



They are hydrometer tests, ammeter tests and thermometer tests. The hydrometer test tells the motroist the condition of charge of battery. Strictly speaking, when he ast undertook to remove the gag from makes this test, the car owner gets not the state of charge, but the specific gravity of the electrolyte. This wever, is an exact index of the charge, for in a fully charged battery the electrolyte has a specific gravity of from 1.275 to 1.300. In the care of the storage battery frequent hydrometer tests are of paramount importance. For satisfactory service a battery ought to be kept in a fully charged condition, and unless the car owner has some way of finding out f the battery is in this condition, he naturally cannot take the proper steps to get the best from

If car owner hasn't been using his ights and starting battery carefully and the hydrometer reading shows that his battery is less than fully charged, the first thing he will naturally do is to see whether the generator is producing a satisfactory amount of current. To determine he makes the ammeter test.

Most automobiles today equipped with starting and lighing devices are provided with the ammeter, so
