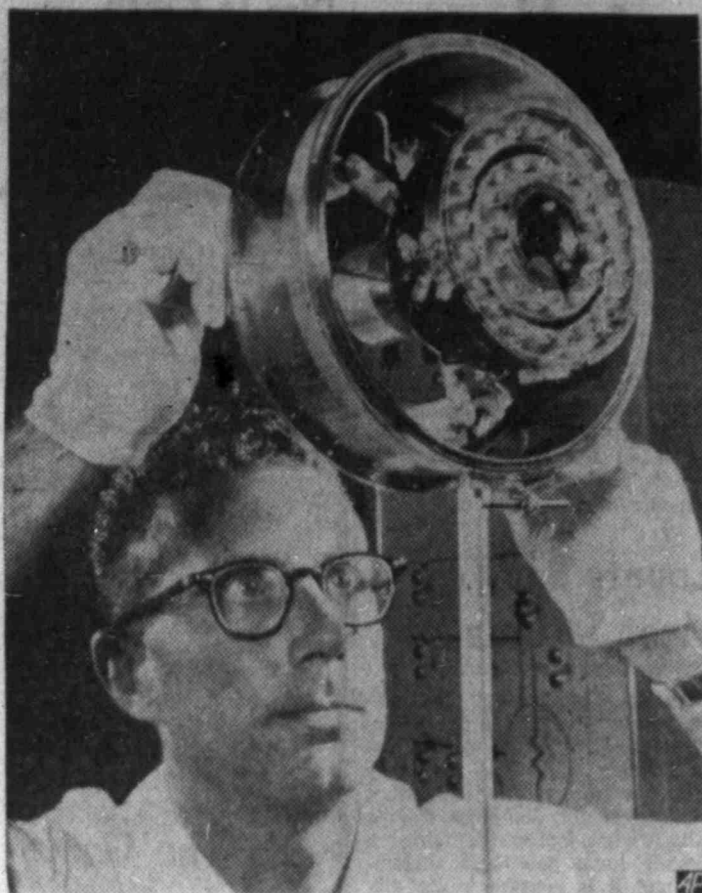

### Wilson Proposes Crime Deterrents

AUSTIN (AP)—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson proposed today an expansion of probation and parole, intensified criminal-record-keeping and a mental hospital in the prison system as a deterrent to crime. Wilson was the first to address the 11th annual Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference. Wilson said the crime rate for Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana climbed 20.3 per cent in 1960.

"This can mean but one thing—we need more discipline—in the home, in our schools, in our thinking. It also means that our disciplinary system is not functioning properly," Wilson said.

"To my mind one of the greatest improvements we could make in our probation system is to give the local district judge more flexibility in enforcing the terms of probation."

The attorney general said about the only effective punishment a judge has for parole violators is to send to the penitentiary.

"This is destructive. I intend to sponsor a statute giving a judge the power to impose a short local jail stay for both probation and parole violators," he said.

Wilson said he also plans to propose legislation requiring that a person who commits a crime and is judged insane be placed in a

hospital setting, but under authority of the prison system instead of state hospital authorities.

Some 200 Texas law enforcement officials were expected for the 3-day conference. Sen. Wardlow Lane of Center will address a banquet tonight.

Vincent O'Leary, director of the Division of Parole Supervision, said \$4 million in state money has been saved in the past four years through sifting out the better prospects for parole and getting them out of the prison system.

"It is a paradox that the half of our inmates who are found to be least ready or who refuse the responsibilities of parole are discharged from our penitentiary with no supervision or control upon release. This is one of the major loopholes in our system today."

J. F. Heard, assistant director of the Texas Department of Corrections, said whether a convict "adjusts to society and becomes a useful citizen depends much upon what we do with him while he is incarcerated."

"We... feel that the most vital factors in rehabilitation are scientific classification, strict and rigid discipline, hard work, education, vocational training, religious instruction and clean, wholesome, supervised recreation," he said. Heard noted that the Texas Prison System includes 13 prison units and over 12,000 inmates.

### Who Took Old Rip?

EASTLAND (AP)—There's a lot of speculation but no proof about who kidnapped Old Rip—a famous frog who's been dead since 1929.

Old Rip was found Thursday in a paper sack. He disappeared Wednesday from his glass case in the Eastland courthouse lobby.

A search started with discovery of a note stating:

"If you want your famous frog back, get \$10,000. Instructions will follow."

A telephone call from an unnamed person cleared up the mystery. Sheriff Lee Horn was told that Old Rip was in a paper sack in Room 400 of the Eastland National Bank Building.

Officers found Rip and returned him to his red casket in the courthouse.

Rip achieved fame in a legend that the frog breathed for 31 years while sealed in the cornerstone of Eastland's old courthouse.

### Lions Urged To Help Hospital

COAHOMA — New techniques and new drugs have helped bring a new glow of hope in treating mental illness, but one of the biggest aids in an increasing recovery record is the volunteer hospital worker.

This was the appeal brought to the Coahoma Lions Club Thursday by Joe Pickle, chairman of the Big Spring State Hospital Volunteers Council publicity committee for continued interest of the club in volunteer work. Consideration of specific projects and of an understanding that most mental illness can be helped or even cured was urged by the speaker.

D. M. McKinney, Big Spring, chairman of the council, was a guest at the weekly luncheon in the Highway Cafe, as was David M. (Doc) Ellis, Midland. The members discussed plans for various community and club events, including the Coahoma High School homecoming (the club will have a float in the parade), the annual fruit cake sale, and fund campaigns.

### Previous Conviction Key To Life Or Death For Murder

SPOTSYLVANIA, Va. (AP)— A prior murder conviction may determine whether Melvin Davis Rees Jr. will escape execution in the 1959 kidnap-slaying of a Virginia family of four.

Death in the electric chair was decreed for Rees, 32, a dance band musician, Thursday by a Spotsylvania Circuit Court jury that found him guilty of first-degree murder in the killing of the head of the family, Carroll V. Jackson Jr., 29, 2½ years ago.

But Virginia's ability to carry out the judgment depends on the willingness of the federal government to commute two life sentences already imposed on Rees in the same case.

The life terms were meted out earlier this year in U.S. District Court in Baltimore, where Rees was convicted of kidnaping and slaying Jackson's wife, Mildred, 27, and one of their two daughters, Susan, 5.

A second Jackson daughter, Janet, 18 months, also was slain

after the Apple Grove, Va. family was abducted from its car Jan. 11, 1959, in what the prosecution here called "the worst crime in Virginia history." Rees, though accused by police, never has been indicted for Janet's death.

The jury of 10 men and two women needed less than 25 minutes to return its verdict.

Judge John D. Butzner Jr. gave the two court-appointed defense lawyers 14 days to present other grounds for upsetting the verdict. If this move fails, the attorneys indicated they will appeal the death sentence.

The Justice Department said in Washington the federal sentences of life imprisonment take precedence over the state's death penalty. A spokesman said the life terms could be commuted to give Virginia custody of Rees, but he said there would be no move in this direction until all possibilities of appeals by the defendant are exhausted.

Two months after the family disappeared while returning home

from visiting relatives, the bodies of Jackson and his youngest daughter were discovered under a pile of brush near Fredericksburg. The bodies of the mother and older daughter were found two weeks later near Gambrills, Md.

Police suspicion was first directed toward Rees by a former acquaintance, Glenn Leroy Moser who terms himself an amateur criminologist. Rees was arrested June 24, 1960, in West Memphis, Ark.

Rees, who never lost his composure during the trial, took the verdict calmly. He showed little emotion during the trial.

GREAT BEND, Kan. (AP) — Motorist Sam Brooks' car bumped a parked auto Thursday as he backed up to leave a parking space.

The 80-year-old man drove off toward his home.

Later policeman Jesse Torrez rapped on his door and informed him he had: Hooked the bumper of the car behind him and towed it five blocks. The car broke free in a busy intersection, jumped the curb and rolled onto the courthouse lawn narrowly missing parking meters, trees and parked cars.

Brooks was quite surprised. So were police. They couldn't find where Brooks had violated any traffic ordinance.

Boys Caught In Wild Chase

DALLAS (AP) — Four reform school escapees, captured Thursday when their car crashed into a parked vehicle following a 110-mile chase, are being held today for investigation of auto theft.

One police chief said the boys fired at officers during the chase but the youths denied any gunplay took place. They blamed the gunshot-like noises on the repeated backfiring of the stolen car.

Carrollton Police Chief Dan Lewis said he spotted their stolen 1957 Chevrolet in Carrollton and began the chase that terminated when they ran into a parked car at a construction site in Dallas.

The chief said the four youths and a companion escaped from Gatesville's reformatory and stole a 1955 Ford. They arrived in Dallas Wednesday night and switched cars.

In the second stolen car, but minus their fellow escapee, they used knives to get \$226 from attendant Arthur Terry at a Texaco station in Frisco, he said. Their whereabouts were unknown until Lewis spotted them in Carrollton and the chase began.

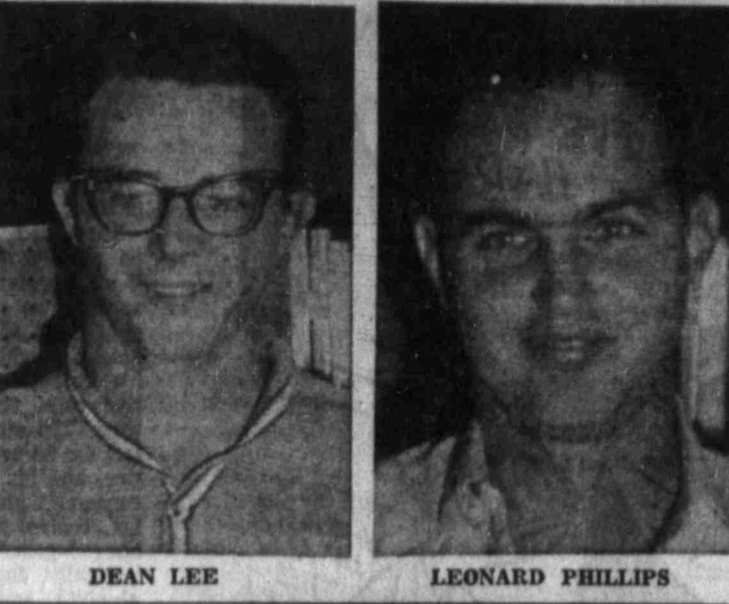

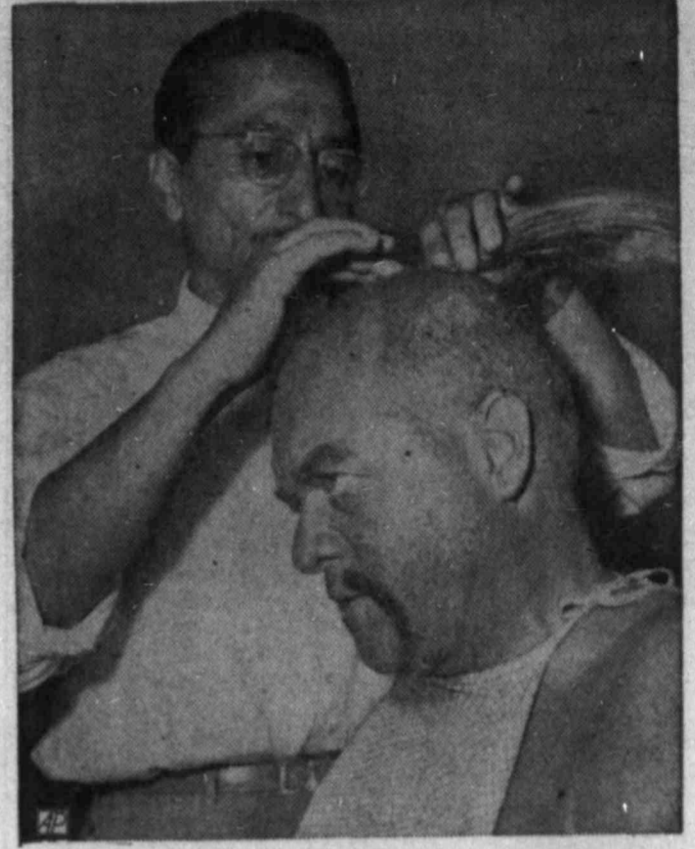

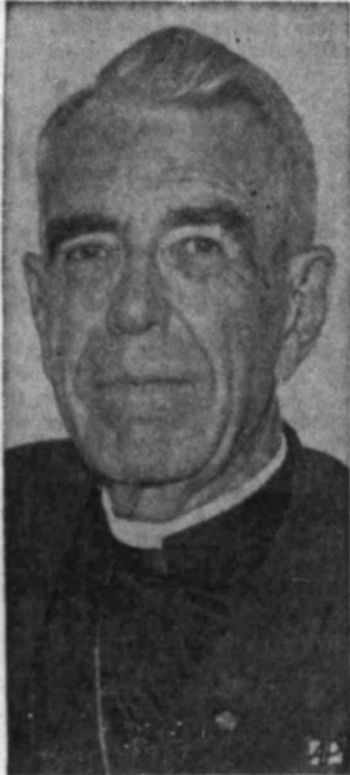

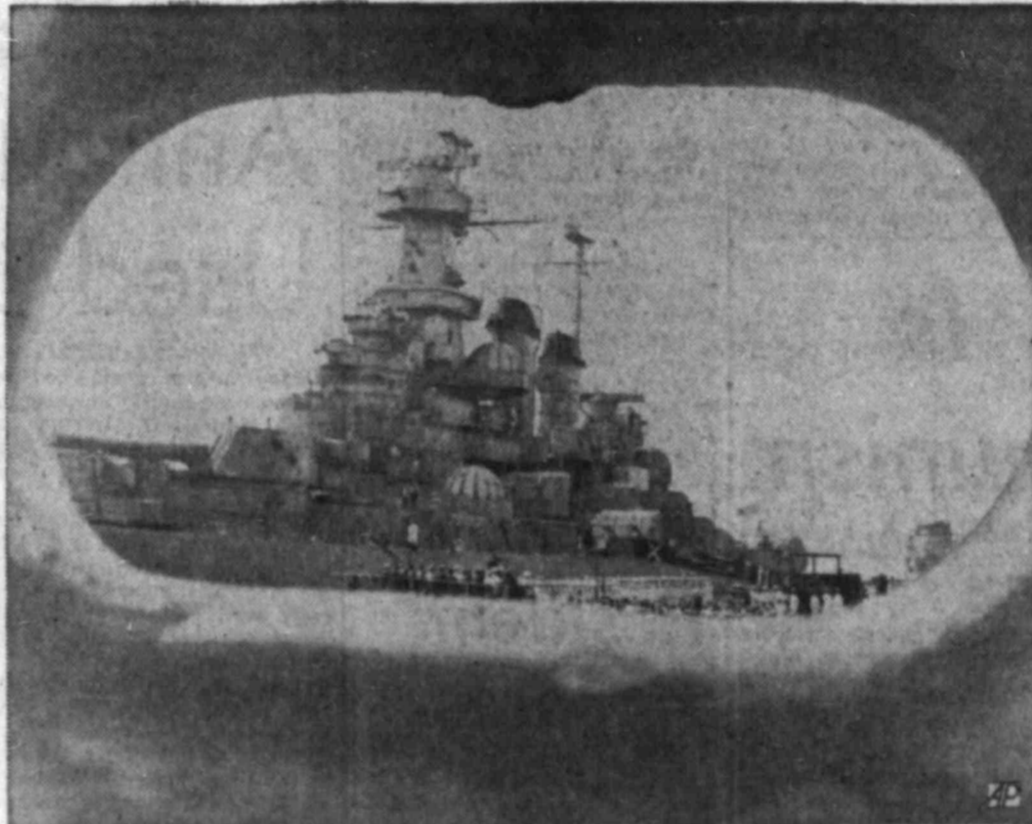

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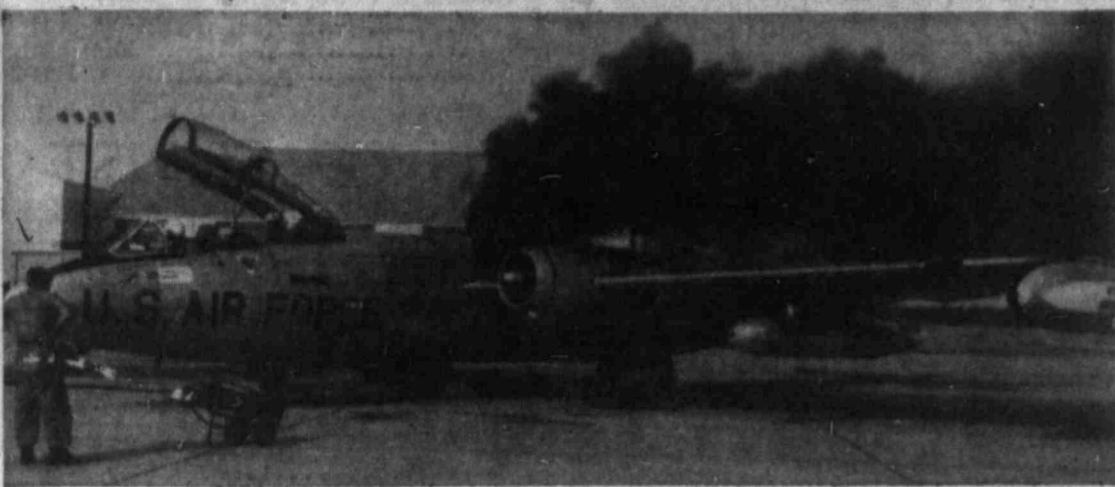

## Area Skies Are Simulated FIS Battlefield

The skies over Big Spring were a simulated battleground Monday, through Wednesday of this week as the Delta Daggers of the 331st FIS engaged a specially equipped B-57 Canberra bomber in practice interceptions.

The B-57, from the 4713th Defense Systems Evaluation Squadron at Stewart AFB, New York was piloted by Capt. Lloyd Neutz, Capt. Neutz, Oakland, Calif., has had two years flying experience in the B-57 aircraft.

The special electronic components of the B-57 were operated by the Electronics Warfare Officer, 1st Lt. Lee Cohen, Lt. Cohen, a native of Minneapolis, Minn., has had two years experience as an EWO.

The function of the EWO is divided between the reconnaissance of electronic emissions and emitting of spurious electronic signals or jamming.

The 4713th is an ADC squadron concerned with testing and exercising defense radar sites and NORAD weapons systems. Periodically, the aircraft of the 4713th are assigned to specific interceptor squadrons to furnish practice to pilots of the unit in overcoming the effects of electronic jamming.

## West Slowly Getting Data On Red Berlin Talk Plans

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Western foreign ministers were reported today to be making slow progress in obtaining information from Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko on Soviet plans for negotiating on the Berlin crisis.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Foreign Secretary Lord Home of Britain have spent a total of more than 10 hours meeting with the top Soviet diplomat in the past eight days, and their main questions about Soviet intentions are said to be still unanswered.

Western diplomats reported the talks have yielded some slight indication that the Soviet Union may be seriously interested in arranging a Big Four foreign ministers conference later on, but it obviously is in no haste to do so.

Some Western officials think Premier Khrushchev probably prefers to stall off a conference until after a Soviet Communist party meeting in Moscow late next month. There is speculation he may sign the treaty with Communist East Germany or announce definite plans for signing it at that time. Thus he may not want to get into negotiations until he has acted.

Home and Gromyko spent an hour and 20 minutes together late Thursday. It was their second meeting. Rusk previously had held two long conferences with Gromyko and is scheduled to meet him again Saturday morning.

Rusk then will hold a final talk with Home here Saturday afternoon. He plans to return to Washington Saturday night and Home expects to fly to London Sunday. Their departures probably will not end the talks, however, for

Gromyko may go to Washington next week for another meeting with Rusk.

On the Western side the aim of all this diplomatic activity is twofold: to try to find out from Gromyko whether Khrushchev is interested in a Berlin compromise and, if so, whether a broad basis for negotiations can be agreed on.

Both Khrushchev and President Kennedy have said they want a peaceful settlement of the dispute. But Kennedy has made clear he

will not negotiate on Khrushchev's terms, and Khrushchev has given no clear sign that he is willing to change his terms.

Gromyko is understood to have emphasized to Home all over again Thursday that the Soviet government wants to make a Berlin settlement only in the framework of an East German peace treaty.

By this approach the Soviets seek to get one of their main points, which is that eventually the stationing of Western troops in West Berlin must come to an end.

Rusk has said repeatedly that the United States has no intention of weakening the position of the West Berlin garrison by any arrangement which implies that the troops are there through agreement with either the Soviets or East Germany.

Home is reported to have spent most of the time in Thursday's meeting asking Gromyko specific questions about possible negotiating procedures and about Soviet intentions with respect to the East German treaty and Berlin's future. By some accounts, Gromyko's replies were evasive and shed no new light on the situation.

Nevertheless, Rusk and Home are said to believe that Gromyko's evident interest in continuing the talks and his willingness to argue the issues offered some hope of eventual success in working out a formula for negotiations.

A British spokesman said the meeting in Home's hotel suite was "perfectly friendly."

"Our aim is to find a basis for negotiations," he said. "This meeting should have helped."

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## Gen. LeMay Orders Air Force Generals At Pentagon To Keep In Physical Shape

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Curtis E. LeMay has taken steps to require the 91 Air Force generals flying desks at the Pentagon to play squash, lift weights or exercise regularly in some other way.

The Air Force chief of staff, a pretty rugged type himself, has expressed "very, very great concern" that generals doing staff work keep in top shape, sources said.

To this end, the Air Force Surgeon General, Maj. Gen. Oliver

K. Neiss, has drafted a program which is expected to gain final approval by LeMay.

Each general would be required to undergo a physical examination by an Air Force doctor, who then would recommend whatever measures might be needed to keep down waistlines and stay in trim generally.

Under the plan, general officers would have a couple of options. They could leave their offices for at least a half day a week for recreation or exercise "of which

physical activity is an essential element." This could include golf.

If they preferred, the generals could take more strenuous exercise for shorter periods of time at an officers' gymnasium in the Pentagon. Available there are handballs, swimming, weightlifting, squash and the like.

Air Force doctors would keep tabs to determine whether the generals attain and maintain the proper physical condition.

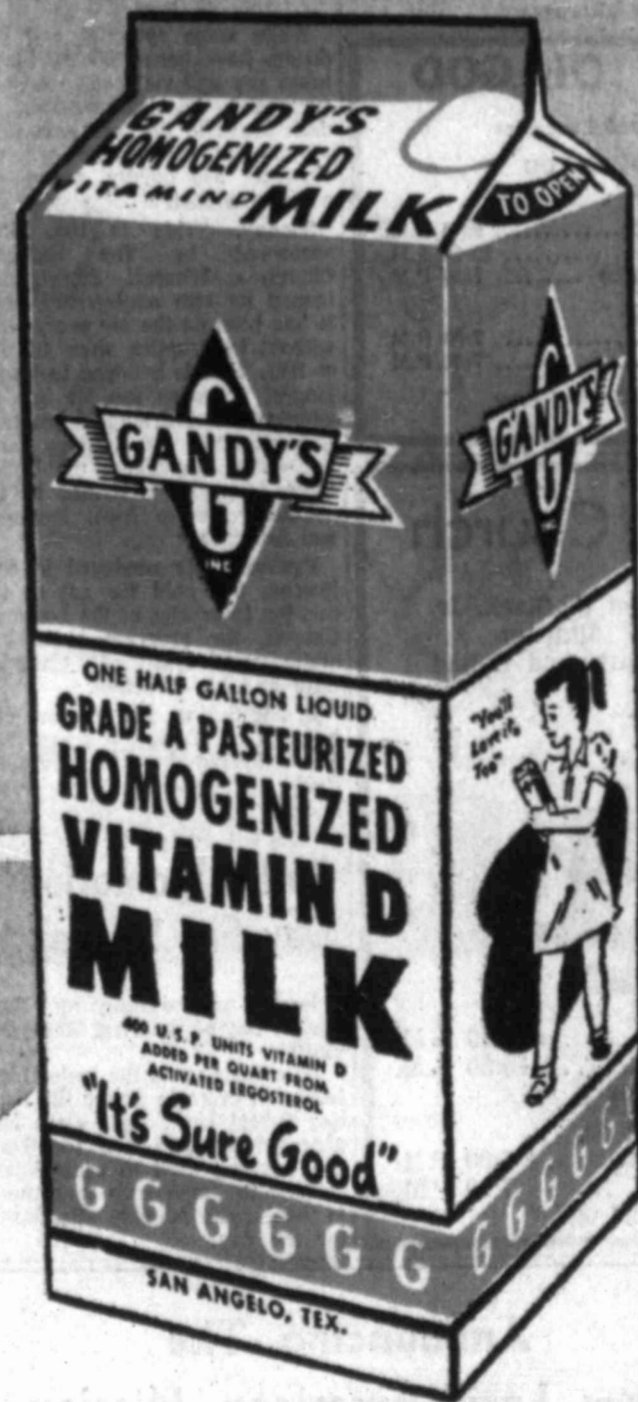

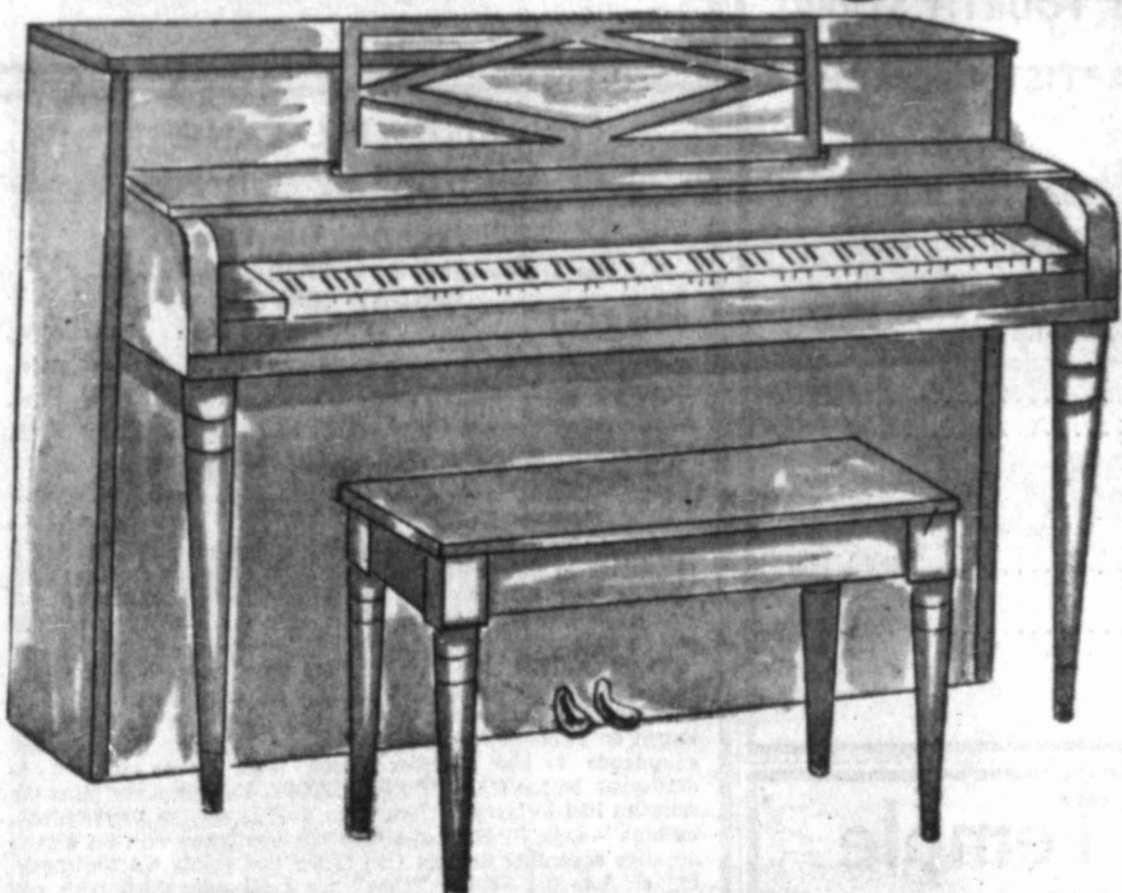

This accounts for the rabbi's amazement at Jesus' learning. The religious instruction Jesus did receive as an average Jewish boy centered on the passages cited from Deuteronomy, especially chapter 6, verse 4. This is known as the Shema, the Hebrew word for "hear."

It is the basic article of the Jewish faith, even more important than now, for its assertion of monotheism in pagan days. With verse 5 it later made up the first commandment of Christ.

The speaker in Deuteronomy is Moses, who spends the book reviewing the experiences of Israel's wandering (the first three chapters) and relating the laws recorded before, in Exodus and Leviticus. His major theme is the importance of obedience to God's word.

An important point in Moses' exhortations is the responsibility of parents to inculcate reverence for the Lord.

Verse 49 contains the first recorded words of Christ. In summation, Christ's growth was one of perfect innocence to perfect holiness.

THE DAY OF PENTECOST

This day stands high as one of Old Testament prophecy and it stood high in Old Testament worship. It occurred (50) days following passover week; Note the thought from Lev. 23:15-18 "seven sabbaths shall be complete: even unto the morrow after the seventh sabbath shall ye number fifty days;—"

Compare Isa. 2:3-4 with Acts 2:1 these verses show that the word of the Lord was to go forth from Jerusalem as it did, Acts 2:1. Also Joel 2:28 points to Acts 2; showing that the Spirit was issued on Pentecost. Acts 1:6 points out specific promises and commands to the Apostles which were to be fulfilled in Jerusalem on the DAY OF PENTECOST. For these promises the Apostles had to tarry in Jerusalem waiting for the "power from on high"—Luke 24:49-52. Matthias was numbered with the eleven apostles according to Acts 1:26 hence this points out the meaning of Acts 2:1 saying "They" were all assembled with one accord in one place that this means the 12 apostles. Here then in accordance with the scripture the Gospel was preached and the apostles stated the terms of pardon to the lost and alien sinners. Hence the message of the gospel was here on Pentecost preached for the first time under direction of the Holy Spirit. Christ was given all authority in heaven and on earth. Matt. 28:18-20, Matt. 17:5 By studying Acts chapter 2 we see how that on the day of Pentecost the Holy Spirit spoke through the apostles and gave life to those who were obedient. Paul speaks of "The law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus.—" Rom. 8:2 this is the law which makes one free from the law of sin and death. On Pentecost this law "went forth" for the first time. "The Spirit dwells in the word as the principle of life dwells in the seed" and with the truth of this statement before us we may see how the gospel the truth, the written word produces faith. Rom. 10:17; and saves. Rom. 1:16.

A person cannot study "Pentecost" without studying the second chapter of Acts and a person cannot study the second chapter of Acts without studying "Pentecost". The great commission stated in Matt. 28:19-20, Mk. 16:15-16, Luke 24:46-49, John 20:21-23 had its beginning on this day and in Acts 2; Additions to the New Testament church started on "Pentecost" and in Acts 2; Christ promised in Matt. 16:18 upon the rock of truth which Peter had just confessed to build his church. This he did on Pentecost and in Acts 2; Likewise the era of Christianity prophesied in Jer. 31:31, Matt. 5:17 had its commencement on Pentecost and in Acts 2;

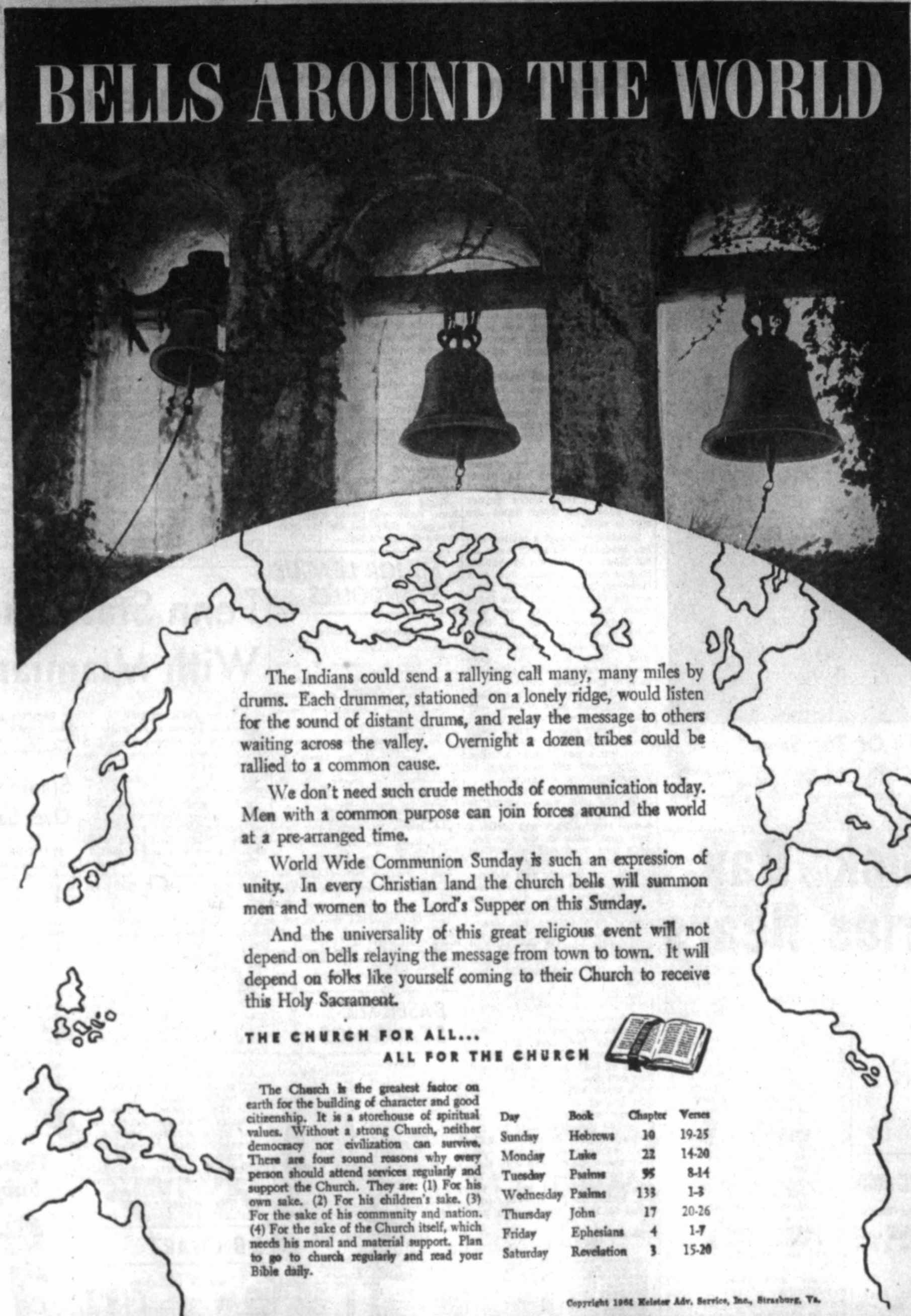

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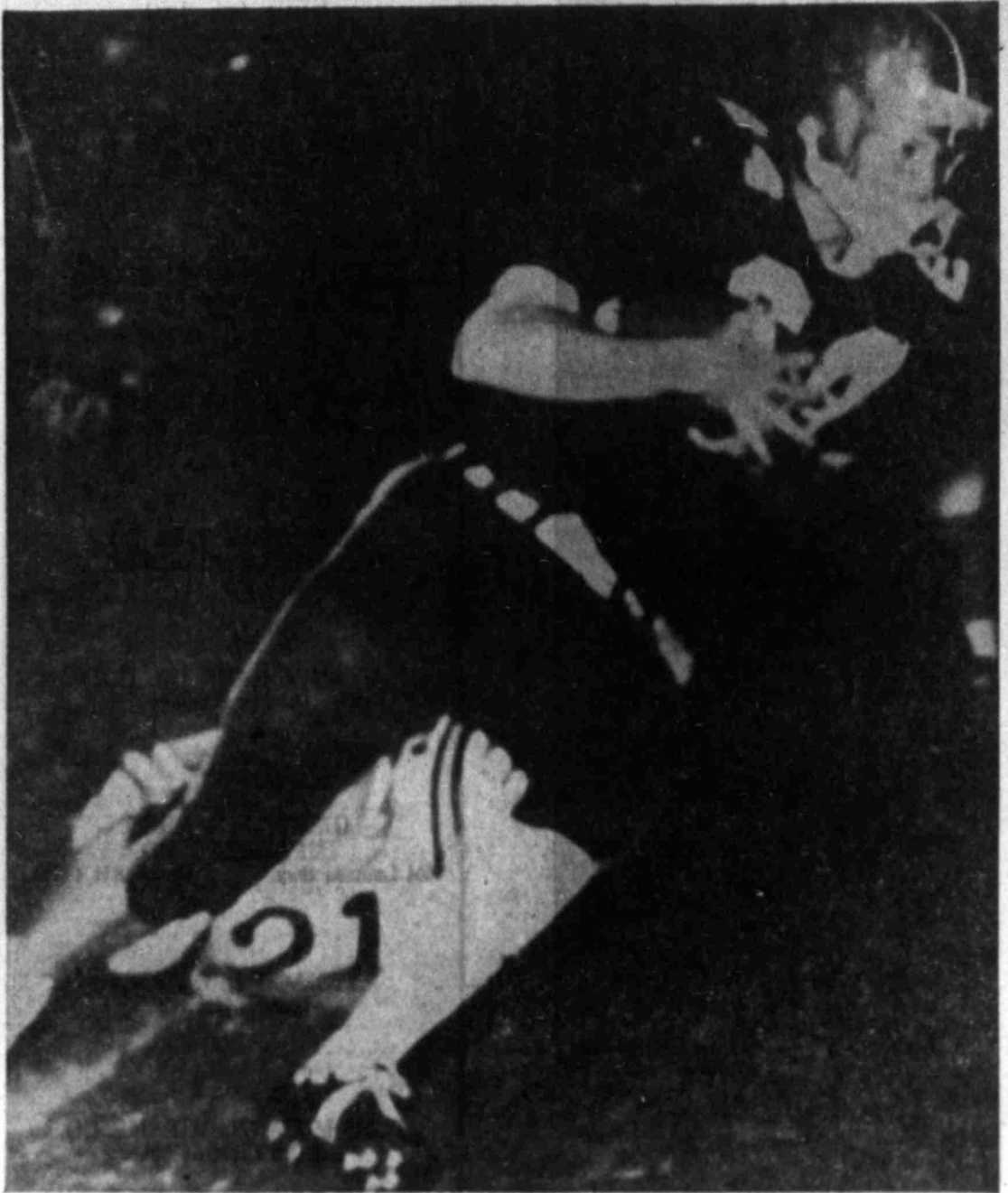
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# Herd Seeks Third Win In Row Here Tonight

The Big Spring football fans are hoping for more extra points in last week's game with Snyder, which the Steers won, 22-6. Gilbert, who has been ailing, should be ready for more action tonight.

## Ponies Form Opposition

Upwards to 5,000 football patrons will gather in Memorial Stadium at 8 o'clock this evening to see if the romance of the Big Spring Steers and that very fickle lady, the Goddess of Victory, endures for yet another week.

It could be a trying two hours for the young and ambitious Longhorns. Their unsullied record will, no doubt, get a severe test.

Guests of the evening will be the Sweetwater Mustangs, who never take the football field anywhere with the idea of coming out second best.

It has become quite fashionable for Big Spring to lose in its long and storied series with the Big Red and what few triumphs the locals have culled from the relationship have invariably come here.

Still and all, hopes for a Steer win over the Class AAA power skyrocketed after the locals pulled the rug out from under Snyder last week and those hopes are still in orbit.

Sweetwater brings a tainted record here. The Mustangs were all but blown off the field by Abilene High a couple of weeks ago, 47-0. However, those who saw the game say the Cayuses would have fared much better had they been able to apply a little glue to their hands in the first few minutes of play. They simply couldn't hold onto the ball and gave away touchdowns like Rockefeller used to give away diamonds.

Outside of that abortive evening, the Mustangs have played very well. They opened with a thrilling 23-21 victory over perennial tough Breckenridge. Their finish in the game was a sort of thing patented in Hollywood and plagiarized in pulp magazines everywhere.

Just when it seemed that Murry Holditch's club was crashing to defeat, all-state end Bud Allredge stepped back and booted a field goal. Some of the Breckenridge fans must still be petrified from the effects of the boot.

Since their debacle with Abilene, the Ponies have come back to defeat Stamford, 12-0. The score doesn't begin to tell the decisiveness of Sweetwater's win. Stamford, a former state champion, was hardly able to get its ball carriers to the line of scrimmage against the hard-charging Mustangs.

Big Spring must be given E for effort in both its starts. The Steers looked good in clubbing Plainview, 36-0, and even better in massaging Snyder last week, 22-6.

They bombed Plainview with a series of bold aerial strikes and then switched tactics and ate Snyder's lunch with a solid, high-octane ground attack.

Snyder held them on even terms for a half the other night but the Steers returned from their half-time respite eager to play ball. They made more yards with Snyder than they did with the other night. They carried the ball and ate Snyder's lunch when he stepped into a drain connection in right center field during the second series games with the Giants. He spent the rest of the series in a hospital, and subsequently underwent an operation to repair the damage.

He missed four games of the 1955 series with the Brooklyn Dodgers because a flareup of chronic osteomyelitis from which he had suffered since incurring a leg injury in high school football in his native Oklahoma. Osteomyelitis is a disease of the bones.

He also missed a full game and parts of two others in the 1957 series with Milwaukee after suffering a shoulder injury in a collision with Braves' second baseman Red Schoendienst.

John Conley, then head coach at Snyder, said about the same thing of Big Spring following last year's game, only he was a little more emphatic—and amazingly prophetic.

Conley remarked, in no uncertain terms: "I don't think Big Spring will win ANY more games."

The Steers will be out to prove Bostick wrong tonight. Sweetwater has this going for it: It's always proved to be a jinx club for the Steers. The locals must look adversity in the eye tonight and start it down.

Perhaps the "big play" in last Friday night's football game between Big Spring and Snyder occurred when linebacker Buster Barnes crashed in to tip pitcher Steve Free's throwing arm just as Steve uncorked a pass downfield, causing Free to throw short.

Tommy Young came in to intercept and the Steers started a drive that resulted in their second TD.

Barnes' pursuit in a good example of the Big Springers' aggressiveness as a whole. Barnes was temporarily slowed by a Snyder blocker but regained his momentum in an all-out effort to get to the passer.

"It's little deeds like that which turn into big plays and, so often, win ball games."

Emmett McKenzie, the head football coach here, who accompanied the Big Spring team to Sweetwater last weekend, said the Dogs looked to better advantage against the Colts than they have at any time this season. Like the A squad, the reserves are all-victorious.

Bobbye Savage, the Big Spring native who was called here following the death of his father, hoped to return to Des Moines, Iowa, in time to be on the sidelines with the East High School football team in its all-important contest tonight with West Waterloo.

The contest could well decide the mythical state championship. (Iowa high schools don't play to an actual state title, as do Texas schools).

In his extended tenure at his Des Moines post, Savage has made East the dominant football school in Iowa's capital city. He coached at Eagle Grove JC in Iowa before moving into the high school ranks.

They say that Sam Echeverry's big trouble as quarterback of the St. Louis Cardinals (he's dividing time at the post with Big Spring's Charley Johnson) is that his voice is too soft. As a result, some of his teammates complain that they can't hear his signals.

When the Cardinals upset the New York Giants recently, Echeverry didn't once change his signals after the Cards had lined up to run a play. He says he didn't need to because he invariably anticipated the opposition's defense.

Incidentally, Echeverry visited relatives in the Snyder area last week. His aunt and grandfather reside there.

Echeverry attended high school at Carlsbad, N.M., and played his college football for Denver University.

The Odessa American Business Club, which, no doubt, took a cue from the success the local ABC chapter has experienced with such ventures, is planning to stage an indoor track and field meet in the Ector County Coliseum next Feb. 17.

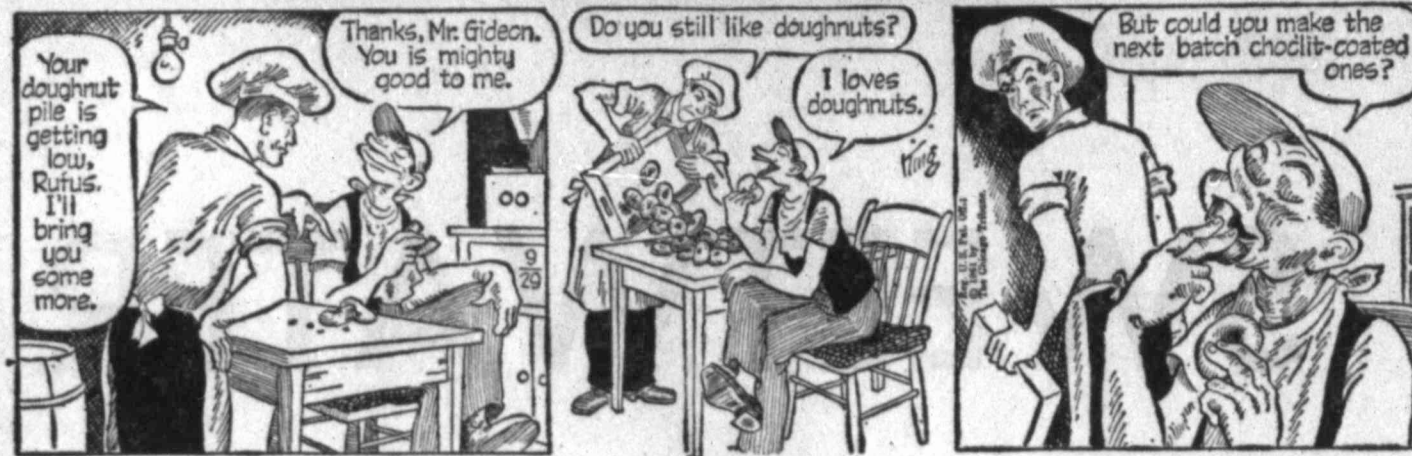
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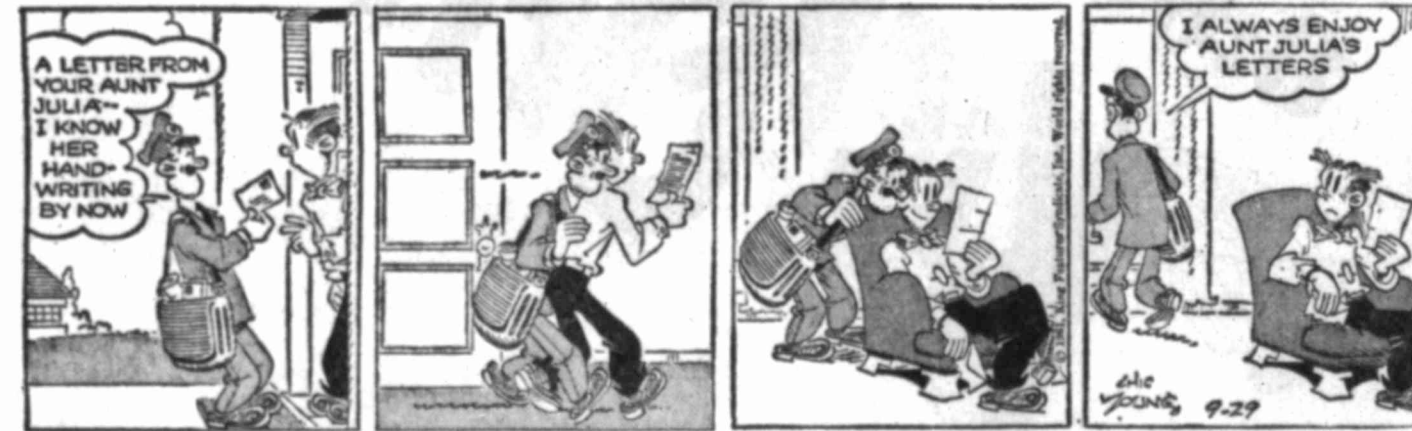

**Goldwater Sees  
GOP Influence**

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater says "we would see the greatest Republican landslide in the history of the country" if congressional elections were held today.

The Arizona senator, addressing a Republican western conference dinner Thursday night said people have had enough of what he termed New Frontier fumbling and extravagance.

Goldwater looked up from his text to say President Kennedy: "We hear him talk like Churchill, then see him act like Chamberlain." Neville Chamberlain was the British prime minister who vainly tried to appease Germany prior to World War II.

"The failure of the New Frontier, both at home and abroad, makes it a matter not just of political choice but of national and international urgency that Republican power be increased in the Congress," Goldwater said.

An audience of more than 750 gave the leader of conservative Republicans an ovation before and after he spoke.

Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon speaks to the conference Saturday night. It will be his first appearance since announcing his candidacy for governor of California.

Goldwater, who was boomed for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination, told a news conference he has no plans to seek it in 1964.

In his opinion, Goldwater said, Nixon will not seek the presidential bid in 1964 if he wins the governorship.

**BIDS, POLLUTION  
Important Matters  
For Water District**

Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District face two important matters here Tuesday. One is opening bids for a headquarters building that may approximate \$75,000; the other is a review of the salt water pollution problem.

Fourteen contractors have taken out plans for the offices to be erected at Third and Lancaster in Big Spring.

E. V. Spence, CRMWD general manager, said Friday that he would ask the board to consider steps toward definite action to expedite the elimination of salt water pollution on the upper Colorado River.

"We hope that operators can bring this matter promptly to a solution without district intervention.

Certainly we want to exercise a proper degree of patience, but few can realize the importance of this situation. Just as it takes several years lead time to produce a new bomber or submarine for defense, so it requires time to develop a water supply of this magnitude and urgency."

"Our permit to impound a second lake on the Colorado River is wholly conditioned on the elimination and control of the salt water problem," he continued.

"Thus, recognizing our responsibility to this area, I believe the time is at hand when we must consider a course of definite action."
