Continental Oil Company No. 1-A-13 University, wildcat discovery from the Silurian in Northeast Crockett County, 14 miles southeast of Big Lake and six miles south of the Barnhart field, has shown that it will make a commercial well.

This project, located 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 13, block 47, University survey, pumped 104 barrels of oil in 20 hours from perforated sone at 9,210-9,300 feet, which had been heavily treated with acid. No water was developed on the test.

Operators plans to shortly complete the new well and put it on regular production. It drilled to todepth of 10,232 feet in Ellenburger, which was entered at about 9,394 feet. That zone had some signs of petroleum, but not enough

to make any sort of an oil well. Conoco No. 1-A-12 University, a stepout from the new discovery had spudded and was drilling below 300 feet. It will go to around 500 feet and cement surface casing before digging deeper.

There was a blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 270 feet of drilling mud, and 870 feet of sulphur water. There were no shows of oil or gas.

Operators were running a Schumberger survey and probably will abandon and plug the wildcat in the near future.



Chinese Loans Raise Question

It seems that nothing in government this year can escape the enveloping hand of politics. The matter of aid to China is a case in point. Some members of Congress /who are least enthusiastic about the Marshall Plan, or epenly oppose it, have been pushing aid to China. Their reasons may not be wholly political, but partisan issues clearly enter into the picture.

This is unfortunate, because aid to China is a comblicated problem at best. If we are to restrain communism, then we should try to help restrain it in China, where a full-scale war is going on. It is not clearly estab-Hished that the Soviet government is aiding the Chinese Communists, but Russia would hardly pass up the chance to capitalize on a Communist victory.

So the State Department, after much goading, is asking Congress for \$510,000,000 for China.

It might be well for Congress to re-read a story on this subject that NEA's Washington correspondent, Peter Edson, uncovered from official sources last April. It had to de with \$3,000,000,000 in loans, lend-lease, UNRRA aid, and surplus property bought for a fraction of cost, which China received from this country during the war. Specifically it dealt with a cash loan of \$500,000,000.

The Chinese government got \$200,000,000 of this in gold, which it sold on the open market. Another \$200,-000,000 was used up in an unsuccessful manipulation of currency which did not stabilize Chinese finances or avoid a terrific inflation. Fifty million went to pay for the paper, printing and transportation of bank notes. The remaining \$50,000,000 apparently was used to buy food,

clothing and other tangibles. Obviously, any further aid to China must be carefully supervised. Even China's best friends make no bones of vise the Marshall Plan.
