

Mass Evacuations Get Under Way In 120-Mile Section

PORTLAND, ORE. —(P)— Mass evacuations began Tuesday as the flood-swollen Columbia River brought new peril to a 120-mile section at the lower end of the stream. The river, which already had caused the Pacific Northwest's greatest disaster, threatened to flood hundreds of farms and many small cities in the area, nearly all

of which is downstream from Portland. Army engineers ordered the evacuation of the thousands of residents of the 43 drainage districts area, but said many of them already had run for higher ground.

The Portland Housing Authority estimated at \$27,-000,000 the loss suffered by the war-housing city of Vanport, which was crumbled Sunday. That was the only flood loss estimate available, although before the Vanport disaster, Army engineers had predicted a loss of \$30,000,000 to farms and houses, and to valuable top soil being swept



Please Close The Gate

Several complaints have been received from residents who say back yard gates are being left open by meter readers, service people, deliverymen and others, permitting dogs and other pets to escape.

And with the new city dog ordinance in effect, this becomes a pretty serious offense. One citizen reports having to bail a dog out of the pound on two occasions recently, paying pound fees each time. And on both occasions the dog left the yard when someone left the gate

Loose dogs now are being picked up and impounded regardless of whether they have license tags. Dogs also stand a chance of being run down by automobiles while roaming the streets.

All of which makes dog owners somewhat unhappy when trespassers leave yard gates open.

The closing of gates long has been a common courtesy and a "must" in the ranch country where thinking, considerate and understanding travelers always close the gates to prevent livestock from straying from one pasture

Sometimes, however, ranch gates are left open by unthinking, indifferent persons, and many lawsuits have resulted. The Old West too, saw many shootings because of gates left open. Surgery May Be Necessary In Treating Inflamed Colon

Ulcerative colitis is a disease in which there is an inflamed and ulcerous condition of the large colon, or bowel. It may affect parts or almost all of the colon, a section of the intestines about five feet

If it is acute, all the signs of severe infection are present. The cause of ulcerative colitis, however, is still uncertain. A good many different kinds of germs have been found, but so far no one of them seems to be entirely responsible. Both Sexes Affected The disease is just about as common in men as in women. Most cases begin before the age of 40.
