# **July Figures Reflect Rise**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Living costs rose to a new high in July. The increase as compared with June was nearly one-half of one per cent, the biggest advance in nine months.

The Labor Department reported today that its index. of consumer prices rose from 127.6 to 128.1. In the index, 100 represents average prices in 1947-49. Prices in July thus were 28.1 per cent higher than during the base years.

The exact amount of the increase from June to July +was 0.4 per cent.

Higher food prices were the biggest single factor in the increase. There also were important advances in prices of gasoline, sporting goods, used cars and women's clothing.

Robert J. Myers, deputy com-missioner of labor statistics, told reporters that about half of the July increase reflected normal seasonal advances. He said part of it could be attributed to rising demand as the nation recovers from last winter's recession.

"An increase of 0.4 per cent at this time is not remarkable." Myers said. He reported that the index has increased an average of 0.3 per cent between June and July during the past 10 years.





## **Rider Is** Convicted

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) - A 12man, all-white jury Thursday convicted Henry Thomas, 19, of St. Augustine, Fla., on a breach of peace charge in the first appeal trial of a convicted "Freedom Rider.

The jury deliberated 45 minutes. Thomas, a Negro and student at Howard University, had appealed his carlier conviction in City Court.

But Judge Oren R. Lewis, in 19-page opinion made public Thursday, did not rule on a more undamental question - whether Prince Edward can be compelled to reopen its public schools He said a suit on the state con-





#### It Helps, But Longer Relief Needed

The authority of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association to inspect cattle for brands, marks and other identifications at posted markets in Texas has been extended to Nov. 1, 1961.

While this definitely helps, it does not provide the long-range relief so needed this vital adjunct to the prevention of livestock thievery is to be salvaged.

Authority to perform this service was granted first to the cattle raisers in 1943, but recently the association was notified the authorization was being revoked as of Sept. 1, 1961. A great hue and cry went up, and Thomas J. Flavin, judicial officer of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said that the revocation had been postponed two months to allow consideration of an application for another au-. thorization of limited nature. ### The Che Goes Wool Gathering

Reports from delegates attending the ments would he be willing to make to Punta del Este Alliance for Progress conference suggest that Cuba may seek a reconciliation with the United States. These reports are based on the general tenor of private discussions held by delegates with Maj, Ernesto (Che) Guevara, Cuba's economic chief. Guevara was represented as concerned over the uncertainty of the future of the world sugar market and the increasing difficulties of Cuban industries suffering a lack of spare parts for U. S.-made ma-

That Cuba is suffering economic distress is nothing new. But evidence that Cuba would like to restore normal relations with the United States is rather curi-

Does Guevara really believe that the United States would be willing to restore trade relations with Cuba on a "let bygones be bygones" basis? What arrangerepay the more than \$1 billion in U.S.owned assets seized by the Fidel Castro regime? The seizure of private property without just compensation is a "bone in the throat" of the United States that can only be removed by realistic measures directed toward repayment.

Beyond the question of seized U.S. assets, does Guevara really believe that we are now prepared to be reconciled with a Communist - oriented, if not completely Communist - dominated, island only 90 miles from our shores? What steps toward a more democratic form of government in Cuba are Guevara and Castro willing to take?

Maybe Guevara has succumbed to a moment or two of wool-gathering. To speak of a reconciliation with the United States without offering in turn repayment for seized U. S. property and a democratization of Cuban rule is to say the least no more than a mental exercise divorced from reality.



## Around The Rim **Rules To Rule By**

legal decorum of Judge Roy Bean, but, talking with Carroll Smith the other day, I gathered that things in the land of re and whereas still aren't as ordered as they should be.

Seems each judge makes his own noncourt rules in his own court, and this, although the jurist certainly has this for right, makes things confusing lawyers-particularly those who must travel to another county to try a case.

SOME JUDGES allow smoking in the courtroom, others don't; some require coats and ties, others don't; some rule Sunday dress for lawyers and court officials but not for litigants or spectators.

Getting down to more basic issues than the trappings, Smith tells me that, in some courts, attorneys are allowed to advance from counsel table to witness chair where they may tower over the witness, lean close to shout, and otherwise browbeat and terrorize the witness. This, Smith says, is not only unfair and unnecessary, it just isn't usually done-except on television. Perry Mason, you might have known, thus becomes

> THE USUAL custom, he notes, is for attorneys to remain seated during questioning of witnesses, thus placing both lawyers at an even advantage, and doing away with one of the big tricks of an attorney who might be a shyster. Smith points out a solution to all this (except for Perry Mason). He refers us to an article in a legal publication calling for standardized rules throughout the courts of Texas-which probably all the state's judges would agree to if the bar association or someone could get them together.

Again, the legislature could draw the rules to a more standard form, although most legal eagles would rather do it themselves.

## J. A. Livingston That Big Instalment Debt

Henry Gregory, president of the First Federal Sayings and Loan Association, of Rocky Mount, N. C., is no bystander in this argument.

"Naturally, being a savings and loan operator," he writes, "I consider homeownership of foremost importance. But from a realistic standpoint, an electric refrigerator, washing machine, and often an automobile are far more essential. A house can be rented, but the average American housewife must have appliances to operate her home efficiently and meet the needs of her family."

WHEREUPON, Mr. Gregory demands: Why do the President and politicians periodically make a national issue of low interest rates on housing when the costs of financing automobiles and household appliances take so much more out of the consumer.

Why, he wants to know, don't the politicans get wholeheartedly behind the truth - in - lending bill of Sen. Paul H. Douglas (Dem. III.) and compel banks, instalment finance companies, department stores, appliance vendors, and automobile dealers to tell customers plainly and unmistakably:

1. The amount in dollars and cents the customer pays for credit. 2. The real, honest interest rate

to the charges on consumer financing. In many instances, the 11.6 per cent becomes 15 per cent or 20 per cent by the time you add together all the closing costs with which the consumer is faced in buying appliances and automobiles on JAMES TOBIN, one of the three mem-

bers of President Kennedy's Council of Economic Advisers, a former professor at Yale, and one of the country's distinguished economists, provides statistics to support Mr. Gregory.

As a witness before Sen. Douglas' Subcommittee of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee, Dr. Tobin noted that although outstanding nonfarm residential mortgage debt is more than three times outstanding instalment consumer debt, annual payments of interest and principal on instalment debt are about three times the payments on mortgages.

OUT OF EVERY \$100 of disposable income, American families pay about \$13 to meet instalment obligations and about \$5 to meet interest and principal on mortgages

"It is clear," said Dr. Tobin, "that credit purchases and repayments have a susbtantial impact on the level of consumer demand."

That's hardly an overstatement, con-

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out of the turbulent drama of his life. As a young Socialist he fied from the Nazis in 1933. Taking refuge in Norway, he managed to escape death. In 1947 he returned to ruined Berlin, resumed his German citizenship and along with the first postwar mayor, Ernst Reuter, fought for the independence and freedom of the city against the Communists. What Brandt means is that now that the East is sealed off, and the slowing of even the trickle of refugees that presisted after August 13 testifies to the effectiveness of the sealing process, the West can no longer pretend at any responsibility for all of Germany.

THE ILLUSION that reunification with a united Berlin as its symbol would come in the forseeable future seems to have been shattered. That illusion was nourished, above all, by Chancellor Adenauer who as the pater familias of a resurgent Germany, held out the hope that all would be as it was before with only a little patience.

The mood of uncertainty and doubt in Berlin derives from a realization that a change has taken place so sweeping as to cloud the future.

BRANDT and many others have criticized the West and in particular President Kennedy for failing to take more vigorous action when the Communists in East Germany sealed the Berlin border. What Brandt's criticism seems to come down to is the failure of the West to take the initiative in the crisis over Germany and Berlin. He points out that it has been 11 weeks since the Kennedy-Khrushchev meeting in Vienna and no move has come from the Western side except in response to action by Moscow. He also points out that he proposed a 52-nation peace conference on Germany and this was promptly slapped down by Adenauer. The contest between the Chancellor of the Federal Republic and the Mayor of Berlin is a further complication in an already complex situation.

IT IS A BITTER campaign, with an underground smear directed against Brandt. Adenauer has not put aside the fierce partisanship that marked his past campaigns. Twice since the newest Berlin crisis he has directed a bitter personal attack against the Berlin mayor as "Willy Brandt, alias Frahm". This is a

Rumors flourish in this atmosphere. One rumor is that in the Kennedy-Khrushchev talks at Vienna Khrushchev notified the President the border would be sealed and the President indicated there would be no reprisal from the West. This fits with the view that the Western Allies privately welcomed the action since it means that the question of what to do about the flow of refugees has been removed from the problems that must be negotiated with the Soviets on the future status of Berlin.

THE BEST refutation of this rumor is that the Allies seem to have been caught flatfooted when the border was sealed with Russian tanks and armored cars backing up the move. One criticism here is that it was 90 hours before the Allied commanders responded with a statement of protest which most West Berliners, including Mayor Brandt, considered far too mild.

The fears of the Berliners of the West living on an island in the cruel sea of communism are not new. When the Russians clamped a blockage on the access routes to West Germany in 1948 these skeptical people said that nothing could be done by the Americans and the city would be absorbed. The air lift proved them wrong.

GESTURES such as the visit of Vice President Johnson and the former Berlin commandant, Lucius Clay, are useful to build morale. With his strong words about freedom and standing firm in defense of the city Johnson will help to assure Berliners that the West intends to live up to its often-repeated pledges, But as Mayor Brandt said in his speech, they will look for more than words when it comes to the assurances that all of Berlin is not to be swallowed up in the Communist sea.

> The two major political parties in West Germany have called for a U.N. debate on the Berlin issue. Mayor Brandt of West Berlin appealed personally by letter to President Kennedy to ask for action by the United Nations. Chancellor Adenauer said to the West German Parliament a few days ago:

"HE WHO TRAMPLES the right of selfdetermination with his feet must count on the deep contempt of all the people in the world who respect the charter of the United Nations. There is only one possibility in placing Soviet-German relations on a new basis: The German people must be given the right to form a free and independent government that can speak and act for the whole German na-

What cause could be more pertinent to world progress and world peace than the right of 17,000,000 human beings to decide for themselves by whom and how they shall be governed? One wonders why the Western governments are shying away from the basic issue. By so doing, they may lose the prestige they have always enjoyed as champions of human liberty and freedom.

**Lieut. Junius Peak** Ranger "We located our man at Round Rock ... "

Back in 1878 a hard riding, fast shooting gent named Sam Bass was holding up toe many Texas banks and railroad trains. Not less than 150 Bass-hunters - detectives, marshals, deputies, Pinkertons, express and railroad agents - were after him. But it took a Ranger and his special company to catch and erase the bold, bad bandit at Round Rock, on July 20. Lieut. Junius Peak commanded those Rangers. Before this historic event June Peak had proved his cool courage and good judgment in quite a few encounters with enemies and outlaws. Twice wounded in the Civil War, Peak subsequently served as deputy sheriff and marshal at Dallas. He had successfully mopped up New Mexico's biggest band of cattle thieves, scouted Indians and charted waterholes in West Texas. In 1880 Peak left the Ranger service for more peaceful pursuits such as railroad construction in Mexico and ranching in Shackelford County - another Ranger to leave his signature on the pages of Texas history.

# Bookmaking **Under Study**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate rackets probers try to show today how the underworld blends trickwith modern electronics to beat the law in promoting big-time gambling.

The Senate Investigations - sub committee already has heard testimony that corruption of some law enforcement officials is another tried and true method. No one at the hearing has yet put the finger on any official as taking graft.

Among witnesses called by the subcommittee was Elum (Bill) Caudell, a former Florida policeman with a record of 14 arrests and one conviction-later reversed on appeal-on charges of illegally ransmitting racing information. Richard E. Gerstein, Dade County (Miami) state attorney, Thursday called Caudell an artist at pilfering forbidden information from race tracks and feeding it into clandestine telephone wire networks that serve U.S. and Canadian handbook betting estabishments.

The subcommittee is trying to decide if new federal laws are needed to curb race wire services. They are legal under federal law and prohibited only in Flori-da, Gerstein said. He called race wires the life blood of book-

Under Florida law it is illegal to transmit any race information from a track for an hour before the races start and for a half hour after each race has ended.

Gerstein told how bookies' agents use tiny radio transmitters hidden in a girdle worn inside their shirts, wig-wag with their hands to confederates outside the track, and use relays of messengers and other devices.

Col, Walter Stone, Providence, R.I., police chief, told of an elaborate code used by a Boston-based race wire service which operated under the name of "Probate Re-search Institute," ostensibly specialists at locating missing heirs.
