**Stay Granted
2 Young Killers**

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — The State Supreme Court granted a stay of execution for James Douglas Latham and George Ronald York, both under death sentence for the slaying of a western Kansas railroad employe last June.

The stay was granted by the court on the request of two attorneys for York and Latham.

Latham, 19, and York, 18, were scheduled to hang Jan. 30 for the pistol slaying of Otto E. Ziegler, of Oakley June 5.

They were involved in a series of killings in a cross-country crime jaunt last spring.

**Yule Greetings
To Armed Forces**

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy sent Christmas greetings to the armed forces Tuesday saying all the nation looks to their "spirit, courage and determination in support of peace and freedom."

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara messaged the U.S. military forces around the world that "the strength you give America makes possible the security of our homes and families and the perpetuation of cherished peace and freedom."

Insurance Plan**

DALLAS (AP) — Candidate for lieutenant governor, Sen. Jarrard Secrest, claims that Texans "are being forced to pay \$24 million more for auto insurance than they should."

The Temple senator was here to appear before a policy-setting subcommittee of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners.

"I was not given a chance to address the group," he said in an interview. "I sought the opportunity to explain how fixed insurance prices are unfair to Texas drivers."

"They finally agreed to take a

written statement. I won't agree to that. I don't want this just pigeon-holed and forgotten."

Secrest said competitive insurance rates, if allowed in Texas, would provide an estimated \$24 million in savings to drivers throughout the state.

"If I was not allowed to speak out to the subcommittee because I am seeking a higher political office," he said, "it should not mean that I have divested myself of years of insurance legislation experience."

20 Years Ago, Dec. 7, 1941: A Day That Lives In Infamy

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (AP)—The sorrowing ghost of Dec. 7, 1941, stalks the waters of Pearl Harbor for the 20th year as Dec. 7, 1961, approaches.

It marks for the world the anniversary day the war lords of Imperial Japan began a conflict that was to rage for 1,351 days.

But for America alone is reserved the special sadness of bowing to the memories of 2,300 sailors, soldiers, Marines and civilians who perished in a few nightmare hours.

In the battleship Arizona alone, 1,102 men were drowned or burned to a crisp when a bomb exploded her ammunition magazines and another bomb went down a stack.

Those few hideous minutes cost the Navy more men than it lost in the Spanish-American War, World War I and the Korean War combined, a searing lesson of unpreparedness.

How did it go, that Black Sunday, the day Americans call "the day of infamy"?

The time was 7:30 a.m. in Hawaii.

On Oahu Island, the sun climbed over grizzled old Diamond Head; plump white clouds drifted lazily over the lovely green mountains summoned the faithful.

On the other side of the world, on a 200-mile front before Moscow, the Russian Army unleashed its first real offensive against Hitler's Nazi legions.

In Britain, Prime Minister Winston Churchill devoutly hoped that America would get into the war quickly to share his country's heavy burden.

Mr. Churchill had only a few minutes to wait.

Across the United States, newspapers speculated on how much store they could put in the peaceful words of Japan's ambassador, Adm. Kichisaburo Nomura. He offered some hope, they thought.

"We are always willing to talk," Nomura told the American press on Dec. 5. "After all, we are a friendly nation."

But Imperial Japan already was committed. On Nov. 26, from Tanakan Bay in the Kurile Islands, a Japanese striking force of six aircraft carriers, nine destroyers, two battleships, two cruisers and three submarines had put to sea.

The target: Pearl Harbor.

In Washington, not long before the attack, American cipher experts delivered a decoded Japanese message to President Roosevelt. He knew it meant war. But he did not know where it would begin.

In Japan, the secret councils of Gen. Hideki Tojo's military government knew the United States had only a few minutes of peace left. With steel and gunpower, what he considered Japan's destiny.

ward the northerly coast lines of Oahu.

Low-level bombers bracketed the island, from the west across Waianae, from the east over Diamond Head; fighters bored inland, strafing airfields; dive and torpedo bombers aimed for Pearl from east and west.

The knell of doom had come.

The clock on Aloha Tower read 7:55.

A low-flying plane dumped a bomb on Ford Island in the middle of the harbor. The Pearl Harbor signal tower flashed the word—"Enemy air raid—this is no drill."

Bombers came in at 100 feet and lower, laying deadly eggs in the quiet water. Fighters raked the harbor at will. Explosions tore the Hawaiian Sunday. On the heights of leeward Oahu—Aiea, Pacific, Punchbowl and Tantalus—residents looked down at Pearl and could not believe what they saw.

The battleships tied up alongside Ford Island, singly and in pairs, were the hardest hit. There were the Arizona, Nevada, Tennessee, West Virginia, Maryland, Oklahoma and California.

These capital ships, bulwarks of the U. S. Pacific Battle Fleet, were left as useless as scrap in less than 30 minutes. The Pacific Ocean virtually became Japan's "lake."

The Arizona got it worst of all. With general quarters sounded only seconds, Arizona took a school of torpedoes. Her forward magazines exploded. Bombs dropped on deck. Flames shot hundreds of feet into the air. On

the signal bridge, Rear Adm. Isaac C. Kidd was killed.

Then, a "one-in-a-million" bomb went down an Arizona stack, as some half a dozen more eggs hit the deck. In a tortured convulsion of smoke, flame and bomb blast, her keel cracked, the Arizona sank on the spot; a tomb to this day for 1,102 souls.

It was all over in two hours.

Throughout the day, Pearl Harbor's waters were aflame with burning oil. Ships trailing sweeps tried to clear open spaces for swimming men who had jumped or were blown into the harbor by explosions.

Long after the sun went down behind the Waianae Range, the harbor was in torment. The wounded were laid out on the decks of any ships available.

Today, a generation later, mysterious puddles of oil are still found here and there in the harbor—from Black Sunday, they say. They also say, the oil will never leave.

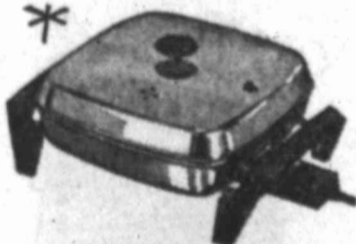

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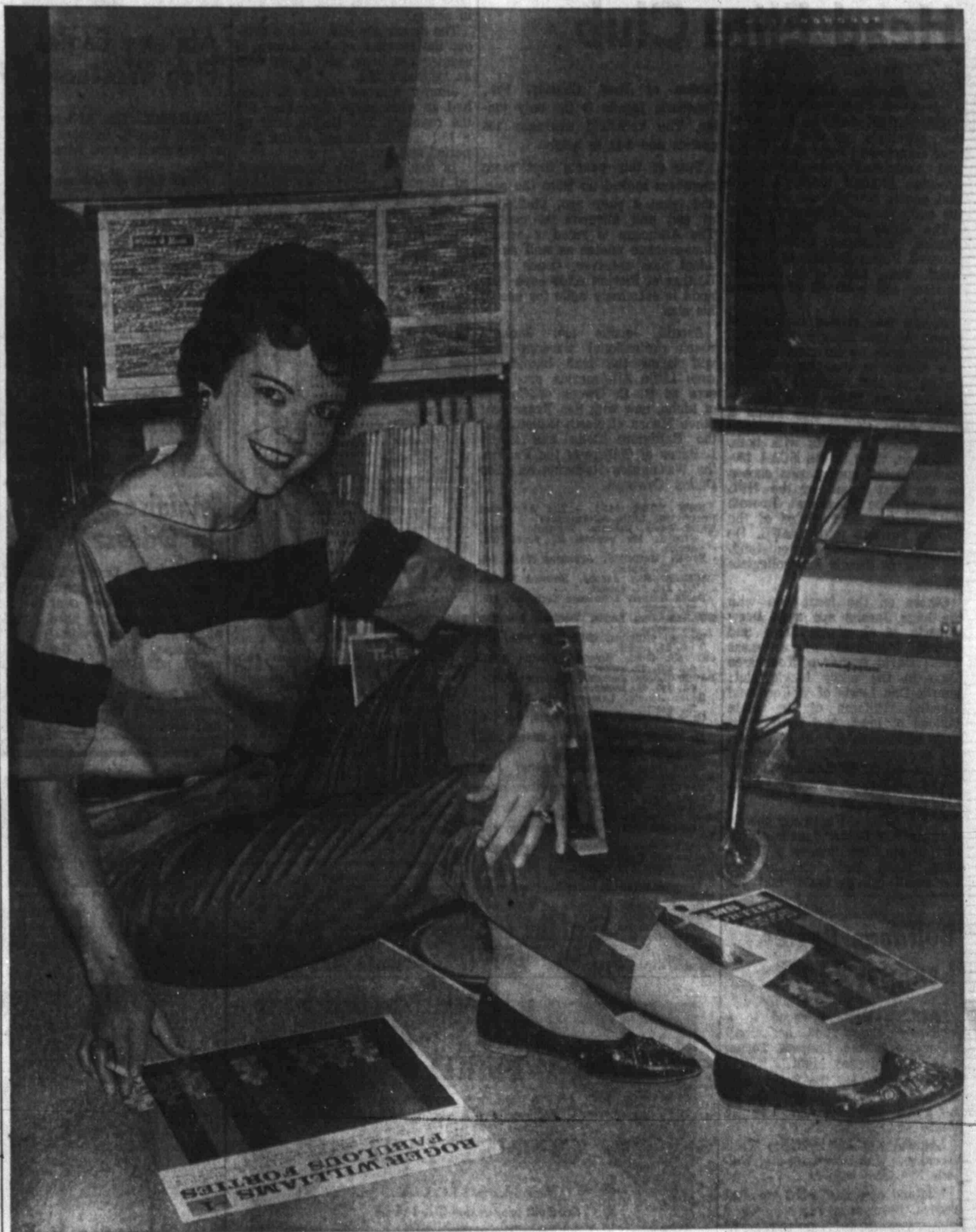
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Girls' Cage Tourney To Begin Thursday


Kirby Pugh, freshman from Abilene, tossed in 19 points for San Angelo.

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Kennedy's Trip Will Call Forth Safety Precautions

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy's journey to Latin America undoubtedly will call forth special precautions for his safety. His first stop on Dec. 16 will be Caracas, Venezuela. That was the site 2½ years ago of riots in which then Vice President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon were stoned and spat upon in one of the most hostile demonstrations ever made against an American official of such high stature.

This will be in the mind of the U.S. Secret Service, whose duty it is to protect the President. This fact is underscored by the stoning Monday night of cars bringing six U.S. senators into Caracas from the airport. Stones flew when the cavalcade stalled in traffic before a high school and students cut loose. There have been a number of student demonstrations over the past few weeks, following Venezuela's cutting off diplomatic ties with Fidel Castro's Cuba.

The visiting senators passed off the attack on them as something from a few trouble makers. U.S. Embassy officials said they were confident that Venezuela would tighten the protection for President Kennedy.

U.S. security officers were hesitant to say whether extra steps would be taken to safeguard Kennedy during his 24-hour stay in

the Venezuelan capital. An advance force of Secret Service agents will cover the ground there. Until they report back, officials here cannot determine just what precautions will be taken for the Kennedys.

When former President Dwight D. Eisenhower visited Latin America last spring, there were demonstrations in Buenos Aires and Montevideo, but nothing of the sort to which Nixon was subjected in Caracas.

In Buenos Aires on Feb. 26 of last year, Eisenhower encountered demonstrations by supporters for former dictator Juan Peron. Police used tear gas to quell them at one point and Eisenhower got a sniff of it.

Then in Montevideo on March 2, 1960, there was a demonstration by students in front of the University of Montevideo, a center of Communist activities.

Police brought out tear gas and fire hoses. Again Eisenhower got some of the gas and rubbed his eyes for a time, although he dismissed the demonstration as "a very small thing" in comparison with the enthusiasm of the bulk of the people who greeted him.

It is to Venezuelan authorities

that the Secret Service must look to the major share of the task of safeguarding the President and the First Lady on Dec. 16.

How To Tampa With The Tenants

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—The Tampa housing authority has tied the can to tenants who refuse to sign a non-Communist oath.

Authority director Thomas Dyer said his agency is requiring heads of family to sign an oath that they are not members of the Communist party. If they don't, said Dyer, out they go. Or if they are applicants for future housing, they don't get in.

Intelligence Report Shows Red Army Fast, Powerful

WASHINGTON (AP)—American intelligence experts believe that if the Soviet Union were to strike in Europe the Soviets would launch sudden, simultaneous nuclear attacks on all of the continent's Western defenses.

The intelligence men expect rapid, deep armored Soviet thrusts would come next.

Once the ground attack was in motion, the Soviets would send in units in waves in an effort to keep their advance moving day and night.

The Russians could be expected to try to maintain constant contact with Allied forces so Western commanders would have to hold their own atomic fire or risk the destruction of their forward troops.

Maj. Gen. A. R. Fitch, the Army's assistant chief of staff for intelligence, sketched current Soviet tactical doctrine earlier this week at a meeting of civilian aides to Secretary of the Army Elvis J. Stahr Jr. at Ft. Monroe, Va.

Fitch's talk was confined to an evaluation of Soviet military concepts. He did not comment on moves the United States might make in the event of a Soviet attack on the European allies.

He said Soviet tactical doctrine has been modified to incorporate nuclear weapons delivered by aircraft or missiles, but conventional artillery retains a prominent role.

The emphasis in Soviet tactical planning is on the use of armor, dispersion of forces and mobility, both to exploit Russian nuclear firepower and to minimize casualties from opposing atomic weapons.

The Army intelligence specialist said the number of Soviet line divisions is expected to remain at

around 150. In addition to airborne outfits, the Russians use tank and mobilized rifle divisions.

Each Soviet tank division has more than 300 tanks and the rifle divisions muster more than 200 tanks each.

The Russians have nuclear weapons for support of all major units, Fitch said.

To be able to cross rapidly the many rivers in Europe, the Soviets have developed what Fitch called excellent bridging equipment, a light amphibious tank and amphibious armored vehicles to carry men and supplies.

In planning for defense, the Soviets stress dispersion in depth, with the men deployed in such a way that not more than one battalion would be destroyed by a battlefield-type nuclear weapon.

Second Polaris Test Successful

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A Polaris missile raced several hundred miles Tuesday night in the second successful test of a new thrust control system.

The Navy, announcing the success, termed the control mechanism an "advanced device being evaluated for possible use in the third generation A-3 Polaris," scheduled to become operational in 1964, with a range of 2,875 miles.

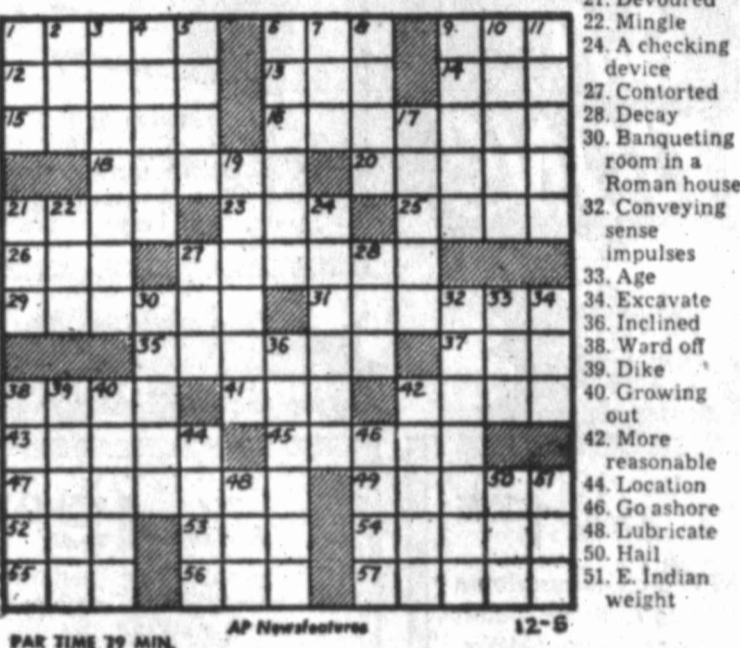

Mayor Claims Blackmail In Bracero Tiff

SLATON (AP)—A West Texas mayor accused the Labor Department of blackmail Tuesday in a dispute over a segregated swimming pool.

Local officials said the federal agency has promised to halt the hiring of Mexican farm labor in this area unless the municipal pool is integrated within 30 days.

Mayor L. C. Lemon and councilman Harry Stokes said they will fight the ruling "not because of the integration angle but because we resent a government bureau trying to ram something down our throats."

"This is nothing more than blackmail and I don't think the government should stoop to such a thing," the mayor said.

The pool is closed for the winter.

Mexican workers are hired by farmers in this area near Lubbock under an agreement between the United States and Mexico.

MEETING CALLED
The 31 farmers who would be affected by such a Labor Department ban were called to meet with the Slaton city council Tuesday night.

"We told the Department of Labor we would work something out, and I think we have. They're just trying to put the squeeze on the bracero program and get it closed down entirely," Stokes said.

A Mexican in August was denied admittance to the city swimming pool, which is operated by the Board of City Development with tax funds.

Then the Labor Department, under whose jurisdiction the bracero program falls, notified city officials they must admit Mexicans to the pool.

"We formed a committee of one councilman, one member of the BCD and three outsiders to look into the situation and come up with a solution," Lemon said.

"By that time the pool had been closed for the winter, and we told the Department of Labor we would let them know what we would do by March 1 when the pool was getting ready to reopen."

DO IT NOW!
After another exchange of communications with the Labor Department's regional office in Dallas, Lemon received a letter last week. It read, in part:

"This is to advise that unless the City of Slaton takes corrective action to remove the discriminatory restrictions in connection with the use and operation of the municipal pool within 30 days after receipt of this certified letter, action will be instituted to remove any Mexican nationals in the area and prohibit Mexican nationals being contracted into the area."

Copies of the letter went to Community Producers, Inc., of Lubbock; the Lorenzo Producers Association at Lorenzo and the 31 farmers in the Slaton area, who will be denied the use of Mexican nationals if Slaton is placed on the list of unacceptable communities because of discriminatory practices.

Stokes said several farmers who would be involved have been informed.

"We explained it to one of them, and he told us, 'Well, just tell them to go to hell.'"

Investors Plan Fallout Village
TULSA, Okla. (AP)—A group of private investors announced plans Tuesday for a \$2.5-million "fallout village" in Tulsa.

A spokesman said plans call for construction of a 1,000-foot-long shelter with 831 family units accommodating up to 4,400 persons.

Pretty Short War For Jap Veteran

TOYOTA, Japan (AP)—Kazuo Sakamaki laughs today about being the first Japanese prisoner captured by the Americans in World War II.

He was the skipper of a midget submarine assigned to sneak into Pearl Harbor on that Sunday morning two decades ago—Dec. 7, 1941—and torpedo the battleship Pennsylvania.

Sakamaki's attack turned into a fiasco that ended with him being washed up nearly drowned at the feet of a U.S. Army sergeant on a sandy seashore in Hawaii at dawn the next day.

Now the well-to-do chief of exports for Japan's largest automobile manufacturer, Toyota Motor Co. Ltd., Sakamaki looks back at his two-day war against the United States and says: "Pretty short war. The Pearl Harbor attack started World War II for me—and ended it."

FINALLY SAW IT

It wasn't until this year that he got a look at Pearl Harbor—aboard a cruise ship.

The Japanese government declared him dead rather than admit that an imperial navy officer had submitted to the disgrace of capture.

Sakamaki said he and his single crewman, Petty Officer Kiyoshi Inagaki, left Japan's Kure naval base on Oct. 16 aboard "mother sub" No. 24 bound for Pearl Harbor.

Their midget sub, 78 feet long and packing two 18-inch torpedoes, was strapped on No. 24's deck. They surfaced off the harbor the evening of Dec. 6. Four other two-

man subs already had arrived aboard other mother subs.

"We could see the stars twinkling. There were many lights visible for the shore," he said. "I listened to music from a Honolulu radio station."

All hands were issued sake for a farewell party. About midnight Sakamaki and Inagaki climbed into the midget sub and set off for Pearl Harbor, seven miles away.

TROUBLE FROM FIRST

The midget ran into trouble the moment it was launched. Its steering gear went out of order and the sub bucked through the sea "like a wild horse."

"Every time I started the engines the nose popped up to the surface," Sakamaki said. "So for three hours Inagaki and I carried heavy lead ballast from the stern to the bow. This exhausted us."

When the sub finally got on course Sakamaki put up the periscope and saw "two American patrol boats so close I could see the seamen running on the deck."

The Americans dropped depth charges "and the sub was twisted violently this way and that." Both

Will Eskimos Inherit The Earth?

WASHINGTON (AP)—Here's a switch from the old story about Americans trying to sell refrigerators to the Eskimos: Canadians are trying to sell igloos to Americans for fallout shelters.

They're not the old-fashioned, ice and snow igloo but are of a fibrous plastic material in an igloo shape and can accommodate eight persons. Canada's civil defense organization has approved them as underground shelters.

Japanese received minor wounds and the sub's torpedo launching mechanism was wrecked.

"But I made up my mind to enter the harbor and dash into a battleship and explode the torpedoes that way," Sakamaki said.

Then the sub hit a coral reef just outside the harbor and came to the surface. Sakamaki saw an American destroyer close by and U.S. guns on the shore.

TOO CLOSE

"An American officer told me later the destroyer was too close to shoot at me with its big guns," Sakamaki said. He quickly backed the sub into deeper water to wait until darkness for another attempt to enter the harbor.

"By this time the bad air and gas in the sub and the tension had almost killed us," Sakamaki said.

Repeated attempts to enter the harbor the night of Dec. 7 failed and Inagaki argued they should withdraw to take part in future attacks on San Francisco, Manila, Singapore and Sydney (Australia)."

Sakamaki agreed and headed the sub for Lanai Island, southeast of Pearl Harbor, where they were to be picked up by the mother sub.

WAY OFF

"At dawn on Dec. 8 we surfaced off what we thought was Lanai," Sakamaki said, "but it turned out we were near the northeast coast of Oahu Island—way off course."

"We hit another reef and were unable to float off so we set the sub on fire and jumped overboard. I was so exhausted I was unable to swim, so I just floated on my back. Inagaki tried to swim to shore and I learned later he drowned."

"I fell unconscious while floating and the next thing I remember I was being picked up on the beach by an American Army sergeant."

Senator Urges Peacetime GI Bill

AUSTIN (AP)—Support by Texans for a bill which would pay part of the college expenses of men who serve in the armed forces in peacetime has been asked by Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex.

In an address to the Austin Rotary Club, Yarborough said the cold war education bill would do more to further the general cause of education than "any other measure pending in the Senate."

Yarborough said a bill which he is sponsoring would make available education at the college level to five million "young Americans who have had their education interrupted by military service just as completely in this cold war as if they had served in a shooting war."

He said about 250,000 in Texas would benefit.

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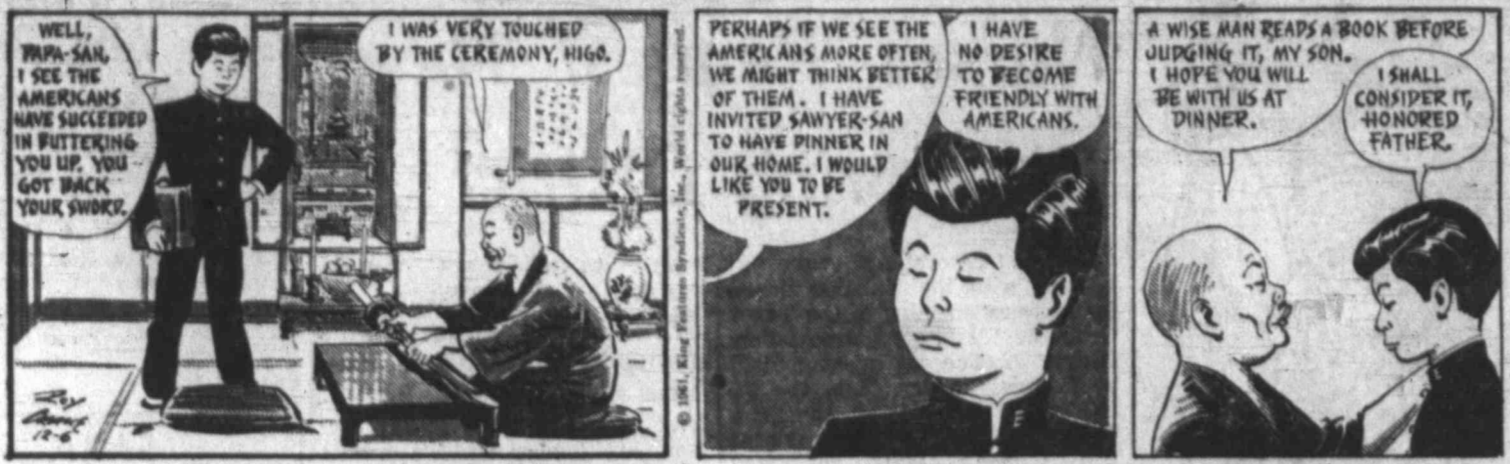
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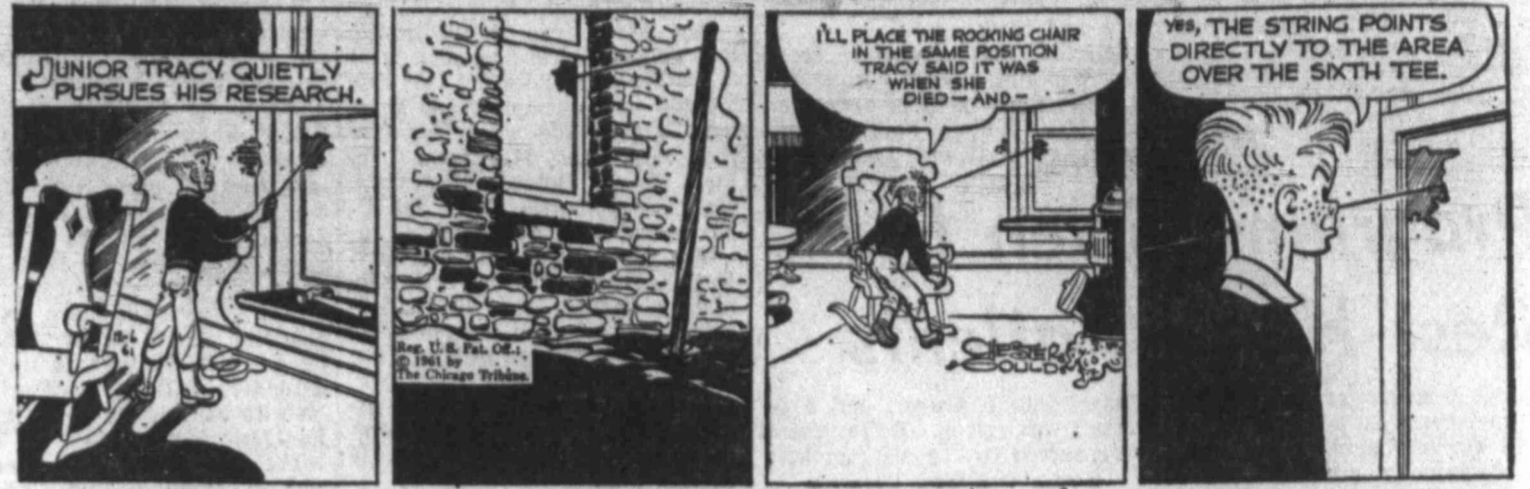

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Eidinoff Hears Medics Debate Issue Of Release

RUSK (AP) — Dr. Harold Eidinoff, committed to a hospital for the criminally insane, heard medical men debate whether it would be safe to free him Tuesday.

The El Paso physician, 52, has been confined since the fatal shooting Jan. 28, 1959, of lawyer Ed Andress, 50, in a crowded airport terminal at El Paso.

Eidinoff argues he now is sane and the state hospital here in East Texas should release him. The hearing continued today.

Dr. Charles Castner, superintendent

of the hospital, testified Eidinoff's condition has improved, but not enough for his return to society. Four other psychiatrists voiced similar opinions.

Called by lawyers for Eidinoff, Dr. William Skinner of Houston said at the sanity hearing: "Eidinoff is perfectly sane and I would not hesitate to refer a patient to him tomorrow."

A district court jury at Lubbock decided Nov. 5, 1959, that the El Paso physician was insane then and at the time he killed Andress. Because of the verdict, Eidinoff did not stand trial on a murder charge.

In committing him to the Rusk State Hospital, Dist. Judge Robert Bean said Eidinoff should be confined the rest of his life.

Stating Eidinoff still suffers from paranoia, Dr. James Kreimeyer and Dr. James Woodward testified at the current hearing that he would be dangerous to himself and others if freed. Both are members of the hospital staff.

Daring Engineer, 24 Friends Railroad Way To Freedom

BERLIN (AP)—A daring railroad engineer and 24 friends and relatives hijacked an East German train Tuesday night and roared at 50 miles an hour past startled border guards to safety in West Berlin.

"We knew we would make it," said Harry Deterling, 28, the engineer. He said food shortages and political pressure had made life unbearable in East Germany. Seven passengers not in on the plot—including the angry conductor—chose to return to the Communist sector. An East German switching locomotive pulled the steam locomotive and eight cars of the escape train, back over the little-used section of track to East Germany.

The well-planned escape—has-

tened by reports the Communists were planning to block the section of track Dec. 10—came off without a hitch.

Border police, taken by surprise, didn't fire a shot.

Deterling said he began planning the escape last Thursday with Hartmut Lichy, his fireman, members of his family and friends. The escapees included the engineer's mother, wife and four children.

Deterling arranged to make an "acquaintance run" on the Oranienburg-Albrechtshof line.

"Everybody was told to be at Oranienburg station for the departure of the regular late evening

train to Albrechtshof. We were 21 in all. That included an 8-day-old baby born only a day before we planned the escape."

The other four got on at Falkensee, the next to last stop. Albrechtshof, the last stop on the line, is about a quarter of a mile short of the border.

Deterling said a transport policeman aboard and the conductor went wild when they realized the train wasn't stopping at Albrechtshof.

"But what could they do but shout?" Deterling related smilingly. "We had disconnected the emergency braking system. They couldn't stop the train."

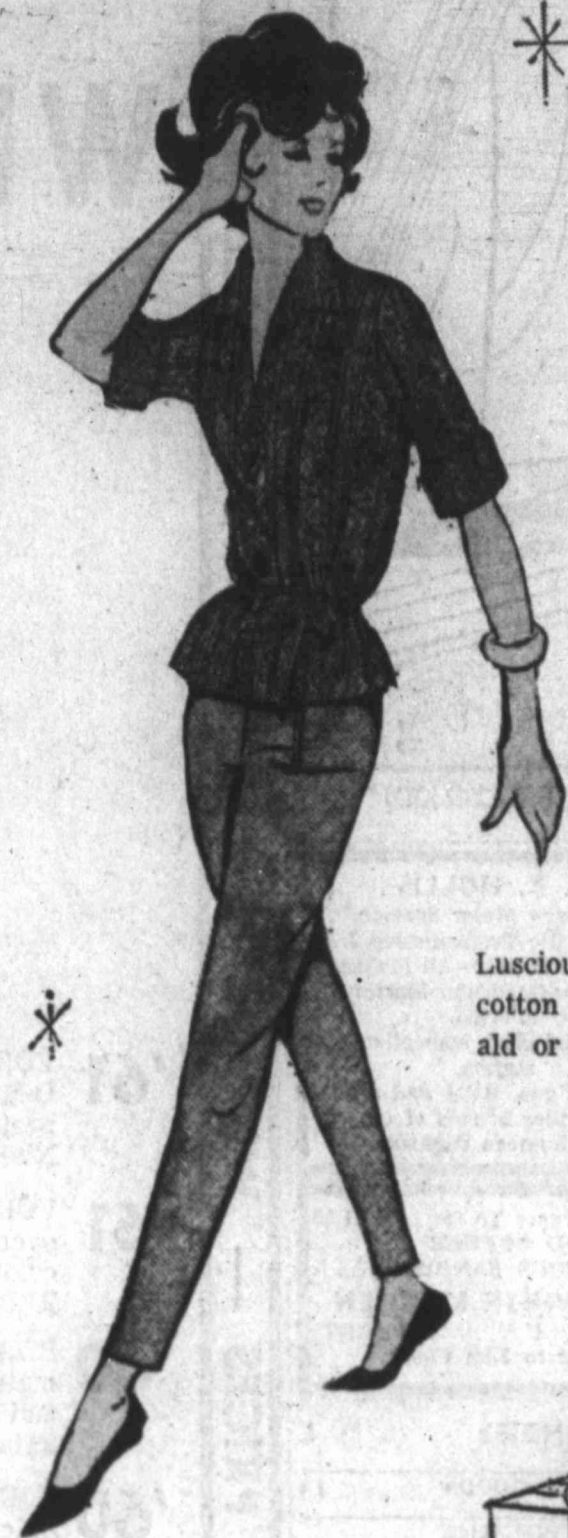

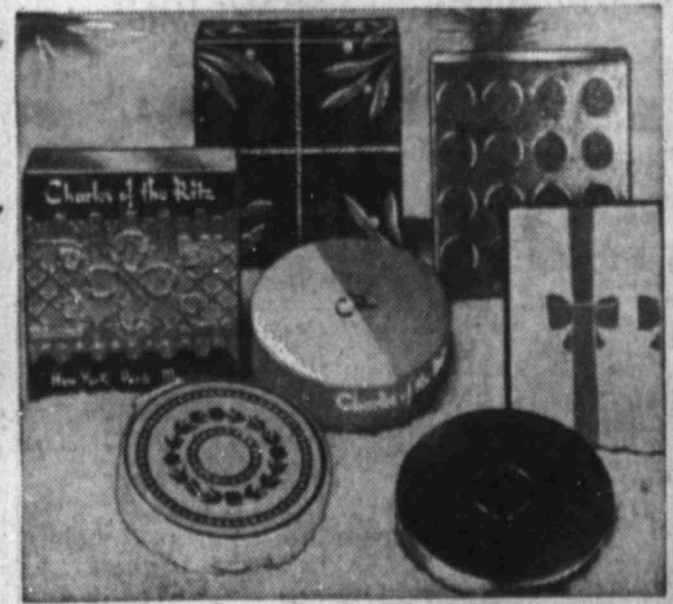
