Bank Deposits Set New High

Registering an increase of almost \$5,000,000 over the same date a year ago, combined deposits of the two Midland banks skyrocketed to a record high of \$27,442,162.03 at the close of business December 31, they reported Friday in response to a national bank call by the comptroller of the currency.

Deposits December 31, 1946, totaled \$22,570,177.80; \$4,871,984.23 less than the 1947 year-end figure.

Greeks Describe Guerrilla Rout As 'Crushing Defeat'

ATHENS (AP)—Greek War Minister George Stratos said Friday guerrilla forces were fleeing into the Grammos Mountains after a "crushing defeat" inflicted in the battle of Konitsa, where a week-long siege of the government garrison was lifted Thursday.

A general staff communique reviewing the seven-day battle said: "This is the first fruit which has been reaped by the bogus government of Slavo-Communists."

## The Junkets Pay Off

A lot of jokes were made about the congressional junkets to Europe last Summer. But, in the light of recent events, friends of the Marshall Plan may have to concede that these junkets were a good investment of the public money which saved the European Recovery Program from costly delay or impotence.

The aid program cleared its first big hurdle in the House of Representatives by only 26 votes. That hurdle was an amendment which would have forbidden the buying of any material for stop-gap assistance if it were in short supply here at home. The result might have been virtually no assistance at all, if the House had its way. And it took a lot of informed talk and a sharp split in the majority party to avoid it.

Much of this informed talk came from representatives who had seen the European situation at first hand during the Summer. It was evident from the debate that most of them had arrived overseas with their minds and eyes open, and that they had done some studious sight-seeing.

This attitude was not true of all the junketeers. Travel does not always broaden. The contrast between foreign and American thought, customs, viewpoint and general way of life can turn some travelers more sour than ever on anything that isn't American. It not only can but it has. All of us have seen it in soldiers who were stationed in Europe. We have at least read about it in some congressmen. But these are in the minority.

Thanks to the speed and casualness of air travel—plus some appropriation expense money—there were probably more congressmen who had seen what they were talking about in a foreign-policy discussion than ever before.

These returned travelers had talked to Italian farmers and French workers. They had looked into coal mines and factories. They had seen the produce and prices in city markets. Communist strength and methods were part of the scene in which they found themselves. Inflation and the black market were more than abstract terms. British socialism, British austerity, and the bitter, chaotic problem that is Germany were not simply words, but vivid recollections.

Not all the Summer sojourners saw all these things, of course, or reacted the same to them. Nor did they provide all the support for stop-gap aid. But the majority seemed agreed that quick and sufficient help is needed.

They probably also realized, as well as the little-spenders and no-spenders did, that giving this help will not be a painless process. But they may have realized, too, that when they can fly to Europe in half a day, danger in Europe is not too remote from this country once the last barrier of opposition abroad is broken down.

The hurdles which these traveling congressmen have helped the ERP to clear are a stone wall of isolationism—a feeling that it is better to take a chance on the ungrateful, improvident Europeans stopping an all-out-short-of-war attack by the Communists than to make any sacrifices ourselves. If the public money spent on congressional travel this Summer produces a force that can break down that wall, then the junkets will really have paid off.

It picked the top of the Simpson at 7,910 feet, on an elevation of 3,299 feet. That makes this project the highest well so far drilled in the field, on the Simpson. The Humble No. 4 Parker, a completed Ellenburger, is the highest well in the field, up to now. No. 11 Parker will continue to the Ellenburger.

## GRANITE WASH FOUND IN EAST PECOS PROSPECTOR

Humble No. 1-1 State University, deep well in East Pecos County, four miles northwest of the shallow Taylor-Link field, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 5, block 18, University survey, was drilling ahead below 5,306 feet in granite wash, which was entered at 5,294 feet.

The project ran a two-hour drill-stem test at 5,200-48 feet. Recovery was 40 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas.

This venture had shown some slight signs of oil and gas in the lower Permian section above the granite wash.

## House Committee To Investigate Panama's Communist Activities

WASHINGTON—(AP)— Chairman Thomas (R-NJ) announced Friday that the House Committee on Un-American Activities will make an on-the-spot investigation late this month of "Communist infiltration" in the Panama Canal Zone.

The Panama inquiry will be part of a five-point program the committee has outlined for immediate consideration. This includes a resumption of the investigation of Communist influences in Hollywood and hearings on attempts to steal atom bomb information, to indoctrinate negro groups with Communism and the spread of fascism.

There have been hints in committee circles that one of the main reasons for the Panama trip is to check on reports that anti-American propaganda disseminated by Russia played a large part in the decision of Panama to refuse the U. S. continued use of Panamanian air bases.



The manner in which Penn State collected a well-earned 13 to 13 tie with the champions of the Southwest in Thursday's twelfth annual Cotton Bowl game was ample proof.

The big Pennsylvania looked easy for the Mustangs the first 28 minutes, but they got back in the ball game by traveling 66 yards on three passes in the last 60 seconds of the second quarter and then returned in the second half to all but wreck the Methodists' undefeated record.

Francis Rogel and Bobby Williams did the heavy work in moving the Lions to the Mustangs 19 the third time Penn State received the ball, but it was from that point that all-America Dick Walker took command and maneuvered the game's first score, an eight-play, 81-yard drive featuring a 53-yard touchdown pass from Walker to Halfback Paul Page. Walker converted.

Frank Payne returned a punt to the Lions 37 late in the second period. This time Walker carried over, hitting right tackle from the third.

The battle went on ice when Ernest Plank, Bexley, Ohio, crashed through the Tech line to block a kick that would have tied the score nine minutes before the game ended. Robert Speelman, Lansing, Mich., reserve guard, accounted for the winning point with an extra-point placement.

Miami struck in the first and fourth periods, first on nine-play drive capped with a line plunge by Halfback Ara Parseghian. Their second came after Captain Bill Hoover blocked a punt and Halfback Paul Shoults bucked it over.

A 32-yard punt runback in the second by Calvin Steveson and 18 more by Bud Conley set up Tech's first score. Steveson sneaked through for the counter. Bernie Winkler, Texas Tech tackle, snared Quarterback Tom Oates' pass attempt and dashed 24 yards for the second score.

The Guam Marine triumphed over the China All-Stars in the China Bowl at Shanghai. A Navy team tied an Air Force eleven, 12-12, in the fifth Lily Bowl at Hampton, Bermuda. The Philippine Ruykyu Command Seashores defeated the Hawaiian Mid-Pacific Commandos, 21-0, at Manila.

The Korea All-Stars trounced the Japan All-Stars, 19-13, in the Rice Bowl at Yokohama, a game involving U. S. Army troops. A Stone Bowl was inaugurated by the inmates of the Washington State Prison at Walla Walla, the All-Stars defeating the Comets, 12-0.

## Michigan Sets Five Records In Rose Bowl

PASADENA—(AP)—Michigan 49, Southern California 0 is the latest entry in the Rose Bowl log.

Run your finger to the top of the list, the first game reads: 1902—Michigan 49, Stanford 0.

Thursday, then, was where the Wolverines came in again after an absence of 46 years and rewrote the record book.

Leaving some 93,000 enthralled fans wondering how good can the Big Nine get, the magical Michigan—besides tying the high score record—wreaked the following havoc on the rose-stained (or is that Trojan blood?) pages:

1. Ran up 491 yards running and passing, surpassing USC's 427 total against Pitt in 1900.
2. Completed 17 passes in 27 attempts, one better than Navy against Washington, 1924.
3. Jim Brieske booted seven straight conversions. Four was previous individual high.
4. All-America Bob Chapuis—all of that, in every sense—passed for 188 yards, ran for 91. The total of 279 yards easily bettered previous individual high of 239 set in 1935 by Alabama's Dixie Howell.
5. Spinning Fullback Jack Weisenburger scored three touchdowns, all in one-yard bucks, to tie the tally mark of Notre Dame's Elmer Layden in the 1925 game against Stanford.

Impressive as all this is on paper, observers found it even more staggering on the field. The Trojans actually were never in the ball game; their long drive, good for 75 yards, came after the Wolves were 21 points ahead and died on the Michigan 13. It was Troy's only thrust into enemy territory.

## Texas Humbles Tide, 27 To 7

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—Texans were bragging prouder and louder than ever Friday, this time over the great Bobby Layne and his Longhorns, who kept the Lone Star escutcheon at the Sugar Bowl masthead with a slashing 27-7 triumph over Alabama's Crimson Tide.

Equalling the all-time margin of victory in 14 years of Sugar Bowling, the University of Texas Thursday whipped the Tide with Layne's stupendous individual exhibition which saw him complete 10 passes for 187 yards, pitch for one touchdown, set up another and score one himself as the Longhorns maintained the reputation of their state's college football of having never lost a game in this post-season classic in four tries.

In the final period, the Longhorns got two more touchdowns, both through the efforts of Law Holder, Texas end. He intercepted a pass for one score and recovered a fumble to set up another made by Layne.

The real story of the game was this: Layne played his best of the season; Harry Glimmer, heart and soul of the Alabama team, played his worst. Glimmer was the "goat." It was one of his lobbing passes that was intercepted by Holder, and it was his fumble that put Texas in position to make the other score.

Texas scored its first touchdown midway of the opening period on an 85-yard drive, with a pass from Layne to big Peppy Blount for the last four yards.

Alabama countered late in the second period after Mosley had run a punt back to the Texas 41. Glimmer passed to Ed White for 10 yards, Red Noonan plowed tackle three times for 23, then Glimmer passed to White for the score.

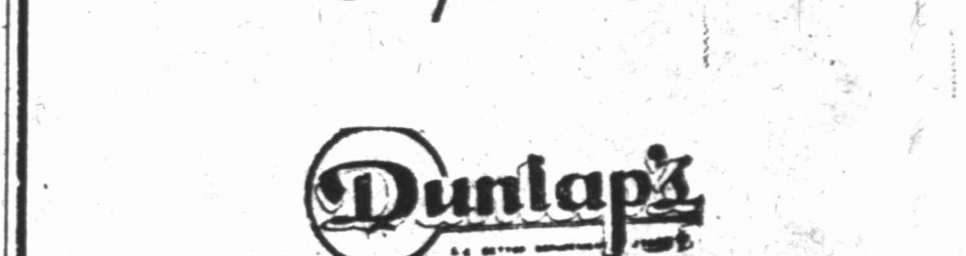
