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## Congress Faces Seven Top Issues

### Tax Cuts, HCL To Come First

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Questions bearing vitally on the future of the United States and most of the world confront the 80th Congress, meeting Tuesday for its final session.

Help for Europe and Asia, tax cutting, the high cost of living, rent control and the housing shortage, military preparedness and health insurance are a few of the top issues. And the list probably will grow.

A complicating factor is that this is a general election year. Democrats want to regain the control of Congress they lost to the GOP in 1946.

The Republicans hope to put their presidential nominee in the White House for the first time since Franklin D. Roosevelt started his first term in 1933.

The first week of the new session will be devoted primarily to speech-making and strategy huddles by congressional leaders, with a few committees starting to lay the groundwork for future legislative actions.

**Three Truman Messages**  
The chief executive will go to the capitol Wednesday in person to deliver his annual State-of-the-Union message to a joint session of the Senate and House. His economic report on Friday and his budget message next Monday will be delivered by messenger.

The first actual battle of the session probably will take place in the House over the GOP-backed tax reduction bill. House leaders want to pass the measure this month so, as Speaker Martin put it, the President will know what to expect.

The tax bill under consideration would cut \$5,000,000,000 and about 7,400,000 low income and elderly persons from the tax rolls.

While the President has said nothing about his plans if he receives another tax-cutting measure, highly placed White House aides expect him to oppose any general slash while the national income is at a record high.

**Aid Bill Forces Delays**  
Most signs indicate that the foreign aid picture will not take definite shape for several months. While the Democrats generally are supporting the Administration's Marshall Plan to spend \$17,000,000,000 during the next four years to help the 16 non-Communist nations of Western Europe regain their economic feet, Republicans are divided.

Some believe the whole program should be wound down sharply and then handed on a strict year-to-year basis.

Congress is also due to get a separate State Department program for helping China.

Truman is expected to submit a report on the economic aid of about \$40,000,000,000 in his message next Monday.

**The Truman Program**  
How the president will lay down his program—whether in general terms in the "State-of-the-Union" message, with supporting details in the economic and budget messages, or spread out over the three documents—remains to be seen.

But in advance of actual knowledge, congressional leaders are speculating the President will ask the lawmakers to:

Approve the Marshall Plan quickly.

Extend rent control beyond its February 29 expiration date.

Pass a universal military training bill.

Approve a national health insurance program.

Extend the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act expiring in June.

Give legal status to and expand the State Department's foreign information program.

Do something about the housing situation, and give him standby price-wage control and rationing powers.

### Postal Receipts Show Record Gain In 1947

Midland postal receipts during 1947 totaled \$172,750.29, exceeding the 1946 total of \$154,236.06 by \$18,514.23. Postmaster W. G. Oates announced Monday.

In the last quarter of 1947, receipts totaled \$51,841.24. The total for the last three months of 1946 was \$45,980.97.

### Wherry Joins Fight On Meat Rationing

WASHINGTON. — (AP) — A contention meat rationing would not work without price control and that a combination of the two would "stifle" meat production came Monday from Senator Wherry (R-Neb).

The Nebraskan expressed this opinion in commenting on plans of Senator Flanders (R-Vt) to introduce legislation shortly authorizing the Agriculture Department to prepare for meat rationing to a point just short of putting it into effect.

Under the plan Flanders outlined over the week-end, Congress would have to enact still another law to get actual rationing under way.

The Agriculture Department already is at work on some preliminary planning, Secretary Anderson, who has predicted Americans will be asking for meat rationing by Spring, told a reporter he has assigned an assistant, Charles A. Brannan, to prepare recommendations in the event the Department should be asked for them.

**Would Stifle Production**  
Flanders said his bill will make no provision for price ceilings on which "will take the steaks out of the rationing, properly handled, would have a restraining effect on prices."

Wherry, one of the chief critics of the old OPA, said his theory is "you just can't ration without price controls."

"What's more, rationing and price ceilings would only serve to stifle meat production," Wherry declared.

"Already all this talk of rationing is discouraging production. Cattle feeders are afraid to take a chance."

Wherry contended that if Congress were to authorize the Agriculture Department to go ahead with preparations, it would trim the meat supply sharply, even though rationing might never be instituted.

**Demands Anderson's Scalp**  
Another long-time critic of OPA used harsher words. Senator O'Daniel (D-Tex) issued a statement in which he termed rationing a "Communist, totalitarian measure which will take the steaks out of the grocery stores and put them in the swanky restaurants and hotels where bloated bureaucrats can feed on them three times a day out of their fat, tax-money expense accounts."

O'Daniel urged housewives and businessmen to join him in a demand that Anderson be ousted from the cabinet.

**NE NOLAN PROSPECTOR TO SET CASING AND RUN TESTS**

**AMERADA COMPLETES NEW DISCOVERY AT SEMINOLE**  
Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 9 T. S. Riley, discovery for production from the San Angelo section of the middle Permian lime, in Central Gaines County, about two and one-half miles northwest of Seminole, has been officially completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 147 barrels of 27.6 gravity oil, and no water, from pay between 6,336 feet and the plugged back total depth of 6,536 feet.

That zone had been treated with a total of 11,500 gallons of acid. The completion test was taken through open two-inch tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 1,172-1.

The well is on the northwest side of the regular Seminole field, which produces from the San Andres-Permian from above 5,100 feet. It is 660 feet from south and 725 feet from east lines of section 229, block G, OSD&RCNG survey.

### 15 Missing As Explosion Levels Palestine Hotel

JERUSALEM — (AP) — Rescuers dug Monday into the debris of the Semiramis Hotel for 15 persons missing after the three-story structure was leveled by a bomb.

Police said the Jewish underground had planted five persons were known dead.

One informant said the hotel was one of five district headquarters for an Arab military group. The known dead included Manuel Sliazer Travieso, acting Spanish consul. Some 17 were injured.

A similar act of violence occurred Sunday in Jaffa, where Arab headquarters was bombed and 15 persons were killed and about 100 injured. Police blamed the Stern gang, the most extreme element of the Jewish underground.

**Arab Meeting Place**  
Hagana, the Jewish underground defense force, said through a spokesman at Tel Aviv that the Jerusalem hotel attack was executed because "the building was an important meeting place of Arab gangs, where arms were distributed to villages in the Jerusalem area."

"Unfortunately, we cannot hit at the Arab band's (main) headquarters, as it is secreted in a mosque," the spokesman asserted.

Arab sources said the hotel was owned by a Greek woman. They described the attack there and at Jaffa as "reprisals" for the rioting last week in a Haifa refinery in which 47 Jews were killed, after Jews had bombed a line of Arabs before the employment office.

At least four persons were brought alive from the hotel wreckage, one a woman who had screamed in pain for four hours before she was saved.

"The Jerusalem and Jaffa bombings increased to 563 the number of persons killed in Palestine since the United Nations voted partition November 29."

The Semiramis Hotel blast was the worst such incident since the bombing of the King David Hotel in Jerusalem on July 22, 1946, when nearly 100 persons were killed by explosives planted by Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground group.

### Midland Couple Killed In Car-Truck Crash Sunday

Two persons were killed and several injured in two automobile crashes which occurred Sunday on U.S. Highway 80 between Midland and Odessa—within a few hundred yards of each other.

In the first wreck, about 9 a. m., Midlanders Ephraim H. Peyton, 74, and Mrs. Peyton, 68, were killed and their daughter, Betty, 26, was injured seriously when their car collided with a pickup about two miles west of the Midland Air Terminal. Officers who investigated the accident reported Miss Betty Peyton, the driver, attempted to pass another vehicle without being able to get back into the right traffic lane in time to avoid an East-bound pickup driven by Lewis Minica of Stanton. Miss Peyton drove into the left borrow ditch in an effort to avoid a collision, officers said, but Minica also drove into the ditch and the crash resulted.

In the other wreck at 12:05 p. m. Sunday, an East-bound sedan driven by a 13-year-old Odessa youth crashed into a West-bound automobile driven by Mrs. Ruby

### Connally Urges Marshall As Head Of European Aid

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Connally (D-Texas) declared Monday that if Congress were to deny Secretary of State Marshall direction over the European recovery program, "Moscow would placard it to the world as an evidence of Russian victory over President Truman."

Connally is the top Democrat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. His statement thus apparently fired the Administration's first gun in reply to growing denunciations among congressional Republicans that the long range foreign aid program be divorced from State Department control.

Noting that Russia "is bitterly fighting the Marshall Plan," the Texas senator said the Soviet Union "would applaud taking the execution of the plan out of the hands of the secretary of state and placing it elsewhere."

**No Russian Veto**  
"There would be no Russian veto on such a plan," Connally continued. "Russian drums would beat and the Soviet would hurrah. Their propaganda machines would send out over the air claims and statements that their fight against the plan had been largely successful."

Connally said it is "known in Moscow" that President Truman "has already indicated publicly that he desires the Marshall Plan administered by the secretary of state under his direction."

"If Congress should override the President," the Texan went on, "Moscow would placard it to the world as an evidence of Russian victory over President Truman."

Connally later told a reporter he assumed Moscow would attempt to propagandize the establishment of a separate administrative agency as a rebuff to Marshall, the author of the European aid program.

### Three All-Time Highs Set Monday At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH — (AP) — Three new all-time high prices for the Fort Worth livestock market were set Monday.

Mature heaves brought \$32.25 on a carlot shipment sent in by Jake Green of Granbury; three loads of heavy calves shipped by McClung Ranch in Johnson County brought \$30.00, and 108 choice fat lambs from Homer Miller of Plainview cashed at \$25.50.

The top-selling heaves weighed 1,044 pounds. Individual steers have sold as high in the past but this was an all-time top on carloads.

Bulldogs Slated Against Odessa

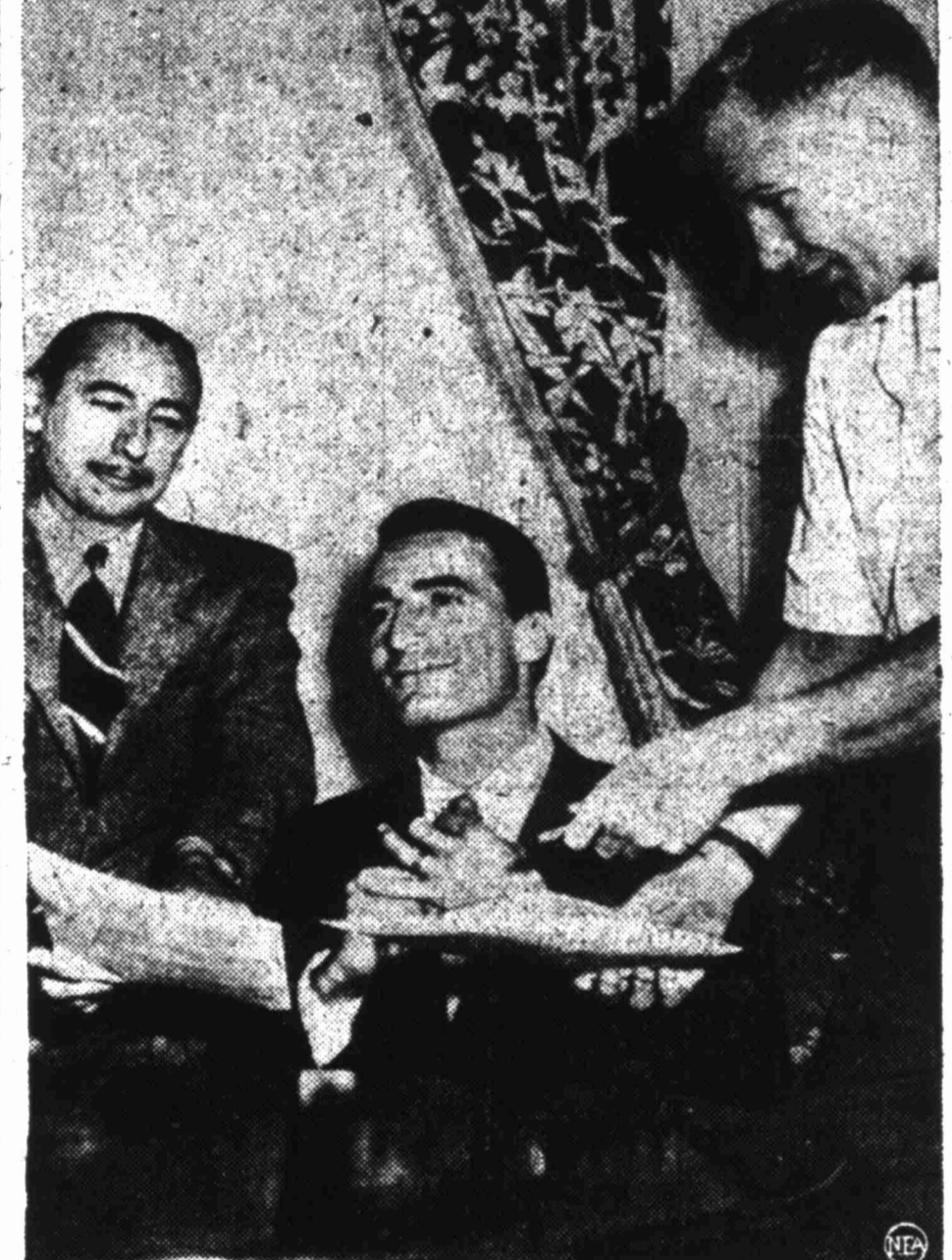

Bantam Ben held a three-stroke lead over the field, and aiming at his third victory in the event, his second in as many years, needed a one-over-par 72 to equal his 260, which won the tournament at this same site, Riviera Country Club last January.

Pressing close behind, however, were such formidable challengers as Knickerbocker Bobby Locke of South Africa, ex-tennis champion Ellsworth Vines of Pasadena and Ed Furgol of Pontiac, Mich., all in the 211 brackets.

**Locke Comes Back**  
One shot back of them after Sunday's 18 holes were the two Mangrum Brothers, Ray, whose 66 was the lowest of the tournament, and Lloyd, not to forget the Argentine invader, Roberto de Vicenzo. Locke got back into the fray with a beautiful 67, and Vines-came to the front with a 67.

Thus far, the long Riviera course, scene of the 1948 national open, has been a good test. Only seven golfers are under par for the three rounds.

**Crack Par Sunday**  
Hogan, with his third sub-par round in succession—68-70-70 for the par 71 layout—and the Mangrum boys, Locke, Vines, Dutch Harrison, Chick Harbert, Tony Penna, Smiley Quick, newly turned pro Felice Torza (with a 69), amateur Bobby Gardner, Johnny Palmer—all these managed to better par Sunday, however.

Six strokes behind Hogan were ex-PGA champions Bob Hamilton and Vic Ghezzi, and still further back were such erstwhile threats as Jimmy Demaret, Sam Snead, National Open Champion Lew Worsham, Penna, Harrison and the first round leader, Jack Harden of El Paso.

Tied in the fight for amateur honors were Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, and Doug Ford of Elmsford, N. Y., at 219. Two strokes back was Johnny Dawson of Hollywood.

## Italy Goes All Out For U. S. Film Stars

ROME. — (AP) — Despite strikes, disorders, political unrest and national paper supplies, the Italian press gives ample space to Hollywood stars and starlets who came to Italy.

For Italians dote on American movies, and their stars are for them the acme of that never-never-land—America—from where more than a thousand ships laden with food,

fuel and clothing have sailed to Italy.

Italy, for the big and little stars' press agents, is a dream—sometimes a little rough, but a dream. Visitors from Hollywood are gladly viewed and thoroughly interviewed, even when mobs are demonstrating in the streets.

**Power Tie-Up**  
Tyrone Power, who arrived here in his own plane, caused as big

a traffic jam as did the funeral for Gervasio Federici, youthful Christian Democrat, killed in a street fight with Communists on the eve of Rome's municipal elections last October. Police thought if Tyrone made a brief balcony appearance from Rome's Grand Hotel, the crowd would disperse. It did for a while—but others came to gape and stop traffic.

In a heavy traffic angle of Via Sistina a cafe window sports a lexy picture of Linda Christian (back in the U. So Landy played a small heart to the ace and led the king of clubs. East went up with the ace. Landy trumped, picked up the outstanding trumps and had two good clubs and a diamond in dummy on which to discard his two losing spades.

## Water Supply Affects Newspaper Shortage

AUSTIN. — (AP) — If Texas had a steady, reliable supply of water, there would be no reason for a shortage of newspaper among the papers of the state, says Dr. Kenneth A. Kobb, University of Texas chemical engineering professor.

Texas has plenty of wood to provide the newspaper, but erratic water conditions created by droughts in summer and floods in spring make it economically difficult to maintain paper mills, he points out.

A river control program that would assure a year-round supply of water would solve the problem, but such program would be a ticklish one, Doctor Kobb concedes.

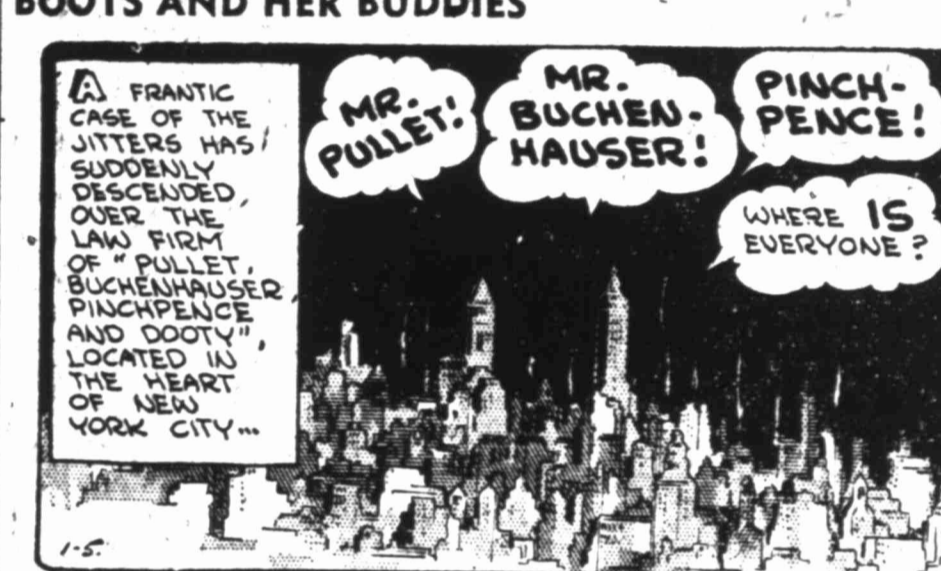

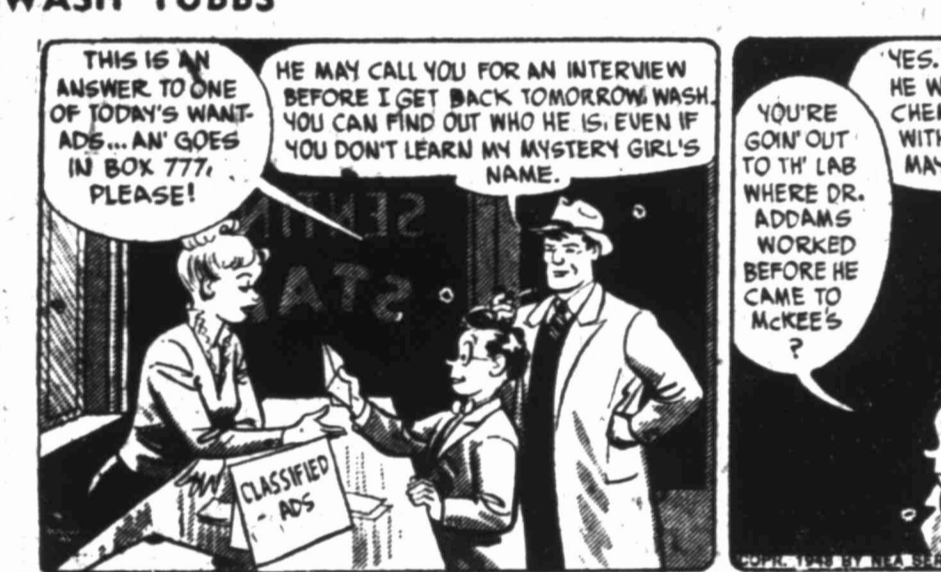

Marshall Plan Hailed As Best, Maybe Last Opportunity For Peace

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—The Marshall Plan for European recovery was held out by a top State Department official Monday as the best—"maybe the last"—chance for a stable and peaceful world. Charles E. Bohlen, Department counselor, declared its rejection by Congress would mean a heavier outlay by the United States on national security in a single year than the entire \$17,000,000,000 cost of the four year "blueprint for European economic independence." "If Western Europe, as we know it, falters and goes under, such a cataclysm would automatically bring about a radical change for the worse in the position of the United States in the world," Bohlen said in an address prepared for Wisconsin's Centennial celebration. "Urges Prompt Action" Bohlen then opened a new phase of the Administration's drive for speedy enactment of the program President Truman submitted to Congress December 19. He mentioned no critics by name but associates in Washington made clear that Bohlen had Senator Taft of Ohio and other Republican spokesmen in mind in asserting: "I do not believe there is any danger that the United States will shrink from this responsibility and turn its back on the outside world by refusing to do anything in the present circumstances. The issue is rather whether or not we will take prompt and effective action in meeting this responsibility or whether the tragic specter of 'too little or too late' will be the judgment of history."

## Politicos Speculate On Wallace's Hopeless Bid For Presidency

WASHINGTON, (AP) - Many Republicans began revising downward Monday their estimates of the effect Henry Wallace's third party venture may have on the November presidential election.

Supporters of Senator Taft of Ohio, an announced candidate, said significantly they are discounting talk that Wallace's move will make it easier for Taft to obtain the Republican nomination.

This theory had been advanced by many GOP members who contended Taft's popularity with organization Republicans was offset by the widespread belief he would have difficulty defeating President Truman in a strictly two-man race.

Politicians in both major party camps have been wondering whether Wallace will go the route in his obviously hopeless bid for election. Some say it might not be too difficult for Wallace to change his mind and drop out of the race later on.

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## Louisiana Tornado Death Toll Is 18

SHREVEPORT, LA. (AP) - A Red Cross hospital survey released Sunday night reported the death toll from the New Year's Eve tornado that struck North Louisiana now stands at eighteen with the official announcement of four dead at Haynesville.

The survey, released by C. E. Bryant, director of the Red Cross disaster operations, said the first official word from Haynesville listed four dead, including two negro women, one negro child and one white woman. Fourteen were reported killed in Cotton Valley, the Red Cross said.

The report added that 89 of the victims of the Cotton Valley tornado still are hospitalized, one in Minden and two in Shreveport.

## Hurricane Debris Moved From Gulf Coast

MOBILE, ALA. (AP) - The Mississippi Gulf coast has been cleared of 11,000 dump truck loads of debris piled up by the September 19 hurricane, Col. Joseph J. Twitty, Army district engineer, said.

The engineers performed the rehabilitation work over a 45-mile stretch of coast from Biloxi to Lake Shore with \$100,000 allocated by President Truman from his emergency fund.

In addition to clearing the debris the engineers refloated or placed in position for repairing and launching 43 boats of varying sizes beached by the high winds and tides.

## FATE OF MISSING VIRMAN STILL CONCEALED
