## Be Patient About Your Baby's Growth

IF YOU'RE concerned about how your baby is growing, just give him the best possible care and be patient, advises Beulah France in an article in Capper's Farmer, one of the leading farm magazines. He will develop only as rapidly as nature intends.

"How fast your baby grows depends on 2 things," she writes in the magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "One is heredity--traits he inherited from both sides of the family. The other is environment--baby's surroundings--which include the food he eats and the treatment he receives."

In the early months, once a week is often enough to weigh your baby, she says. Later, once a month will be sufficient. Baby usually doubles his birth weight in 6 months. At one year he should weigh about 3 times his birth weight.

Your baby may begin to sit alone for a moment or two at a time when he is 7 months old. But he must not be propped and left that way. He will sit without support

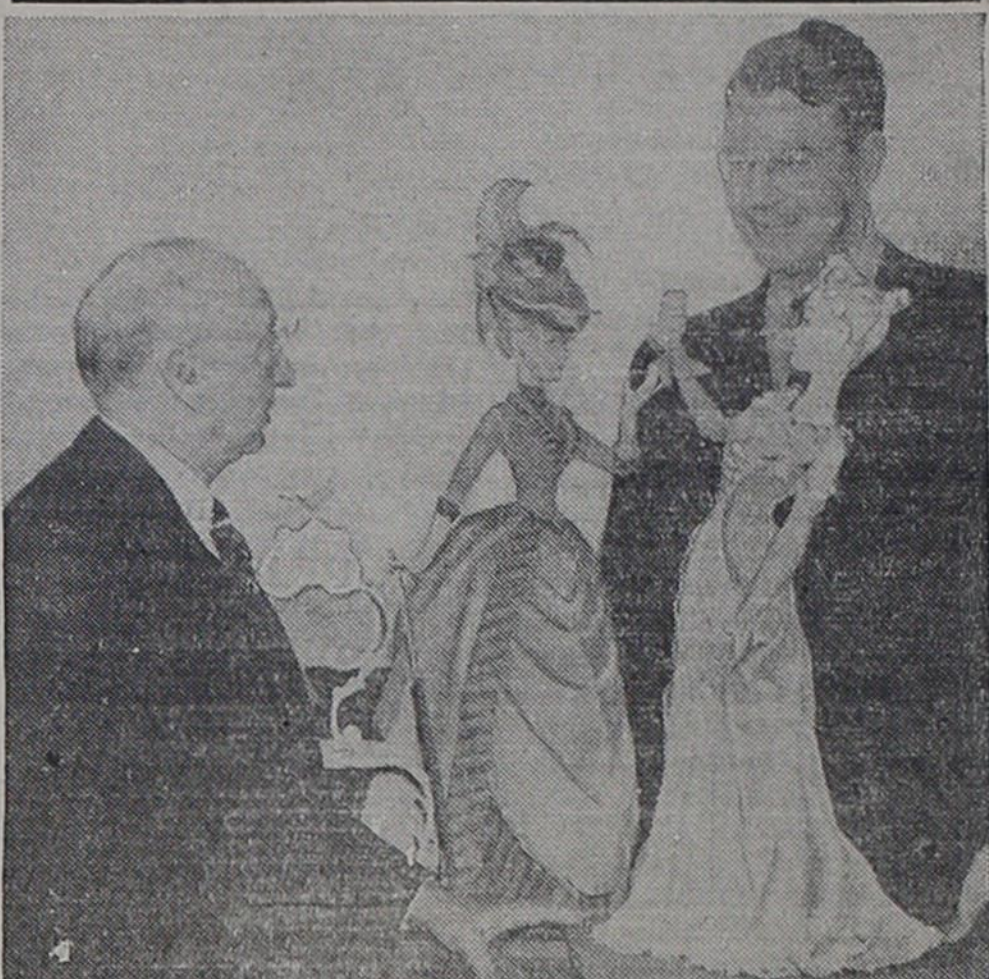

Austin, Texas, October 23—The State Department of Health has issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, since the number of cases usually increases during the fall months from October through February.

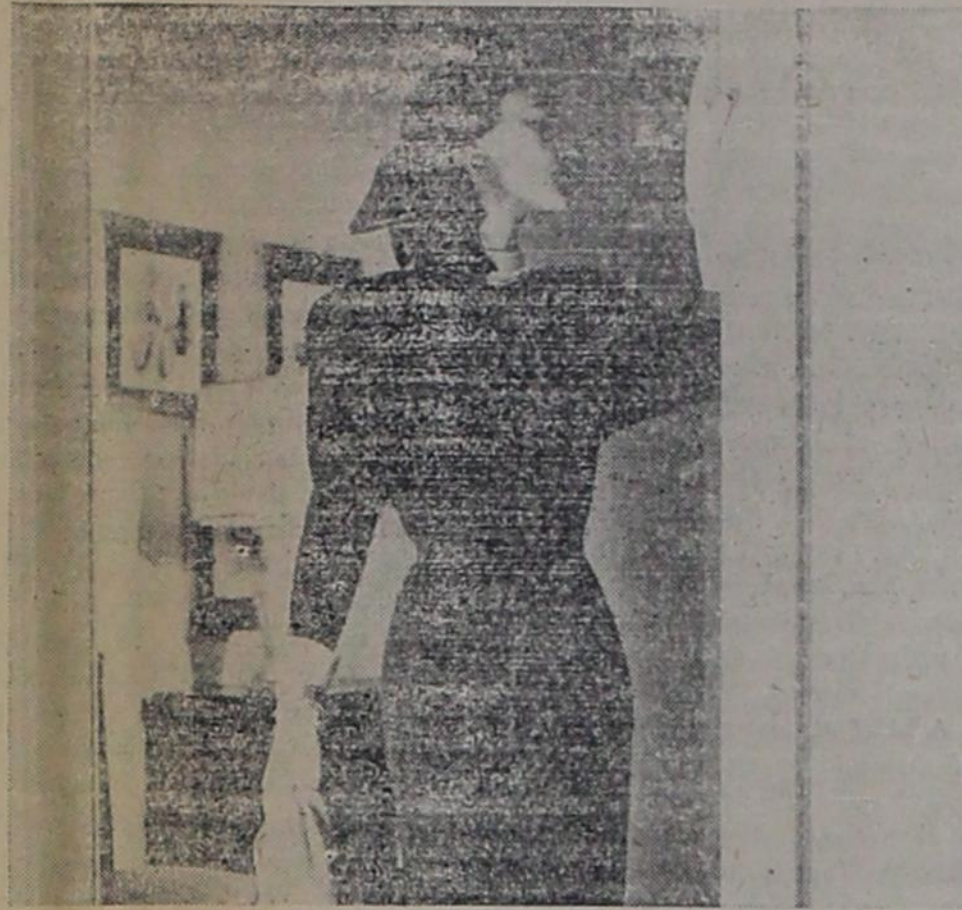
Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may contract it, but children under 15 years are especially apt to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, warns mothers to "not let your children take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as any suspicious symptoms appear."

Dr. Cox said that the first signs you may notice are that the child seems tired, restless and out of sorts. Usually, there is a sore throat, chills, vomiting, or in some

## TRAFFIC AT HOME

"Traffic improvement" can save steps and keep travel lanes out of the work centers. Mattie Lee Seago thinks "traffic improvement" should be considered in your plans for home improvement. Re-locating a door may give a better entrance to the house from the back rather than through the kitchen, or—at least route it to one side of the workcenters in the kitchen. Since the back door usually leads directly to the drive, and most families use the back door most of the time, the space between hall, stairs and first floor rooms, should be a direct route from the back door.

Changing a room to give a work room with closets and doors conveniently placed for work clothes, cleaning and laundry equipment may mean a use for the spare bed room. Providing more places to store equipment and clothes is another means of lessening the traffic troubles.

Miss Seago says the new illustrated bulletin, "Your Farmhouse: How to Plan Remodeling" takes up traffic improvement as one of the most important remodeling principles. cases convulsions and fever. The skin is dry and hot, the tongue is furred, and, under this furry covering, it is red and swollen. In ordinary cases, these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. Little flat red points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest and soon the rash, very red in color spreads over most of the body.

The doctor is required by law to report the case to the local health officer. It is important that the family follow carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer issues, since a severe or fatal case of scarlet fever may develop from contact with some one who has only a light attack. Children who have had scarlet fever, or who have been exposed, must not return to school until permission is given by the health officer and physician.
