## End Of The First Round

America was in the corner of the French and Italian governments during their fight with the Communists, but ser support was moral rather than active. So now at the and of the first round for surely the present lull is no nore than that—this government is probably reviewing he results and figuring ways to help its fighters finish off he opposition.

The French and Italian governments showed surprising strength in round one. But the Communists, though short of breath and prestige at the moment, are certain to ry again. Their communique, calling off the French strikes, promised as much when it said, "We must regroup and rally our forces for future battles, which will be bit-

It now seems imperative that Washington speed up the appropriation machinery in its final job and get this much-talked-about assistance under way. The Italian and French police may handle violence with assurance. The workers of both countries may show good sense in refusing to follow the Communist leaders. But, in the end, America probably holds the most potent weapon in the fight.

That weapon is food, and its target is the Communists' strongest ally, hunger. Food shortages and outrageously high prices must have won a bigger audience for the enemies of the Marshall Plan than would have been possible otherwise. When a man spends three-quarters or more of his pay in trying to feed his family—as workers in French cities are reportedly doing—he is ready to try desperate measures.

A greater burden has fallen on the American air program, with the Russian government's spiteful breaking off of the trade talks which would have brought Russian wheat to France in exchange for machinery. An added burden is the loss he production which the Communist-inspired strikes caused, even though they were broken. A possible future burden is found in the prediction that the Communists, after they catch their breath, will try to Lie up key industries, one after the other, by strikes.

Yet America seems to have gained as well as lost. She probably will profit from the fact that the Soviet government-which was, of course, in the Communists' corner -lost its temper in dealing with France. The French may have lost much of their strength and importance in Europe, at least temporarily. But they still have a maditional finesse in diplomacy, and they clearly came off best in the flurry with Moscow.

The Soviets' angry ending of the trade talks was clumsy. Their insulting note which charged mistreatment of Russian citizens in France was made doubly insulting when they broadcast its contents before they delivered it. This naturally injured French pride and helped solidify Retired Teacher, 96, anti-Communist feeling.

"All these recent actions have shown more clearly that it is Russia who insists on a divided Europe. They must have discouraged any lingering hope that France, particularly, might act as a go-between. Russia has pushed both France and Italy definitely to the side of freedom, and of America. 'Man Without Country'

Wins 10-Year Battle

PITTSBURGH. - (AP) - Andrew Gogal, 46, Pennsylvania-born "man without a country," has won his 10-year court battle to establish his American citizenship and bring his family to Pittsburgh from Czechoslovakia.

Gogal, born at Walston, Jefferson County. Pa., was taken to Czechoslovakia at the age of 3 by his father and remained in that country with relatives after his father died. In 1922 he was drafted into the Czech army.

Gogal later returned to the United States but encountered legal difficulty in 1937 when he attempted to bring his wife and two children here. Immigration authorities ruled he had forfeited his citizenship by serving in the army of a foreign power.

U. S. District Judge Wallace S. Gourley ended the matter by ruling that Gogal is an American citizen by birth.
