## New 50-Star Banners Fly As City Observes Flag Day

New 50-star flags flew throughout Big Spring in observance of Flag Day today. In further observance this evening beginning at 6:30 in Codden Little League park, the traditional Flag Day program will be staged by the Elks Lodge. This will be the 33rd annual national observance of the day. The first Flag Day was declared by Congress in 1908 at the urging of the Elks Lodges all over the nation. At the local ceremony today the history of the flag will be read by John Taylor, and the story of each of the emblems will be told as the flag is presented. Climax of the program will be the presentation of the new flag boasting 50 stars with 13 stripes. As the flag is brought forward, the audience will join in singing the national anthem. Members of the various Boy Scout troops and Explorer posts will serve as color guards as five flags which have represented our country throughout history are presented, and the Elks-sponsored troop drum and bugle corps will perform.

## Sen. Mansfield Suggests 'Free' Berlin To Avoid A Nuclear Clash

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., suggested today establishment of an internationally protected free city of Berlin to avert an East-West nuclear clash. Mansfield, the Senate's Democratic leader, said that if the world must live indefinitely with a divided Germany, peace itself requires that "Berlin—all Berlin—be held in peace and trust until the day of unification." He said that the way to peace cannot be found either in Soviet Premier Khrushchev's proposal to turn only U.S.-supported West Berlin into a free city or in the West's insistence on a status quo in Berlin until Germany is reunited. "Berlin is the lever which may ease Europe toward a more durable security or push the Western nations and the Soviet Union into a new vortex of irrationality at whose center lies the graveyard of humanity," Mansfield said in a speech prepared for Senate delivery. Mansfield said that the United States will not be "driven, pushed or harassed" from fulfilling its responsibilities for freedom in Berlin. But he warned that the U.S. commitment to Berlin's defense extends from a beginning of firmness "to a final pledge of every man, woman and child in the nation." "We are not engaged at Berlin with the fast draw and wax bullets of television any more than the Russians are engaged in a harmless game of chess," Mansfield said. "In the last analysis we are engaged now, as we have been in Berlin, with the whole future of the United States." Mansfield made clear that in advancing his suggestion, which is close to a position he has been advocating for years, he was speaking as an individual senator. He said that in addition to the Western proposal for a free West Berlin and the Western insistence on a status quo, "a third way may lie in the creation of a free city not in West Berlin alone, but in the creation of a free city which embraces all Berlin—the Communist East no less than the free Western segment of that metropolis."

The first of three bus riding groups totaling 32 white and Negro "Freedom Riders" arrived at Myrtle Beach, S.C., this morning for a brief rest stop after the short, uneventful trip from Wilmington, N.C., where they spent Tuesday night. Eight members of the party that left Washington Tuesday were aboard the scheduled public (Greyhound) bus that was to take them to Charleston, S.C., where they will remain overnight before continuing to Florida Thursday. Six more riders who remained in Wilmington overnight were due to leave this afternoon for Charleston, also by scheduled bus, in their test of racial segregation in the South. They will proceed to Jacksonville, Fla., Thursday morning and go on to St. Petersburg, Fla., Friday. They are not passing through Alabama or Mississippi. ## City Is Alerted To Bad Weather

Big Spring was alerted to possible bad weather for Wednesday afternoon from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. in a Weather Bureau warning issued at 11 a.m. Heavy rains, strong surface winds and some hail were forecast in an area covering much of West Texas, other towns in the storm zone were Odessa, Midland, San Angelo, Big Spring, Monahans, Fort Stockton and McCamey. A few light sprinkles were reported in the Big Spring area shortly before noon. Downtown the moisture was just a light mist but there was a report of a slightly heavier shower south and west of town.

## Group To Leave Cuba Thursday

HAVANA (AP) — U.S. negotiators announced today they will leave Cuba Thursday whether or not they get a tractors-for-prisoners agreement with Prime Minister Fidel Castro—and indications were they will not. A spokesman made the announcement while the four-man American team sat cooling its heels in a Havana hotel, awaiting another meeting with Cuban officials. It still was unclear whether they would get to see Castro personally. The group expected to meet with the Cuban chief today. He was reported to have returned to Havana from eastern Cuba Tuesday night. The four non-government U.S. technical experts arrived Tuesday to work out a swap of 500 tractors for the 1,214 Cuban invasion prisoners Castro holds. In a two-hour meeting Tuesday, Cuban President Osvaldo Dorticos stuck to Castro's terms which are unacceptable to the American negotiators. A spokesman for the U.S. group, Duane T. Greathouse, said arrangements were being made to fly back to Washington Thursday no matter what happens in talks today. He said the team will report promptly in Washington to its parent Tractors for Freedom Committee of prominent U.S. citizens who are raising funds for the tractors. The committee heads are Eleanor Roosevelt, Walter P. Reuther and Dr. Milton Eisenhower.

## Group To Leave Cuba Thursday

The Castro provision on an exchange of prisoners for tractors—an idea which Castro himself first advanced—was spelled out in firm tones in today's Havana newspapers, which are government-controlled. Dorticos was reported to have stuck to Castro's demands for heavy tractors, the kind used for big construction jobs ranging from roads to airfields. **NOT BIG ONES** The U.S. team is offering smaller tractors for farm work, not the big ones. Dorticos also was cited as ruling out the exchange of tractors for three of his prize prisoners captured in the invasion of April 17 that was crushed. These are Manuel Artime, the invasion leader; Jose San Roman, one of the battalion commanders, and Rafael Bolivar Fuentes. The Havana radio reported that the three men will be freed only in a man-for-man exchange for Francisco (The Hook) Molina, Alibuz Campos and Henry Winston. Molina is a Cuban citizen awaiting sentencing in New York for the slaying of a 9-year-old girl during a political scuffle among pro- and anti-Castro Cubans. Campos is a Puerto Rican nationalist leader who has been in jail for several years, and Henry Winston is a U.S. Communist party figure.

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## Clear Well Construction Begins

Excavation of the hole for a new three million gallon clear well has begun. The site is between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets at Virginia. Additional filters with a capacity of 2.25 million gallons a day will also be part of this expansion program, according to Roy Hester, water department foreman. Work should be completed about November.

## Texans Sank Yanks At Sabine Pass Fight

Sabine Pass was believed by the Union forces to be Texas' soft underbelly which could be taken at will. Often they steamed gunboats into this mouth of the Sabine and Neches in Southeast Texas to shell old Ft. Craig and a nearby rail line.

President Abraham Lincoln met with his war cabinet July 31, 1863, and it was decided that the strategic pass should be taken. Lincoln's decision came at the special instigation of Secretary of State William Henry Seward.

Seward, an ardent abolitionist who as a senator spoke against admitting Texas to the Union, feared that Emperor Louis Napoleon of France would land a force in Texas to fight with the Confederacy. That could have won the war for the South, many military experts and historians believe.

Adm. David Glasgow Farragut agreed strongly with Seward. He believed the pass could be taken easily because his Federal gunboats on numerous occasions had shelled the small earthen fort and entered Sabine Lake to shell the Houston-Louisiana rail line.

**COTTON, TOO**

On top of all the military reasons for wanting control of Sabine Pass, Gen. Nathaniel Prentiss Banks, Massachusetts politician who had been given a Union command, was then commander at New Orleans. This commander heard that 40,000 bales of cotton were near the railroad, awaiting passage through the Union blockade.

Banks, a quick man with a dollar, reputedly had a passion for capturing cotton, an almost priceless commodity at the time, and most of the general's liberated cotton rarely went into government hands. Some historians say the general became very wealthy dealing in looted lint.

So it was that on Sept. 8, 1863, the Federal forces made a great bid to take Sabine Pass, outlet of the Sabine and Neches rivers into the Gulf of Mexico.

Four gunboats, 22 transports carrying 5,000 troops and 2,500 sailors advanced to the pass. Troops were to be landed just below the Confederacy's Ft. Griffin for which the Yankees—rightfully until that date—had little respect.

It is entirely possible that the South's area commander, Gen. John Bankhead Magruder, sent a force to Ft. Griffin to spike her six pieces of artillery, believing the place indefensible. This seems certain because only 44 or 47 men were there when the Federals advanced on the place.

The men were commanded by Capt. Felix Odum, who was ill that day and passed his command to a stuttering lieutenant, Richard Dowling, 25.

If Dowling and his 45-odd Irishmen, gathered from the Houston-Galveston area, had been ordered to spike the guns at Ft. Griffin they disobeyed—and gloriously.

AUSTIN (AP)—Nominations from major oil companies indicate a drop of 62,121 barrels a day in the demand for Texas crude oil in July, the Railroad Commission said.

The nominations total 2,417,424 barrels.

The Bureau of Mines forecast a demand of 2,555,000 for Texas crude, up 15,000 barrels daily from June.

The only increase was a 63-barrel jump in Dist. 10, Panhandle.

## Push Is Needed For Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., said today President Kennedy will have to exert the strongest kind of leadership to obtain passage of his \$4.8-billion foreign aid bill. Fulbright is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which continues hearings on the legislation today with public testimony from Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Fulbright said in an interview that despite the foreign aid program's revamping, its prospects "follow too closely the old patterns of the past." He said that its administration should be directed to the application of more selective and discerning aid. Fulbright said that passage of the President's program, in anything like the amount he asked "will require one of the toughest fights of the year." He added that Kennedy and his administration will have to give strong support to the measure on both sides of the Capitol. An appeal was made by Sen.

## North African Peace Talks Broken Off

EVIAN-LES-BAINS, France (AP)—Indefinite adjournment of the French-Algerian peace talks raised the grim prospect today of increased bloodshed in Algeria. The first solid effort to end the 6½-year war in the North African territory broke down Tuesday when the French delegation called for a "reflection period" of 10 to 15 days, apparently hoping that the exiled rebel regime in Tunis would ease its tough, no-compromise stand. No date was set for the talks to resume. The impression after three weeks of tense, strenuous meetings was that the negotiations were not likely to resume in the foreseeable future.

Louis Joxe, French minister for Algerian affairs heading his French negotiators, indicated his government had enough of the rebel insistence on getting all their demands and their refusal to even open an avenue to compromise. Joxe said the risk of continuing the talks in the prevailing atmosphere "was too great." It was useless, he said, "to clash all the time, to continue the sterile encounters."

## New Charge Filed In Stabbing

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A new charge was filed Tuesday against Dorothy Joan McKay, 25, as the pretty brunette from Gainville, Tex., made her preliminary statement to a criminal court. She is accused of stabbing her wealthy Mexican cattleman husband, Miguel Burberg Pue, last week during an argument over a possible divorce. He was seriously injured. The new charge brought by her husband's lawyers claims she sought to leave the country with \$1,500 belonging to Burberg. She denied the charges and said she defended herself with a knife when Burberg threatened to kill her and hit her several times. The judge is expected next Friday either to order her to stand trial or to be deported.

## School Plant Gets Maintenance Work

Big Spring schools will get the usual summer cleaning and overhaul this year, but no major work is contemplated, according to Pat Murphy, assistant superintendent. Floors will be cleaned, sealed and waxed as they are during Christmas, Thanksgiving and Easter holidays, Murphy said. Only at Rummis will any new floors be put in.

## TILE

The wood floors there are being gradually eliminated and asphalt tile put on them, he said, and about 10 more rooms should be completed this summer. J. H. Turner and a crew of nine men are now working on floors. Rooms in which summer school is scheduled were completed first.

Landscaping and protective measures are being instituted on school grounds. Crews are watering the lawns and clearing out weeds, Murphy said. The grounds in front of College Heights and Cedar Crest schools have been completed.

A cable fence will be put up around Boydston Elementary School to keep traffic from ruining the grounds. Property lines will have to be defined before this can be done, Murphy said, but it will be done this summer.

There is also some talk about improving the concession stands and the pressbox at the college stadium. This would be addition of gas lines to the concession stands and the pressbox and installing sewer connections in the stands it would have to be a cooperative effort of the school, the college, and others, Murphy said.

## Heated Tempers At Laos Parleys Begin To Abate

GENEVA (AP)—The storm of East-West accusations at the 14-nation Laos conference showed signs of abating today and long-delayed bargaining on rival peace plans may be near.

Western spokesmen indicated they are ready to call for the conference to break up into working groups to consider Soviet and Western proposals for unifying and neutralizing the Southeast Asian kingdom and keeping it peaceful.

The Soviets, who accused the West Tuesday of stalling and said the conference should get to work, are expected to demand bargaining sessions. These are distasteful to the West because they usually turn into propaganda sounding boards.

While the delegates debated, reports reaching U. S. officials in Geneva said the fighting continues in Laos, with the Communist Pathet Lao forces maintaining pressure in northern, central and southeastern Laos.

The United States led a Western walkout of the conference last Wednesday, saying in effect that negotiations at gunpoint were impossible and that the West would stay away until the cease-fire was effective.

## New Eidinoff Hearing Denied

LUBBOCK (AP)—Dist. Judge Robert Bean said Tuesday he had denied a request for a new sanity hearing for Dr. Harold Eidinoff because his court isn't the proper one to hear the application.

Eidinoff was committed to the Rusk state hospital for the criminally insane after Bean on Nov. 5, 1959 found him insane at the time he killed Ted Andrews, El Paso lawyer.

Bean recommended that Eidinoff never be released.

## Chilean Leftists Attack Agency To Protest Adlai

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—A handful of leftists smashed windows of the U. S. Information Agency Tuesday night, protesting the arrival of Adlai E. Stevenson as President Kennedy's special envoy.

In the most hostile incident so far of Stevenson's South American tour, about 30 demonstrators paraded through the streets of Santiago, chanting "Cuba si, Yanqui no." They rushed the USIA office, shattering plate glass windows with long poles.

The lone policeman on duty arrested one demonstrator, but the rest escaped, leaving behind a banner saying "Go home Stevenson."

U. S. Embassy officials said the demonstrators were Communists.

Otherwise, Stevenson's reception was warm and friendly. Crowds of several hundred greeted him at the airport and at the hotel where he is staying in the heart of Santiago.

Stevenson planned to devote most of his time here to talks about next month's meeting of the Inter-American Economic and Social Council at Pinta del Este.

Chilean President Jorge Alessandri already has endorsed the conference and has had his experts working on preliminary aspects for some time.

Stevenson, touring 10 South American countries in advance of the economic meeting, leaves early Thursday for Bolivia.

"He was really happy," said Mrs. Dougherty after it was all over. "He said he loved it. He didn't talk much. He was so busy watching."

"When we got home he was playing and eating a little better. I didn't have to give him a sedative."

"It makes your heart feel good to see how he was smiling. I'd love to take him again if he'd improve just a little bit."

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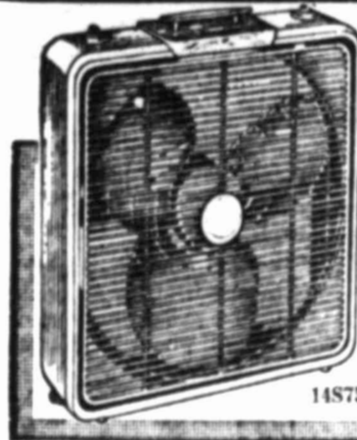

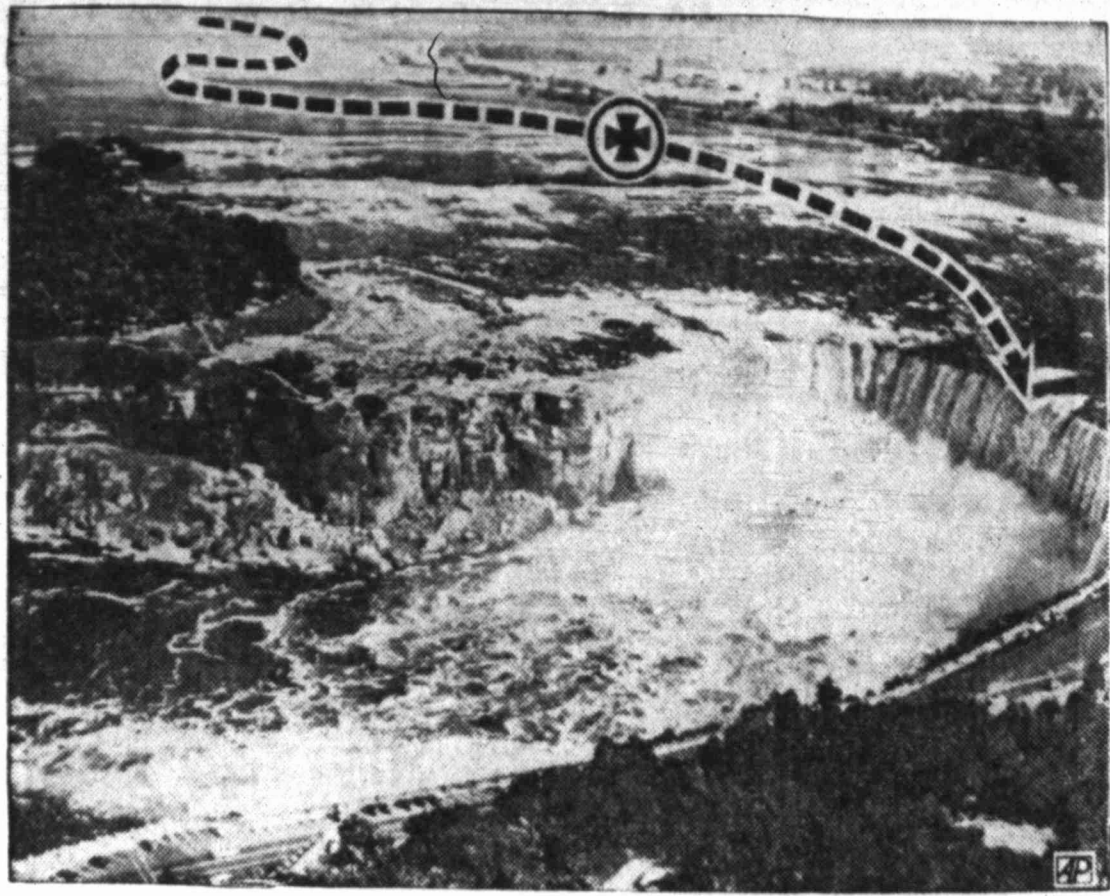

A supposed scientific adventure into eugenics, a remarkable talkative satellite, reams of science data, and an assassin bug are subjects for science at work:

## Science Fiction?

Supposing it is 1975, and supposing since 1946 the Russians have been embarked on a super-secret Project G—a project aimed at developing supermen and superwomen.

This is the theme of a science fiction thriller written for the Bulletin of the American Institute of Biological Sciences by R. A. McConnell of the University of Pittsburgh.

Supposing since 1946 the Russians each year had chosen 1,000 women of superior scientific aptitude and physical stamina—and these women conceived children by artificial insemination with sperm from men of similar attributes. Then supposing the offspring were mated with similar offspring. What would such an adventure into eugenics prove?

"Remove from history 1,000 in philosophy and religion, 1,000 great names in science, 1,000 more in the arts, and the rest of us would still be Bronze Age savages," McConnell says.

And if the Russians did try to breed a human elite, by 1975 you could reasonably suppose that they would need little more time before they would be able to speed up the evolutionary process so that 50,000 years of development would take place in the span of a lifetime, McConnell writes.

If you set out to scan the 60 million pages of technical literature produced in the world last year alone, it would take you 465 years.

And think about this: Each 24 hours the world's scientists produce enough technical papers to fill seven sets of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

And if that isn't frightening enough, every ten years the amount of technical literature in existence doubles, writes Lawrence Ross in a Georgia Tech publication, Research Engineer.

## Bedbug Hunters

It is masked and it hunts bedbugs and it is called the masked bedbug hunter, one of a group of assassin bugs that live off other insects.

The assassin bugs live all over the Americas, but mostly south of the New York — Denver latitude. Most of them live on the blood of other insects.

Curiously the masked bedbug hunter looks like a bit of lint when it is still young, thanks to the fact that dust and fibers stick to its body. You'd hardly notice it unless it moved, says a report on assassin bugs prepared by the Smithsonian Institution.

# Highway Death Predictions Hit

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Gov. John N. Dempsey Tuesday criticized the National Safety Council for its public predictions of holiday traffic death tolls.

The governor said the predictions either leave motorists unconcerned or create a feeling of anxiety or nervousness in drivers. "I for one don't want any anxious, nervous drivers on our highways, especially during a holiday when traffic is exceptionally heavy," Dempsey said.

The governor, also, disapproves of the manner in which the estimates are later interpreted. "What should be our reaction if the death toll was 34 fewer than the 436 predicted over such a holiday," he asked.

"Will we rejoice that 34 lives were saved and only 402 persons were killed? This is a natural reaction when a performance is better than anticipated."

# Dabney's Great-Grandfather Bequeathed Even The Unborn

One hundred and fifty years ago last Saturday, one Thomas Usery, solid citizen of the state of North Carolina and destined to be the great-grandfather of a Big Spring man, sat down at his desk and wrote out his will.

A copy of that document in which the redoubtable Mr. Usery disposed of his earthly holdings is still in possession of a great-grandson.

## DABNEY

The grandson is G. W. Dabney, 806 Runnels. The copy of his great-grandfather's will he owes to his mother, who was apparently Usery's granddaughter.

He points out that his mother, who prior to her marriage was Renny Usery, died in 1890 when Dabney was just two years old. The copy of the will had been in her possession and was preserved coming down to Dabney. Dabney says he knows little of his ancestor. The will relates that on June 10, 1811, he was a resident of Montgomery County in the state of North Carolina. And from the provisions set forth, Usery was a well-to-do man. Most of his wealth, as was common with the wealthy men of that date

was in slaves and land. Extent of his land holdings is not detailed but the will devotes considerable space to the disposition not only of the slaves he then had but of how he wanted their "increase" be handled in the years to come.

## TO SON

His son, Thomas, he decreed, was to get all of his land and "my Negro man, Charles, after the death of myself and my wife." To another son, Welton, the old gent bequeathed "the \$100 I let him have to buy land on Little River." A son named Robert

## Russians 'Invent' W. Texas Weather

is "bequeathed my Negro boy, York."

As to his daughter, Elizabeth, the father relates:

"I lend to my daughter Elizabeth, during her life, my Negro girl, Rosie, at the discretion of my executors from year to year as they may think proper, and then the said Rosie and her increase to be equally divided among the heirs of her (Elizabeth's) body."

## TO WIFE

In the case of his wife, Usery provides that she shall have another Negro girl, Fanny "with her increase." The wife is empowered "to dispose of any or as many" as she sees fit of these "increases" to "Samuel and Martha Rogers and the rest of my heirs." The same provision applied to "Charles, Tamm, Rachel and Aggy. Other slaves and their increase together with all of my stock of every kind."

In all, Usery lists 11 Negro slaves and apparently anticipates they will live long and have large families. He lends them to his heirs with the stipulation frequently repeated that their "increase" is to be distributed equally among his own descendants.

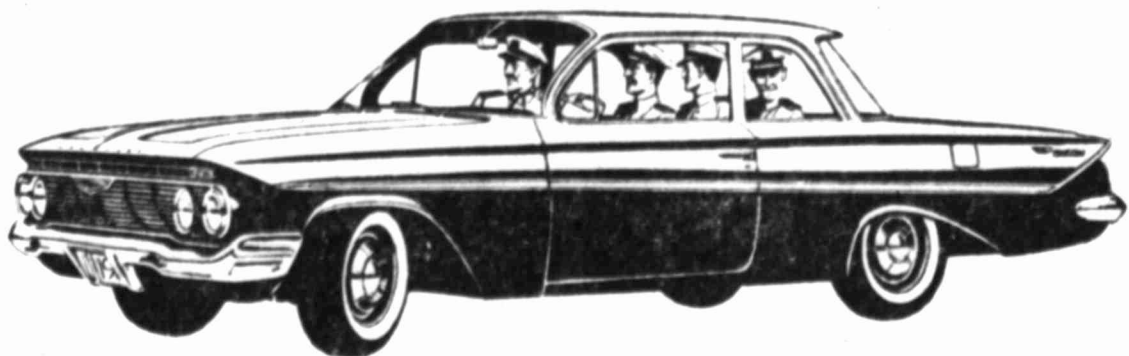

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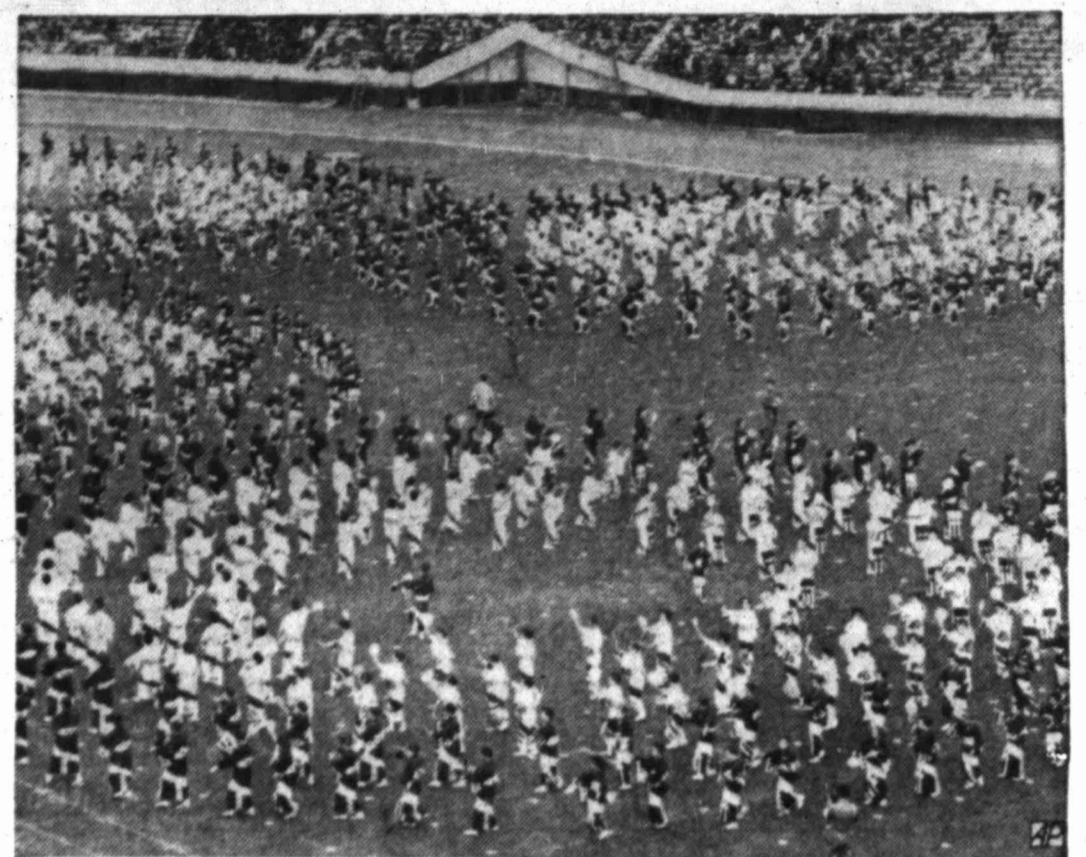

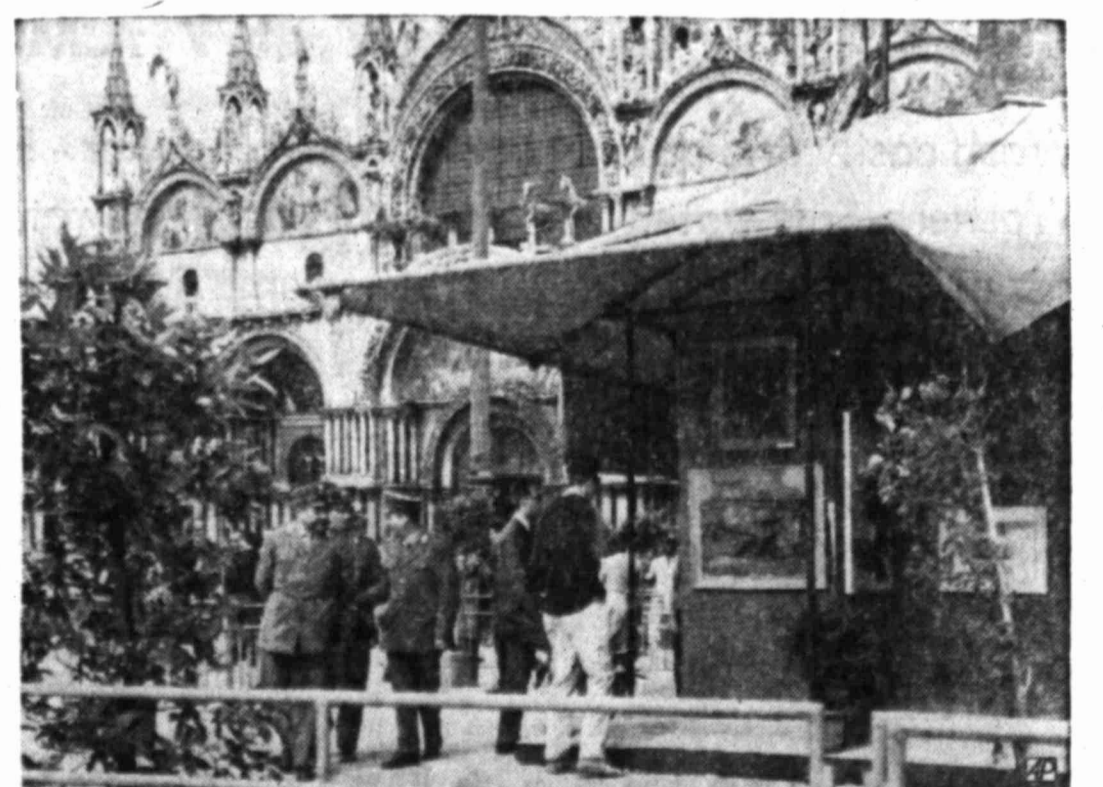

## Electric Rocket ---Key To Future?

LOS ANGELES (AP)— Meet the electric rocket—a tiny power plant that some day may drive space ships of almost any size to the moon and the planets.

The electric rocket probably will be the final and critical stage of the huge projectiles President Kennedy has ordered developed to take men to the moon and back in this decade.

Eight companies and two government agencies gave technical papers on electric rockets Tuesday at one of the nation's top scientific conventions—the annual joint meeting of the Institute of Aerospace Sciences and the American Rocket Society.

Consensus of the papers is that the electric rocket works—under laboratory conditions.

By the time large clusters of present-day intercontinental missiles are ready to boost big space ships beyond earth's gravitational pull—possibly in three to five years—electric rockets should be far enough advanced to take over the job of propulsion in space.

Capt. Richard Hayes, an Air Force research expert assigned to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Washington, said in an interview:

"This is an important field where the United States can forge ahead of Russia in the space race."

Neither the Soviet Union nor the United States has yet tested an electric rocket in space, but both are rushing research programs. Hayes said the U.S.S.R. plans a test flight later this year. America's target date is sometime next year.

What's so special about electric rockets?

In the language of the average motorist, they are designed to give more miles per gallon and much higher speed. But they are only good for cruising in high gear. They don't have enough power for the fast takeoff necessary to get into space.

Electric rockets are comparatively small—about the size of a garbage can. Chemically fueled Atlas rockets tower 65 feet into the air.

Electric rockets have a very small wallop—a fraction of a pound of thrust compared with the 360,000-pound thrust of an Atlas.

They make up for this, however, by running continuously for hundreds of hours.

Mrs. Mahood, a veteran West Texas newspaper woman, has been assistant to the director of public relations for H-SU for the past two years. She was associate editor of the Stamford "American" prior to joining the H-SU staff, and was with that paper for 25 years. She previously worked for the old Stamford "Leader" for seven years.

This is her fifth year as secretary-treasurer of the WPTA, and she is a former president of the Texas WPA. She was honored as Stamford's outstanding woman in 1954, the same year her newspaper story of a car-train crash was judged the best news story in a weekly newspaper in the nation.

# Power Failure Darkens, Heats Manhattan Island

NEW YORK (AP)—The second massive power failure in less than two years threw five square miles of midtown Manhattan into a 4½-hour chaos involving millions Tuesday. It was the hottest June 13th in the city's history.

From skyscraper peak to subway bottom—and in between—citizens of this always cramped metropolis were startled in the vivid example of electricity's value to modern man.

The power went out just as the mammoth office buildings began pouring their tens of thousands into the streets.

Riders were trapped in elevators for up to three hours. Passengers were stranded below ground in subways. Passengers emerged from both, shaken and dripping with perspiration.

"It was like a steam bath," said a patrolman coming out of a subway.

**No Steady Diet Of Two Most Popular Shows**

NEW YORK (AP) — In the course of one TV year, there are usually two important beauty-contest programs—the finals of the Miss Universe and Miss America contests — and three important awards-presenting shows — Oscar, Emmy and TV Guide.

It's a wonder we don't have a steady diet of the two categories. They almost always run away with the lion's share of the audience.

The new Nielsen ratings put last month's Emmy awards show at the top of the popularity lists, beating out even the perennial No. 1 entry, "Gunsmoke."

Last night there were the TV Guide Awards, which provided the home audiences with a chance to see their favorite stars in multi-award-presenting shows.

On July 15 the girl-watchers will have their annual chance to see the beautiful finalists in the Miss Universe contest. So the summer isn't entirely lost.

The Senate subcommittee currently investigating the alarming rise of juvenile delinquency is studying television as one possible factor. The committee is in the process of giving network brass a rough time, asking them to explain the super-abundance of violence — fights, guns, mayhem and murder — in their action shows.

Answers ought to be easy for TV spokesmen by now. Anthropologist Geoffrey Gorer observed that each time a new medium of mass communications has been developed, older people have blamed it for all the defects they see in the young. The movies first were blamed for juvenile delinquency, then radio. Now it's TV's turn.

And when the finger is pointed, the TV executives usually react by (a) pointing to all the cultural, no-action shows on their schedules (b) mentioning that Shakespeare has more blood-and-thunder in his plots than the worst TV offender and (c) promising to keep a closer check on "unnecessary violence" in the future.

Although many have tried, it has been hard for students of TV and students of children to prove satisfactorily that television's violence has turned nice normal kids into young criminals.

## Tax Writers Will Go To Work Next Week

AUSTIN (AP) — A compact team of citizen tax writers goes to work next week on Gov. Price Daniel's plea for a revenue package to offer the Legislature when the special session meets July 10.

It is a five-member subcommittee within the larger group of 19 named by the governor to make specific taxing, spending and economy suggestions for the lawmakers who failed to solve the state's money problems during the 140-day regular session.

The subcommittee, headed by French Robertson, Abilene, chairman of the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools, said it wants to hear suggestions for possible economies, take another look at proposed spending, and work with legislators and tax experts in its efforts to help the special session.

**NO DETAIL**

Robertson said the appropriations bill as tentatively approved by the regular session would not be gone into in detail, but that there might be some opportunities for review. The main task will be to look for a tax compromise.

Daniel told the committee in first session Tuesday that he hopes it can "get together on something all can support" before the special session starts.

The subcommittee will meet Tuesday. The whole committee will be called into session July 6 to formulate a final report for the July 10 special session. Robertson emphasized that all members of the larger committee are welcome to join the sub-panel in its studies, and promised to keep all members advised.

**CHAIRMEN**

The governor's committee includes chairmen of many of the policy-making boards for a wide variety of institutions, along with such unofficial agencies as the Texas State Teachers Association.

Daniel once again emphasized one of his pet taxes—application of a new franchise tax formula which he says will bring 11,600 interstate corporations into a more equitable relationship than they now have in the taxing pattern. The present plan discriminates against domestic corporations, he said.

While Daniel emphasized this measure—a major issue during the regular session—he also indicated he is ready to compromise.

He told the committee he hoped it could achieve a "fair and equitable compromise" from tax proposals already submitted and heard before the Legislature, without delving into new fields.

"I hope you can come up with some proposal that will enable us to walk together better during the special session than we did during the regular session," Daniel said.

Rep. George Hinson, Mineola, House member of the regular session's deadlocked conference committee on taxation, appeared before the committee with its first concrete proposal which he said was a true compromise. It included a sales and use tax as well as excise, transfer and natural gas levies.

Hinson and Rep. Tony Koriath, Sherman, who favors a corporate income tax, were the only two authors of revenue measures to respond to an invitation to meet with the committee at its first session.

Rep. Franklin Spears, San Antonio, discussed franchise tax revision proposals.

Hinson's bill calls for a 2 per cent retail sales and use tax on all items costing \$5 or more. It includes many specific exemptions. Hinson also proposed an increase from 1.5 per cent to 2 per cent on the motor vehicle sales tax, a 2 per cent sales tax on restaurant meals costing \$1 or more with beer, wine and other beverages bought with the meal included.

STUTTGART, Germany (AP)—Two more bodies were pulled from the wreckage of two commuter trains today, bringing the death toll from Tuesday's head-on collision to 35. At least 47 were injured, some critically.

Packed with home-bound commuters, the two trains collided just outside the rail terminal at nearby Esslingen. The German railway blamed the collision on the failure of one train, bound for Stuttgart, to heed a red signal.

Doctors with the party, which had tried unsuccessfully to climb the 27,790-foot peak without oxygen equipment, sent Hillary to a lower elevation. Since then the New Zealander has been ordered to remain below 16,000 feet.

## Something Old, Something New --- For Presidential Back

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy is getting a combination of old and new treatments for his back ailment—hot pads and ultra sound.

The ultra sound—using high frequency sound waves—is a method for applying heat to deep-seated tissues.

It is the latest treatment in a regime including rest and swimming prescribed by White House physician Dr. Janet Travell who reported Tuesday that Kennedy "continues to improve." He is still using crutches.

Today the President undertook a busy schedule—a late afternoon conference with top advisers on the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance after visits from a Vietnamese of-

ficials, a group of Ceylonese parliamentarians and a Michigan delegation concerned with that state's economic problems.

Reporters had a heated session Tuesday with White House news secretary Pierre Salinger on his handlings of news about the President's ailment.

The exchange was partly triggered when he disclosed that a New York specialist had been summoned to Palm Beach, Fla., last Sunday to examine Kennedy.

The disclosure came after Kennedy canceled a speaking date. Salinger said the specialist, Dr. Preston Wade, agreed with Dr. Travell's diagnosis that Kennedy's ailment was "a new back strain not related to any previous back

injury suffered by the President." Salinger seemed irked when newsmen prodded him for more details and he snapped: "Nothing is being withheld in this matter whatever."

When a reporter suggested that the White House didn't reveal Kennedy's pain until last week, although it said the injury occurred at a ceremonial tree planting in Canada last month, Salinger replied: "I really have no control over what the President tells me."

Salinger said he hadn't learned until Tuesday morning that Dr. Wade had been called into consultation. He added that his assistant, Andrew T. Hatcher, also had been unaware of it.

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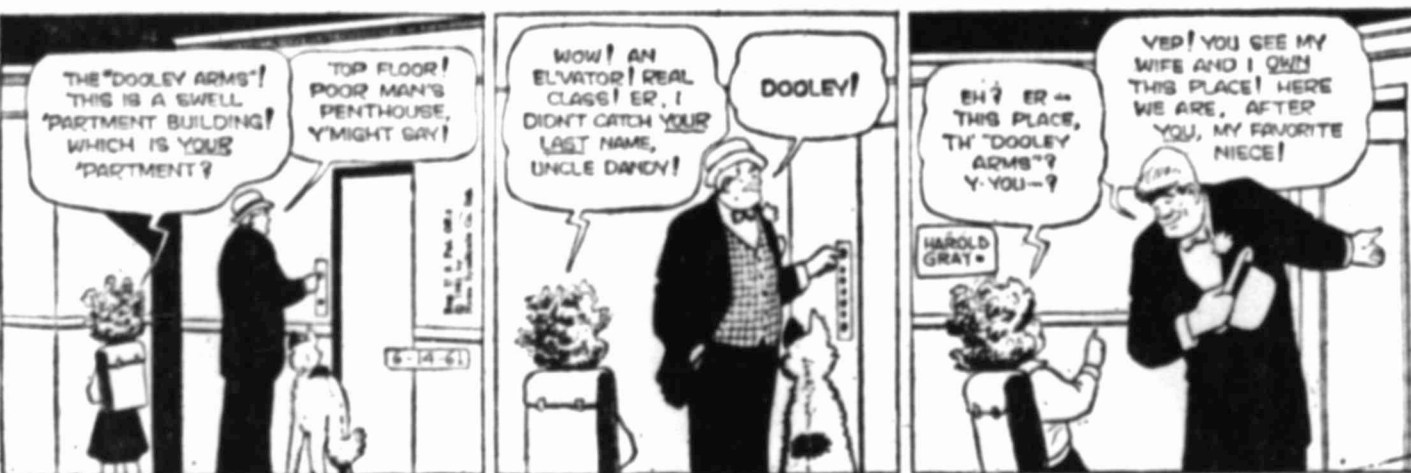
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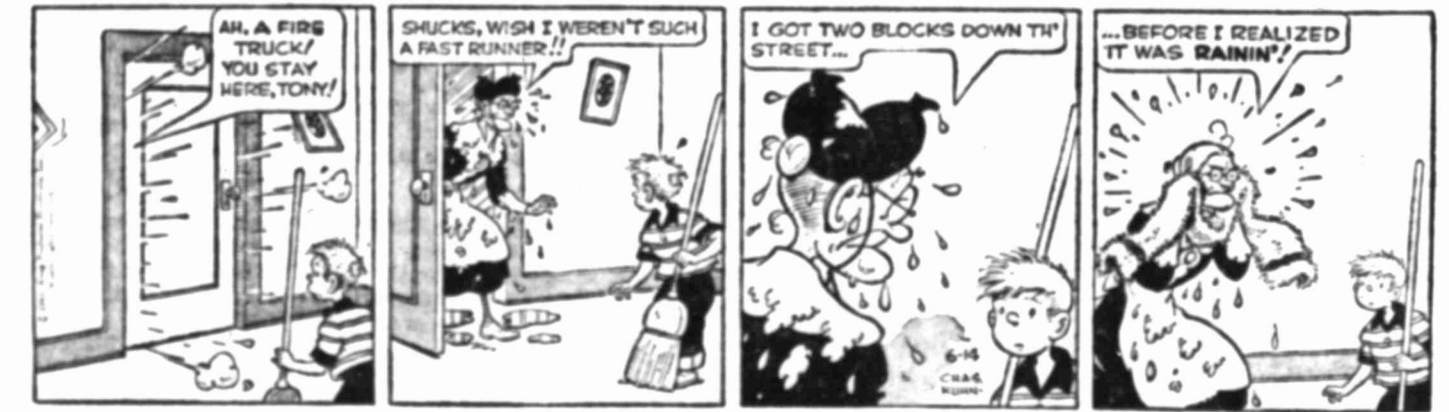
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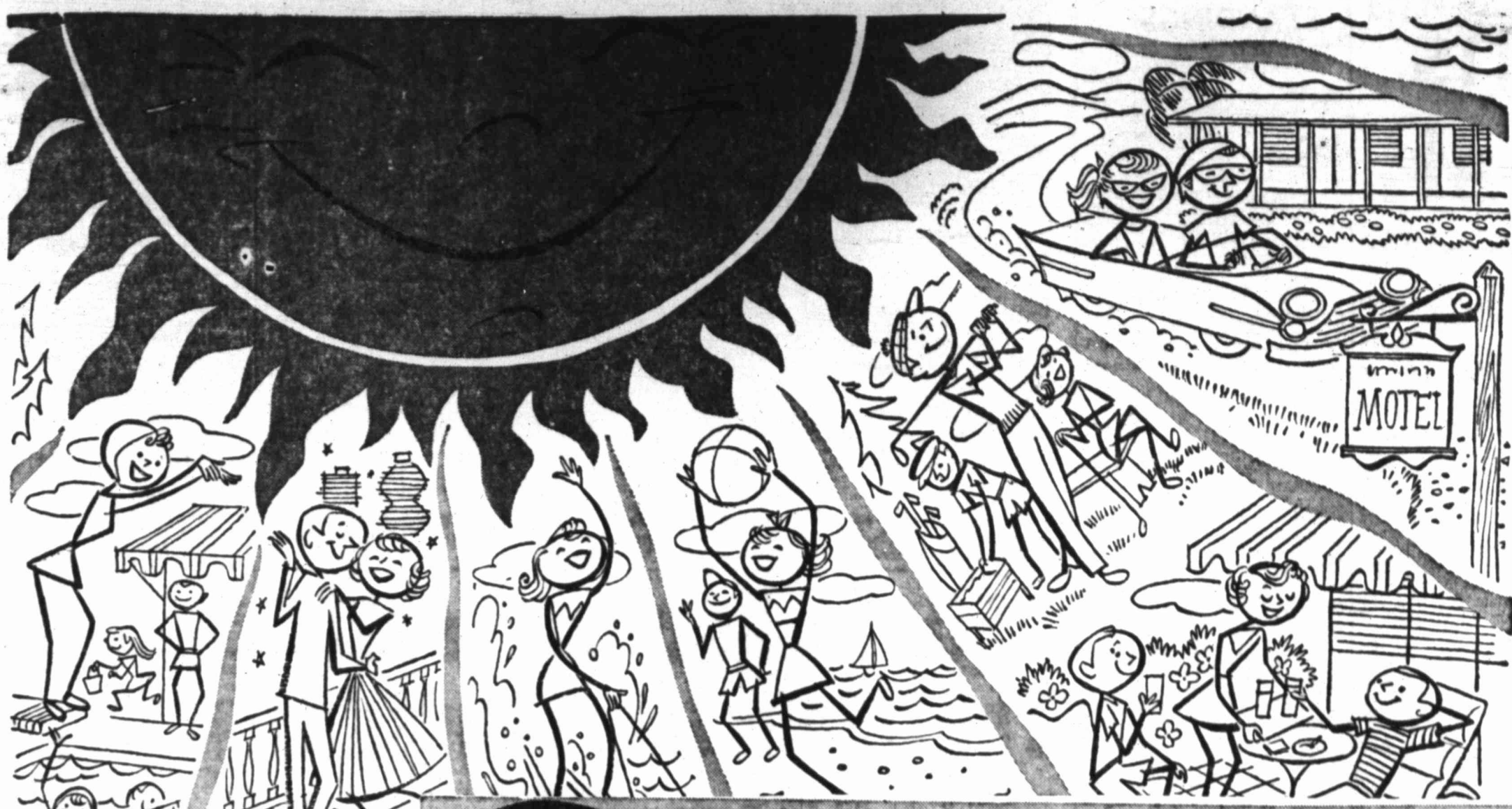


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# Giants Back On Beam In National League

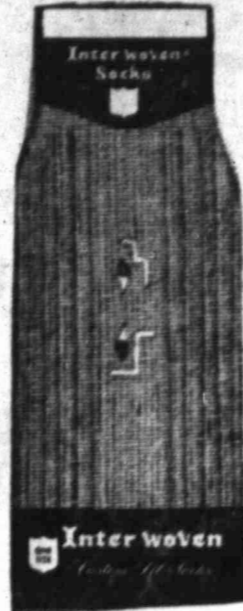

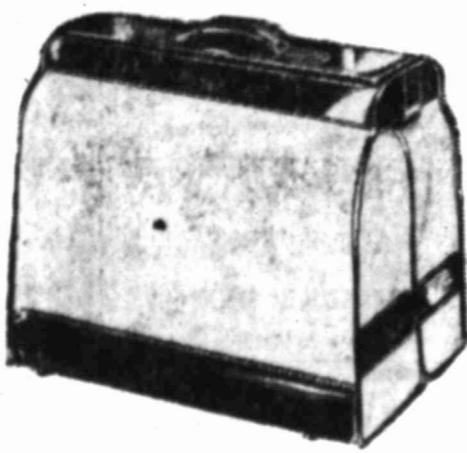

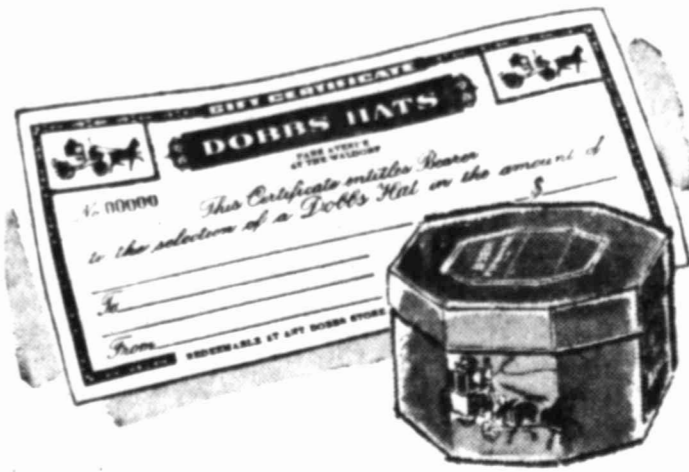
