

#### Fastest Field In History Vies In 500-Mile Race

INDIANAPOLIS - (P) - Four hundred acres of people expected to see the fastest of 32 Memorial Day 500-mile races at Indianapolis Motor Speedway Monday. Time trials leading up to the

race winnowed out the 33 top cars from a record entry list of 80 pow-erful, high-geared racers. They high-geared racers. They were the speediest vehicles modern engineers could produce that would stay on the track.

Nine of the leading drivers from America's dirt tracks and midget saucers were ready to burn the bricks along with 24 speedway veterans. The nine freshmen already had proved themselves adept on the two-and-a-half-mile track by earning starting spots in the fastest field ever brought together. Starters Average 125.163

The 33 cars, ten of them brand new and the others rebuilt from proved racers, had averaged 125.163 miles an hour in qualification runs. That was about three miles an hour faster than any previous starting field. Five cars averaged more than 128 miles an hour for another record.

The standard favorites were Rex Mays, Ted Horn, Bill Holland, Mauri Rose and Duke Nalon. Rose, winner last year and co-winner with Floyd Davis in 1941, was the only starter who ever had received the victor's checked flag. Holland was second last year in his first race after thinking, through a mixup in pit signals. that he had beaten his teammate on the Blue Crown Spark Plug





To reporters who asked him if it were true that he was going to quit his United Nations post, Warren Austin gave this amiable but pointed answer: "If you ask me whether I have resigned, I haven't. If you ask me whether I am going to resign, I am not."

That is as definite a statement as anyone could ask. Yet it is not surprising that rumors to the contrary have been circulating. For Austin's recent diplomatic role has been most difficult and embarrassing.

As America's top man in the United Nations, it was his assignment last year to put through the UN Commission's porposal of partition in Palestine.

Even after our government came out for partition there were a good many reluctant members that had to be brought into line. This was accomplished-and, according to reports, not always on the high plane of polite diplomatic language. At any rate, there is little question that the final partition vote was largely the result of American

#### Sinking Of 'Hot' Ship Brings Hint Of Atom Worries

WASPHINGTON -(P) - Civilian defense experts find in the latest sinking of a radioactively "hot" ship a sobering hint of the prob-lems an atomic war would bring. When the Cruiser Salt Lake City

When people grow older, they be-gin to face health problems entirely different from those which they had when they were young. With increasing years, the tissues in general become more dry. This process, however, is so gradual that it can scarcely be noticed. The ability to repair injury becomes gradually lessened; wounds heal more slowly, broken bones knit with much greater difficulty. There is a slow decrease in energy, the tissues are less elastic and the skin becomes wrinkled and has a different texture in older

The strength and endurance of the muscles and the speed of reaction are also decreased. 


