Missing Airliner Is Sighted From Air

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA—(AP)—A search plane reported Saturday that it had sighted a smashed Shanghaito-St. Paul airliner, which vanished Friday night with 30 persons aboard, on an Alaska mountainside. There was no sign of life at the scene.

The Army Public Relations Office said a searching party aboard a C-47 spotted a Northwest Airlines insignia in the wreckage at the 8,500-foot level of Mount Sanford, a 16,208-foot peak 200 miles northeast of Anchorage.

Lewis Circulars Fan Threats Of New Coal Strike

PITTSBURGH - (P) - John L. Lewis' fight for miners pensions gathered new steam Saturday with the United Mine Workers chieftain putting the issue before the rank

Lewis sent circulars to union local officers of some 400,000 bituminous miners in 28 states, telling the diggers that operators had "dishonored" the current contract by not agreeing to pay pensions to miners. He asked locals to hold meetings to determine their reaction to his stand.

John P. Busarello, president of UMW District Five in Western Pennsylvania, said locals received the circulars Saturday and that many of them would hold sessions immediately. Demands \$100 Pensions

Lewis had demanded that \$100 monthly pensions be granted miners 60 years of age or more who have 20 years' service in the pits. Although the current UMW contract does not expire until June 30, either side can terminate it on 30 days notice. No such notice has been given the operators.

One expression of miners' reaction came from Charleston, W. Va., where President William Blizzard of UMW District 17 said a delegation of miners came to his office to declare "something has to be done about our pension plan or we'll quit







Simultaneously with the government's announcement to turn commodity purchaser again, the nation's commodity markets showed definite signs of leveling off, and possibly heading up again. For six weeks, beginning January 13, the food markets dropped sharply. As March came in like a bull, they started up again. Some commodities have regained 50 per cent of their losses. The government's announcement that it would buy flour helped increase the bullish tendencies. The charts trace price fluctuations since 1929 for seven important commodities. Figures are from the Department of Commerce Statistical Abstract and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.







Maryland City Still Pays Off Civil War 'Ransom'

FREDERICK, MD. -(P)- Residents of this city still have three years to pay off their war debt. The Civil War, that is.

The debt was only \$200,000, but will have taken 87 years to clear. Which ought to give pause to anyone trying to figure out when books of the last war with a seemingly endless row of ciphers are to be balanced

Frederick incurred its debt in 1864 to save the city from being burned by Confederate troops. The money was demanded by Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early after he chased a few Union troops out of town. Five banks put up the money and

the city agreed to repay them. They've been paying eyer since, although exactly how much is obscured by past financial juggling. While it tried unsuccessfully to have the federal government assume responsibility, the city went

on making payments through bonds. 'Sinking Fund Issues' Originally, the money was to be repaid through sinking fund issues. This required the city to set aside a certain amount and to pay the

banks at future maturity dates. Frederick found it difficult to hold on to the earmarked money, and subsequently issued the banks serial bonds which would come due every year.

Then in 1917 the city had a financial housecleaning. It lumped a lot of its debts together and included them in a new batch of bonds. A portion of the Civil War debt remaining was included.

How much it was no one knows now. City register A. A. Nicodemus guesses between \$40,000 and \$60,000. He also estimates the city has paid \$300,000 in interest-\$100,000 more than the original debt.

At any rate, the whole 1917 issue will be paid off in 1951, when the Civil War will end for Frederick.


LAKE SUCCESS - (AP) - The Prague government Saturday fired Dr. Jan Papanek as Czechoslovak delegate to the United Nations, but Papenek defied the Communistdominated regime he has bitterly

Ending a three-day official silence, the Prague authorities sent through their Washington office to the U. N. a curt telegram saying Papanek had ceased to be the permanent delegate on the Czechoslovak Republic on March 10.

That was the day Papanek attacked the Communist government in Prague, accused Russia of aiding the Communists to gain control, and demanded that the U. N. Security Council investigate the coup.

Papanek acted without informing Prague what he planned to do. As soon as the U. N. received the dismissal notice, Papanek told a reporter by telephone that "I am going on in my position." He said he would bow only to a written recall signed personally by President



Jan Masaryk's Testament To America: Get Tough, And Keep Russia In Line

"Look, you fellows are just about beginning to realize your own strength. America is a giant, and Russia respects giants. If I were an American, I'd go all out for a tough policy toward Russia. That's the only way for you to keep her in line: get tough.'

The speaker was Jan Garrigue Masaryk, Czech foreign ministerson of the founder of the Czech republic, Thomas G. Masaryk, and Charlotte Garrigue of Brooklyn,

The scene was his apartment in Czernin Palace, from which he hurtled to his death from a secondstory window on Wednesday

Speaking frankly because his remarks, so long as he lived, were offthe-record, Jan gave me what amounted to his political testament role in international affairs. interview took place June 20, 1946, long before most Americans were talking about a tough policy toward Russia. His words today are a warning from the grave. 'Can't Get Tough'

"We Czechoslovaks," he said. "aren't in the giant league. We can't get tough. All we can hope is that the Russians will know we can do them more good as their friends than as their puppets. (President Eduard) Benes and I are going to have our hands full with the local comrades. It'll be a hard fight all We've got maybe a 50-50

Two weeks ago, when the Communists grabbed Czechoslovakia, Jan Masaryk lost his bet. Early Wednesday morning, Masaryk lost his life. His tragic passing cancels the pledge of secrecy and "releases for publication" these notes of a

I had just arrived in Prague from a year and a half of reporting in Eastern Europe when Jan talked with me. During all that time I had been watching the Communists and the Red Army operating in totalitarian style over half a "liberated" continent.

As soon as he could see me, visited the foreign minister. I had known him well since the wartime years. Most of us correspondents called him Jan, because that was the kind of man he was- The Czechoslovak people's pet name for him was Honza-Little Jan. He was tall and sturdy, but for them he was always old Thomas Masaryk's boy, and they loved him. Listened Hard

TROY, N. Y.—After fighting 100 years for women's rights, leading day night. feminists smile when asked if man still is boss of the world.

York City, United States delegate to the United Nations conference on food and agriculture at Hot Springs, Va., in 1943, and chairman of the foreign policy committee of the Greater New York League of Women Voters, said women exercised great interest in national and international affairs.

"The four walls of a home can not/corral a woman today. When a woman rears a son, gives him to the world as a fighting man and learns that his body has been washed up on a beach of an Okinawa, she develops intense interest in international life," Miss Schain continued.

The women could have pointed to a census bureau report for proof that men were no longer corralling women within the four walls of a home. Twenty out of 100 married women living with husbands worked or were looking for jobs last April, compared with 15 out of 100 in April, 1940, the

bureau reported. Mrs. Woodhouse told the Troy conference that "women have a bad habit of living longer than She considered this proof that women had to step into public life whether they wanted to or not. "It is a matter of self preservation," she noted.

C Of C To The Rescue

The decision of the Chamber of Commerce to take the lead in an all-out effort to bring additional water into Midland to prevent an anticipated water shortage this Summer was greeted with enthusiasm by citizens. Directors of the organization are to be commended for their interest and action.

Steps now are being taken by a Chamber of Commerce committee to obtain sufficient pipe from oil companies to lay a temporary line to the Wadley tract north of the city to meet increased water needs during the Summer months and until the city can obtain water pipe for a permanent installation.

City officials said the temporary line can and will be laid in quick order if pipe is obtained. Steps already are underway to purchase and install tanks and pumps at the new water source. It is planned to use water from two of the wells at the Wadley acreage. Officials estimate the line will bring from 750,000 to 1,000,000 gallons of new water into the system which last Summer provided around 4,000,000 gallons on peak days. The demand this year will be much heavier due to increased population and to hundreds of additional lawns at new homes.

The Chamber of Commerce became interested when it was evident the city government could not complete the water expansion program, for which bonds were voted last year, before or during the Summer months. The situation looked even more acute than last year when a voluntary water rationing program was in effect during the Summer Ohio Republican presidential candidate's high, intellectual tion, signed by Secretary of the months. 



Texans complain less about bridge tolls than residents of any other state, Charles P. Harwood, toll collector of the great Mississippi River bridge at Vicksburg, Miss., says.

"This is probably because Texans aren't used to toll bridges, "The worst state for complainers

We charge \$1.25 per car and driver and 15 cents for each additional passenger and Californians are always letting me know that they can cross the Oakland Bay bridge for two bits.

"I have a standard reply to that. 'If we had the bay bridge's traffic I say, 'we could make big money at a nickle a car'."

London Citizenry Is Close To Ideal Set By Planners

LONDON -(P)- Wartime shifts have brought London near the "planners' dream," the population figures which government surveys have fixed as the ideal.

The number of people in inner London is almost exactly at the figure to which planners said it would have to be reduced, but the country zone could still take another 360,000 people.

The in-between suburban zone, however, still has over 500,000 more inhabitants than the planners would

London transport experts, as the result of an inquiry so that the future traffic development can be shaped to fit the "new London," say the capital's population has changed more in the last eight years than in any comparable area in Britain.

Drop In 'Inner Core' A big drop in the "inner core" of London, within six miles of the center, since the beginning of the war has brought the population down from 4,013,000 in 1939 to 3,360,000 today.

The outer fringe of London-the

'country area" between 12 and 25 miles out, including semi-rural areas -now has 2.178,000 people compared with 1,886,000 in 1939. The intermediate zone from six to 12 miles from the center has shown little change, increasing only from





'Future Farmers Of America'

Vocational Education Act were first established in the United States in 1917.

Within a few years, a number of local departments of vocational agriculture in most of the states had developed agricultural clubs, of vocational agriculture. Such organizations were, in many instances, largely social and recreational in nature but contained certain educational self-improvement and cooperative features were often in-

As these local vocational agriculture organizations grew in number, the idea of banding together local groups of vocational agriculture students into a larger organization grew in the mind of progressive leaders in the field of vocational agriculture. And so the idea of statewide or- ball, ganizations, with each local group as an active unit, developed.

It is interesting to note that such names as "Junior Farmers," "Young Farmers," and "Future Farmers" appeared in various sections of the country. However, the pioneer effort of the Future Farmers in Virginia attracted the greatest attention nationally due to the excellent ideals, purposes, ceremonies, and definite constitution, formulated by Henry C. Groseclose and his associates.

Accordingly, a temporary constitution, purposes and ceremonies, patterned very closely after that of the Future Farmers of Virginia and other states was drafted by the staff of the Agricultural Education Service of the Federal Board of Vocational Education during the Summer of 1928. The first national convention was held in November of that year and since that time the growth of the Future Farmers of America has been steady and rapid, extending to Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Similar organizations patterned largely after the FFA are now found in several



Income Tax Expert Signs Name With Disappearing Ink

NEWARK, N. J. -(A)- The Internal Revenue office said it is investigating a part-time "income tax expert" who got big refunds for his clients but kept his own signature off their falsified reports by attestting to them with disappearing ink.

Revenue officials said the case was one of eight seasonal "experts" who have set up shop in assorted stores and offices and whose returns are being probed because of a steady stream of large refunds listed for their clients.

The man who used the disappearing ink was described by revenue agents as a barber who was filling out tax forms in between hair cuts. His signature would disappear from the forms shortly after he prepared them, revenue officials said, but chemical treatment of the paper brought out the name and led investigating agents to his shop.

Agents said he had prepared 450 forms at fees from \$5 to \$20 and had written up a total of \$75,000 in refunds. Three hundred and fourteen his clients were interviewed by the Internal Revenue agents.
