## Northwest Flood Disaster Spreads

### Mass Evacuations Get Under Way In 120-Mile Section

PORTLAND, ORE.—(P)—Mass evacuations began Tuesday as the flood-swollen Columbia River brought new peril to a 120-mile section at the lower end of the stream. The river, which already had caused the Pacific Northwest's greatest disaster, threatened to flood hundreds of farms and many small cities in the area, nearly all of which is downstream from Portland.

Army engineers ordered the evacuation of the thousands of residents of the 43 drainage districts area, but said many of them already had run for higher ground. The Portland Housing Authority estimated at \$27,000,000 the loss suffered by the war-housing city of Vancouver, which was crumpled Sunday. That was the only flood loss estimate available, although before the Vancouver disaster Army engineers had predicted a loss of \$30,000,000 to farms and houses, and to valuable top soil being swept to sea.

The river, second largest in the nation in amount of water discharged, is at flood stage for 750 miles. The area was reached the Portland area Tuesday night or Wednesday. Downtown Portland flooded. Part of Portland's downtown area, including the Union Station, was under water Tuesday after.

WASHINGTON (P)—President Truman Tuesday ordered "full resources of the federal government" mobilized for aid in the Pacific Northwest flood disaster.

He directed the Army, the Interior Department and housing officials to investigate and make recommendations for "additional legislative authority to meet emergency of this character."

The Willamette River topped the sea-wall. The station is Portland's only railroad depot, and trains were unable to use it.

In North Portland, where more than 15,000 persons were left homeless in Sunday's Vancouver flooding, the flooded area was tripled by the bursting of two more dikes. On top of these two dikes were the approaches to the Pacific Highway, principal north-south route.

The breaking of these dikes left three square miles under water, with houses from Vancouver pouring through both gaps. Some of them turned end-over-end, and all hope of salvaging these was lost.

No bodies have been recovered from Vancouver. Some bodies might (Continued on page 9)

**E-C ROCKLEY WILDCAT HAS PROVEN FOR A DISCOVERY**  
Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1-13 Elwood estate, three and one-half miles north of Sulger, in East-Central Rockley County, has definitely proven for the discovery of a new producing area.

This project is three and one-half miles west of the Sulger field, where there are three small oil wells. There is a dry hole between the Sulger field and the new Honolulu development.

No. 1-13 Elwood had crumbed at the rate of six barrels of oil per hour from open hole at 5,977-5,978 feet after treating with 2,000 gallons and with 4,000 gallons of acid.

The well was set with less than one per cent acid residue and water.

Operator has now perforated the casing, which is set at 5,978 feet, with 120 holes between 5,978-5,988 feet, and has set a packer at 5,988 feet.

The interval is now being studied to test at this time. The section back of the perforations had logged some slight shows of possible production.

The new discovery is 800 feet from north and west lines of section 13, block A, R. M. Thompson survey.

**SEABROOK PROJECT IN CORE APPEARS TO BE AN OIL WELL**  
Seabrook Oil & Gas Company No. 1 H. G. Wendland, Southeast Core County prospector, seven miles southeast of Robert Lee, and about the same distance southwest of Bronte, flowed at total of 254.5 barrels of 47.1 gravity oil in 24 hours, through a 20-foot-long tubing choker, and had no acid water shakedown at the end of the test.

The production is coming from open hole in the top of the Elwood formation at 5,235-5,236 feet. This zone had been treated with 250 gallons and with 1,000 gallons of regular acid. Gas-oil ratio is about 1,000-1.

The flowing tubing pressure maintained about constant at around 275 pounds, during the 24-hour test. Flowing casing pressure was 280 pounds at the start of the period, and was 210 pounds at the end of the 24 hours.

The well is now shut-in until the storage is empty. Sections of two 1,000-barrel tanks have been started at the drill site. The oil which has already been produced is to be trucked to The Atlantic Pipe Line Company station near Bronte, about five miles north of the new field.

**HUMBLE COMPLETES STERLING PROSPECTOR AS A PRODUCER**  
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1-B Elwood estate, in North-Central Sterling County, 16 miles north of Sterling City, flowed 100 feet from north and 1,000 feet from west lines of section 54, block 18, SPRB survey, has been officially completed as a new producer, and is a discovery for a new field from the Elwood.

This exploration made a 95-hour flowing test of 124.4 barrels of 47.4 gravity oil, through an 18 1/4-inch tubing choker, at a general flow rate of 1,750-20,000 gallons per day. Flowing tubing pressure was 50 pounds.

This project drilled into water between 1,200 feet and the total depth at 5,000 feet, but apparent operator has been able to complete a similar test in the lower section. The well will now be put on regular production.

**SAMEDAN HAS PLUGGED SE TERRY WILDCAT**  
Samedan Oil Corporation No. 1 Elwood estate, in Southeast Terry County, two and one-half miles east of the Adair field, and 300 feet from south and 900 feet from east lines of section 2, block C-37, plat survey, ran a drillstem test for one and one-half hours at 4,984-5,000 feet.

There was a slight blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 120 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

The venture drilled on down to 4,920 feet and took a two-hour drillstem test with the packer at 4,920 feet.

There was a good blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 100 feet of salty, sulphur water, and drilling mud; 100 feet of dark sulphur water, and 370 feet of clear sulphur water. There were no shows of oil or gas.

The venture has been plugged and abandoned with 50 sacks of cement.

### Israel Accepts Truce

LAKE SUCCESS (P)—The State of Israel announced Tuesday it had accepted the United Nations' appeal for a Palestine cease-fire.

The spokesman for Israel described the acceptance as unconditional. He said, however, the communication from Tel Aviv contained a Jewish interpretation as to what Israel understood the cease-fire to mean.

The deadline for replies from the Jews and Arabs is 5 p. m. CST, Tuesday. Arab League leaders were meeting at Amman, Trans-Jordan, to decide on their course.

The Israeli spokesman said: "Our acceptance is being communicated to the secretary general of the United Nations as soon as possible. It is unconditional. It does contain our understanding of the terms of the cease-fire."

The cease-fire appeal was voted by the Security Council last Saturday.

The attack came as the Arab allies reported their troops and armor mauling on a 40-mile front in an effort to throw a noose around Tel Aviv, the heart of Israel.

The British announced in Haifa that an RAF field near Amman also was struck. Arab officials in Trans-Jordan said six Arab civilians including two children, were killed. The British put the total dead at 12 and the wounded at 30.

### Negro Charged In Sex Murder, Rape

HOUSTON (P)—A 26-year-old negro Tuesday was charged with a sex murder, with rape and assault to murder of a Houston white woman, and with attempted rape of two other housewives.

The charges against William Wilson, Jr., Houston, were filed before Justice of the Peace Tom Mass. Examining trial is set for June 8.

Homicide Captain George Seber said Wilson made signed statements in connection with the charges.

Wilson, porter at the Southern Pacific passenger station here, is married and the father of five children.

He is charged with the murder of Mrs. Emily Winne, 56, whose mutilated body was found early Sunday in a ditch 100 yards from the trailer home of a 31-year-old woman involved in the rape and assault to murder charge.

The attempted rape charges resulted from cases of last March 4 wherein two Washington Terrace housewives, 49 and 55, reported being attacked in their homes within less than an hour.

### 22 Men Drown In Navy Accident

NORFOLK, VA.—(P)—Twenty-two men—nine Marines and 13 Navy men—perished in Hampton Roads Monday night when a Navy launch swamped in choppy waters while returning 90 men to their ship after Memorial Day liberty.

The 30-foot open launch was swamped in a wind and rain storm as it was returning a liberty party to the Kearsarge, anchored two miles off the Norfolk Naval Station. The launch, which was swamped when only 200 yards off the Kearsarge port beam.

WASHINGTON (P)—Bessie Borgia told senators Tuesday that at least half a dozen NBC officials were thoroughly familiar with the "Voice of America" broadcasts which have aroused a storm in Congress.

Borgia, who wrote scripts for many of the broadcasts, said "it is not true" that they "slipped through" without knowledge of National Broadcasting Company officials.

On the contrary, he said, he objected often to putting in "cheap comedy" but was ordered to write them as he did.

Borgia testified at joint hearings by subcommittees of the Senate Foreign Relations and Expenditures committees.

### U. S. Seeks Red Reply On Trieste

WASHINGTON (P)—The United States prodded Russia a third time Tuesday for a new reply to the American-British-French proposal to return the free territory of Trieste to Italy.

The State Department said in a note delivered to the Russian Embassy that the problem requires a "very early resolution."

State Department Press Officer Michael McDermott told reporters he understood the British and French governments are sending similar notes to the Soviet government.

Russia never has rejected the principle of returning Trieste to Italy. But it has objected to amending the Italian Peace Treaty as suggested by the three Western powers.

The American note sent to Ambassador Alexander S. Foy Kohler just as he was preparing to leave for consultations in Moscow on the lend-lease question said:

"It is hoped that the Soviet government will communicate its views at an early date concerning the procedure to be followed for the joint consideration of the (Trieste) matter by the powers concerned."

### Sale Of Horse Meat Reported In Houston

HOUSTON (P)—The Houston Chronicle said the Harris County grand jury is conducting an investigation of sales of horse meat for public consumption and that "sensational" developments are expected.

"It was understood health department officials had turned over to the grand jury a written report that a fourth of a pound of meat, picked up in public schools, had been tested by Dr. Harold Wood of the State Health Department and had been positively identified as horse meat," the newspaper said.

### Mundt-Nixon Bill Foes Threaten Capitol Protest

WASHINGTON (P)—Belligerent opponents of the Mundt-Nixon and Communist bill threatened Tuesday to hold a protest demonstration at the capitol Wednesday.

Joseph P. Kamp, executive secretary of the Committee for Democratic Rights, said "thousands of people" will be on hand to demand a hearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

### Presbyterians Debate Five-Year Delay In North-South Union

ATLANTA—(AP)—A five-year delay in a move to unite with the Northern Presbyterian Church was proposed Tuesday as the 86th General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian Church began debate on the question.

Dr. L. Nelson Bell of Montreal, N. C., suggested the delay. He said agitation for union now was regarding the Southern church program of progress and other programs.

Dr. D. L. Stitt, president of the Austin Theological Seminary at Austin, Texas, offered an amendment to Bell's proposal. His amendment called for completing the present plan of union by January 1, 1949, and keeping it on file for action when the assembly sees fit to call the matter up again.

The Southern Presbyterian Church voted to remain in the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, after airing charges that the council favors non-segregation, has Socialistic leanings and is doctrinally unsound.

The General Assembly turned down requests to withdraw from the council by a vote of 574 to 108. Two hours of debate preceded the vote late Monday.

### Red Coup In Czechoslovakia Should Give Others Warning, Says Columnist

The democracy of Czechoslovakia was wiped out in last Sunday's Communist-controlled election—a terrible warning to other countries which temporize with the Red.

This represented the final step in the Bolshevik conquest of the 30-year-old republic which now becomes to all intents a part of the Moscow empire. Formal "admission" of Czechoslovakia into the Soviet Union may or may not follow in due course, but that makes small difference. The little nation is now under the Russian totalitarian dictatorship.

There was only one ticket of hand-picked national front candidates, so that the outcome was out and dried. The sole way opposition could be shown was by casting blank ballots under scrutiny of Red watchers—a dangerous defiance.

Perfect Example

Despite the fact 770,701 citizens are said by the ministry of the interior to have cast these ballots. Here we have a perfect example of the way Communism proceeds in the conquest of a nation. The Reds first began with specious overtures of comradeship for their Slavic brothers. They was infiltration of Communist agents into Czechoslovakia, the unostentatious creation of a Communist Party which gave lip service to the Democratic government.

If the Prague government was uneasy, there was small sign of it. The relations between Czechoslovakia and Russia appeared to be grand. There was no Czechoslovakian FBI announcing subversive Red activities.

There was no Attorney General Tuesday morning that the Prague government's authority to dismiss employees having Communist connections was established clearly in law and by Supreme Court rulings.

There were no witnesses flatly defying a congressional committee and refusing to disclose whether they are Communists.

There was no House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., to declare, as he did Monday in a speech at Gettysburg:

"It is a strange paradox that when we seek to curb their seditious activities, the subversionists seek refuge under the protection of the same constitution and the same bill of rights they are attempting to destroy."

The Communists and fellow travelers in Czechoslovakia found a friendly atmosphere at that time. Then the Communists staged a strong-arm coup. Now we have the climax in the rigged national election.

That surely is writing on the wall for all democracies which are smart enough to read it.

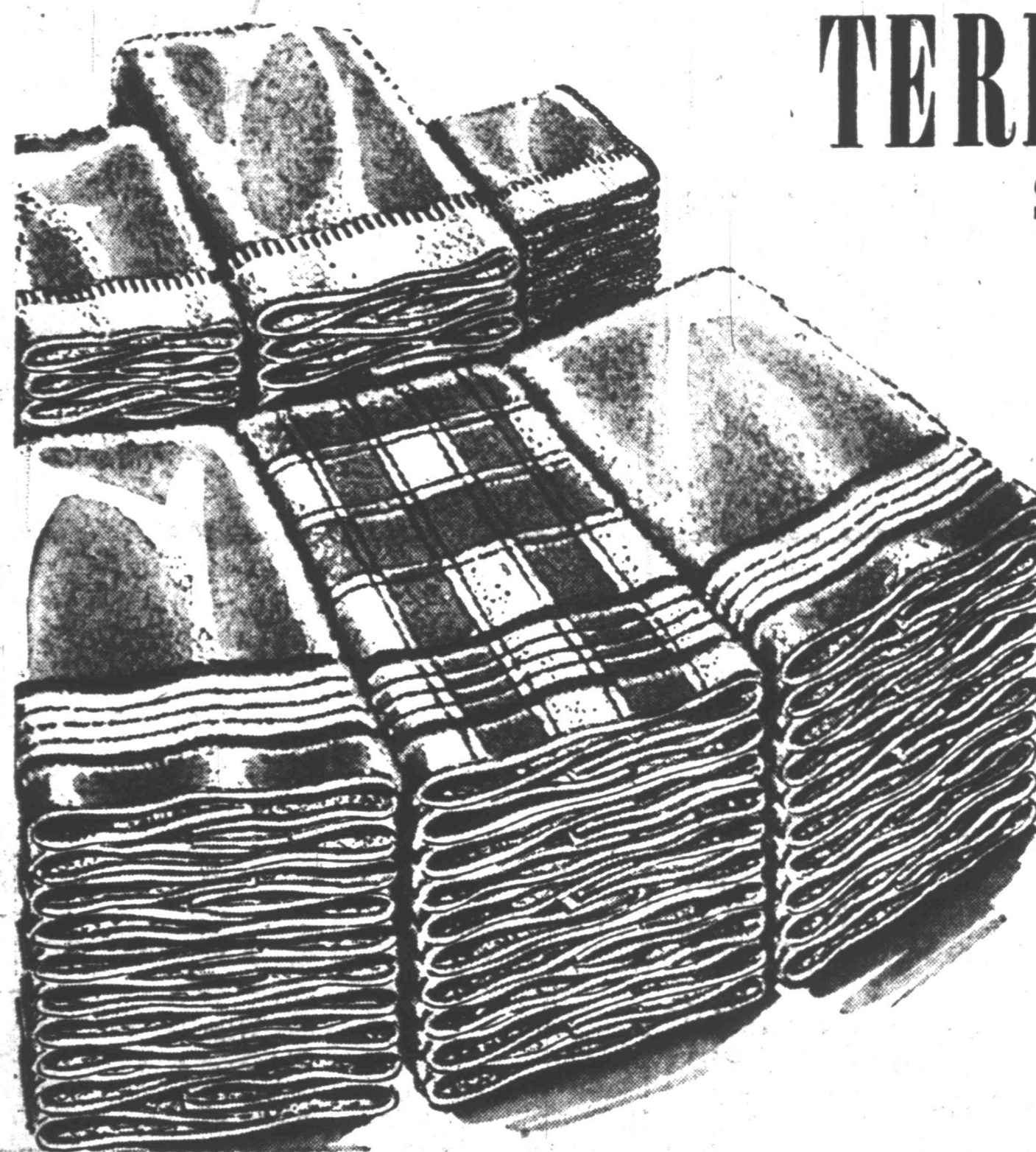

Stern Gang Radio Propaganda Indicates Commie Influence

By PETER EDSON, NEA Washington Correspondent. WASHINGTON (NEA)—How much Communist strength there may be in the new Palestinian state of Israel is attracting Washington attention.

"Russia's attitude was clear," said this propaganda broadcast. "This was an attitude of friendship and support."

Since last March, Irgun has been clearing its activities with the leaders of Haganah, and may eventually be absorbed into the Jewish army.

In appraising this kind of stuff, it is of course necessary to know the source. The Stern gang is an extreme left wing group of terrorists.

Membership in the Stern gang has been estimated as high as several thousand, but the Jewish Agency in Washington says it has never been over 1,000 and is probably not more than 700.

The Stern gang was formed originally in a split from the Irgun Z'vai Leumi. Irgun, for its part, had been formed in the 1930s in a split from Haganah.

Though a secret army, Haganah has twice been armed by the British and used as police to quell riots.

But the anti-British methods of Haganah were not considered severe enough—not anti-British enough—for the faction that broke off to form the Irgun Z'vai Leumi.

HAVANA, CUBA. (AP)—Cuba elects a new president Tuesday and a hot campaign by the four candidates brought predictions of a heavy vote.

With 2,508,754 Cubans eligible, a vote in the neighborhood of 2,000,000 is expected. In all, 572 men and women are running for 132 offices—84 seats in the Senate, 70 seats (half the membership) in the House of Representatives, six provincial governorships and the presidency and vice presidency.

Although presidential returns will be counted first, the official results may not be known before Thursday, unless there is a runaway, heated campaign.

The campaign has been so heated the government issued a last minute appeal to citizens for "calmness, patriotism and common sense" to keep the peace.

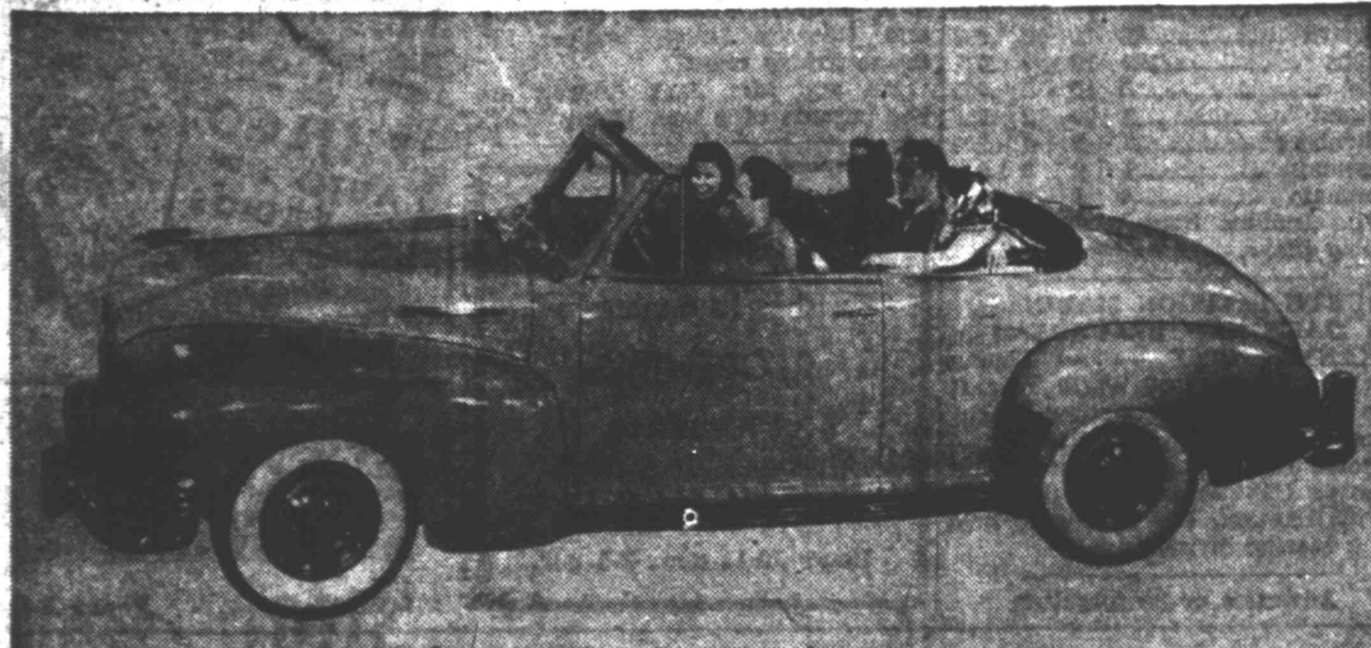

A story could well be titled "Texas Turnouts." Besides having a successful 1947-48 in standings, Texas University sports were well attended.

In football, for example, Texas drew in 475,000 fans to 11 ball games. The Sugar Bowl drew 73,000. Texas' average attendance then is 43,000.

In basketball, the Longhorns played before a record 160,000 fans in 25 games. This total is buoyed by two sell-out throngs in Madison Square Garden.

In baseball, the winning ways of the Texas nine drew large crowds. The Baylor and A&M games, four in all, averaged 7,000.

In track, the Orange and White thistles performed before 15,000 at the Texas Relays. At the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays, Jerry Thompson set all shown before 50,000.

The league has more than 800 high schools in football, more than 600 in basketball, more than 1,500 in track and field in addition to thousands of contestants in debate, declamation, music and other contests pooled in the division called "literary events."

Bedichek is nearing 70 years of age; and under the compulsory retirement rule of the University of Texas, which operates the Interscholastic League, he will go on modified service.

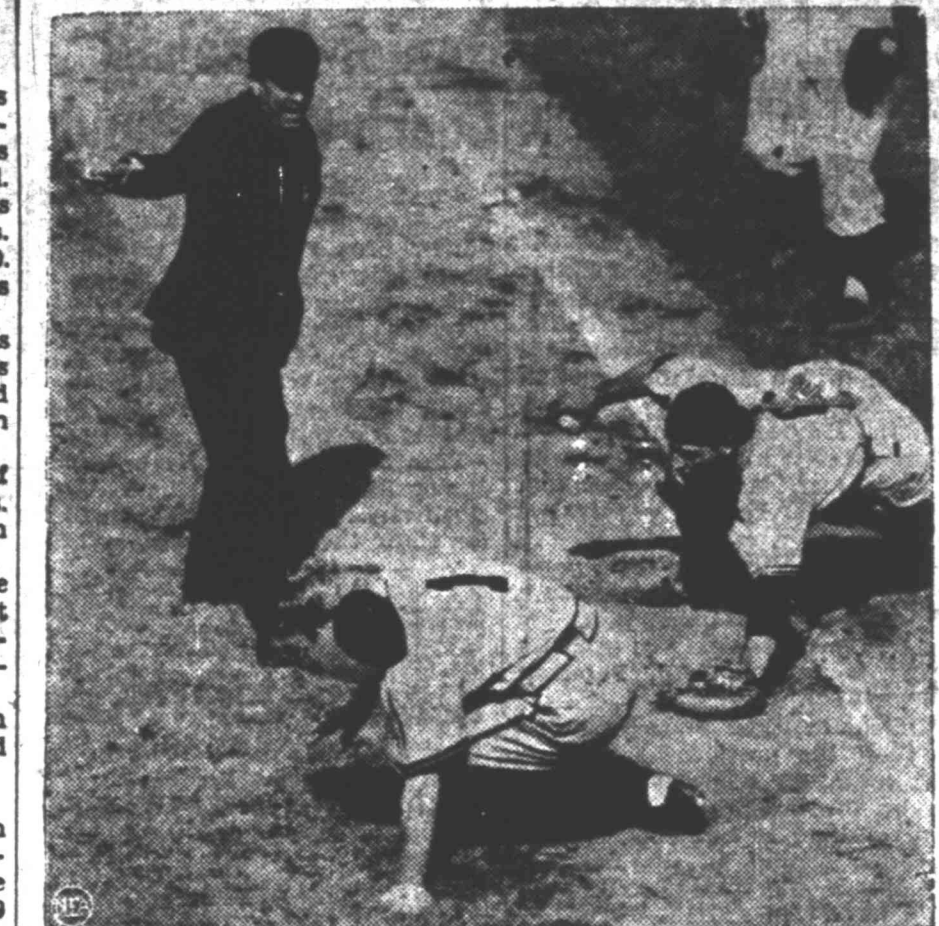

Memorial Day, 1948, which produced the greatest single day turnout ever witnessed in the major leagues, will be remembered by baseball fans for a long time, but it will bring only poignant memories to followers of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Only a comparative handful—24,009 persons—of the record paid admissions of 337,776 were on hand in Cincinnati to see the lowly Reds inflict two decisive defeats upon the slump-ridden Redbirds that knocked the Cards out of first place in the National League.

The scores were 4-3 and 7-0. The defeats were the fourth and fifth straight suffered by the Cards, Tuesday, as they prepare to open a long home stay, they find themselves out of the league lead for the first time since May 13.

The new occupants of the top berth are the New York Giants, who assumed a half-game lead over the Cards by earning a split in their double header with the Dodgers in Brooklyn. The Giants bowed 4-3 in the morning game, but came back strong to win the afternoon game 10-1.

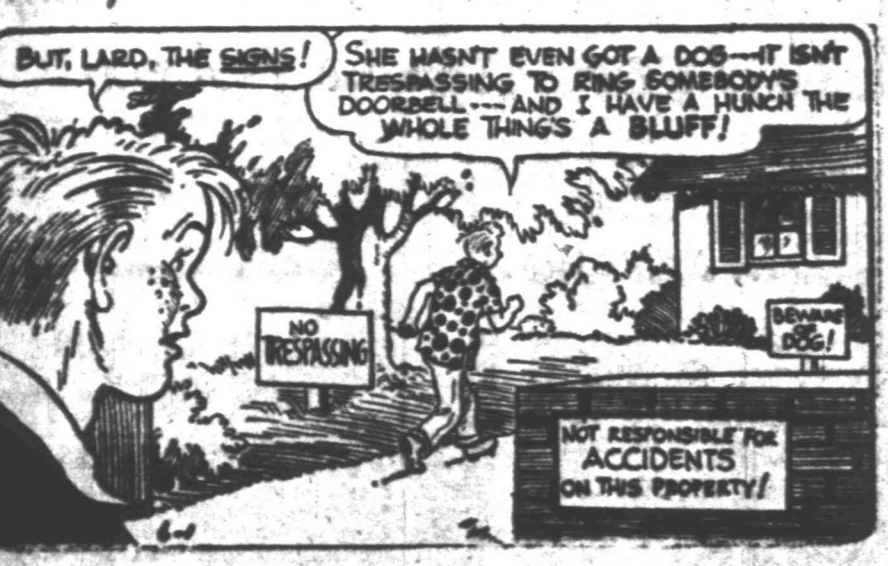

### Holiday Weekend Toll Of 27 Deaths Listed In State Of Texas

Drowning proved Texas' No. 1 killer as 27 persons died in the state during the Memorial Day weekend.

Eight drowned. Six were killed in traffic accidents and four in plane crashes. There were five homicides. The rest died from assorted causes. M. C. Goodchild, 50, of Houston was the latest drowning victim reported up to Monday midnight, end of the three-day holiday. He fell from a speedboat in Galveston Bay Monday.

Deaths of two other Houstonians were reported Monday. Edward F. Gillies, 36-year-old dental technician, shot himself fatally Sunday with a 22 automatic rifle he had used for target practice, according to an inquest verdict. Charles Moffett, 49, Houston restaurant operator, died of injuries received in an automobile accident south of Humble Sunday.

Howard Bradley, 26, of Dallas was killed Sunday when his car was in collision with a truck near Atlanta, Texas. His wife was critically injured. The truck driver was not hurt.

### Crude Oil Production Shows Slight Increase

TULSA, OKLA.—(AP)—Crude oil production in the United States averaged 6,440,228 barrels daily during the week ended May 29, an increase of 9,580 barrels over revised tabulations for the previous week, the Oil & Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

The following areas reported the largest gains: Illinois, up 3,200 barrels to 173,700 barrels; Michigan, up 1,600 to 46,200; Oklahoma, 6,450 to 423,056, and Mississippi, 3,200 to 122,015. Indiana, Montana, Wyoming and California had gains of 800 barrels or less.

Major declines were in the eastern area, down 1,250 barrels to 67,200; Colorado, off 2,090 to 43,400, and Kansas, down 1,200 to 303,900. Losses of 770 barrels or under were recorded in Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky and Louisiana. Production was unchanged in Florida, Nebraska, New Mexico and Texas.

GIESSEN, GERMANY.—(AP)—Dr. Theodor Morrell, once Adolf Hitler's personal physician, died last week, it was learned here Tuesday. He was released from an American internment camp only a few months ago.

### Boyle Declares It Takes More Than Buttons To Win Push Button Battle

By HAL BOYLE  
NEW YORK.—(AP)—If war comes tomorrow it will only be more of the same old bloody business battle has always been. This is pointed up by a primer for total war put out by the Defense Department's Munitions Board in Washington.

Should a third world war break out in the immediate future, there could be no reliance on "push button" weapons. You have to have more than a button to win a push

button war. And that's all we've got today. No other country has more than the button either. Beyond the button, all is design and experiment.

The report of the Munitions Board emphasizes that another war would require immediate and complete mobilization of national resources, industry and manpower. Entire Devotion.

Few people in the United States realize what this means. It means absolute and entire devotion of every ounce of the nation's energy toward one aim—support of the armed forces.

It means that war will begin at your own front door, figuratively if not literally. It means war on a 24-hour-a-day basis for every body.

Only on such a basis could America defeat the only possible present enemy—Russia.

Over-confidence is the greatest enemy of any nation. Optimism thrives at the rear headquarters and on the home front. An enlightened pessimism always rules the courageous men on the actual battlefield.

They face and fight the enemy, and they know his worth. It never pays to underestimate a foe. That is the lesson taught by the two American retreats in the European Theater in the second World War—Kasserine Gap in Africa, the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium. I know because I had to run from both places.

Grab By Throat  
And for all the developments that have taken place in the theory of warfare, there is nothing to indicate that a vast foe such as Russia could be knocked out by anything short of a gigantic expeditionary force.

This would require every man, ship, gun, airplane and guided missile the American nation could muster in an uttermost test of its strength. It is folly to rely alone on our airpower.

To throttle Soviet Russia or any other big power we'd have to grab her by the throat where she lives. And that would take every dough-boy, in good or bad health, we could put in uniform. It would also require every gun, tank, plane and ship we could build.

There is no push button war on the horizon yet.

### Too Many Potatoes Again Threaten Food Officials' Headache

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The lowly spud threatens once again to cause food officials, farm leaders and possibly politicians many headaches during the next four months. Potato supplies are expected by Agriculture Department officials to start flowing to market within a few days in a volume far above consumer needs.

If this is so, the department will be forced for the third straight year to buy the surplus to carry out grower price guarantees.

The cost to Uncle Sam in the last two years exceeded \$125,000,000. The department formally predicts it will have to buy from 800 to 500 carloads of potatoes a day this month, or a total of at least 25,000,000 bushels by the end of July. Most of the surplus is expected in California, North Carolina and Virginia.

Some of the potatoes bought by the government will be diverted into livestock, feed, alcohol, and other by-products. But because of a shortage of processing facilities, officials said some of the spuds may have to be dumped.
