

By REGINALD L. WOOD SAN JOSE, COSTA RICA -(AP)--- Troops and police nipped Thursday a plot to overthrow Costa Rica's government and install former President Rafael Calderon Guardia. The attempted coup began with violence Wednesday night over Sunday's presidential elections. A policeman was killed and several persons were wounded in shooting, which continued into the early

mornings. Gangs raced through the streets. They wore the blue, yellow and red armbands of the Republicano Nacional and the red armbands of the Vanguardia Popular (Communist) Party, both supporters of

Calderon. Calderon trails by 10,000 votes in Sunday's election and has conceded ed fraud.

A government source said the coup was plotted by the Communists, and that the Republicano Nacional was not involved. He said the first step was a vain attempt to seize a barracks. He added it probably failed because the plotters struck too soon.

New Attempt Feared Shots rang out frequently in the capital Thursday morning. Half-tracks loaded with soldiers raced through the streets with sirens screaming. 

Passage Of Housing Bill Is Predicted

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) predicted Thursday Congress will pass a long range housing bill this year.

The Wisconsin lawmaker, vice chairman of the House-Senate Housing Committee, made this forecast after talking with GOP leaders in Congress.

At the same time McCarthy recommended in a report to the joint committee that there be no provision in the program for government operated or owned public housing projects.

"Private enterprise must be our chief reliance," McCarthy declared. He said the goal should be 1,500,. 000 new cwellings a year.





WEST TEXAS' FINEST PRINTING The subject of booty fades the vagueness which covers all the war souvenirs now in American homes—guns, cameras or you name it. Army officers say troops pick up things, but as long as an officer doesn't know about it there is nothing the Army or the government can do.

But the U. S. has traditionally been very strict about "It ain't nice to steal" and "Never kick a fellow when he's down."

In World War I a top American office in Paris received a picture of a German Iron Cross displayed in a Midwest jewelry store window . The Army found the man who had sent t home, an ambulance driver.

He said a German officer had sold it to him. The Army didn't believe the story. The Iron Cross was shipped back, the German found and the cross returned.

Russian Viewpoint The Russians appear to look at the subject differently. Our recent ambassador to Poland, Arthur Bliss Lane, says he saw long lines of horse carts leaving Poland for Russia, loaded with bath tubs, washing machines, mattresses and what have you. Much of it, he says, was taken from Polish homes. And Poland was an ally, not an enemy.

Army officers have to make some quick and often humorous, decisions to look the other way. In the final shove for Berlin in

1945 the men marched east loaded down with battle gear. An officer spotted one American youngster bent nearly double under

his gear. He carried his rifle in his right hand. From his left dangled a fancy bird cage. It was not legal booty, but the

officer just grinned. He figured the youngster would soon learn that a bird cage is no help in battle. Booty Vs. Trophy

Booty is always public property It becomes the property of the victor government, but there is a point at which booty can legally become the property of individual soldiers. Then it is called "war trophy."

In Northern Italy our Army found a huge store of little squirrel coats which the Germans wore under Winter battle dress. These were parcelled out to GIs to keep. They became trophies.

Also in Northern Italy the American Army found a cache of 800,000 liters (a liter is about a quart) of very good cognac. That was parcelled out to GIs too, and after they'd drunk it, is definitely became "personal property."

Mississippi Leaders Meet Thursday To Map Plans For 'Revolt'

JACKSON, MISS. -(P)- Mississippi Democrats will hold their first meeting Thursday to map their strategy against the Administration's civil rights program.

Announcement by Gov. Laney of Arkansas that five members of the Southern Governor's Conference would attempt to iron out the differences with the Democratic high command did not cause a change in plans.

Gov. Fielding L. Wright, whose inaugural address attack on "anti-Southern" legislation touched off the revolt, said Wednesday Laney's plan was encouraging. But it will not, he added, delay or cancel a scheduled Dixie-wide meeting in Jackson sometime next month.

Wright indicated he would ask the Mississippi Democrats Thursday to agree to withhold their electoral votes from the Democratio Party unless they received assurances such legislation would be dropped by party leaders.

During recent years we have become increasingly conscious of the importance of conserving our land resources. Accordingly, we have initiated conservation programs and practices which are sound and logical. Such action was and is urgently needed, not alone for the current generation, but as an obligation to generations yet unborn. As one result of the programs adopted, much land (which because of its character and slope was being destroyed by erosion) has been turned back to grass. Thus, expanding livestock production has become an increasingly important part of the program of conserving our natural resources.

Continual sale of crops off a farm or ranch results in serious loss of plant food. But the maintenance of plant food elements in the soil is urgently needed if our crop land is to continue to provide adequate quantities of human food. Livestock farming is helping accomplish this. For when land is used for grazing, rather than for crops, soil erosion ceases and the unnecessary loss of plant foods is checked.

Today, one out of every 20 Americans is a victim of heart diseases, high blood pressure, or hardening of the arteries. In 1945, the last year for which figures are available, diseases of the heart and blood vessels killed 588,000 persons in U. S., more than cancer, accidents, nephritis, pneumonia and tuberculosisthe next great killers—combined. Asking Public Support

Yet until a few years ago research funds available for heart studies amounted to less than 25 cents per death from heart trouble. Even last year, including U. S. Public Health Department appropriations and contributions of \$600,000 by the Life Insurance Medical Research Fund, the total available for study amounted to \$4.52 per death, less than 25 cents per person suffering from diseases of either the heart or

blood vessels. This year, for the first time in its history, the American Heart Association, with headquarters in New York, is asking public contributions to support heart research and its allied activities.

It hopes to raise \$828,000 of which \$500,000 will be spent on research, and another \$125,000 on educational work among doctors and laymen. The balance will go towards helping communities to develop local heart associations, establishing standards of care for cardiovascular patients and other service work. The fund-raising campaign will be climaxed on February 14, at the

close of National Heart Week. Service organizations such as the American Legion, the Kiwanis, Lions and Rotary Clubs, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce are actively supporting the drive for funds. Druggist groups have agreed to set up plastic heart-shaped contribution boxes in their stores. Work Will Continue

But the work will go on just as intently after the drive is finished. Eventually, says Dr. Charles A. R. Connor, medical director of the American Heart Association, the association hopes to have local affiliates in every major area in the country. Already 23 local heart associations are working as "task forces" for the national group,

Local heart associations, Dr. Connor says, back research programs of their own when possible, and plan community care and treatment of heart diseases. Where local heart associations already have been established, funds collected this year will go towards furthering their work and supporting the national pro-

The association's drive is only a small beginning to an enormous problem. But, it hopes, education and research soon will make it unnecessary to brush off the staggering tolls of heart and blood diseases with "nothing can be done about it."



Colonel Smith remembers Hamlin as a democratic man, and C. S. Seavey, who once worked for the family, described them as "common people." One of Hamlin's big interests after his retirement was bee-keeping, and Seavey still remembers the day a bee stung the statesman in the eye.

Hamlin grew up in the backwoods round Paris, attended cademy, managed his father's farm for a time and rana weekly newspaper in Paris before studying law.

He was admitted to the bar in 1833 and turned his attention to politics as an anti-slavery Demo-crat. In the Maine legislature he served as presiding officer from 1836 until 1840, and in 1843 went to Washington as a member of Congress. In 1848 he moved up to the U.S. Senate.

Against Slavery Hamlin took a prominent stand in Congress against extension of slavery. When the Wilmot Proviso, prohibiting slavery in any of the territory gained from Mexico after the Mexican war, was scheduled for introduction in Congress Wilmot was detained at the White House. Hamlin heard of it and at the last moment introduced the Proviso as an amendment to a bill granting Mexico \$2,000,000. It

passed 115-106. When the Democrats endorsed the Kansas-Nebraska bill, he withdrew from the party and joined the newly-organized Republicans. He resigned from the Senate to run for Governor of Maine on the Republican ticket, won, and took office January 8, 1857, only to resign a month later to return to the Senate where he could carry on his anti-slavery fight. In 1861 he resigned from the Senate after his election as vice president under

The GOP convention of 1864 failed to renominate him or he might have become president. Instead he became collector of the Port of Boston from 1865 to 1886. in 1869 he returned to the Senate, remaining until 1881 when he resigned to become minister to Spain. Three years later he retired after a career in public life lasting nearly 50 years. From then until his death he

lived quietly, taking little interest in public affairs. He spent much of his time at the Tarratine Club here, which he founded. He died at the club July 4, 1891, during a game of cards with old friends. None of Hamlin's descendants live in Bangor today. A great-grandson, Dr. Hannibal Hamlin, is a Boston surgeon, and another

member of his family, Miss Louise

Hamlin, lives at Belfast, Me. Bangor has grown past his old farm and it is now part of the city. The house is used by the Bangor Theological Seminary. There is a historical marker on a tree near it to identify it for the curious. A statue stands in a city mall and there is a school named after him. Each year school children compete for the Hannibal Hamlin essay award. But there is little else to remind the nation of Lincoln's forgotten vice president.

As we honor Lincoln's memory, perhaps we ought to compare the problems he faced with those we face today. Lincoln overcame jealousy, suspicion, hate and greed to emerge from the struggle with the beginnings of a truly unified United States. The "cold war" of today is inspired by the same emotions—jealousy, suspicion, hate, greed. Are they any more insurmountable today than they were in 1865? Probably not—human nature changes very little over the years. What our great-grandfathers did, we can do.

But our world today desperately needs someone, or something, to hold it together. It needs an Abraham Lincoln, willing to devote its entire efforts to the purpose of unity. If there is still logic and common sense and decency left in man, there is still hope. We think that Lincoln would be the first to say that man is basically decent, logical and sensible. All that he needs is a little inspiration from someone such as Abraham Lincoln.

Labor's **Politics** Hit Snag

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Organized labor's drive to swing the 1948 elections ran into double trouble Thurs-

The two big complications seem-1. The possible chilling effect of a grand jury indictment on union

2. Divided political loyalty within the ranks of both AFL and CIO. The indictment cited the CIO and its president, Philip Murray, under the section of the Taft-Hartley Act which bans use of union money for political purposes.

A CIO strategist said privately the indictment is bound to discourage unions from campaign spend-

Unions Can't Agree
Both the AFL and CIO have as their aim the defeat of congressmen who voted for the Taft-Hartley Act. But both are finding it hard to make their members stay hitched to a single line of political action.

Top AFL officials failed, at their recent executive council meeting at Miami, to agree on a league director. There is more turmoil about this than appears on the surface.

Bill Hutcheson, head of the AFL carpenters and lifelong Republican, has declined to go along with the others. There are reports that Dan Tobin, one of the staunchest Democrast among the AFL leaders, may make his own separate political

As for the CIO, a group of its unions representing about 1,250,000 of the CIO's claimed 6,000,000 members have indicated they may support Henry Wallace's third party. Murray and the rest of the CIO have come out against a third party this year.

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Thirteen men will soon visit the Philadelphia Mint, pick up an assortment of coins at random, then weigh and assay them.

That's an old and annual practice, to make sure that the hard money you carry in your pocket is sound. The assayers are paid only their traveling and other expenses for a couple of days work. They're appointed by the President.

One of those the Treasury Department recommended to Truman for appointment is a Texan, U. S. Naval Capt. Oscar Henry Dodson. Senator Tom Connally appointed Dodson to the Naval Academy 20 years ago from Central, Texas. As a hobby, Captain Dodson has studied the "science of munismatics" and specialized in the collection of coinage of the United States, ancient Greece, Rome and China.
