MIDLAND WINS HIGHEST HONORS

Hector, a B. N. Aycock & Sons Exhibit, The Supreme Victor at Ft. Worth Last Week

The picture opposite herewith, as stated under it, is of Hector, the Grand Champion Hereford bull of the National Feeders and Breeders Show at Fort Worth last week, March 12th to 17th, inclusive. It is but another proof that we can produce as good cattle right here in the Midland Country as can be found in any State in the Union. It will be remembered that Hector was first brought into the limelight at our Midland fair last fall and was the junior sweepstakes winner and sold in our auction sale by Henry M. Halff to B. N. Aycock & Sons at \$3500. That B. N. Aycock knows a good one is evidenced by the fact that this was the outstanding bull of the greatest stock show ever held in Fort Worth.

It will be remembered by the older breeders that Mr. Aycock bred and exhibited a show herd at the Fort Worth show in 1905 that made a re-cord that never has been equaled by any other breeder in the State on a like number of animals. At this time Butte Hesiod was made junior sweepstakes winner over Sagamore, which was the first prize junior calf at the World's Fair at St. Louis in 1904, and bred by Gudgell & Simpson, Independence, Mo., who will take their place in Hereford history as the world's greatest constructive breeders. Last, but not least, Mr. Aycock brought home the grand champion ship won by his aged bull, Oakwood Hesiod 43rd, a 2400-pounder, Midland raised.






