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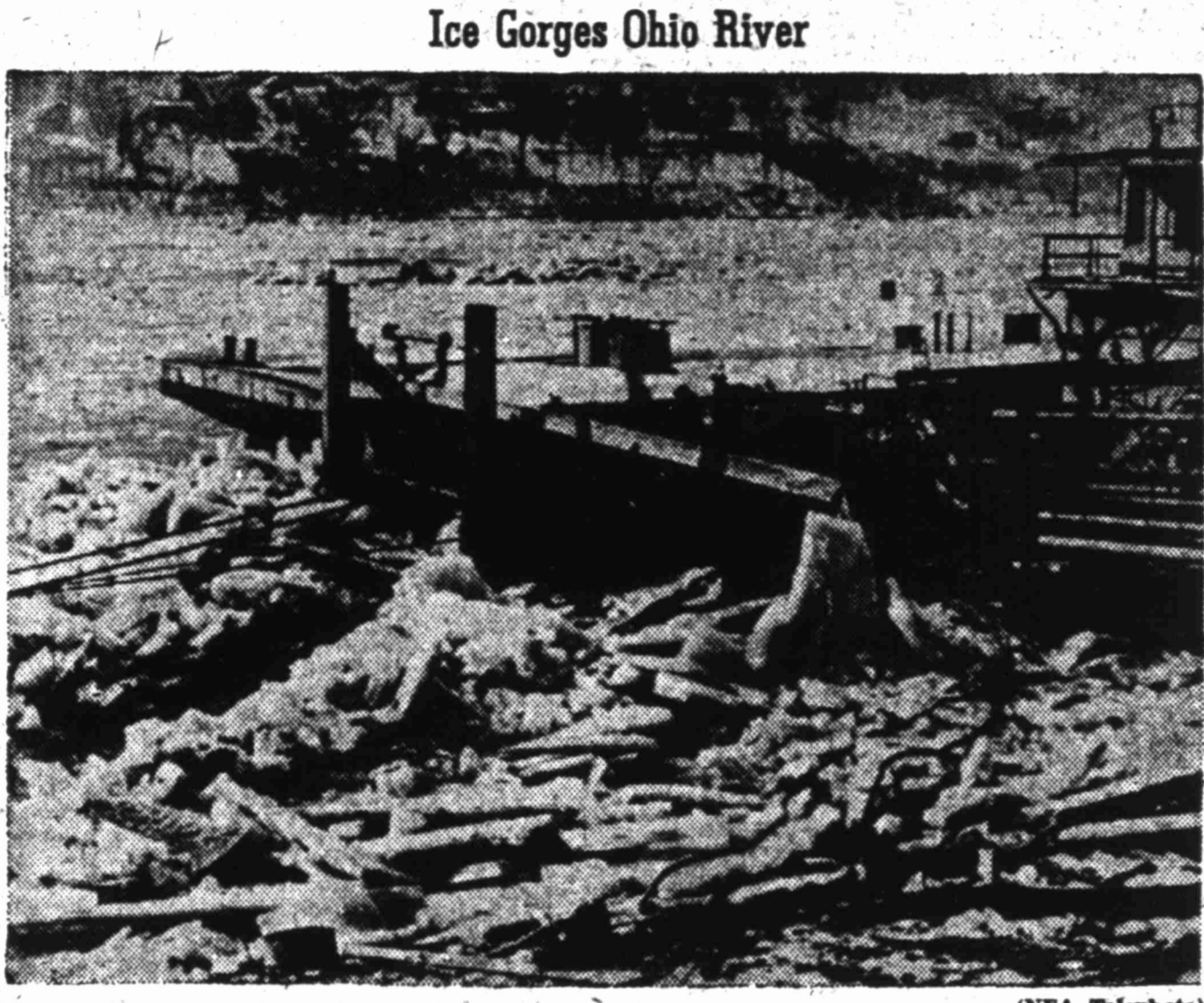
## Commodity Prices Hit Skids Again

### Cotton, Livestock Lard, Grains Drop

NEW YORK—(AP)—Cotton and grains led a new and fast retreat on the price front Tuesday.  
Grocery stores and wholesale markets gave wide recognition to the tumbling prices as the break became general, pulling stock market prices down \$1 to \$3 a share.  
Prices on the wholesale meat market at Chicago were down as much as \$4 a hundred pounds in an unusually quick reaction to Monday's livestock declines.  
Cotton was down as much as \$9.95 a bale, only five cents below the daily allowable limit.  
There were scattered reports of further declines in cost-of-living items.

### Convict Sought As Killer

EL PASO—(AP)—An escaped convict from the Texas Prison System was wanted here Tuesday as officers sought to solve the roadside slaying Monday of one man and the wounding of another.  
Maurie Heaton of Los Angeles was killed and H. D. MacNeil of El Paso was wounded by a gunman who shot them and robbed them of approximately \$125.  
Sheriff Allan Falby of El Paso County said the description of the gunman given by MacNeil fitted the general description of Harvey Lee Glass, 34, who escaped from Darlington Prison Farm early Saturday.  
Glass was last reported Sunday night in Laraine, Texas, near Big Spring. His two companions in the break were captured Sunday night in Colorado City by John H. and Kemper Kimberlin of Midland and their brother-in-law, Howe Mayes of Colorado City.  
Heaton and MacNeil, both advertising men, were on a sightseeing trip when approached by the gunman.  
Abandoned Car Found  
MacNeil said they were forced to drive outside El Paso on a highway where the shooting occurred.  
The bandit escaped. The car was found abandoned in the hills outside of El Paso.  
The three escaped convicts from Darlington were first reported Saturday night near Gatesville, in East Texas, when they released three members of a Tellico, Texas, family after holding them captive for more than 12 hours.  
Glass fled in a stolen car at Colorado City Sunday night as his companions, John Tom Rawlings, 21, and Cecil Chester Davis, 25, were captured.

### 34 Or More Perish When 'Home' Burns

ST. JOHN'S NEWFOUNDLAND—(AP)—Thirty-four persons were officially reported to have perished in a fire which destroyed Hull House, an old people's home, here early Tuesday.  
A fire official said more bodies may be found in the ruins of the three-story concrete building which sheltered indigent and ill people.  
Some occupants escaped. Some suffocated or died of burns while still abed. Nine bodies were found in beds in one room. Some reached windows before collapsing.  
The cause of the fire was not known. A 50-mile gale fanned the flames quickly out of control. The weather was below zero.  
Some of the residents of the home who escaped suffered from exposure and frost-bite before they found other shelter.  
The blaze lit up the whole city, and its reflection could be seen far out at sea.  
It was the heaviest loss of life in a St. John's fire since the Knights of Columbus Hotel burned in December, 1942, taking a toll of 100 dead and 102 injured. Most of the victims in that fire were Canadian service men.

### Soviet Says Allies Paved Way To War

MOSCOW—(AP)—The Russians promised Tuesday to publish secret German documents which they said would prove their charges that the Western Allies paved the way for World War II.  
The Soviet Information Bureau stated that the United States, Britain and France had, in their relations with Germany, provided Adolf Hitler with the strength to launch the second World War.  
The Russians said it was done by "a golden rain of American dollars" and by French and British diplomacy.  
The Russian statement was in reply to the U. S. State Department's publication January 21 of 260 documents captured from the Nazis dealing with Russian-German relations prior to World War II.  
Russia said its charges were supported by "important documents" which were captured by Soviet agents.

### Oklahoma Seeks Killer As Body Of Victim Found

DUNCAN, OKLA.—(AP)—"The worst killing in the history of Stephens County," Tuesday spurred officers on the hunt for a three-cornered murder weapon.  
They believe some special instrument was used to batter in the head of a 30-year-old Indian waitress, Helen Beavers.  
Her body, partly stripped, was found Monday stuffed in the trunk of an automobile unused since Christmas.  
County Attorney Hegel Branch, who called it the county's worst killing, said his head was beaten to a pulp by 13 blows, any one of them fatal.  
Missing Since January 22  
At the same time, Hegel continued questioning three men arrested shortly after the discovery. Two of them were in a party the young woman left the night of January 22 to keep a midnight date with another man. She was not seen again alive.  
The find was made by R. C. Gentry, driver of the car. He left Duncan, Okla., for Christmas and did not return to drive his car until Sunday. When he noticed an unusual weight dragging down the back of the machine he investigated.

### Two Killed, Four Injured In Auto Collision Tuesday

AMARILLO—(AP)—Two Oklahomans were killed and five other persons were injured in an automobile collision early Tuesday on U.S. Highway 66, 14 miles east of here.  
The dead are Joe Mattick Roark, 24, and Mrs. Flossie Marie Beach, 18, both of Checotah, Okla.  
The injured were George L. Beach, 27, of Checotah, husband of the dead woman; Dylon L. Dollins, 33, Checotah; Nelson L. Holly, 26, and his brother, Richard L. Holly, 28, both of Bakerfield, Calif.; and Howard K. Lynch of Conway, Texas.  
Lynch was driving alone. All of the other persons were occupants of the second car.  
The injured were in a hospital at Groom, Texas. Bodies of the dead were taken to a funeral home there.

### Air Terminal Citizens Apply For Post Office

Residents of Midland Air Terminal have applied to the Post Office Department for a post office for their own. Postmaster N. G. Oates reported Tuesday.  
The application calls for the post office to be known as "Terminal, Texas." Originally, the petition asked that the post office be known as "Midland Air Terminal, Texas," but the Post Office Department suggested the name be shortened. So, going all-out for brevity, the applications was amended to ask that the office at the new community be called simply "Terminal."

### Six Believed Dead In Tent Blast

HALIFAX N. S.—(AP)—Four persons, including two children, were believed to be dead in an early morning tent fire here Tuesday.  
Two others were missing and presumed dead. Twenty persons were left homeless by the blaze.

The West and extreme South portions of East Texas were promised rain Wednesday afternoon or night. Meanwhile the latest cold snap which moved in over the weekend passed into the Southern part of the state, reversing the weather map. Freezing temperatures reached to the coast at Beaumont, which had an overnight low of 31 degrees. San Antonio had a low of 36, Houston an even 32.  
The state's lowest reading—24 degrees—was shared by Texarkana, at the Northeastern corner, and Pampa, in the Panhandle. Two inches of snow from last week's storm remained on the ground at Pampa. Brownsville had the highest overnight minimum of 49 degrees.  
Skies were clear Tuesday in the Northwestern half of the state and cloudy in the West.  
At Wink, in West Texas, the mercury climbed to 61 degrees for the state's highest reading. Specimens in the East had a top of 54 degrees.

### New Orleans Goes On Annual 'Bender'

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—New Orleans went on its annual Mardi Gras bender Tuesday, celebrating a modern version of the world's oldest surviving festival.  
The pre-Grick shepherds who started the business 5,000 years ago might have been a bit surprised if they had chanced upon the scene. But nobody would have noticed them—what with folks disguised as decks of cards and aspirin bottles, gypsies and convicts, apes and ballet dancers.  
By various twists and turns, their festival was changed into the orgies of European carnivals. The French carnival celebration of Mardi Gras, with the orgy strained out, was imported into New Orleans about 120 years ago.  
Mardi Gras itself, on Shrove Tuesday, a day of fun before the lenten austerity—winds up a carnival season that started on twelfth night, January 6.  
The thing became a general spree on this final day. With all business stopped, the people crowded the downtown streets for the last parades.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The fray of "politics" echoed on both sides Tuesday in the election-year price feud between President Truman and Senator Taft (R-Ohio).  
The latest jab came from Secretary of Agriculture Anderson.  
Anderson said Taft, a candidate for the U. S. Senate, had "political reasons" when he declared the administration was trying to keep prices high for political gain.  
There was no immediate reply from Taft, who left for a Midwestern speaking tour at about the time Anderson hit back.  
Denies Statement  
The latest chapter of the squabble between Taft and the Administration over why prices are high got started last Thursday when Anderson talked about grain exports at a news conference.  
Taft said advance announcement of government purchase plans was an attempt to raise prices at a time the market was sliding.  
The Olson also said: "The Administration, which talks about bringing prices down, is afraid they actually will come down."  
Anderson replied he made no statement that the government is planning to buy an additional 50,000,000 bushels of wheat and I made no other statement to which you could have been referring.

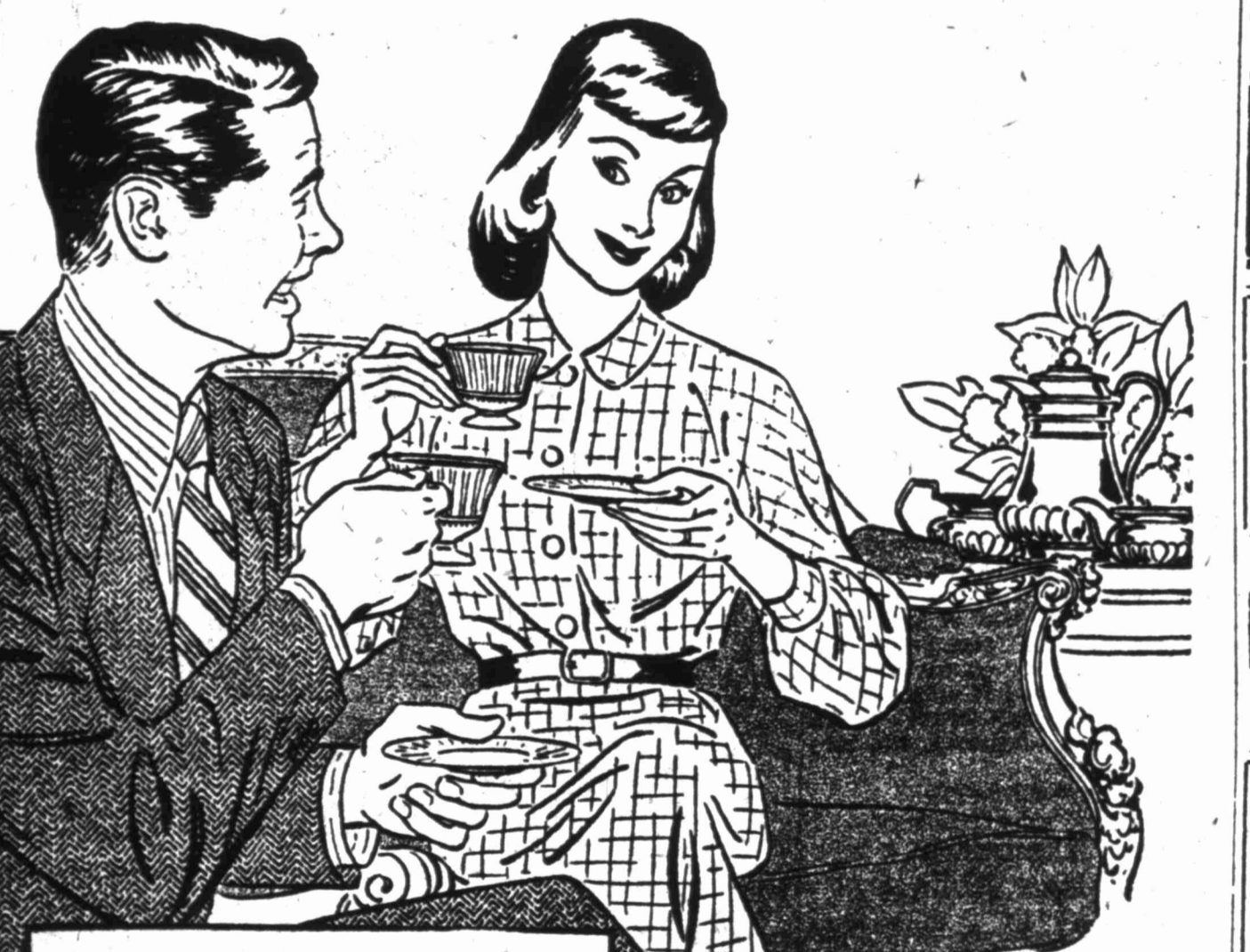

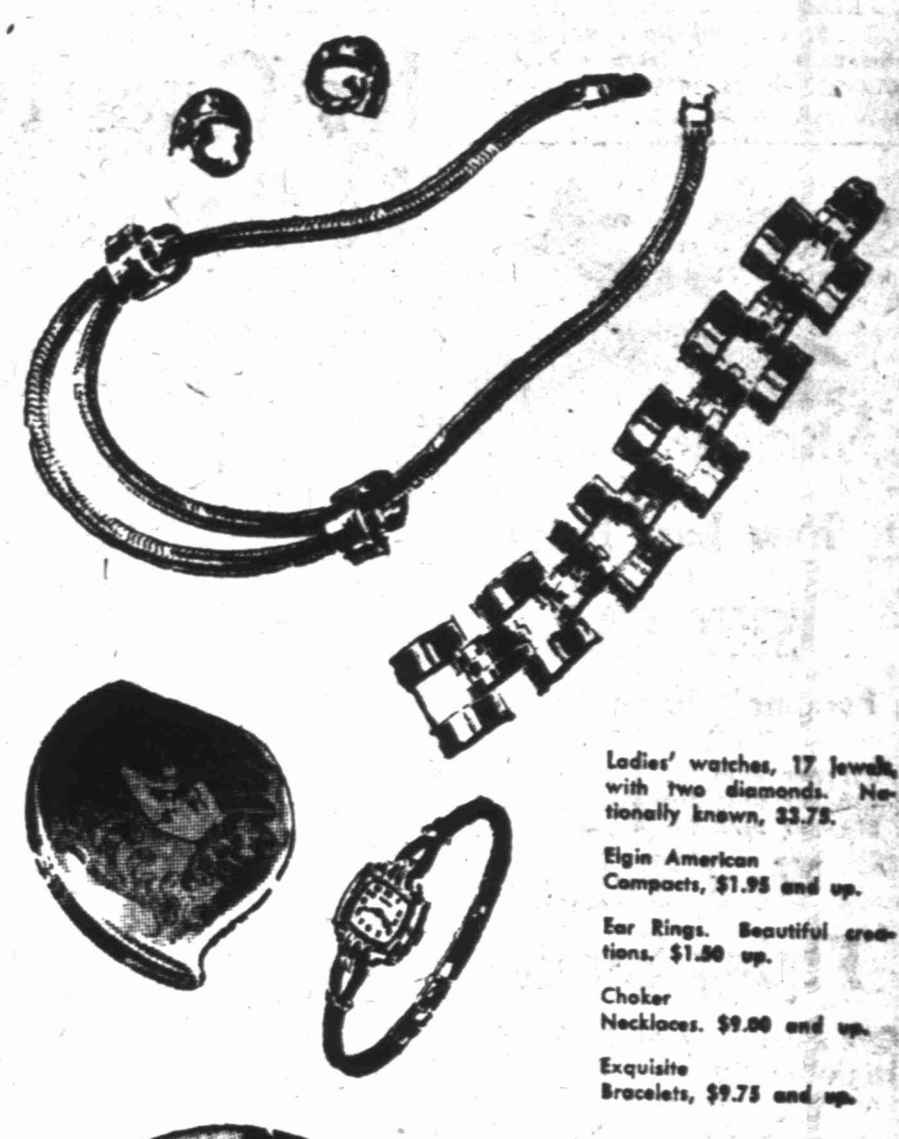

BALTIMORE—(AP)—Leo Matriciana—who should know—says heavyweight champion Joe Louis may be a little slower on his feet than a few years ago "but you can't say that of his body or his punches."

Leo, a Baltimore heavyweight, boxed four rounds with Louis in a no-decision four-round exhibition before 3,020 fans here Monday night.

He went the same distance under the same conditions against the brown bomber in 1944, when they were both soldiers in England. Leo said "Joe hit me pretty hard," a few times and that he had been hurt by a punch to the abdomen in Monday night's bout.

Rolling in Fat  
Joe's weight was announced at 220. He had a roll of fat around his girth and ringers thought his poundage should have been announced at somewhere between 225 and 230.

He stalked Matriciana, 208, all the way, but threw few punches. Matriciana tried hard and struck out time and again, but did not succeed in hurting the champion.

Most of the action came in the third round, after Joe was stung on the nose by two jabs. Louis let loose a sharp left and followed it with a right jab that made 23-year-old Matriciana cover up.

Late in the final round Louis opened up again and was banging away with both hands, but the bell came before there was any damage.

It was Louis' last ring appearance in the United States before sailing for England on February 19, where he will engage in exhibitions preparatory to a title defense against Jersey Joe Walcott next Summer.

Louis reiterated the Walcott fight will be his last—"win, lose or draw."

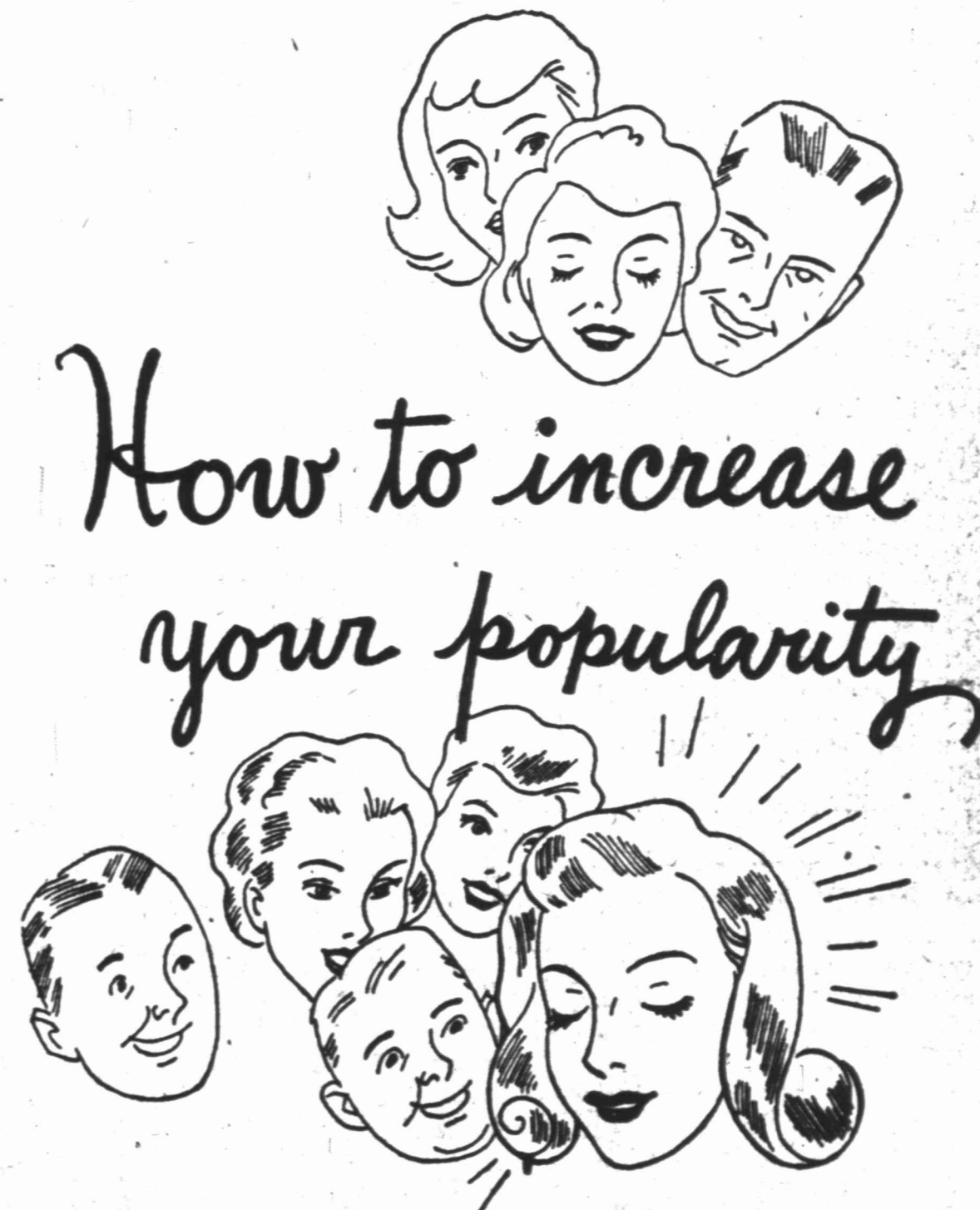

## Double Talk A La Russe

It has been suggested that Russia and the Western  
 powers could get along together, if only they could under-  
 stand each other.  
 Because so few Russians are permitted to see our  
 civilization, and so few non-Communists are permitted to  
 see Russia, we have to exchange information and ideas in  
 words. But even after they have been translated, words  
 do not always mean the same thing to the two peoples.  
 There are some who argue that Moscow has not vio-  
 lated the various agreements solemnly made by Roosevelt,  
 Churchill and Stalin, but has observed them strictly, as  
 they were understood then. It is our fault, they feel, that we  
 did not understand those words and phrases the same as  
 Stalin, Molotov and Vishinsky did.  
 In hope of avoiding some future misunderstandings,  
 here are a few definitions of words and phrases constantly  
 used by Soviet and Communist spokesmen, which mean  
 something different to them than to us:

Aggression: Any attempt by a non-Soviet nation to  
 encourage or help a small country resist Soviet inter-  
 ference.

Collective bargaining: For Russian workers, a process  
 by which they are permitted to ask for small favors. For  
 American workers, the right of the workers to demand  
 what they want from the boss—or else.

Cooperation: Unquestioning acceptance of the Soviet  
 will and viewpoint.

Democracy: Rule by the Supreme Soviet, or by agents  
 elected and directed by the Kremlin. A legislature is  
 permissible if it limits itself to ratifying decisions of the  
 Soviet agents.

Election: A poll in which voters can vote for one ap-  
 proved list of candidates or—if they dare—can vote against  
 it, but not for an opposition slate.

Fascist: One who criticizes the Soviet Union, praises  
 capitalism, or objects to having native Communists work  
 for the Soviet Union against the interests of their own  
 country.

Freedom of press: The privilege of printing what the  
 Kremlin has authorized. Also the privilege of publishing  
 what the Kremlin has not forbidden—with the risk of  
 liquidation if it is something the Kremlin would have for-  
 gotten if it had thought in time.

Freedom of speech: The privilege of agreeing, ver-  
 bally with what one's superiors say.

Imperialism: Similar to aggression, with the further  
 meaning that the non-Soviet nation (usually the U. S. or  
 England) is helping the weak country in order to establish  
 economic and political domination.

Labor union: An organization of workers through  
 which they can be told where to work, how long, under  
 what conditions, and for how much pay.

Monopoly: Any business that has become big.

Right: (Noun) The nearest synonym in English is  
 privilege or suffrage; there are no rights in Russia as  
 we understand them. (Adjective) Only communism and  
 the Soviet Union are right; everything and everybody else  
 is wrong.

Sovereign nation: One controlled by Moscow, but  
 permitted to have its own officials, provided they are se-  
 lected or approved by the Kremlin.

Victim of capitalism: An unemployed person in a non-  
 Soviet country, at a time when there are jobs for all, who  
 can live in idleness on public charity better than Russian  
 workers can live when both husband and wife work 48  
 hours a week.

War monger: One who criticizes any action of the  
 Soviet Union, or disagrees with any statement of its spokes-  
 men. Includes the compiler of this glossary.

## Long-Standing Feud Flares Anew Among University Teachers

AUSTIN —(AP)— A long-standing  
 feud between two groups of sci-  
 entists at the University of Texas  
 came out into the open Tuesday.  
 Dr. E. J. Lund, outstanding bio-  
 physicist, accused President T. S.  
 Painter and the board of regents of  
 having violated his tenure by reduc-  
 ing his salary without good reason  
 or cause.

## Electronic Photo Engraving Machine Culminates Century Of Development

HACKENSACK, N. J. —(AP)— Cul-  
 minating a century of development,  
 a new electronic photo engraving  
 machine which automatically pro-  
 duces "cuts" from which pictures  
 are printed is on trial in three New  
 York area newspapers.

One of the new machines was  
 shown at the offices of the Bergen  
 Evening Record here by the Fair-  
 child Camera and Instrument Cor-  
 poration of New York, which pro-  
 duces it. Others are at the News-  
 day at Hempstead, N. Y., and the  
 Ridgewood Herald-News.

Twenty-three other test engravers  
 are being installed, but general pro-  
 duction is not expected to be under-  
 way until July.

The new engraver was acclaimed  
 by publishers who saw the demon-  
 stration as economical and a spur  
 to increased use of pictures in news-  
 papers, particularly smaller news-  
 papers without conventional photo-  
 chemical engraving plants.

Will Not Sell Outright  
 The machines will rent for \$160 a  
 month, and Fairchild does not plan  
 to sell them outright.

The engraver produces only half-  
 tones, not line cuts, and makes the  
 conventional dot pattern by punc-  
 turing a plastic sheet with a heated  
 stylus. The test machines turn out  
 65-screen engravings. Laboratory  
 models produce cuts of better than  
 100-screen.

An operator can learn to produce  
 photo-engravings on the electronic  
 machine in "a few hours," the firm  
 reports. After being loaded with a  
 picture and the plastic material on  
 which the engraving is made, then  
 adjusted, the machine functions  
 automatically.

The Fairchild engraver turns out  
 cuts at the top rate of four square  
 inches a minute. It will produce  
 the maximum size engraving it will  
 accommodate—8x10 inches—in 18  
 minutes.

 gravings only of the same size as

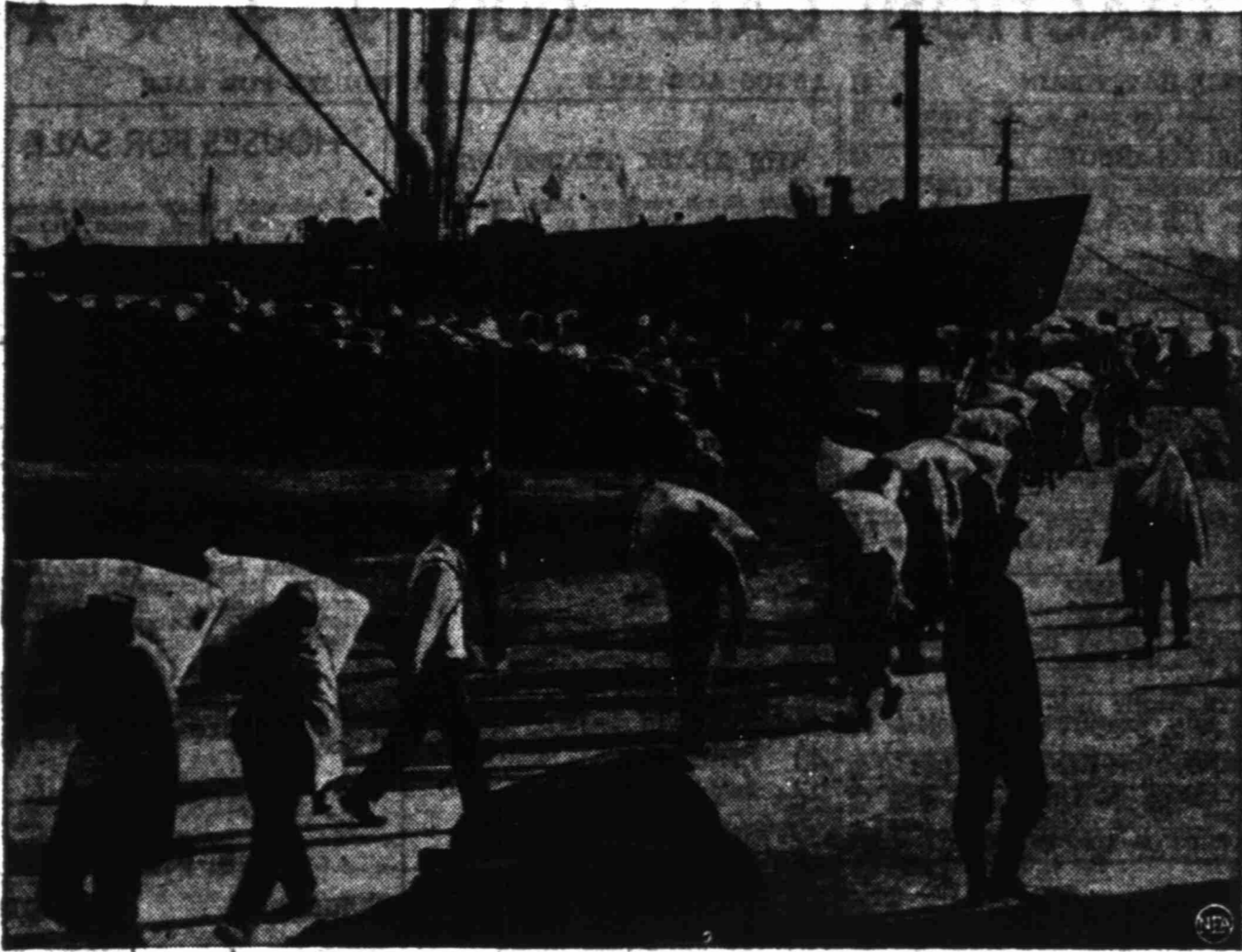

Blond, smiling Kay Polchikoff, 28, arrived here for a visit with her brother, Nicholas, a student at UCLA.

"The bomb fell three miles from where I lived," she said. "I became hysterical and we were all excited. Our house caved in like a stack of cards. People ran around screaming. Buildings collapsed everywhere. Fires were all around us. At first we thought it was an earthquake. Everybody wanted to get out of the city."

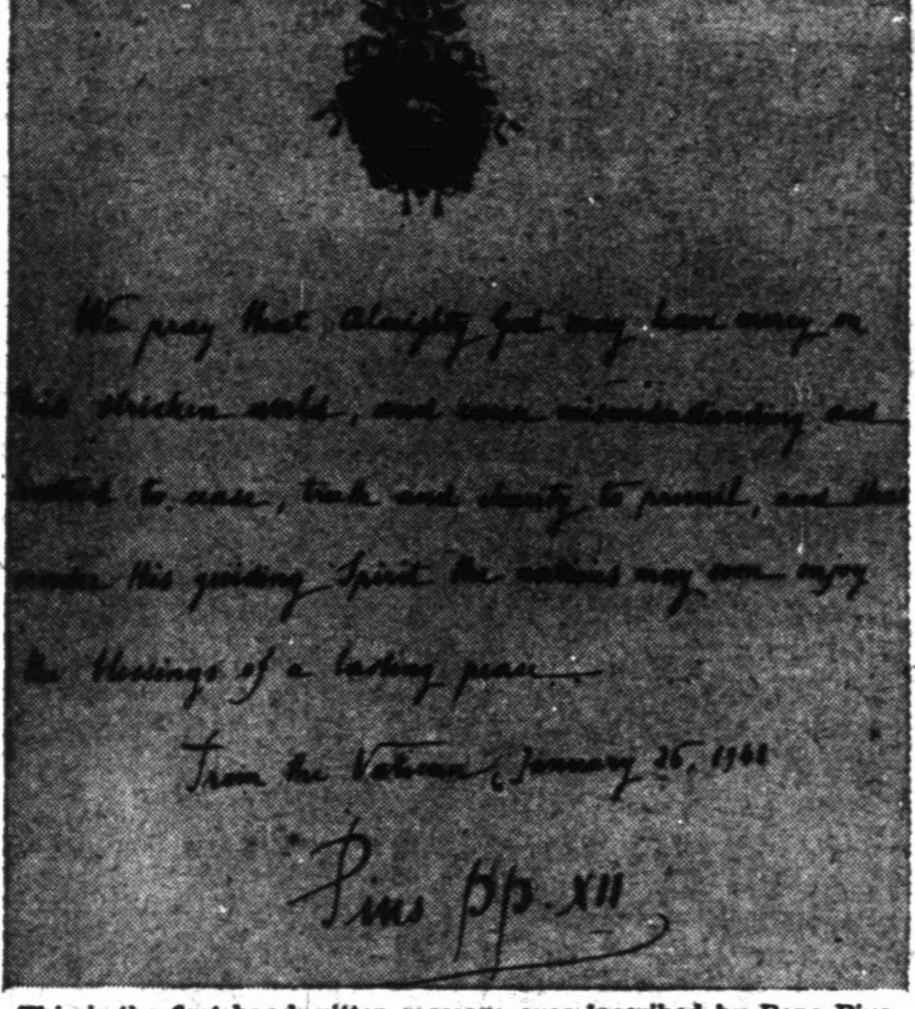

### Marshall Plan Failure Could Scuttle GOP

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Senator Reed (R-Kas) said Tuesday failure to enact a "workable" Marshall Plan could scuttle GOP election hopes. Reed described himself as no great champion of the European Recovery Program now before Congress. But in a letter to a fellow Kansan which he made public Tuesday, he declared: "The international point of view in the Northeastern part of the United States and on the Pacific Coast is so different from our Midwestern point of view, that if the Marshall Plan should fail (of passage) and President Truman could gain the Presidency on the Republican Party, and if— Would Fall in Each "Between this time and November through failure of a workable ERP to be passed, a Communist government should be chosen to replace the present government x x x in Italy, France or any other important Western European country, the Republican candidates in November would not carry a state East of Ohio, except perhaps Maine and Vermont, or any state on the Pacific coast. "Under such circumstances, defeat for the Republican Party in November would be a blow from which it would be very difficult to recover."

### Arab Suicide Squads Reported Ready To Fight UN Commission

CAIRO, EGYPT. —(AP)— Jamal Kifendi Hussein, deputy chairman of the Palestine Higher Executive, said Tuesday Arab suicide squads are training in Palestine "for attacking the United Nations Commission when it comes to the Holy Land." Hussein made the statement in an interview. "This is a warning, not a threat," he said. "We shall not be able to take any responsibility concerning the security of the United Nations Commission in Palestine." Hussein, nephew of the exiled mufti of Jerusalem, is attending meetings of the Arab League here. He declared Arabs "will fight to the end" any force sent to Palestine to implement partition.

troops during the smash-up of Hitlerite Germany." On the 1946 Agreement The statement asserted that American financial aid to a beaten Germany after World War I enabled the former Reich quickly to re-establish a powerful war industry. The Soviet statement dwelt at length on the U. S. State Department's publication of Nazi documents. The Russians asserted that in 1946 the Western Allies agreed to publish archives material of the German Foreign Office for 1918-1945, which was seized in Germany by British and American authorities. "Noteworthy is the fact," the statement said, "that the published collection contains only materials relating to the period 1939-1941, while materials relating to the preceding years, and in particular, to the Munich period, have not been included by the State Department and have been concealed from the world opinion."

### Operators Howl At Ching Stand In Coal Dispute

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Cyrus S. Ching, chief federal labor conciliator, said Monday night the government won't permit a soft coal shutdown this Spring. Members of the Southern Coal Producers association were still yelling "foul" Tuesday. They said Ching has practically handed John L. Lewis a loaded gun if a strike is what the United Mine Workers has in mind. "Lewis comes into the negotiations with an ace in the hole," protested Raymond Salvard, a West Virginia mine official. "If we cannot get together and his demands are such that we cannot concede them, the government would step in and grant Lewis what he wants." Government Will Intervene Ching said flatly the nation "will not tolerate a coal stoppage." If a strike develops, he told the Southern producers at a dinner meeting, "the government will step in." Lewis already has taken what many coal operators regard as a possible first step to end his present contract April 1. He has notified the operators a dispute exists over his proposed \$100 a month pension for miners 60 or older who have 20 years of service in the pits.

SALONIKA, GREECE —(AP)— A large force of guerrillas fired 12 mountain artillery shells into this city Tuesday morning, killing four persons, an official announcement said. The dead included a British soldier who died in his billet in the heart of the city when a shell exploded. Two women and a man also were killed. City officials said the rebels fired on Salonika from a point five miles to the north. Press reports reaching Athens said the air force had found the rebel band and had strafed it. These reports said one of the shells struck the Mediterranean Hotel, headquarters of the UN Special Commission on the Balkans, cutting off communications and shattering windows.

### Insurance Men To Meet Here Wednesday

Members of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents, District 6, will hold a casualty conference Wednesday at 10 a. m. at the Midland Country Club. The meeting, expected to draw 75 to 100 agents within a 125-mile radius of Midland, will feature talks by Joe P. Gibbs, casualty insurance commissioner of Texas, and six directors of various sections of the commission.

### CONDEMNED NEGRO GETS SECOND REPRIEVE

JACKSON, MISS.—(AP)— A Mississippi negro, twice sentenced to die for the rape of a white woman, has his second new lease on life Tuesday. The State Supreme Court by a 4-2 decision quashed the original indictment on which Willie McGee was tried because no negroes served on the grand jury which returned the true bill. It was the second time the high court had saved McGee.
