In addition to Civil responsibility, Article 1151 of our Penal Code makes libel a criminal offense, punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$2000., or imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding two

Pupils Should Report Where Grades are Taught


In the assignment of teachers, which appears below, it will be observed that five sections in the grades South Ward: High second grade.

In the grades at Central Ward there are seven grades, each grade being



RENEWED INTEREST IN GOOD ROAD PROJECT

A special meeting was held at the court house yesterday afternoon to listen to an address by Judge Adrain Poole, of El Paso, and arouse interest in good road running along the Texas & Pacific railway between Ft. Worth and El Paso. Considerable interest was manifester in this meeting, all of the business houses closing du: ing the meeting. Judge Poole made a good talk which was listened to with close attention. He explained the benefits which would be derived by all of the towns on this road, and wha. they were losing by not having it. He explained the advantages which such a road would give to the Midland Fair and Inter-State Stock Show through a greater attendance.

Following Judge Poole's talk several short addresses were made by lo cal citizens, all of which showed that the sentiments of those in attendance were greatly in favor of the proposed

It was suggested that a called meet ng be held at Midland during the first two days of the fair, the railroad excursion rates in force for the fair would be of material advantage at that time to the delegates coming from El Paso and other distant points. Through the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce an invitation was extended to Judge Poole and others, who might be selected, to attend this meeting at Midland. Following this action, it was decided to hold this meeting in our city on the dates mentioned, and a general call will be made to all towns on the T & P. to select representatives to this

Midland people will follow with interest the work connected with the securing of this road, which would be probably more to the advantage of our town than any other place along the line. Besides bringing a great deal of tourist traffic through Midland, it would make our city muc. more accessible to stockmen, who might be in the market for our fine stock, especially would this be so in regard to the New Mexico and Arizona trade. The Reporter will be glad to make public all of the details in connection with this work as fast as they can be secured.

tain portions of comments were published.

For over two years your paper has maliciously libelled me. Beginning with your annonymous "Nelson McLane" article in the Spring of 1914 up to the close of the recent campaign you have bemeaned me in every way possible. Your "Abilene's Disclaimer" editorial of June 12th, 1914, was used by Congressman Smith as a campaign document, and was published in every newspaper from Mineral Wells to El Paso. I have patiently waited to this date, hoping that when you learned, which you must have done by this time, how absolutely foundless all of your malicious attacks were, you would make proper reparation of your own volition, but I have waited in vain. If you could calmly read the files of your paper which I have before me at this writing, you would be astonished at the number and the vileness of your-many unwarranted attacks.

Now there are two ways which a newspaper may use in making proper reparation, for libelling a citizen.

(1) Voluntary public retraction. (2) Involuntary redress, forced through decree of court. The time has now arrived when I owe it to my good name, my family, my friends, my constituency and my native State, for you to make proper retraction. It is immaterial to me through which method you act, and you may take your choice, for if you don't do it voluntarily, I am going to exhaust every means known to the law to force you to do it through a decree of court. I would much prefer, however, that you do it voluntarily, for I neither want nor need any of your money, if you have any, and I would regret being forced to sue you for damages in our Civil Court, and to appeal to our grand juries in the counties where your malicious articles have been circuilated, but I have determined that reparation shall be made through the courses above indicated, regardless of costs and results.

If you will publish in your next issue the inclosed retraction, I will let the whole matter drop, and it will be an ended chapter. If you don't I will proceed as my judgment dictates without further notice. I am giving you an opportunity to do the right thing like a man, and obviate all trouble, inconvenience and expense, and it is for you to decide what you will do, as this will be my last communication. Men who know me best know that I am a man of action, and net words, and I know what any honest court and jury will do, when I place before them the amount of testimony you have published against yourself.

Paying a Just Debt

On June 12, 1914 in our editorial columns we published an article entitled "Abilene's Disclaimer" in which after stating in substance that Judge Blanton's home people were against him, and wouldn't give him a clean bill of health, we stated: "We have it on equally good authority that of the 20 to 25 ministers of the gospel at Abilene and about Simmons College, every one of them, save his own pastor, is openly, avowedly and strongly against Judge Blanton. The single exception, his own pastor, is non-committal, and no expression from him indicates that he will support Blanton at the polls. Why is this? Does it appeal to you that these men of God think they know Judge Blanton, that they have made up their minds that he is unfit, unworthy? And we continued by saying that the physicians and business men had lined up in the same way, and deemed Judge Blanton unfit and unworthy, and that there was something rotten in Denmark, and by inuendo we insinuated that the middle initial of Judge Blanton's name, "L." stood for "Liar."

In the above article, as well as others published, we did Judge Blanton a great injustice. He darried Abilene by 86 votes, and carried Taylor County by 484 votes. He liked only 19 votes of carrying Midland County, and carried 23 counties including Borden, Fisher, Sterling, Coke, Reagan, Upton, Irion, and Schleicher. Then in January of this year he defeated Judge Wagstaff in a preferential primary in Taylor County, notwithstanding Judge Wagstaff's residence there for 30 years. In the recent campaign on July 22nd, Judge Unton received 1001 votes in Abilene, while Judge Smith received only 333 votes there, and in Taylor County Blanton received 2185, while Smith received only 691. And Blanton carried 36 counties, while Smith carried only 17, they tieing in Borden.

Again in our issue of July 14, 1916, on our editorial page, we published an article headed "Blanton Tac Tics," which except its heading came already prepared from Congressman Smith's Headquarters, indicating that Blanton had forged the names of five citizens in Stephens County to his endorsement, and we also stated that Blanton had published a fake endorsement from us.

In his campaign circular, under the heading: "FAVORABLE EXCERPTS FROM PRESS COMMENTS" Judge Blanton published an excerpt from one of our comments, and every word he published was in our comment, and our above statement did him an injustice. -Justice also demands that we state that Stephens County gave Blanton a substantial majority this time, while in all previous elections, it has been a Smith stronghold.

Now wouldn't I look chunky as the daddy of that? How'd I feel amongst my fellows with the self consciousness of bedraggled imbecility? Suffering martyrs, that Texas had laws that would permit a man to tell a-a-oh damn!-what he thinks of him!!!

This will not only give the pupils room, but it will reduce the number of sections by four, and hence save the work and the expense of two teachers. where it will be taught by Miss These grades, instead of other grades are transferred for two reasons: In the first place, in every instance except that of the low fourth grade, the number of pupils in these grades in both buildings is small enough to be combined without making the classes two large, thus reducing the num saving the work of at least two teach-

The transfers are not made to save the work and the cost of two teachers, but since they have to be made for the purposes of room, they are made on this principle. In the second place, the transfers can not be made from the high school or from the fifth, sixth and seventh grades, except in cases where consolidations can be made as in the case of the high sixth grade, without interfering with the departmental method of instruction, which method is used in these departments. In these departments, one teacher teaches the English, another the history, another the mathematics, and so on. These teachers are professionals in these different branches and are employed with that in view, that they shall teach these distinct branches and not straight grade work. Since the first and the second grades are composed of the smaller pupils, the transfers are made of pupils and grades be tween these grades and the grades namely the fifth. It is deplorable that any transferrs have to be made, but since they have to be made tothe principles which have guided the superintendent and the board in making them. The good people of Midland have realized this situation, and have been exceedingly loyal in their co-operation with the board and the superintendent in their efforts to relieve crowded conditions and thereby promote efficiency in the schools.

In the South Ward there are seven grades, the seventh grade being smal. enough for one section and the low third and the low second each being large enough for two sections, thus making fifteen sections in all, not 1 counting Miss Smith's room. Since there are only seven teachers in that building besides Miss Smith, who will teach the low fourth grade from the north side, it becomes necessary to consolidate one of those sections with a corresponding one on the north side. Hence, the high second, containing only four or five pupils, is transferred to the north side and will be combined with the high second grade on the north side.






