HE IS ELECTED
MR. JONES ADMITS MR. BRYAN'S DEFEAT.

After Receiving a Message from Sen. McKinley...

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 6.—Chairman Bryan issued the following statement last night: "The result of the presidential election is apparently no longer in doubt. It has been one of the closest contests that the people have been called upon to determine in recent years. We have claimed the election on our advice from states that were admittedly in doubt, in which we knew there had been many frauds, and from which there were evidences of tampering with the returns. It seems now to be apparent that while Mr. Bryan has made the most brilliant campaign in the history of our country, and has carried most of the states claimed on our advice, he has not carried enough to assure his success in the electoral college.

Mr. Bryan received the news with quite as much composure as did his husband. McKinley's Message to Hans...

William McKinley Jr. Bryan electors have been chosen from all of the states south of the Potomac and Ohio except Missouri and all those west of the Missouri except California and Oregon. He has received enough to carry the electoral college. This, this remarkable campaign closes with the election of William McKinley.

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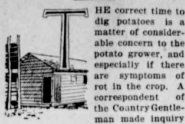

Barney Gibbs was warned by the Houston Post that he had stopped too soon. That immortal 108 can now call in the corner to inspect their scattered remains. Bryan advises the silver clubs to keep up their organizations and be ready for the next campaign. The mud slinger at Austin has not said a word about the "Austin Gang" in the News since the election. The Dallas News and other populist papers will now give the people a rest on the prize fight and the prize fight fee. All sorts of explanations are given for Watson's defeat, but the cold fact stands that we failed to control enough votes. In Texas, hereafter, the fight will be between the democratic party and the republican party. The third party is a thing of the past. THE STAR warned the populist long ago that they would get run over if they ever succeeded in stirring up Texas democracy. Capt. Tucker's majority for the legislature is about 650 a gain of 550 voters. The Democratic party appears to be dying out—over the left. Editor Bryant has hit the ceiling again in an effort to get into the State Senate. Regularly every two years the Democrats have to lay Bro. Sam out, though the kinder hate to do it, but it can't be helped.

No better days work was ever put in by any people did when they buried Creion David, candidate for congress, in the 4th district, and Bill Farmer in the 6th district. If McKinley is the best for the country the Bryan supporters will get so much benefit from it as any one else. So lets make the best of what we will believe to be a bad bargain. Bryan carried a majority of the states and received more electoral votes than Cleveland in 1888 or Harrison in 1892. The republicans claim one million popular majority for McKinley which is probably an exaggeration, but nevertheless he has a large majority which is sufficient for all practical purposes.

If gold monometalism is right the people will keep it; if it is wrong they will abolish it. The people have spoken and for the present have declared against free coinage of silver, and for one we have no kick to make against the majority having just what they want. The greenbacks, gold and silver certificates will probably be retained and national bank notes substituted for them. Silver coinage except minor coins will cease. This is the logical result to follow McKinley's election. Let them have full sway and oppose nothing they do. No matter how bad they may mess up affairs the republicans cannot be worse than Clevelandism. The Courier-Journal says the democratic party will be reorganized on the idea of Palmerism. That! The democratic party is already organized and it will fight Palmerism just as hard as republicanism or any other man. VENEZUELA DISPUTE

BOUNDARY QUESTION SETTLED AT LAST.

It is to be decided by an international arbitration tribunal.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The king of Sweden and Norway, Oscar II., has been chosen by treaty between the United States and Venezuela as the fifth of the arbitrators of the Venezuelan boundary question. The other arbitrators, four in number, are to be designated two by the chief justice of England and two by the chief justice of the United States. This is the final and most important feature of the treaty for the complete adjustment of the pending Venezuelan controversy. The treaty was concluded in Washington Monday night, at the British embassy. Sir Julian Pauncefote represented the British mission and Secretary Olney the United States.

Since the return of Sir Julian Pauncefote from London three weeks ago, negotiations toward a final settlement have been proceeding. Most of the points were of such an important character that it happened that Mr. Olney's residence or at the British embassy, the two houses being but two blocks apart. It happened that the concluding meeting was at the embassy Monday and special interest was given to it from the fact that it was the first premier, was to make a speech at Guild Hall, London, in the evening. 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SHIPWRECK ABANDONED.

NEW YORK, NOV. 10.—A special from Panama, Colombia, says:

Six officers and thirty members of the crew of the steamer Littlepage, of Glasgow, Capt. David Petrie, arrived at Panama yesterday morning. The Littlepage was abandoned at sea in October.

The ill-fated steamer left San Francisco July 27 for Leith, with a cargo of 400 tons of barley. On August 11 the steamer was wrecked, leaving 841 miles from any land. On August 13 a boat was sent out with the chief officer and three crew members. The boat made Arapahoe, but no assistance was seen.

A second boat containing the third officer and four men was dispatched for aid on Sept. 21. They were ordered to attempt to make Santa Cruz, from which point at that time the ship was about 220 miles distant. Of that party nothing has since been heard. The Littlepage crew made a makeshift and made temporary repairs to the shaft, and the ship proceeded. After running twenty-five hours the shaft broke again. As the vessel was taking considerable water and provisions had run out, the captain decided to attempt to make Santa Cruz on Oct. 12. On Oct. 15 the ship's company landed on the coast of Guatemala, where they were aided by the British consul.
