

Right, But Still 'Wrong'

There is nothing new in the Soviet government's efforts to remove all western influence from Russian minds. Every so often we read that an author, playwright, composer or other artists has been reprimanded—or worse for succumbing to "bourgeois" influences.

But now these efforts have been extended into a less familiar field, and one that concerns the western nations more closely. According to Will Lissner, a New York Times reporter, the Soviet Union's ace economist is now in the doghouse. The reasons are interesting, but not very encouraging.

The economist is Dr. Eugen Varga, a Hungarianborn Marxist who has lived in Russia since 1920. He was Premier Stalin's personal economic adviser during the war. Before that he had been the Communist International's economic expert. The account of his fall from grace was found in official Soviet publications which recently came into Lissner's possession.

Dr. Varga's principal sin, it seems, was his conclusion that a crisis was not imminent in capitalist countries; that there was no economic reason for a struggle between Russian communism and western capitalism, and that Russia's economic development depended more on the western nations than on the new satellite states.

The economist arrived at these conclusions after a long study of capitalist economics and their postwar outlook. He was assigned this task by the Russian Communist Party. His study and similar ones by western economists seem to have been the basis for the Soviet-American discussion of reconstruction loans to Russia, before relations between the two governments reached their present unhappy state.

The disquieting thing is that Dr. Varga has lost his high post in the Soviet Academy of Sciences for saying the Robert N. Denham admits that the employment is so irregular. old contracts come up for renewal. Results of the 664 elections held up to January 1 show 660 for the union shop, only four against. The vote was 95 per cent for the union shop, with 85 per cent of 100,000 eligible workers voting. Sixty per cent of these elections were in plants employing less than 100 workers. The big union shop election tests will come in coal, steel and the other industrial unions, and in the construction industry.







As soon as the dummy went down Mrs. Cunningham realized the spade suit was the danger point. If East held the king of diamonds, and West had the ace of spades, how could she prevent East from shifting to a spade? On trick one she played the deuce of hearts from dummy and West put on the jack.

Now just a minute-would you play the queen of hearts from the North hand? If so, you would not make the contract because when you went over to dummy with club and took the diamond finesse East would win and he would not lead into your ace-ten of hearts.
