Midland Receives More Attention

Here's how the rest of the world s talking about Midland: Even the editorial writers are taking up Middlan, and helping boost. There may be a few people left in Midland wh are not for their own home town, but there's not many here, nor many anywhere else.

The editorial writer on the Abilene Reporter, recognized as one of the most studious and keenest editorial writers in West Texas, read a Midland story in a daily newspaper and wrote the following editorial:

West Texas and Cotton.

Texas, premier producer of cotton, s headed for a crop of five million bales. Already the ginnings are over 4,131,000 bales, which is probably a record for this time of year. and the government estimate on final ginning figures is 4,650,000.

Credit West Texas with the big showing made this year. And West Texas is not yet done with its harvesting. The Panhandle-Plains region is in the midst of its greatest cotton picking season. This year. many counties have produced cotton for the first time-and some of them have produced big.


Cotton has come to stay as a factor, in West Texas farm production. The cowboy has abandoned the saddle for the sack. You read the other day where a bunch of cowboys out near Midland cultivated cotton on six acres of land, and gathered six bales of cotton from the patch. Some of the cowboys, we are told, rode the cultivators with their spurs on-prob-

Gives Up Gas ably feeling the need of them in their first expreience with one of the tricky contraptions. However, so far as we have been able to learn, none of the cowboys was "throwed" by a cultivator. But likely some of them had to "claw iron."

Now six bales of cotton is worth around a thousand dollars in good United States currency. That's more than a dozen average steers would bring. And the cotton was raised on six acres, whereas a dozen steers would need a hundred acres or so. economize on land. Land has been so plentiful and cheap heretofore that a section or two made little difference. But when it sells for \$50 or \$60 an acre, and produces a crop worth from SAYS JOIN C. 




