THE PROCESS OF BANKING EXPLAINED

American, Bankers Association, in Its Thrift Campaign, Tells How Supply is Kept Up

It would seem that after the bank takes your money, protects it, pays it back on demand or as you order, lends you money, discounts your heighbor's note for you, it would have nothing else to offer in your behalf. But it has-it "makes" money for you, and incidentally makes money

When you see the president or the cashier of a bank signing his name to a row of four crisp new bills (they always come in sheets of four) you may wonder what he is doing, and what is behind it all. We will show you by a simple illustration. Let us suppose you want to borrow a thousand dollars and offer your note to your banker. He knows you, knows that you will pay, and wants to accommodate you. He looks at his owe my depositors in cash, or where I can get it on demand; and I have you credit for the note and let you check against it, I increase my debts and make my condition worse, for if I do not bay you in cash I must stand ready to do so."

minute while he goes to his strong box. He finds a government bond which he bought a year ago when he had plenty of spare money, for cash, and comes back smiling and says:

"Very well, in three days you can

sends the bond to Washington, and in NO APPLICATIONS return the Government sends him 200 crisp new five dollar bills, to be signed by two officers of the bank, cut and handed out to you.

The Government keeps the bond as security that he will redeem the notes in "lawful money" on demand-that is, pay greenbacks or gold for them if demanded (but this is seldom done,) pays him interest on the bond and you pay him interest on your note for the use of his notes, and both are satisfied.

You see, by this proposition he has turned your note into bank notes, with himself behind it and the Government behind him. Your promise wouldn't go very far from home, these promises will. Everybody knows them. They are "money" and circu-



There can be no confroversy about what we want to do, but the question to decide is how to do it. Whenever the personnel of the trial judges of this state is so elevated that the men who occupy them will be above employing their positions, for political preferment, yielding to the clamor of one faction or another in the community, or of doing anything else except to fearlessly administer justice, then and not till then will the well founded complaints which exist against the laws' delays cease.—Senator Hanger.

> Inefficient Marketing It is easily demonstrated that the cotton crop of the South under the present methods of marketing, suffers an annual loss of from \$10 to \$25 a bale. It is a maxim of statesmanship that the State abhors waste. Wherefore the States make provision by penal acts and otherwise to prevent the loss of property by fire and flood. If the State abhors waste and is warranted in legislation to prevent loss by fire and flood, it is all the move warranted in measures of legislation to prevent loss and waste of substance to the producers of the wealth of Texas and to those who furnish us with all we eat and wear.-Clarence

> Conservation of Natural Resources Texas is great in her agricultural, forest and mineral resources, and especially in those products which furnish food, raiment, shelter and fuel for the people. Our agricultural production can be easily increased to meet our growing demands, but the forests are fast disappearing, and it will require a generation to reproduce them; and our mineral fuel at the present rate of production and consumption will be exhausted almost within a few decades, and it cannot be reproduced. The problem therefore of conserving our mineral resources

is well upon us, and especially does this apply to petroleum, for it furnishes light, heat and power for the factory, the mine, the farm, the home, and transportation on land and sea, and it is an indispensable factor in the army and the navy. This question vitally affects the daily life of every citizen and every community and of government. All who have studied the question must realize that modern civilization is absolutely dependent for its very existence upon petroleum, or some unknown substitute yet to be discovered, and that its conservation and use for essential purposes under strict governmental supervision and control should be under taken before our bountiful stores are seriously impaired or exhausted .- J.


