Because so few Russians are permitted to see our vilization, and so few non-Communists are permitted to e Russia, we have to exchange information and ideas in ords. But even after they have been translated, words not always mean the same thing to the two peoples.

There are some who argue that Moscow has not vioted the various agreements solemnly made by Roosevelt, hurchill and Stalin, but has observed them strictly, as ne understood them. It is our fault, they feel, that we id not understand those words and phrases the same as alin, Molotov and Vishinsky did.

In hope of avoiding some future misunderstandings. ere are a few definitions of words and phrases constantly sed by Soviet and Communist spokesmen, which mean mething different to them than to us:

Closely Watched On this side of the Atlantic in Latin-America, television developments are being closely watched. Indications are that that part of the world will soon join the radio picture parade.

From the standpoint of international television, progress might seem slow. It was like that, too, in the early days of radio. But such authorities as Brig. Gen. David Sarnoff, president of RCA, apparently do not think so. Sarnoff is credited with being a principal incentive behind American television, Sarnoff says the world shouldn't have to wait too long before it can see itself instantaneously from almost any place. Probably within a decade, possibly two at the most. There are a number of technical problems to solve first, such as efforts now being made to find a means of sending the high frequency signals of television over greater distances than 40 or 50 miles.

CHICAGO -(P) - Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said Tuesday the United States can't afford to "give away" so much to Europe that price controls will be needed again at home. Taft came here to begin a mid-Winter hunt in six Midwestern states for GOP presidential nomi-

In an address prepared for a meeting of the Inland Daily Press Association Tuesday, the Ohio sens-tor declared that individual freedom at home must be "the ultimate purpose of any foreign policy."

Taft, who has called for a cut in the \$6,800,000,000 proposed by President Truman for the first 15. months of the European Recovery

Program, added: "We should not be actuated by purely altruistic desire to improve the condition of a lot of other peo-ple who have failed for centuries to do the job for themselves." The Ohioan said this country wants peace and freedom throughout the world. But, he continued, "it is certainly not worthwhile to

troy at home the very freedom we are trying to protect." Taft criticized what he termed the New Deal theory that a higher standard of living can be produced by "government handouts."


