

NHS ceremonies held Wednesday

96 to graduate from HHS, DHS

17 Nazareth High School graduates received their diplomas Wednesday night as graduation season started for the three county high schools' classes of 1985.

32 Hart High School seniors will graduate Friday night, with 64 seniors to graduate Monday night in ceremonies at Dimmitt High School.

Last night at NHS, seniors marched into the school cafeteria to the processional performed by Shirley Pegram. The invocation was delivered by Father Harold Waldow, followed by the

salutatory address by Dwight Acker.

Following a song performed by Greg and Glenda Birkenfeld, Russell Hoelting delivered the valedictory address before the Birkenfeld's performed the class song, "We've Only Just Begun."

Nazareth's first foreign exchange student, Yocasta Reina of Honduras, was the special commencement speaker, and was followed by the presentation of special awards by Supt. Johnny Mason.

Diplomas were then awarded by Nazareth School Board

Education president Alan Dobmeier. Mrs. Pegram then performed the recessional.

At Hart Friday night at 8 p.m., Brenda Campbell will perform the processional, followed by the invocation by Rusty Ammons. Noemi Ponce will give the salutatory address.

Cristi Rowland and Harvey Perez will then present the class history, preceding special music by Vivian Bennett and awards presented by HHS principal William Ammons.

Rowland will then deliver the valedictory address, followed

by the presentation of the class by William Ammons and presentation of diplomas by Supt. Ted Averitt and school board president Harold Bob Bennett.

The Alma Mater will be sung by the senior class, and will be followed by the benediction delivered by Darrell Ethridge and the recessional performed by Campbell.

Marshals will be Antonia Garza and Arnulfo Carrasco, with ushers to include Stephanie Lee, Thelma Longoria, Mary Kaye Mapp, Manuel Ramirez, Arturo Guz-

man and Pete Barretero.

Hart school officials indicate the front door of the Hart School Auditorium will be locked at 8 p.m. until the exercises are completed. Late arrivals may use the west door if weather permits, or the south door of the gym.

All available seats on the floor will be filled before anyone is seated in the stands. The stands will be filled from the middle section first, filling to the west.

Seniors will be seated on the stage, with each class member receiving two passes for family members to be seated in the front row area.

At DHS next Monday, the processional will be performed by Deanne Clark and Dwight Joiner. The Invocation will be delivered by Joyce Schilling, followed by the salutatory address by Mary Flores.

The Class Song, "Out Here On My Own," will be performed by Kyla Boozer and Carla

Frye before the valedictory address by Greg Sava. Frye will then introduce the speaker, Bill Caraway, of Texas Tech University.

Supt. Robert Ryan will then present the class, and diplomas will be presented by school board president Fred Bruegel.

The benediction will be delivered by Kim Howell, and the recessional played by Clark and Joiner.

Seniors will be seated on the east and west sides of the auditorium. Seniors will have tickets for family members to assure seating. Limited seating will be available.

School officials ask the audience to refrain from applauding and/or shouting until all graduates have received their diplomas.

Head ushers will be Marlene Nino and Blake Brown, and will be joined by ushers Yvette Barrera, Ben Benton, Noe Castro, Woody Glass, Karen Nelson and Stephanie Ryan.

19 Lifeline Systems home units on tap

Plains Memorial Hospital has 19 Lifeline Systems home units available to subscribers. Installation of available units began Wednesday.

Currently nine persons have subscribed to the system which will provide medical assistance to subscribers within 40

seconds. A personal help button will be given to subscribers that will set off the home unit and send a message to the base unit located at the hospital.

A nurse at the hospital then will call the subscriber to find out what is needed. If the person cannot be reached, a

responder will be contacted.

The responder will push the reset button to let the hospital know that help has arrived. Hospital personnel then may call the responder at the subscriber's home to find out what is needed or if an ambulance should be called.

Responders are pre-selected by the subscriber. Each responder should live nearby and should have access to the home.

According to Hamid Salmasi, Lifeline Systems field service engineer, the system does not have a cancel button. This is to prevent the subscriber from cancelling and trying again.

"Forty seconds seems like a long time to the person that needs help and they may wonder what is taking so long or think the unit did not send the message and try again to send it," he explained.

Home units will be connected to the electrical outlets and phones. The system will work even if the phone is off the hook.

In the event that the electricity goes off the system will continue to operate on batteries for 24 hours before the batteries must be changed.

The system will cost subscribers \$16 per month. Persons interested in subscribing may contact Beral Hance, Box 1036, Dimmitt, 79027, or at 657-5444. For information after 6 p.m., persons may call 647-4488.

Annexation hearings set

City tackling drainage

City workers have already begun to take steps to improve the poor drainage situation in northwest Dimmitt after the Board of Aldermen approved a plan of action at its Monday night meeting.

The board instructed City Manager Paul Catoe and Director of Public Works James Killough to ask residents living along Andrews, Dulin and Allen Streets between NW Tenth and NW Eleventh where they would prefer to have garbage dumpsters moved, and to grade the alley between NW Tenth and NW Eleventh from Andrews to Halsell to facilitate water flowing west along the streets to avoid flooding problems in the alley and along NW Eleventh.

The city, with approval from the Castro County Country Club, also plans to remove one set of culverts at a water crossing at the CCC golf course. City officials feel removing the culverts will improve the flow of water from the northwest part of the city to the playa lake in the southwest corner of the course.

City aldermen voiced opposition to proposals that would include paving the alley between NW Tenth and NW Eleventh, citing high costs and possible opposition by homeowners to building waterways between at least four homes on NW Eleventh to alleviate flooding

problems in low-lying areas on the street.

The city plans, instead, to work with city engineer Bill McMorris of Amarillo and slope the alley and install a ditch to divert the water toward the natural drainage of the CCC playalake.

Alderman David Hays also asked Catoe to "negotiate, do

some PR work or whatever" with the county to help provide maintenance on NE Eighth, on the city's eastern side, to avoid further drainage problems along the street and the county road that runs toward the city sewage treatment facility and landfill site.

City officials said several property owners just outside the city limits on the county road have installed culverts that have caused water to back

County still high on nation's ag list

Castro County is the third-highest agriculture-producing county in Texas and 32nd in the nation according to 1982 farm census ratings released this week.

The 1982 Census of Agriculture was issued last April, but the ratings were not computed until this week.

The top county in the state — and number 12 in the nation — was Deaf Smith County, with \$562.7 million in farm sales in 1982. Parmer County was next in Texas, and 25th in the nation, with \$306.5 million.

Castro County had \$234.1 million in farm sales according to the 1982 farm census.

According to the 1984 figures, the number of farms in the county dropped to 483 from the 556 reported in the last census in 1978, but the average farm size jumped to 1,136 acres from 1,042 acres in 1978.

The large land size is attributable to the decline in small farms, but there were seven more farms in the county with over 2,000 acres in the 1982 census.

The number of irrigated acres dropped accordingly with the decrease in the number of farms, from 308,354 in 1978 to 237,238 in 1982.

The \$234 million in farm sales is off from the \$257 million in 1978, but the average farm sales for each farm was up from \$463,877 in 1978 to \$484,546 in 1982.

Total crop sales were down slightly, to \$64.7 million from 1978's \$66.9 million. Grain sales were up \$7 million to \$48.2 million, but cotton sales dropped from \$12 million in 1978 to \$5.5 million in 1982.

The biggest drop came in livestock sales, from \$191 million in 1978 to \$159 million in 1982. The biggest part of the drop came in cattle sales, off \$25 million dollars to \$159 million. The number of cattle

up instead of flow through ditches toward several lakes in the area.

The board agreed Monday to accept three petitions for annexation of 33.8 acres located along US 385 south of the city.

The land has been divided into three tracts, including two 10-acre divisions that will be used for new construction by the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation and Bob Towler Equipment Co.

The Castro County Economic Development Commission signed an option Tuesday on the remaining 13.8 acres.

Jerry Hanners, director of the EDC, presented aldermen with petitions for annexation of the tracts from Towler and the EDC, but said the SDHPT has not yet signed a similar petition.

"The Highway Dept. neither seeks nor opposes annexation at this time," Hanners said. "They are currently neutral in the matter. They would like ample opportunity for their staff attorneys to look over the petition before they do anything."

However, the aldermen were presented with a letter on March 18 from the District Five Engineer William D. Pope asking for annexation of the SDHPT land which includes a legal description of the land, and City Attorney Jack Edwards said the letter may be legally considered as a petition for annexation of the land.

The letter calls for the city to provide water and sewer services, which is contrary to a tentative deal worked out between the city, Towler and

SDHPT calling for Towler and SDHPT to share costs on providing water service and providing their own septic tanks in lieu of costly installation of sewer services.

"The city does not have to provide any service at all to the annexed land," Edwards said. "If the city provides no services, then, after five years, SDHPT may petition for deannexation if they choose. The city doesn't have to provide any service if it's not economically feasible to do so."

The petitions are set for hearing on June 17.

The aldermen also chose to table bids on a new bulldozer or compactor for use at the city's landfill, and awarded the contract for the audit of the city's books for the 1984-85 fiscal year to Crofford and Company of Amarillo for an estimated cost of \$5,750.

Aldermen also honored C. C. Lopez, landfill operator, as City Employee of the Month and inspected the fire department's new emergency wagon while agreeing to take bids for a new Suburban for the department.
