Sabine Pass was believed by the Union forces to be Texas' soft underbelly which could be taken at will. Often they steamed gunboats into this mouth of the Sabine and Neches in Southeast Texas to shell old Ft. Craig and a nearby rail line.

President Abraham Lincoln met with his war cabinet July 31, 1863, and it was decided that the strategic pass should be taken. Lincoln's decision came at the special instigation of Secretary of State William Henry Seward.

It is entirely possible that the South's area commander, Gen. John Bankhead Magruder, sent a force to Ft. Griffin to spike her six pieces of artillery, believing the place indefensible. This seems certain because only 44 or 47 men were there when the Federals advanced on the place.

The men were commanded by Capt Felix Odlum, who was ill that day and passed his command to a stuttering lieutenant, Richard Dowling, 25.





Life Term Is Given Killer Of Tulia Officer

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP)-A Tennessee farm youth was sentenced early today to life in prison for the Christmas morning murder of a Tulia, Tex., policeman.

Haston Lee Winnett, 20, of Sparta, Tenn., showed no emotion as the verdict was read. A jury had deliberated for nearly four hours in convicting him of murder with malice in the slaying of Robert Potter, 41, Tulia assistant police chief.

Winnett talked quietly with his parents but began crying as they ef: the courtroom. Potter was shot after he surprised three men burglarizing a

cafe last Dec. 25.
The youth's father, Clarence Winnett, was the only defense witness. The White County, Tennessee, farmer testified that Winnett was the first of eight boys he had raised ever to get into trouble. The father also brought affidavits from Tennessee officers that his son was a first offender. The state had asked the death penalty.

Officers testified they captured Winnett and two companions at a road block in Randall County last Christmas Day after finding Potter's body at the cafe.

R. W. Knox, deputy sheriff and constable at Happy, Tex., testified that he chased the trio in a car into a road block set up by officers south of Canyon, Tex. Sheriff L. S. Johnston testified that the men were armed with four shotguns, three rifles and two pistols.

The two men arrested with Winnett pleaded guilty in April and were sentenced to life in prison. They are Donald Carlson, 27, Anderson, Ind., and James Roy Groover, 31, Eldwood, Ind.







Exoneration And An Admonition

Maj. Edwin A. Walker has been admonished by the Army to heed superior officers advice against participation in controversial activities beyond his military

The admonition does not carry with it any official reprimand, although, as the Army noted, the wide publicity given the case, will carry some mild imputations. Gen. Walker has been exonerated of fostering material for the Birch society, a charge that grew out of claims made in the Overseas Weekly, which is published privately in Europe. Gen. Walker had set up what he called his pro-blue program as a militantly anti-Communist training series. Despite the refuted claims of the paper, it was not the training series which got him in hot water, but intemperate remarks before certain public groups.

This was a finding by Business Week, a management magazine of national circulation. The magazine surveyed businessmen regarding the preferences, and in answer to the question "what locations you would consider if your company were going to select a site for a new plant," 61 of the 299 replying listed Texas or some specific location in Texas. Texas moved up one notch from its position of two years ago in a similar survey. Cali-· fornia, with 104 preferential replies, still led the pack.

This ought to say something to Texas communities seeking industry. There at least should be a favorable audience in

management, based on the survey results. This ought to say something else if the entire survey is digested. For instance, here are the 10 most frequently mentioned primary factors in the selection of a plant site: Nearness to market, sales area or customers; available labor supply; reasonable or lower state and local taxes; availability of raw materials; availability of transportation or shipping facilities; weather or climate: favorable freight rates or transportation costs; low labor costs; near sources of supply; central location to allied industries

This list presupposed availability of water and power in ample supply. The factors all boil down to favorable industrial climate, and that can include community facilities, attitudes, and insti-

Personal Diplomacy Questioned

WASHINGTON-Did President Kennedy make a mistake in the timing of his visit with Nikita Khrushchev? Should he have delayed at least a year, and should he have consented to a meeting alone for several hours with the Soviet Premier at which no stenographic record was made of what was said? Also, why didn't Mr. Kennedy disclose to the American people the two documents which the Soviet government presented at the Vienna conference and now is making public of its own ac-

THESE QUESTIONS are asked because it is announced that in a few days the Soviet Premier is to present a report to the Soviet people giving his own interpretation of the long discussions at Vienna. Also, it is pertinent to inquire why as early as February 22-only a month after his inauguration-President Kennedy sent a letter to Premier Khrushchev paving the way for the meeting at Vienna. At that time Mr. Kennedy could not possibly have become familiar with all the background of previous negotiations as recorded in the file of reports from our ambassadors abroad to the State Department in the last several years. Nor had he spent very much time getting at first hand Mr. Eisenhower's impressions of Nikita Khrushchev's tactics. Yet the preceding President had access to every bit of information gathered by intelligence sources in the last several years.

MR. KENNEDY established a precedent in his long periods of conference alone with the Soviet Premier. Such a conference means a lot of risks for this country. Thus the words of an ambassador are constantly subject to review by his superiors. They can be disavowed or their meaning softened or hardened as the case may be. When a President speaks, however, every word is authoritative and final. It represents a commitment and is part of a historic negotiation. even though for political or other reasons the tendency in official statements is to claim that what Mr. Kennedy said to Mr. Khrushchev was not a "negotiation" but a "discussion.

HOW COULD Mr. Kennedy, with his cursory knowledge of the official records of the State Department, safely make any statement orally in talking with Mr. Khrushchev without months and months of briefing beforehand by American experts familiar with Russian affairs?

Even those American experts now resident in this country are at a disadvantage. Thus, Mr. Khrushchev's problems

are not publicized in the Soviet press. If he is catering to or defying an opposition, there is little opportunity for American observers to know just what the latest opposition viewpoint is and how much influence it happens to have with the Soviet Premier in shaping his policies. How many American officials know intimately the background of Kremlin policy over the years or the environment in the Ukraine, for instance, which has played such a controlling part in Mr. Khrushchev's life and methods of operation?

YET AN AMERICAN President with no previous experience at all in international conferences ventures forth to a "summit" meeting and then proclaims to the world afterward on a nationwide television network that "no major decision was either planned or taken." In the same address, moreover it is revealed that Mr. Kennedy delivered a warning on West Berlin and said the United States would take "any risk" to defend our rights there. Plainly this was not just a "discussion" but a grave step in international relations which could mean war.

SHOULD AMERICAN Presidents issue in personal conversations-rather than in writing-warnings that could involve the country in war? The Constitution gives only to Congress the power to declare war. Diplomatic exchanges can often bring commitments that may provoke war, and then Congress is placed in the awkward position of "ratifying a state of war that

When President Eisenhower decided to go to the "summit" at Geneva in 1955 and at Paris in 1960, the same criticisms were made in these dispatches. In fact, thoughtful students of American diplomacy feel that "summit" meetings constitute a dangerous departure from a republic's policy and seem to be more in conformity with the customs and policies followed in the days of absolute monarchs.

SECRETARY RUSK, in a magazine article published before he entered the Kennedy Cabinet, opposed "summit" conferences unless preceded by careful preparation and, through diplomatic channels, some measure of previous agreement, in writing, on fundamentals. Indeed, it is also a risk for secretaries of state to participate in oral conferences with foreign ministers of countries which are not allied with us and which are potentially our enemies

It was thought for a while that the Kennedy administration would conduct foreign affairs in what was referred to a few weeks ago as "quiet diplomacy." But for some unexplained reason all this was suddenly changed and a spectacular stunt conference was substituted. The President eliminated from many hours of his talks in Vienna the very experts who could have subsequently sized up for him the true significance of Mr. Khrushchev's be-

IT IS QUESTIONABLE whether such 'summit' talks should be permitted again, and yet Congress today seems supinely to ignore the risks already taken. Possibly it is because the Republicans were involved in somewhat the same procedures during the Eisenhower administra-

All in all, the present system of communications seems to be slipshod, disorganized and ineffective except for publicity maneuvers on both sides. Yet it involves commitments that can make the difference between peace and war. (Copyright, 1961, New York Hersid Tribune, Inc.)

Conditioned To Air Conditioning

"Boy is it hot out there," said Granville (Grampy) Glenn, nodding his head toward the exterior. "Yesterday the air conditioner went on the blink in the composing room for awhile. Bet it got up to 85

or maybe 90." "What are you kickin' about." I replied. "You used to work in heat up to

110 and didn't seem to care." Grampy thought that over, for he's been around the Herald even longer than I, and part of that time was before air conditioning was introduced into our vocabulary, much less our facilities. He worked in the back shop where heat of the linotype machines, along with a generous surplus from the casting pot, added to the 100 or so degrees that nature managed to cook up on some summer days.

IF NOBODY seemed to beef about it, it was because there was little other than a strong exhaust or attic fan that could be done about it. On blustery and sandy days, when the heat was apt to be considerable, you couldn't risk funneling the dirt in from the outside, so ventilation was cut down.

The men in the pressroom and composing room got wringing wet at times, but they were heat conditioned and kept plugging along. Maybe their efficiency was sharply reduced, but no one figured that fine. Up front we turned up the revolving electric fans and tried to weight down all the papers around our desks. By quitting time everybody was ready to get out and hunt some breeze

I DON'T KNOW who figured out that you could cool the interior of a building just as practically as you could the interior of a canvass water bag or the vault of an ice house. It was a question of economics and desire. Someone hit on the idea of putting straw behind a ventilating fan and dripping water over the

straw so that the resulting evaporation would cool the air several degrees. Refinements have followed, but essentially, this is our evaporative cooling so popular

in this semi-arid area. Someone also tinkered with blowing air over coils of pipe cooled by refrigerative processes. This was quieter and offered greater control of temperature and humidity, although it was more expensive to

install and operate. THESE TWO processes have made a lot of difference in our area. It is hard to calculate how much they have contributed to the growth of this section by making living more comfortable and providing more livings. Hundreds of thousands of gallons of water and many KWH of electricity are required for evaporative conditioners and for operating and cooling some refrigerative types. Scores and scores of people are employed in merchandising, powering and servicing air

conditioners. The current issue of Saturday Evening Post has an article by Joe Alex Morris in which he refers to the current Arizona boom. He quotes Herbert A. Leggett, Phoenix banker and economist, as saying that "air conditioning and jet air travel" are the contributing factors in the great growth "Modern air conditioning makes it possible to live through the summers.

WASHINGTON - It was on June 6th. the 17th anniversary of D-Day, that the Kennedy administration made a smart aleck, uncalled-for and indicative, crack about Major General Edwin (Ted) Walker, who is banished to the New Frontier doghouse for something often called "extreme nationalism.

IN A PENTAGON press conference on that proud date in American history, Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatric was asked if Gen. Walker, whose present fate rests on the President's desk in the form of a report, might be transferred to a post in Texas. Gilpatric: "Considering recent events in Texas, maybe he would be very wel-

AFTERWARDS, the deputy secretary confirmed the obvious by saying he referred to the recent Texas Senate election won for the first time in history by a Republican, John Tower of Wichita Falls.

WELL, A politician who trips over his tongue is fair game in Washington, but I bet there's more to Gilpatric's crack than that. The Walker-JBS case isn't as hot a potato, as yet, as the Cuban debacle, the Laos braggadocio, the tractorsfor-prisoners faux pas-but it's hotter than the President is in shape to handle. If the American people get a full report on the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). a lot of unexpected things, including the truth about the enemies who besmirched Walker, will jump out of the box.

SINCE the White House hasn't done entirely right by the gallant officer. I think the American press should do so. As a beginning, there is this anecdote which will serve as a signpost to Walker's "extreme nationalism." A staff officer was commenting on a map which showed Communist countries in red, neutralist countries in white, American and her allies in blue. The officer said the map showed why the free world should be anti-Red. Walker responded: "That's defensive thinking. We're pro-Blue!"

DURING HIS entire career. Walker has been the affirmative type. After West Point graduation in 1931, he played polo





Famed Trainer Ben Jones Is Death Victim

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) - The death of 78-year-old Ben Jones took from thoroughbred racing one of its greatest trainers and

most colorful personalities. Jones, who trained six Kentucky Derby winners, a record no other trainer has ever approached, died in a Lexington hospital Tuesday.

He had been in ill health several years. Last Saturday he was hospitalized after suffering a heart attack.

Jones' name was synonymous with Calumet Farm, for whose owners he trained five derby win-

His son, H.A. (Jimmy) Jones, now is Calumet's trainer. Between them they saddled eight derby winners. 'Plain Ben' Jones trained horses by intuition and scoffed at book
