THE PASSING DAY

By Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, University . of Texas

The studious observer at a large political gathering is certain to reach the conclusion that most men are easily worked into a high pitch of excitement that subsides almost as rapidly as it is created. When under the influence of excitement they often do and say things of which they would be ashamed in their cooler moments. As a whole people appear to be swayed more by denunciation than by praise, and that which is almost tantamount to a mob spirit can be created by fiery invective. Orators are aware of the power of this appeal to the primordial instincts and in close contests nearly always resort to it. In the most recent campaign in Texas, culminating in the Austin convention, the hate appeal has been used by both sides for all that it has been

Speakers and audience alike have not hesitated to give vent to their felings, in unmistakable terms and often in language anything but polite. The very vehemence of their expressions, though, appear to have cleared the atmosphere somewhat, and to have paved a way that may lead to better understandings, just as pent-up anger when once turned loose, often results in creating friendships between hitherto antagonistic parties. That is certainly the hope of many who are keenly alive to the best interests of Texas, but who have not been violently partisan. There is great need in Texas for the people to work unitedly for the advancement of State and community interests, and this can not be accomplished where ill feeling predominates. Division means death to progress in localities where every ounce of energy is needed.

The pity is that it is so difficult to bers to interest themselves in other than political movements. Even the church is made secondary to politics with nearly every one when work is to be done. COCKLEBURS SHOULD BE CUT NOW

County roads in many parts of the county are growing up in cockleburs. This menace should be guarded against at once before the fields of neighboring farmers are taken in by the fast spreading burs.

It wil soon be time for the burs to ripen and drop off. If they are not cut before that time, they will be hard to stop, whereas if they are cut while green, and burned soon after, they can be warded off.

A few years ago, one of the Halff farms had quite a big acreage of cockleburs. Mr. Halff had them cut at the right time, and they are about all gone at present, completely reclaiming some valuable land for more profitable purposes.

There are some sections of the country that have allowed these burs to spread to such an extent that crops are badly impaired: Johnson grass fades into oblivion when compared to the worthlessness of cockleburs.

#### Last Call To **Midland Farmers**

Midland must have three fair exhibits to tell all Texas about the Midland Country. One of these will go to Abilene and Dallas, one to Colorado, and the other to El Paso, Austin, Waco and Beaumont. Three separate exhibits are required.

The exhibit to be shown by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at El Paso and other cities must be sent from Midland Monday, September 15. The others must be prepared not later than September 19 and September 23. This is the last call for people who want to see their county progress to bring in what agricultural products they have to the Chamber of Commerce.

Here is what is required: 600 heads of maize, kafir, feterita, cane. Five bundles of forage crops; 15 big coton stalks; 100 bolls of open cotton; 3 watermelons; 5 cantaloupes; a peck of sweet potatoes; peck of turnips; 20 carrots, 20 radishes, peck of onions; 20 pods of okra, 8 pods of bell peppers; 12 tomatoes; 6 egg plants; 5 heads of cabbage; gallon of string beans; gallon of dry beans; 3 kershows; ' winter squashes; 3 gourds; 3 pumpkins; 3 watermelons; 5 cantaloupes; 4 quart jars of all kinds of fruits; a gallon of oats; 2 gallons 'of peas and a peavine; a bundle of Bermuda grass; three pounds of popcorn; a bundle of Sudan grass; 3 pounds of honey; dozen hen eggs, pound of butter; 3-pound strip of bacon; half gallon of lard.




