PRESENT PETITIONS FOR GLASSCOCK CO. ROAD
FOUR ROUTES OFFERED TO COMMISSIONERS COURT MONDAY.

Citizens from the east part of the county presented petitions to the Midland County Commissioners Court Monday to have a lane built through that section and into Glasscock County.

One route was presented by K. S. Boone, C. A. McClintic and William Skeen; another by M. H. Fisher; one by Willis Woody; and still another by B. T. Hale.

The routes are all in the same part of the country but would serve the individuals in different neighborhoods a little better as presented by each petitioner. Several names of other citizens were signed to each petition.

A committee was appointed by the County Judge to go down there and look over the different routes, after which some action will probably soon be taken.

The lane and graded road when built will offer a much more feasible way to reach the farms and ranches down there, and will also serve as a drawing card for trade from people in Glasscock County.

Supreme Court Affirms Ross and Good Cases

According to press reports, the Supreme Court affirmed the sentences of Tom Ross and Milt Good at Abilene, at the hearing in Austin last Wednesday.

The sentences were twenty five years for Ross and twenty five years for Good, in connection with the killing of H. L. Robertson and W. D. Allison, cattle inspectors for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, in a hotel at Seminole April 1, 1923.

This case has been of great interest to the people in Midland and the surrounding country, both because of the fact that all four of the parties were well known here and because the case was said to have grown out of trouble over the theft of cattle.

MIDLAND BOY DIRECTS TFX. UNIVERSITY BAND

GRADUATE OF HIGH SCHOOL DIRECTS FRESHMAN BAND OF 64 PIECES.

It is a matter of pride and congratulation both to himself, his family, his high school and his many friends here, that H. B. Dunagan, who was graduated from the high school with honors here last spring, has been elected director of the University of Texas Freshman Band. The Freshman band is composed of 64 pieces and it is no small honor which our young townsman has attained. We understand that this is the only Freshman band in the United States. J. Wiley Taylor, Carleton College, Iowa, is the only member of the band, all from Midland. These boys will be in Dallas Saturday with the main University band and the rooters for the Longhorns who are scheduled to play S. M. U. at the Fair grounds on that day. The two bands will give a parade in Dallas about ten o'clock Saturday morning. A number of Midland people are going down and will see the boys. At the regular rehearsal of the Freshman band, H. B. Dunagan of Midland was elected director of the band for one year. Dunagan resigned his position with the advisory board to fulfill his duties as director, and A. Navratil was elected to succeed him. The band decided to establish Monday and Thursday nights as the regular rehearsal nights.

Any freshman wishing to join the band is urged to be present next Monday night at 7 o'clock.

The band has secured uniforms and made their first appearance at the Howard Payne game yesterday in the new attire. This was the first time that two uniformed bands have appeared on the football field together.

Further cause for congratulation is the fact that young Dunagan had keen competition when it came to selecting a director for the freshman band, a former director of the Oak Cliff high school band and a boy who had been director of the Brenham band being aspirants for the honor. We extend hearty congratulations. Midland is proud of her boys, as well as her girls. They are making good the world over.

SECOND FLOOR WILL BE CONVERTED INTO AUDITORIUM, OFFICES AND ROOMS.

Mexico To Deport Many Saloon Men

Jimmy O'Brien and Joe Mogul, partners in a Juarez saloon where gambling has been conducted, Tuesday were among a number of Americans ordered deported as a result of the gambling probe of R. C. Lecanda in Juarez one week ago, according to instructions received by B. A. Ruiz, acting chief of immigration.

The instructions to Mr. Ruiz were contained in a telegraphic message

from the secretary of the interior.

Frank Del Vecchio and Charles Cruz, proprietors of another saloon, were also among the number, Mr. Ruiz said.

A Spaniard who, it is reported, has been active in gambling in Juarez, also was included. In each case three days' grace was allowed the men, the instructions said.

O'Brien and Mogul are proprietors of both of the "Jimmy O'Brien" saloons in Juarez and conducted a lottery up to within a short time ago. The lottery was closed down at the same time Mr. Lecanda forced Jorge Martinez to close his casino where gambling was conducted, through closing the bridge at an early hour and not permitting traffic to El Paso.

Mogul termed the deportation as "unreasonable" in a statement to The Herald reporter Tuesday.—El Paso Herald.

University Laboratory Established at Big Lake

Austin, Texas, Oct. 17.—Temporary laboratories for the investigation of the oil field on University of Texas lands have been established at Big Lake by Dr. E. H. Sellards and Dr. L. T. Patton, geologists of the Bureau of Economic Geology. The purpose of the laboratory will be to collect and examine samples of Texas oil. It also proposes to work out the structural conditions in order to determine why oil has collected in Reagan county and to see what sort of structures the oil is coming from. After this work has been done, it is stated that the limits of the field and the amount of the oil there can be determined.

THE PASSING DAY

By Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, University of Texas

The people of the United States have been vying with each other in the effort to show the Prince of Wales that we are pleased to have him visit this country, as indeed we are. The Prince is a nice sort of a visitor and a democratic kind of a fellow in spite of his inherited title. He knows how to make himself agreeable in a truly American fashion and seems to be without that affectation that we have learned to expect in Englishmen generally. That being true, he must at times have a feeling of disgust at the propensity of the average American to bow down and worship royalty. Doubtless he would much prefer to be accepted for what he is rather than for his title, but Americans will not have it so.

In spite of our democratic ideals, we are not far enough removed from monarchical government to keep from toadying to royalty and seem to delight in paying homage to those highest in authority. This is shown so often in the character of our entertainments. The most popular spectacular shows we have are our pageants depicting the crowning of a king and queen, with great royal processions of dukes and duchesses, ladies in waiting and attendants. In spite of the almost ludicrous mimicry of such affairs people turn out in great numbers to witness these processions of imitators of royalty, and the royal performers pay immense sums to bedeck themselves in what they regard as royal apparel. The spectacle would be amusing if it were not so pitiful.

We are too much disposed to truckle to those in authority. Every citizen is under obligations to support, and should delight in supporting, those to whom the affairs of government are entrusted, but this does not carry with it even a suggestion that those in service are a whit better personally than other citizens. It is interesting to watch the almost servile attention we give to a president or even a governor and then see how quickly and how far he can drop from public sight as soon as his term of office expires, and that in spite of the fact that his service has in most cases made him a really greater man. A governor is a great man so long as he is governor; an ex-governor is merely a man who is down and out so far as the people are concerned.

A man is handicapped by what he has been unless he is constantly striving to go forward to greater things. He can't live on past achievements and hold that position in public esteem which those achievements won for him. The more he accomplished the more the public expects and has a right to expect. The things done in the past indicate his capacity for greater undertakings, and unless he is willing to make the effort to carry

on he soon finds himself losing his own grip as well as the confidence of his friends. On their part there comes a feeling that perhaps he has been overestimated. There is no stopping-place in life at which one can hold all that he has gained in the way of public favor.

Perhaps public favor should not be regarded as a test of one's worth to his fellow-men, yet it is about the only test by which he may be gauged. Certainly few persons may be accepted on their own evaluation, for that is either too high or too low. The public is the safest criterion of human values, even though it is too much disposed to give hero-worship to those temporarily in the lime-light and to forget those who are not constantly endeavoring to lift themselves by their own boot-straps.

Certainly if you are not in good favor in the community in which you live—and you can learn your own standing if you really want to know it—it behooves you to examine yourself to see just where the trouble lies and then to correct it. Every one owes it to himself and those about him to do his best to hold the favor of others. He is justified in having a pride in his community standing, but should take care not to develop a spirit of arrogance—a holier than thou, or better than thou attitude.

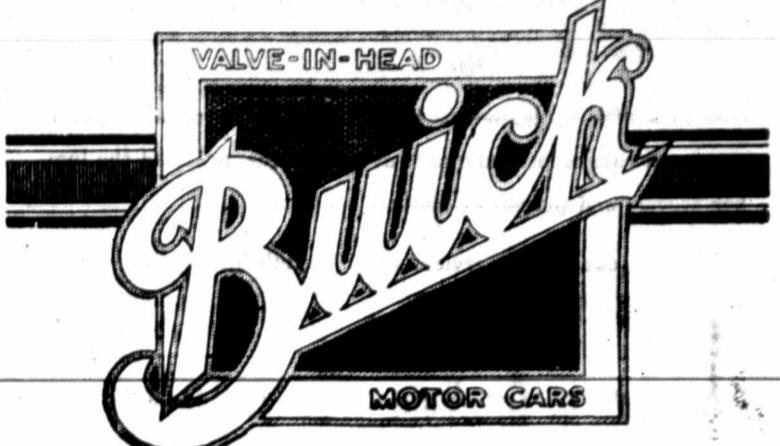

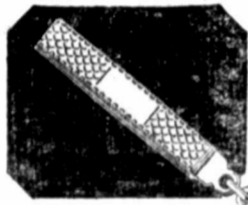
