just for Asians, but for ourselves as well."

He spoke at a conference of United Press International editors. Communism, the vice president declared, "is not riding a tide of inevitability in Asia," and "it can be stopped in its tracks."

"Simple arithmetic and common horse sense dictate that we

take the necessary steps to maintain the freedom of nations that have not fallen under the Communist yoke," Johnson said.

Johnson said the countries he visited on his recent trip for President Kennedy have a population of 606 million and do not include countries outside the iron and bamboo curtains such as Japan, Indonesia, Afghanistan and others.

He added it did not require great imagination to determine what the Communists would do next if they could add these millions to their ranks and take over the tremendous resources of rubber, tin, rare minerals and other critical materials of Southeast Asia.

The body will lie in state at 1301 W. 2nd until service time.

Survivors are the parents, two brothers, Consilio and Benardino, Big Spring; four sisters, Olivia, Margarita, Beatriz, and Maribel.

Locally Active Officer Leaves For Study In Spain

Going to Spain in the uniform of an Explorer Scout is the plan of Capt. Gerald T. McMillan, who was released from active Air Force duty last week at Webb. He plans to study at the University of Barcelona for two years. At present he is attending the Explorer Delegates Convention at Oklahoma City as advisor for the Lone Star District and as a representative from Big Spring. The trip to Spain should take him about three months, he figures.

With no definite itinerary drawn up, he will go by way of the Far East, visiting as many countries as possible.

"I want to call on Scout organizations in the Philippines, Japan, Korea, Formosa, China, Indonesia, Thailand, Pakistan, India and other Near and Middle East countries as I'm able to," he said.

McMillan will take every opportunity to work his way on tramp steamers, ocean liners, freighters, caravans, and "come what may." But if behind schedule he's prepared to pay part way. After two years' studies at the university, he plans to retrace his over-sea, over-land route, visiting the same Scout organizations.

An Air Force officer since 1953, he came to Webb in 1957 and was promoted to captain in December, 1959. During his stay at Webb, Capt. McMillan was an active Explorer advisor for Post 1, despite his Air Force duties, first as flight line instructor, and then as academic instructor in aerodynamics and survival. He was the first Scout to attain the Eagle rank through the Explorer method in this district.

Largely through his efforts, the Post obtained a building of its own and he got a remodeling. Among activities he sponsored were a skiing trip, numerous overnight camping trips, including visits to far West Texas in the Davis Mountains and Big Bend National Park areas.

McMillan was also active in the First Methodist Church, teaching a Sunday school class. He worked in the first annual Christmas pageant, launched last year by the YMCA, providing the musical effects. Also at the Y, he signed on as a camping instructor.

He played many parts in local theatrical productions, including the annual Easter Pageant produced by the Big Spring Civic Theatre. He also was a past board member of the BSCT.

One of them, Rep. Robert R. Barry, R-N.Y., has two children and the belief "that the warmth and support of a family are vital to the efficiency of many congressmen."

Armed with this observation and also the statistics that senators have about 140 school-age children and House members more than 600, he appeared Thursday before the House Rules Committee.

His aim: Action on his resolution requiring Congress to recess every year, or at least every other year, from the end of June until early October.

He got no immediate sympathy from the committee, even after saying wives of 175 senators and representatives have signed a petition favoring the summer recess.

Meanwhile, operating on a second front—the Senate—Sen. Gale W. McGee, D-Wyo., said a Senate resolution proposing annual summer vacations for Congress has been misunderstood.

He urged Congress to adopt a policy of "continuous year-around sessions" with time out for summer vacations, election campaigns and the national political conventions. Such a policy, he said, "will result in less time off, rather than more."

Rep. Richard S. Schweiker, R-Pa., joined Barry in his plea for summer family unity before the House committee. Schweiker, the father of two, said the public expects members of Congress—like ministers—to lead ideal family lives. They should have their summer fun together, he said.

The Barry-Schweiker plea on behalf of children and mothers seemed to make headway with Chairman Howard W. Smith, D-Va., a grandfather many times over.

Storms Punish West Texas Again, Scare Waco Citizens

Thunderstorms punished West Texas anew Thursday night and spread into Central Texas where twisters gave some residents of the tornado-wary Waco area a scare.

There were reports of at least two tornadoes around Waco where the Weather Bureau clocked winds of 85 miles per hour.

One tornado was reported 10 miles west of Snyder and another 15 miles north of the West Texas city. There also was a report of another near Rockwall, northeast of Dallas.

The first tornado funnel sighted was in the Axtell area, northeast of Waco, and the second at Moody, 25 miles south.

Ed Jaska, principal of the Ross Elementary School, put his relatives in the family car and left home as the storm slammed across the area.

Jaska said an odd cloud formation formed above his home.

He described the formation as

looking "just like" the one that spanned the tornado of May 11, 1953, which killed 114 persons.

Heavy hail beat down cotton and torrential rains flooded fields in the Fluvanna area, 60 miles southeast of Lubbock.

"Some cotton farmers south and east of Fluvanna say they were wiped out," said cotton farmer Bo Forehand.

Forehand said rains of 2 to 3 1/2 inches fell in the area.

Dunyon Evans said large hail wiped out his 250-acre cotton crop just southwest of Fluvanna.

"The fields looked like lakes," he said.

Hail the size of hen eggs covered fields southwest of Fluvanna. Cotton is the main crop of that area.

Young cotton plants also were heavily damaged in the Floydada area, 60 miles northeast of Lubbock, where a 2 1/2-inch rain fell.

A newsman at Lockney, northeast of Floydada, said about 40 per cent of the wheat crop in the area was destroyed by a 2-inch rain and hail. The hardest hit section extends from one mile east to six miles southeast of Lockney.

Planting of some 2 million acres of cotton, largest crop in the history of the South Plains area, was completed a month ago.

Rains also were heavy around

Lubbock. Mrs. Ray Greentree received minor injuries when lightning hit her home.

Lightning knocked off a corner of Midland's 14-story Shell Oil Co. building during a one-inch rain with light hail.

Kennedy Finishes Review Of Army Politics Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy has finished reviewing the Army's investigation of charges that Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker exposed his troops in Germany to propaganda of the militantly conservative John Birch Society.

Indications are that Walker will be dealt what amounts to a reprimand in the report, which is expected to be made public Monday.

There was speculation that Walker will ask to retire. Though only 51, the Texas-born general has completed 30 years of Army service and is entitled to retire if he wishes.

The investigation was ordered by Kennedy in mid-April after the privately-owned Overseas Weekly, widely read by American soldiers in Europe, charged that Walker used a troop information program to subject men of his 24th Infantry Division to "a propaganda barrage" of John Birch Society material. The society is strongly anti-Communist.

The paper also alleged that Walker, in a speech, described as "definitely pink" former President Harry S. Truman, former Secretary of State Dean Acheson and Eleanor Roosevelt. This too, was investigated by the Army.

Walker has denied both charges.

Cuban Property Is Up For Grabs

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cuban property in the United States was up for grabs today by Americans whose holdings in Cuba were confiscated by Fidel Castro.

Circuit Judge Hal P. Dekle Thursday ruled that any Cuban property found in this country can be attached. He found in favor of Terry Kane, who contended that the Cubans confiscated \$22,500 worth of farm equipment in his tractor agency.

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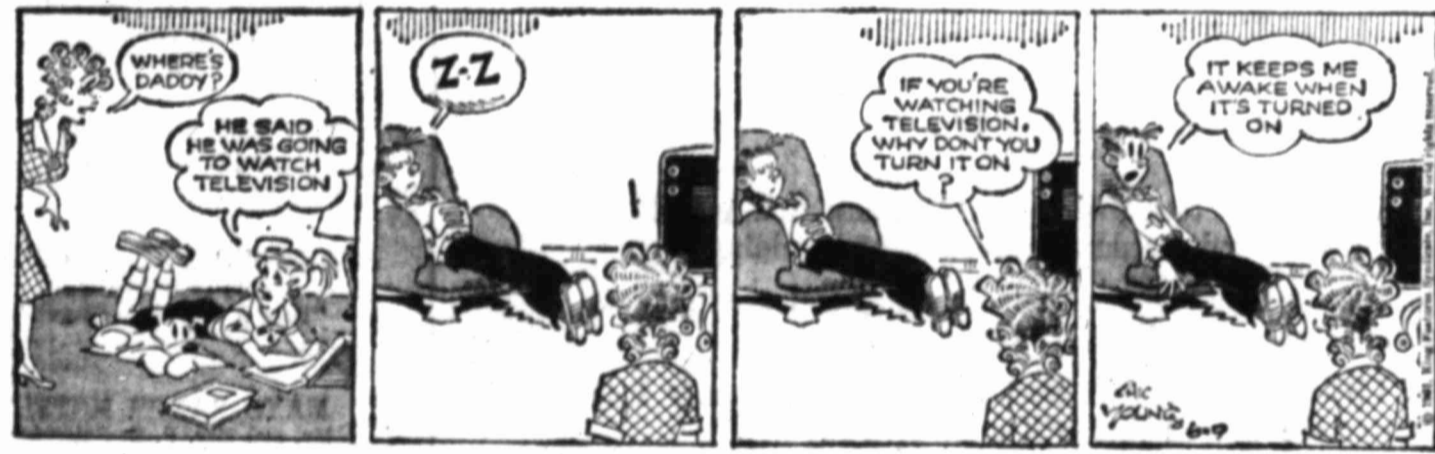
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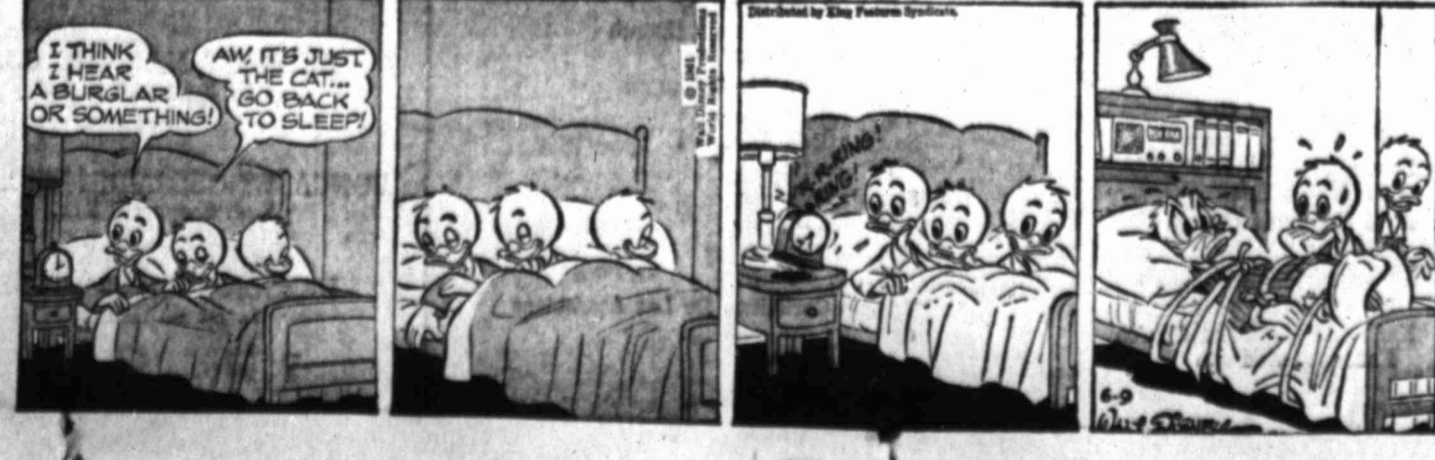
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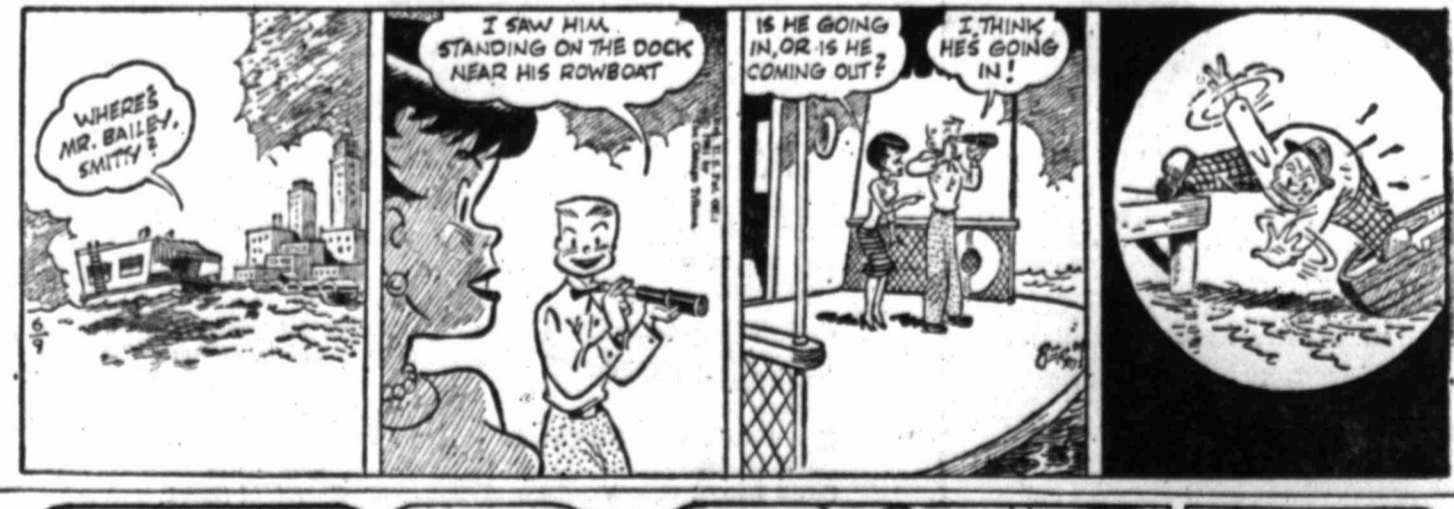

THE FIVE WORLDS OF OUR LIVES. By the Editors of Newsweek and Cartographers of C. S. Hammond & Co. Hammond, \$12.50.

Recent history, with geographical interpretations, is the theme of this large volume.

Upon casual examination it seems to be just a picture book, reminding one of old newsreels that flicker through a recollection of the turbulent decades since the turn of the century. But it has more substance than this, and more reference value, because of the terse text and the 50 original maps.

It begins with the World of Imperialism at the end of the Victorian Age, detailing the empires of all major powers. Then comes the World of Idealism and Upheaval, from Woodrow Wilson and the League of Nations to the 1930's. Next comes the World of Dictators and the Second World War, followed by the World of Nationalism and the Cold War. Fi-

Castro Claims Cuba Is 'Open'

HAVANA (AP)—Fidel Castro said today Cuba is open to Americans and Cubans are free to go to the United States—"even to go to American universities to see if they can be brainwashed there."

The prime minister spoke at the closing session of the leftist assembly of the Union of International Students. He made no mention of the tractors-for-prisoners deal in his two-hour speech.

The revolutionary leader berated foreign news agencies for their reports on the Cuban situation and declared: "Revolutions are the most misunderstood events in the history of the world and history is made not by news agencies but by the revolutionaries. We have never said we are Communists. This is a name that has been given to us. This is a socialist revolution."

nally there is the World of Space. There are more than 400 photographs, many in color, and reproductions of paintings, drawings and cartoons. Together with the maps they present a vivid panorama.

MILA 18. By Leon Uris. Doubleday, \$4.95.

When Uris wrote "Exodus," he incorporated a brief episode about the uprising in the Warsaw ghetto during World War II. This novel is a terse narrative of a doomed, desperately heroic group of men and women who fought that battle. The story begins in August, 1939, on the eve of war. Gradually the terrifying blows of fate fell—the German occupation, the creation of 100 city blocks of walled ghettos, starvation, the dumping of uprooted Jews into the ghetto until there were half a million, the shipments to the death camps.

Finally when the gruesome shipments had removed all but a tenth of the ghetto's humanity, the Jewish leaders decided to fight back with smuggled and homemade weapons. About a thousand of them held off Nazi soldiers, bombs, tanks and planes for a month and a half. Only a few score crawled through the sewers for a final escape. The book takes its title from the street address of the bunker that served as headquarters for the revolt.

Uris has made the story memorable because he has succeeded in combining dramatic action with the whole wide gamut of his characters' ideas and emotions. There are two principal heroes, in the individual sense—Andrei Androfski, the Uhlan officer who always demanded violent action, and Alex Brandel, the scholar and pacifist. Brandel eventually agrees to the use of violence, and symbolically hurls the first gasoline bomb at the advancing Germans. Androfski serves as military leader of the doomed battalion. But more important than either of them is the journal which Brandel has been keeping, to be smuggled out later for the world to see.

There are sharp characterizations in this novel, such as the Italian journalist who goes into the ghetto because of another man's wife; the corrupt Nazi officials; and the teen-agers who fall in love amid all the horrors.

Some readers may compare this book with John Hersey's "The Wall," but the criteria are different. Uris has written a first rate novel, vivid and moving, about heroic figures. Because he has given it the dramatic effect of fiction it carries a strong, personal impact.
