 NEW YORK (AP)—Money whippers love's sweet nothings today. Cupid has gone on the stock exchange. Matrimony is wearing a price tag.  
 Across the country grass widows and spinsters are springing up like dandelions to announce their willingness to race to the altar with the right man. But he doesn't have to be tall, dark and handsome. The first qualification of their atom age romance is a five-figure bank account.  
 This new pattern in leap year courtships was set by a sprightly suburban blonde with one divorce and two children. She's had scores of offers since she began looking for a husband with \$10,000. A brunette in Seattle went her one better by advertising for a husband with \$10,000—plus a home.  
 Flooded Field  
 And now the field is flooded with unwed damsels who've put themselves on the matrimonial mart.  
 But the old iron law of supply and demand has set in. Some girls have cut the asking price to \$5,000 and a wedding ring, and the under-the-counter figure is probably lower than that.  
 I hope all the girls get the man of their financial dreams. But if most of the lassies in America start refusing to dedicate their lives to a cookstove except on a cash-and-carry basis, they are bound to lose. The going rate on these endearing young charms will quickly drop to bargain basement levels.  
 It's a matter of cold, sad statistics. It boils down to these facts: Women control most of the nation's wealth; more women than men want to marry; but the male is finishing.

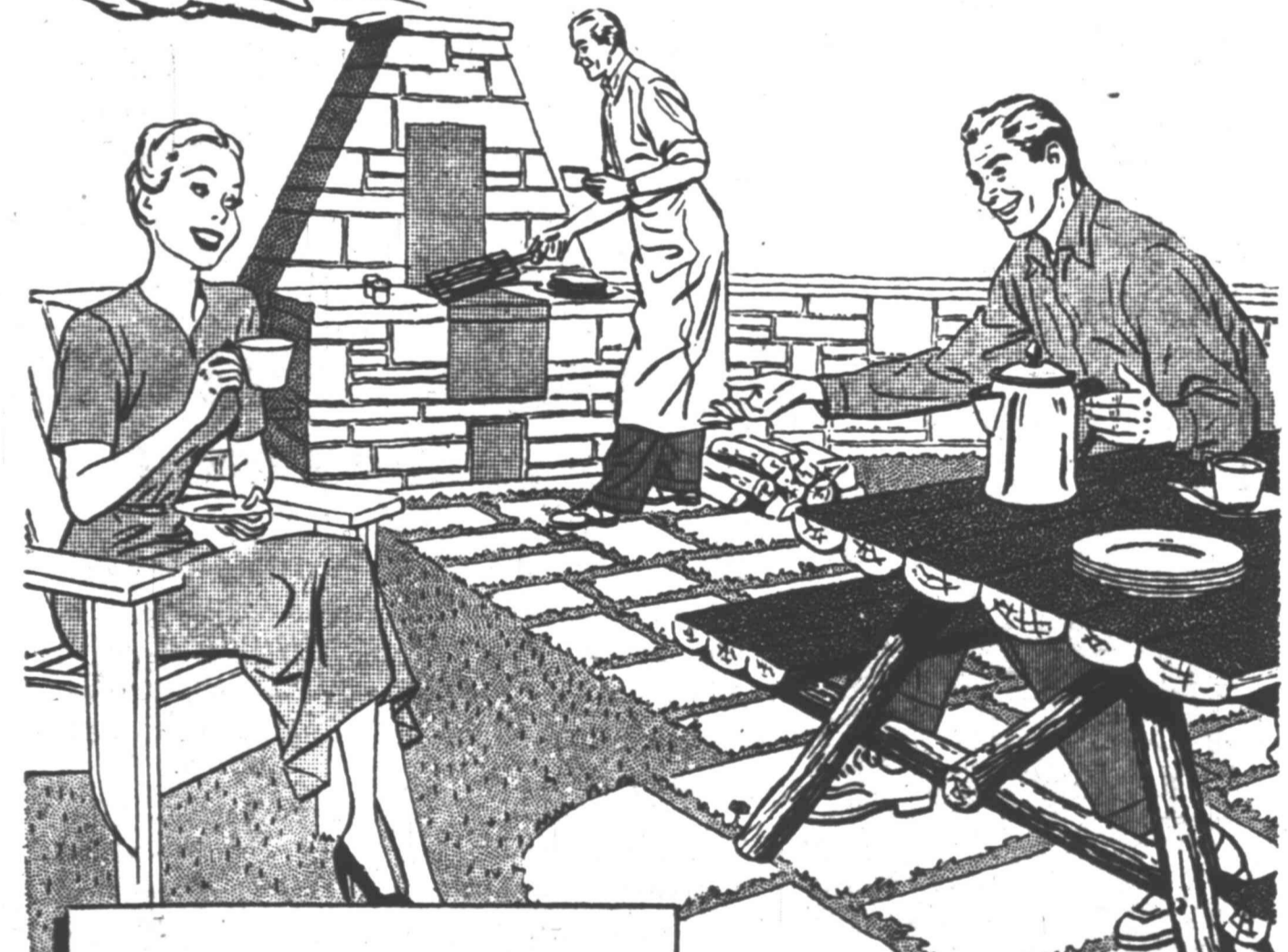

Harry Hopkins' Story

The Roosevelt story has already attained weighty proportions, only three years after his death. Frances Perkins and James A. Farley have written books devoted largely to the late President. Men who guarded him and waited on him have added their ghost-written reminiscences.

Henry Morgenthau's diaries have much to say about the feudin' and fightin' among the cabinet and palace guard. Cordell Hull's memoirs deal almost as much with Roosevelt as with their author. Winston Churchill's have added to the story. And now come "The Secret Papers of Harry L. Hopkins" on the installment plan in Collier's Magazine.

On the basis of two samples it seems to us that the latest entry may turn out to be the best to date. For one thing, the papers were arranged and their story written by Robert E. Sherwood, the playwright and former Roosevelt speech writer, and a gifted man with words.

Sherwood is an ardent Roosevelt admirer and he makes no bones about it. He admits that this favorable prejudice probably shows up in his writing and colors the subject matter. But in spite of the confessed bias, the Sherwood account strikes us as remarkable in that it probably will be read with delight by persons who admired the wartime President extravagantly and by those who disliked him with an almost bitterness.

The admiration and dislike that Roosevelt inspired were a constant and powerful force in our national thought and life for a dozen fateful years. Those emotions are not entirely dead. And anyone who can put himself in a neutral frame of mind will find a remarkably clear picture in these first Sherwood samples of the actions that inspired these intense feelings as the United States approached the world conflict.

Those who say that Roosevelt's penetrating vision saved this country and western civilization by aiding Britain and arming a reluctant America will find confirmation of their belief in these two articles. Those who say that Roosevelt wanted to get in the war and pushed the country to a point where war could not be avoided, while lulling the people with false assurances, will also find confirmation.

The perspective of eight years highlights the doubt and confusion that possessed American thought and action in 1940. France was fallen, Britain seemed doomed, and Hitler appeared invincible. On that last Americans were generally agreed. But there agreement ended.

From there on the Roosevelt course of action is still judged in the light of individual opinion. It is clear that he was governed by strong personal conviction, constitutional checks and balances, and political expediency.

The rest of Sherwood's Hopkins-Roosevelt story, from Pearl Harbor to Yalta, will probably revive old feelings and old controversies. It also will be invaluable to those historians who, when time has passed and feelings have cooled, must evaluate Roosevelt's true place in history.

Meanwhile it is certain that those who read the narrative composed from the documents and scribbled notes of this Iowa, who rose so swiftly from obscure relief worker to "assistant president," will know a lot more about Franklin Roosevelt and recent world history than they did before.

Candidates Aren't Even Sure Why They Seek Presidency

The President's living quarters are the 11 parlor and bedroom suites on the second floor. The President and his family are virtual prisoners here. They are constantly guarded by the Secret Service. Whenever the President travels, this Secret Service protection is increased. Wherever he goes, the job follows him—even on vacations. Recent Presidents have averaged from 8,000 to 30,000 miles a year. Every fourth year a President running for reelection must get out and campaign actively, as President Truman is now doing on a coast-to-coast swing around the country. Every place he goes, every crowd he faces, must be with the knowledge that some crank may take a shot at him.

### Nation's Daily Crude Production Spurts To New All-Time High

TULSA, OKLA. (AP)—The nation's crude oil production spurted to a new all-time daily average record of 8,473,642 barrels during the week ended June 5, the Oil & Gas Journal reported Tuesday. The figure was 33,420 barrels over the previous week's production. Texas output was a major factor in the increase. The country's largest oil producing state was up 27,175 barrels to 2,446,500 barrels. Other big gains were by Oklahoma, up 2,950 barrels to 426,000; New Mexico, up 1,850 to 177,850; Kansas, 1,400 to 305,300; Louisiana, 1,200 to 467,025; Mississippi, 1,085 to 123,100; and Colorado, 2,230 to 45,630. The Eastern area, Indiana, Kentucky, Alabama and Arkansas reported increases of 1,000 barrels or less. Declines of more than 1,000 barrels were registered in Michigan, down 1,700 barrels to 44,500, and Wyoming off 3,240 to 144,583. Smaller losses were recorded in Illinois, Montana and California. Production was unchanged in Florida and Nebraska.

### 17-Year-Old Bride, Married Salesman Released By Police

WICHITA, KAN. (AP)—A 17-year-old girl, taken into custody two days ago with a married salesman, was released by police Tuesday. The girl, Mrs. Mary Kalmoski, was released upon arrival of her mother and brother who flew here from their York, Pa., home. Mrs. Kalmoski, a bride of less than two months, and Arthur Deets, Jr., 23, of Kingston, Pa., were taken into custody Sunday. Police said they ran away May 28 shortly before the girl's high school graduation. Kidnaping charges were filed against Deets by the girl's husband, Thomas T. Kalmoski, 26, of New Britain, Conn. Police quoted Mrs. Kalmoski as saying she accompanied Deets willingly, however, and his release was authorized Monday by the district attorney at York. Police here said they were informed the charges would not be pressed "at this time."

### Senate Hopefuls Pick Stevenson As Verbal Target

### Yugoslavia Says Italy Should Retain Colonies

ROME (AP)—Yugoslavia spoke up Tuesday in favor of letting Italy continue to administer her pre-Fascist African colonies. A note delivered in London to the deputies of the Big Four foreign ministers set forth the Yugoslav view that the consolidation of peace and world security would best be served by making Italy the United Nations' mandatory power for Libya, Eritrea and Italian Somaliland. The note, released here by the Yugoslav Legation, was couched in terms of surprising friendliness toward Italy—with which Yugoslavia has picked many bones since the war. Yugoslavia specified the United Nations should see to it that Italian administration of the colonies was designed to bring about "their most rapid progression possible toward self administration and independence."

### Father Searches For Son, Slaying Suspect

EL PASO (AP)—The wild Sierra Madre of Mexico was the scene Tuesday of a dramatic search by an El Paso father who believes his son is innocent in the slaying of a jewelry store salesman here. The father left Monday, saying he hopes to persuade his 19-year-old Spanish-speaking son to surrender before an international posse, already on the way, catches him. The youth has been missing since Friday. He is sought as a suspect in the slaying that morning of Irving Kordish, 41, jewelry store salesman.

### T&P Railroad Union Leader Blasts Truman

PORT WORTH (AP)—A Texas railroad labor group Monday night heard President Truman accused of "putting a bayonet in the backs of railroad men." The charge was made by L. A. Aucoin of Fort Worth, general chairman of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen for the Texas & Pacific. He addressed the opening session of the seventeenth annual convention of the BRT's Texas State Association. Aucoin struck at what he termed the "inconsistency of the President in drafting labor to operate the railroads, but leaving the railroads in the hands of their executives and not drafting the revenue, too." He also criticized Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough for granting an injunction against the workers and said the judge allowed the carriers to go scot free.

**Storage Space For Wheat, Grasshopper Plague Worry Farmers**

Two problems weighed heavily on the shoulders of Texas farmers Tuesday.

They had too much of one thing—grasshoppers.

They had too little of another—storage space for wheat.

Thousands of bushels of Texas and Oklahoma wheat were piled on roped-off streets of Burkburnett, Texas.

Valued at about \$200,000, the wheat was piled in the open because Burkburnett's three grain elevators are full.

The problem will grow worse, said Editor and Publisher John Brookman of the weekly Star, because trucks were backed up a mile waiting to unload wheat at Burkburnett.

**Hoppers At Abilene**

The grasshopper invasion centered in Central Texas and farmers said it was the worst in several years. The pests were reported in great numbers north to Greenville and west to Abilene.

Hill County farmers said last week the pests had become a serious menace to cotton and corn crops there. W. E. Cross of Covington and Nat Thomas of Vaughan declared it was the first time in their memory the hoppers had threatened complete destruction of crops.

As dry weather encouraged the hoppers to move from grass to field crops, farmers sought means of combatting them.
