Rebels Declare Nasser's U.A.R. Tyranny Is 'Gone'

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syria's army rebels installed a new civilian government today and declared their independence of Cairo.

"The regime of tyranny has gone forever," declared Damascus radio. Accusing President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic of turning Syria into a prison, the broadcast said: "We do not oppose Arab unity. We dispute your claim to Arab leadership."

Nasser announced from Cairo that he had recalled two army regiments, air units and the entire Egyptian navy sent to suppress the revolt. He said he did this to

The Missile Strike Problem

With national survival clearly and directly at stake, can the normal processes of collective bargaining, even under voluntary no-strike agreements, be relied upon for uninterrupted progress in government - contracted missile and space

Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., introduced a bill posing that question for interim congressional study presaging a decision next session. McClellan heads the Senate investigating subcommittee which earlier this year revealed scandalous featherbedding, excessive overtime pay and gouging work stoppages in the missile-space effort. The hearings resulted in no-strike agreements which Sen. McClellan concedes produced "excellent accomplishments."

Noting labor-dispute delays recently in the Titan and Minuteman missile programs, however, Sen. McClellan has concluded that "this government should not be required to depend solely upon voluntary cooperation" in this field. His bill would provide for compulsory arbitration of labor-management disputes in missile and space activities,, with decisions by three-member emergency boards representing the public and both parties enforceable by court order.

Such compulsory arbitration has been

consistently opposed by both labor and management in industrial relations generally, because in its area of application it is likely to lead irresistibly to governmental fixing of wages, prices and profits. Compulsory arbitration has not even been established in national emergencies, though the various governmental pressures for settlement of a dispute of that magnitude often have amounted to virtually the same thing. The principle that there is no right to strike against the government, however, is well established,

In view of the vital security nature of the missile-space programs and the heavy burden of their financing by taxpayers, compulsory arbitration such as Sen. Mc-Clellan proposes can be strongly justified if voluntary processes prove inadequate. What introduction of the McClellan bill does is to put both unions and contractors in this field on probation, Should either fail to maintain the high level of responsibility essential to guaranteeing maximum, uninterrupted progress in the missile-space race with Russia, Congress should - and probably would, even in election year - turn to the McClellan blil for that guarantee.

No Penetrating Policy

We have recovered from the nasty shock of the ouster of Syngman Rhee in April, 1960, and the military revolution of last May 17. We have apparently made such adjustments as were necessary to accommodate ourselves to the situation in South Korea and have turned our attention to Europe once more.

At least one expert in Korean affairs is not at all happy with the situation. He is Edward W. Wagner, assistant professor of Korean studies in Harvard's Department of Far Eastern Languages. He is alarmed by the aimless drift of U.S. policy in South Korea and communicates some of his forebodings in the October issue of the quarterly, Foreign Affairs.

The Communist threat to South Korea today is the threat of subversion by invidious comparison." Wagner wrote, after noting earlier that the Communist development of North Korea has given the inhabitants a higher standard of living than they had known, whereas the masses of South Koreans live at a bare subsistence level. "In the long run South Koreans will not choose between Washington and Moscow but between Seoul and Pyongyang. For us not to insist on the ordering of South Korean society so as to bring a material betterment in the Korean way of life would be to admit that we do not have the will or the wisdom to compete with Communism in a critical underdeveloped area of the world."

Thus we have failed to identify ourselves and our way with the masses and their aspirations for liberty and a better

The situation in Korea may be beyond redemption. We can hardly impose our ideas on Gen Pak Chung-hi without a fight. This also would expose us to charges of "interference" in international affairs of Korea

Yet, we may as well admit that we have no penetrating policy in South Korea, We have armed them to the teeth, but somehow we have not been able to extend the blessings of freedom to the masses. Anti-communism is certainly fundamental, but it must also be accompanied by positive action.

The President Speaks From Strength

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. - The calm and confident tone of President Kennedy's speech to this world organization derives in part from a new frame of reference, First, the President was speaking from a position of strength that has now been more clearly realized than at any time in the recent past and, second, he spoke with an awareness that it is for the first time possible to foresee reasonable negotiations with the Soviet Union over Berlin and Germany.

THE TWO SIDES of this frame give a rather different look to what has been an almost - unrelievedly gloomy picture. All the evidence available, and its scope cannot for a variety of reasons be disclosed, has convinced top policy-makers that American nuclear strength and the capacity to deliver that strength are preponderantly greater than that of the Soviet Union.

What is more, Premier Khrushchev knows this and he is fully aware of the careful appraisal of the relative strength of the two nuclear giants contained in top-secret files in Washington. This may explain why all the bluster and boast have been on the Soviet side in recent

IT IS CERTAINLY the reason the Soviet Union resumed nuclear testing at the risk of losing so much in the propaganda war. Military - scientific pressure helped to persuade Khrushchev, in the view of American officials who have valid reasons to know, that catching up with the United States was essential. Unfortunately in last year's Presidential campaign the nation's nuclear status got tied up with partisan politics or it might be possible

to spell this out more exactly. But, in any event, the President's wisdom in refraining from the public flexing of nuclear muscles seems evident.

A SMALL FRACTION of America's nuclear power would devastate the Soviet Union and of the capability of delivering this power these same officials have no doubt. That Khrushchev also understands. There is some small initial evidence, and this is the other side of the frame, that the Soviets are beginning to believe the United States is in complete and deadly earnest about defending basic rights in

The signs of a change in the Soviet attitude are small. But so were the first signs in 1949 of a Soviet willingness to end the blockade of Berlin and come to the agreement reopening the access routes on the ground. The tender hope. like the first uncertain crocus in spring, is that the parallel does exist and the way for a negotiation on broader terms that just Berlin and not held at gun point is opening up. The first private talk between Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was in general, discounting initial statements for the propaganda record, in this

THE PRESIDENT'S speech was aimed at the negotiating target. He said the United States was committed to no rigid formula, sought no perfect solution and believed a peaceful agreement was possible with the protection of the freedom of West Berlin and the access routes to the city. That is, in effect, an invitation to negotiation.

The disarmament plan put forward by the United States bear's a close family resemblance to the plans that have preceded it. But there is at least one important addition and that is in the proposal in Stage 1 that states that now have nuclear weapons would not relinquish control of such weapons to any nation not owning them and would not give any information or material necessary for their manufacture, Furthermore, as the present nuclear powers disarmed under inspection and control carried out by an International Disarmament Agency those outside the nuclear club would agree to cease and desist any and all efforts to join the club

THE HOPES of the present moment can be quickly dissipated. The signs of a changing attitude may be no more than heat lightning on the troubled horizon. Incredible as it may seem, there are apparently those opposed to any agreement. Incidents such as the U-2 do occur and intrusions into nuclear diplomacy such as in the strange speech of Senator Margaret Chase Smith of Maine can do great harm. But the words the President has spoken point a way which, while still dim and uncertain, nevertheless may be the beginning of a path in the wilderness. An Approach To The Berlin Issue

WASHINGTON - If the Berlin issue were the only one that separated the East and the West today, there would be a comparatively easy way to handle itat least for several years.

Diplomacy has long held a trump card to play in similar emergencies. This starts with the acceptance by both sides of the proposition that a particular dispute is for the time being unsolvable. Then it is usually proposed that a "modus vivendi" be adopted. This means "a way of living" with the difficulty without actually solving it.

BUT THE PROCEDURE is often successful. There have been cases where the controversy in question was ultimately solved with the passage of time and with the later development of a spirit of conciliation. There have been other cases where the problem remained unsolved indefinitely, or at least till some other circumstances arose to bring a new ap-

A "modus vivendi" need not mean an abandonment of the issues themselves, and it could mean a decision to explore various ways of producing a settlement. Thus, what are the rights of the Western Allies? Have they grown obsolete, as the Communists claim? Do rights disappear just because a few years have elapsed, or are they fundamental and rooted in or implied in written agreements?

THE UNITED NATIONS has created a court of international justice. Why couldn't the East and West agree to submit the juridical questions to the World Court?

If such an agreement isn't possible now, then a "modus vivendi" could provide that the status in Berlin prior to August 13-when the East Berlin border was closed-be restored and given an indefinite lease of life while the Soviet government pursues its own policies with respect to East Germany. As President Kennedy said in his speech, it doesn't matter what "paper agreements" the Moscow government makes with the East German government, What does matter is whether the East German government,

encouraged by the Soviets, starts to commic acts of aggression and seeks to brush aside established rights of the United States, Britain and France in West Berlin.

FUNDAMENTALLY, there are today lots of unsettled questions, including the right of the East German people to "selfdetermination," but a "modus vivendi" could provide a five-year formula in which to move forward toward the attainment of such an objective.

Basically, the agreement that would be made would mean that both sides agreed to disagree, but at the same time they would agree to bring forward a formula to take care of the immediate futurea way of living meanwhile with the probm and still advancing it towar tual solution. Diplomacy is replete with examples of this technique.

PLAINLY THE world doesn't want to see a war over a question that is by some means susceptible of adjudication, But, in saying this, it is also pertinent to note that Berlin is not an isolated issue. There are pressures in Vietnam, in Laos, and in Africa where the ambitions of the Communist regime in Moscow are producing considerable tension. It may be doubted whether any single issue would block an over-all settlement if there were a genuine desire on both sides for a peaceful result.

WHAT EACH SIDE fears today is that it will be represented before the world as having made a "concession" or that its willingness to "negotiate" may be construed as a willingness to surrender on some vital point. None of this is necessary when a "modus vivendi" is offered and accepted. It simply keeps the existing rights intact for both sides and devises a formula to achieve in five to seven years the over-all objective-a reunified Germany under a government to which all governments in the East and West can accord full diplomatic recognition and which can be universally accepted as a partner in maintaining the peace of the world.

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





THE DAY OF PENTECOST

This day stands high as one of Old Testament prophecy and it stood high in Old Testament worship. It occurred (50) days following passover week; Note the thought from Lev. 23:15-16 " seven sabbaths shall be complete: even unto the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall ye number fifty days;-"

Compare Isa, 2:3-4 with Acts 2:1 these verses show that the word of the Lord was to go forth from Jerusalem as it did, Acts 2:1. Also Joel 2:28 points to Acts 2: showing that the Spirit was issued on Pentecost. Acts 1:1-6 points out specific promises and commands to the Apostles which were to be fulfilled in Jerusalem on the DAY OF PENTECOST. For these promises the Apostles had to tarry in Jerusalem waiting for the "power from on high"—Luke 24:49-52. Matthias was numbered with the eleven apostles according to Acts 1:26 hence this points out the meaning of Acts 2:1 saying "They" were all assembled with one accord in one place that this means the 12 apostles. Here then in accordance with the scripture the Gospel was preached and the apostles stated the terms of pardon to the lost and alien sinners. Hence the message of the gospel was here on Pentecost preached for the first time under direction of the Holy Spirit. Christ was given all authority in heaven and on earth, Matt. 28:18-20, Matt. 17:5 By studying Acts chapter 2 we see how that on the day of Pentecost the Holy Spirit spoke through the apostles and gave life to those who were obedient. Paul speaks "The law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus,-" Rom. 8:2 this is the law which makes one free from the law of sin and death. On Pentecost this law "went forth" for the first time. "The Spirit dwells in the word as the principle of life dwells in the seed" and with the truth of this statement before us we

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




