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## Finland Bows To Russian Demand

### Two-Nation Talks Slated For Moscow

HELSINKI—(AP)—Finland's cabinet decided Monday to begin negotiations with Soviet Russia, a member of the government reported.

Finland is suggesting that the talks be held in Moscow. No decision was announced on the makeup of the delegation that will go to the Russian capital to carry on negotiations for the treaty of cooperation sought by Prime Minister Stalin.

The cabinet member who made available this information said he could not disclose whether Finland is advising Stalin she is ready to negotiate toward a military pact as well as a friendship agreement.

This reserve likely was due to the desire not to reveal the contents of President Juho Paasikivi's letter to Stalin before the Russian leader receives it.

Finland's fateful decision came after the cabinet met for an hour and a half Monday.

At Mercy of Soviet Russia has been pretty well at Russia's mercy since losing two wars to the Soviet Union since 1939. Peace terms required her to pay \$300,000,000 reparations, lease the Hangö Peninsula in Southwest Finland as a naval base, and cede to Russia the Karelian Isthmus, the Petsamo area and lands along the Eastern border.

When Prime Minister Stalin suggested the talks in a letter to Paasikivi dated February 22 and delivered July 14 days ago, he said Russia would agree to meet either in Helsinki or Moscow.

Stalin's proposal for a mutual assistance pact like those Russia now has with Hungary and Romania has caused much concern. Most Finns oppose any far-reaching military alliance with the U. S. S. R.

Oppose Military Pact The Popular Front, including Communists and Radical Socialists, was the only bloc to support a full military alignment. They have 31 of the 200 parliamentary seats.

Opposed to any kind of military alliance are the Social Democrats, 48 seats; Agrarians, 48 seats; Conservatives, 29 seats; Liberals, nine seats; and the Swedish People's Party, 15 seats.

Any treaty that is concluded must be ratified by Parliament. Sunday, strong-arm men broke up a mass meeting protesting the proposed treaty.

Armed Robbers Take \$20,000 In El Paso

EL PASO—(AP)—Four armed men who robbed the Valley Country Club Sunday escaped with an estimated \$20,000.

The private night club, located about five miles from here across the border in New Mexico, is not open on Sunday and only two employees were present when the gunmen entered.

The men tied up the two employees, then broke open two safes to obtain the money. A third employee, who entered the club while the robbery was taking place also was tied up.

American Soldier Shot By Russians

VIENNA, AUSTRIA—(AP)—U. S. Army authorities said an American soldier was shot in the back Sunday night after refusing to obey a Russian order to get off the sidewalk and into the gutter in front of a Russian headquarters hotel in the International District of Vienna.

City Starts Sewer Fixture Survey In Residential Areas

City employees Monday morning started a house-to-house canvass to determine the number of sewer connection fixtures in each residence in Midland. Henry Nunn, superintendent of the water and sewer departments, announced. The survey is in connection with the recently adopted ordinance providing for a revision of sewer charges here. Nunn said it will take 10 days or two weeks to complete the canvass.

### Mrs. Muldrow To Plead Self-Defense

Mrs. Mahotah Muldrow, 40, will plead self-defense at her district court trial on a murder indictment in connection with the fatal shooting last September 7 of her estranged husband, Robert Muldrow III, head of a Midland aerial photography firm.

The case went to trial in District Judge Cecil Collings' court Monday morning and three jurors had been selected when court recessed for luncheon.

The three jurors are B. R. Matthews, drilling company employee; James D. Sadler, oil company employee; and Ish McKnight, independent oil operator.

Eleven veniremen were examined at noon Monday. Selection of jurors will continue Monday afternoon.

Announcement Defense Plan Foreman, defense attorney from Houston, questioned prospective jurors closely on their thoughts of the state's law on self-defense. The Midland law firm of Klapproth and Hamilton also represents the defendant.

District Attorney Martelle McDonald and County Attorney Joe Mims are being assisted by T. D. Kimbrough, a special prosecutor employed to aid the state.

Foreman said Mrs. Muldrow will plead self-defense. During the examination of veniremen no mention was made of a death penalty.

Each state and defense announced ready for trial when Judge Collings called the case. One hundred and eighty veniremen had been summoned and practically all were present in the courtroom.

To Admit Shooting Foreman told the court the defense will admit the shooting and the primary issue will be self-defense.

Muldrow was shot and wounded fatally on the lawn of his home, 1001 North D Street about 9:56 p.m. last September 7. A few minutes later Mrs. Muldrow arrived at police headquarters and surrendered.

"I just shot Robert," she declared.

An automatic pistol was in her automobile.

Trial of Armo Spears on an indictment charging murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Robert L. Wallace here last October 12 was set for 10 a. m. Thursday in 70th District Court by Judge Collings.

Western Union Pact May Be Signed This Week, Reports Say

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM—(AP)—First articles of a pact intended to bind five Western European nations in a union to resist the further spread of Communism were drafted here Monday.

The conferees, representing Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg, referred the drafts to an editorial committee for polishing before Tuesday's session.

Reports circulated that the pact may be ready for signing this week. The pact would be signed by French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin were ready to come here at any time to sign.

### Confessed Bank Robber Maintains Wife Innocent

CLEVELAND—(AP)—David F. Almeida, confessed robber of a New Orleans bank, maintained Monday his pretty, 31-year-old wife had no connection with the \$114,000 holdup of the Hibernal National Bank.

The 33-year-old ex-convict, who confessed to Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents Sunday he was one of five men who robbed the bank, insisted his wife was asleep while the New Orleans robbery was planned and carried out.

Almeida said he told his wife the \$23,400 he received as his share of the loot was the result of a "milling" he made in a New Orleans gambling house.

D. K. Brown, special agent in charge of the Cleveland FBI office, said Mrs. Almeida was believed to have helped plan the holdup, obtained paper bags into which the cash was scooped by the gang and assisted in dividing the loot.

Wanted For Murder Two Philadelphia detectives also were here with warrants charging Almeida with first-degree murder in the killing of Patrolman Cecil Ingling, 42, in a super-market holdup there Jan. 30, 1947. Mrs. Almeida is charged with being an accessory after the fact.

The Almeidas were arrested by FBI agents in a downtown apartment room Saturday afternoon. Brown said \$20,000 of the loot recovered in paper bags in suitcases.

Four of the five men who participated in the robbery already have been sentenced to jail terms ranging from 20 to 35 years.

### Congress Hopes To Complete ERP Before April 10

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall personally urged Speaker Martin Monday to expedite House action on European aid.

Accompanied by Undersecretary Lovett and Lewis Douglas, U. S. ambassador to Great Britain, the secretary visited Martin in the speaker's office.

Later, Martin said he told Marshall he believes the House will be able to act by April 10 or soon after.

While the subject of including military and other aid to China was discussed, Martin said, the main purpose of the meeting was to consider a time table for the European Recovery Plan.

The Senate turned Monday to its second week of Marshall Plan debate with a promise to "get some voting started."

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the acting Republican floor leader, added, however, that he isn't too sure of a quick final vote on the \$5,300,000,000 European Recovery Program itself.

### New Palestine Peace Effort Slated Monday

NEW YORK—(AP)—The United States prepared to press for a new Palestine conciliation effort Monday as the big powers tackled the Holy Land crisis.

The exact nature of the U. S. plan was not disclosed. A member of the American delegation said, however, that the consultations were confined to "peaceful measures" of settlement.

Representatives of the United States, Russia, France and China met in Russia's new Park Avenue offices.

Britain refused to take part in the consultations.

### Grains Slump Again

CHICAGO—(AP)—Sharp losses were recorded in grains on the Board of Trade Monday. Discouraged holders threw wheat and corn on the market and found limited buying support.

May wheat plunged 10 cents, the daily limit, and May corn eight cents, the daily limit for that cereal. All soybeans were off their daily limit of eight cents in the usual thin market for this commodity. Deferred deliveries showed more resistance to the drop.

Pit observers said the selling in wheat appeared to be based on the fact that news mills had offered huge quantities of flour to the government, which last week asked for offers on flour equal to 9,300,000 bushels of wheat. The government is expected to wire acceptance after the close.

Corn declined in sympathy with wheat and also because of a slackening in demand for the cash grain traders said.

Shortly before noon wheat was \$1 1/2 to 10 cents under Saturday's finish, May \$2.33 1/4; corn was down 5 1/8-7 1/4, May \$2.17; oats were off 1 3/4 to 3 cents, May \$1.11 3/4, and soybeans were off eight cents, May \$3.42.

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### New Device Gives Altitude Warning

Two pilots examine the cigar-like forward antenna, arrow, of a new radar altimeter and warning device being installed on Pan American-World Airways Clippers. **OHIO IS RUNNING CASING AT NE GARZA WILDCAT**

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1 Swenson Land & Cattle Company, Northeast Garza County wildcat, 2,307 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 26, block 2, H&GN survey, was reported to be bottomed at 1,264 feet in an unidentified line, and to be running 5 1/2-inch casing.

No further information on this project has been released by the operator. Some observers think the zone at the bottom is Eilenburger.

There is no verification of rumors that this development has shown some signs of oil. However, the fact that pipe is being run indicates that some sort of tests are planned for the near future.

**LINE TOP CALLED AT DEEP EXPLORATION IN E-C UPTON**

Oil Carriers, Inc., No. 1 May Pray-State of Texas, East-Central Upton County wildcat, 3.15 miles northwest of the discovery well of the Benedum field, and located 860 feet from south and east lines of the west 120 acres in the south half of section 38, block Y, TCRS survey, had reached 4,590 feet in line and was making more hole.

Some geologists picked the top of the line in this venture to be at 3,750 feet. Elevation is 2,703 feet. According to some correlations that puts the project 126 feet low on that mark to the same point in the Slick-Urschel Oil Company and Plymouth Oil Company No. 1 Alford, discovery of the Benedum field.

The Oil Carriers, Inc., project was started to go to about 12,000 feet, if necessary—to test into the Eilenburger.

Golf rules have been revised again.

One new rule states that the club grip "may not have a channel or furrow for the fingers, or be molded to the fingers." This change takes effect next January 1.

From now on unfair delay in play becomes against the rules instead of merely a breach of etiquette. Penalty is disqualification.

Two chief changes relate to artificial obstructions. If an obstruction touches the ball or interferes with a player's swing, the ball now may be dropped with two club-lengths of the point of the obstruction nearest where it originally lay. This means a free ball and a clear swing, but not necessarily a clear shot.

Artificial obstructions in hazards, the rule now provides relief without penalty for all except bridges and abutments.

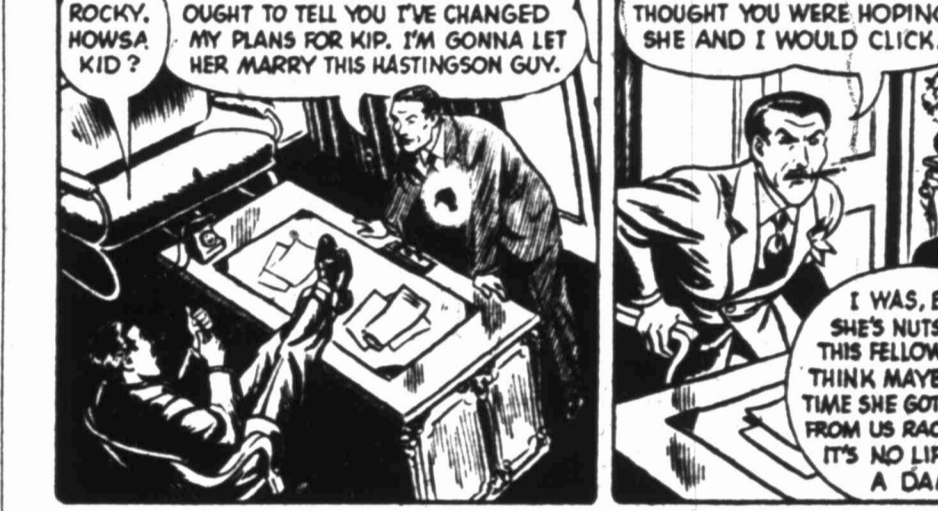

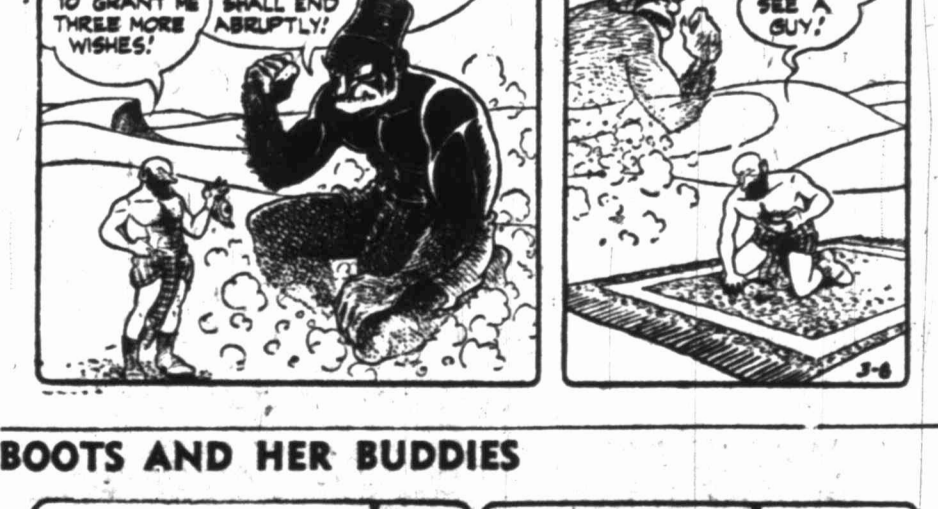
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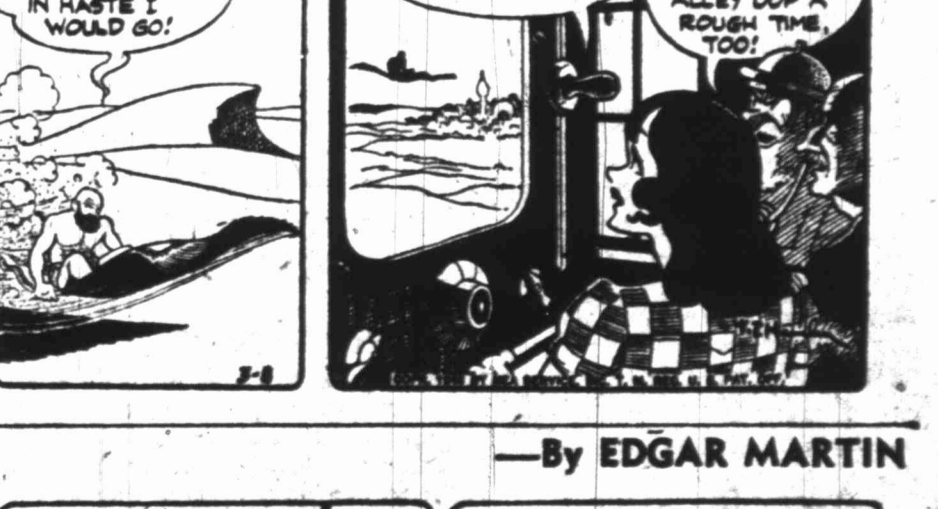
