

Arabs And Jews Agree To Truce

CAIRO (AP)—Arabs and Jews replied Wednesday to the United Nations proposal for a four-week truce in Palestine and members of each camp said they accepted unconditionally.

Authoritative Jewish informants at Lake Success said the Israel government approved unconditionally the plan of the UN mediator, to become effective at 1 a. m. (EST) Friday. Arab spokesmen in both Cairo and Amman, Trans-Jordan, said the Arab acceptance was without strings.

The Arabs replied well before the deadline set by the mediator. The Jewish reply, probably because of communications difficulties, arrived from Tel Aviv 50 minutes after the deadline.

Foreign Minister Fawzi Fasha Mulki of Trans-Jordan announced in Amman that all Arab states accepted unconditionally Count Folke Bernadotte's nine-point armistice plan.

While the Israeli cabinet met in Tel Aviv on the truce terms, Egyptian planes bombed the central business and residential sections of that city. A dispatch from Tel Aviv said it was feared casualties were heavy.

Flames Drip From Jewish Army headquarters said that during the night Israeli planes bombed Arab artillery positions at a former radar station near Elar Elida in the Sinai, from which shells had been hurled at Jerusalem.

While the truce was being considered, fighting continued in the south on the coastal route to Tel Aviv, where the Jews have part of the Egyptian Sinai, and in the north at the Arab triangle of strength.

The United Nations hoped during the four weeks armistice to reconcile the differences so fighting would not be resumed. That would be difficult if not impossible. The Arabs appeared determined not to let the truce to exist in Palestine where Arabs outnumber Jews two to one.

The attack came in an address at Butte, Mont., Tuesday night. The President charged that Congress, under Republican domination, had wrecked price control, stymied the housing program, virtually abolished the Labor Department, tried to tear up the employment act of 1946, and the budget act, and practiced "economy in the reverse."

Congress weakened the Labor Department, Truman declared, after the Republicans had said in their platform they were going to make a strong Labor Department. The Republican platform, he added, is the platform of the Congress now.

One of our candidates for president has said the best way to control prices was not to buy, Truman said. He did not identify the candidate, but added, "I guess he would let you starve. I don't know. I am not in that class."

Former Secretary Seeks \$250,000 NEW YORK (AP)—The former secretary of Bennett E. Meyers is suing the retired Air Force general for \$250,000, charging he made "false" and "defamatory" statements about her.

Mrs. Mildred R. Lamar filed suit Tuesday in federal court. In an affidavit, she said Meyers implied in statements before a Senate investigating committee that she was an "unchaste woman, unfaithful to her husband and her marriage vows."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Southern Democrats were beaten Wednesday in their efforts to amend the draft bill to allow conscripted men to serve in separate units of negro units at their own request.

The Senate rejected by voice vote an amendment sponsored by Senators Russell (D-Ga.) and Maybank (D-S.C.).

The action came as Republican leaders planned a third straight day and night session in effort to pass the selective service measure and speed it to the House.

The decision was another step in the drawn-out draft-vote fight. Several other moves have been made to stich civil rights amendments to the selective service bill.

In its second overtime session Tuesday night, the Senate adopted an amendment to limit the selective service law to two years instead of five as originally proposed.

Czech Communists Nominates Gottwald PRAGUE (AP)—Czechoslovakia's national coalition, ruled by the Communists, announced Wednesday Communist Premier Klement Gottwald is its only candidate to succeed Eduard Benes as president.

SENATE COMMITTEE APPROVES RAILROAD PENSION INCREASE WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Labor Committee Wednesday unanimously approved a bill to increase railroad workers' pensions 2 1/2 per cent and cut unemployment insurance contributions by half.

LONDON (AP)—Official British sources said Wednesday they expect a three-power agreement soon opening the way for the United States, Britain and France to resume allocating war reparations to Russia from Western Germany.

SEOUL (AP)—A Russian radio broadcast says Soviet occupation forces in North Korea "will be reduced."

HONG KONG (AP)—A naval spokesman said Wednesday British warships will engage in practical exercises with U. S. Navy units on a visit to Japan in July.

WASHINGTON (AP)—John L. Lewis Wednesday offered to keep the coal miners on the job after July 1 when their present contract expires if mine operators agree to his \$100 a month pension plan.

MOSCOW (AP)—Russia is ready to increase economic aid to nations which have friendly relations with her, the Moscow press announced Wednesday.

LISBON, PORTUGAL (AP)—Five men were killed and seven seriously injured Wednesday by a bolt of lightning which struck a large group dining around an iron cauldron under a tree near the Montalegre power station.

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City Adopts Paving Plan

A resolution adopting a 400-block paving program, as recommended by the Planning Commission, and earmarking \$120,000 of available street improvement funds for the program was passed by the City Council at its regular meeting Tuesday night in the city hall.

City Councilman Stanley Erskine moved the adoption of the resolution and Councilman W. F. Hejl seconded. The vote was unanimous. City Manager H. A. Thomson was instructed to prepare an ordinance adopting the state paving law, and to submit recommendations for the creation of paving districts within the city. Action on both matters will be taken at the next regular meeting.

Mayor-Pro-Tem Robert I. Dickey presided in the absence of Mayor R. H. Gifford. The report of the Planning Commission was submitted by Chairman Fred T. Hogan who displayed a map showing the commission's suggestions as to the streets which should be paved. He said the commission was of the opinion the 400-block program should be adopted since it would be almost impossible to single out 100 or 200 blocks when so much more street paving is needed here. He said citizens desire paving in all sections of the city.

The city manager suggested that contracts be let for 200-block programs at a time. The council favored a maximum five-year plan for the financing of paving by property owners with a six per cent interest rate. Property owners could pay 20 per cent of the total cost to them down and the rest in four equal payments. The city will pay 10 per cent of the paving costs. The type paving recommended will meet Highway Department specifications, officials said.

Holt Jowell, J. P. Carson and Don Johnson were appointed members of the Board of Equalization for the Wednesday morning. The salary expense will be paid jointly by the city and the school district.

City-Hall Remodeling The council approved plans and specifications submitted by Hank Avery, Midland architect, for the remodeling and enlarging of the city hall, and instructed the city manager to advertise for construction bids on the project. The bids will (Continued on page 11)

More Hot Weather Promised Texans By The Associated Press More hot weather was in store for Texas for the next 24 hours. Some sections of North Texas got temporary relief late Tuesday after a series of thunderstorms, but Wednesday morning temperatures were on the rise again.

A heavy rain measuring 1.55 fell at Glade, north of Fort Worth, and showers cooled the temperature at a number of other points. Wichita Falls had .50 of an inch, Dallas .32 and Fort Worth .23. A trace of rain fell at El Paso, Amarillo and Waco.

A windstorm struck the southwest section of Dallas late Tuesday, causing light damage at the Red Bird Airport. Gusts up to 98 miles an hour were reported.

High temperatures Tuesday were: Presidio 105, Wink 103, Waco 103, Laredo 101, Brady 101, Amarillo 90, Clarendon 94, Panola 93, Abilene 90, Big Spring 100, Lubbock 100, Tearkans 91, Tyler 96, Lufkin 93 and Beaumont 94.

SW FLOYD VENTURE TO RUN CASING AND TEST Bob Donnell, et al., No. 1 Carmichael, three-quarters of a mile east of the discovery for commercial production from the Pennsylvanian lime reef, in Southeast Hale County, at General American Oil Company No. 1-A F. Byrd, was bottomed at 4,955 feet in lime, and was preparing to run and cement 5 1/2 inch casing to allow making production tests.

This project topped the reef lime at 5,955 feet. It took a drill-stem test at 5,946-59 feet. The tool was open 45 minutes. Recovery was 130 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud.

Another drillstem test was run at 5,978-5,995 feet. The tester was open 45 minutes. Recovery was 900 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. The drill pipe flowed out one head of heavily oil and gas cut drilling fluid, while it was being pulled.

The venture then cored on down to 6,905 feet, took a gamma ray survey, and started preparations to run the casing. This well is in Southwest Floyd County, and is 950 feet from south and 1,800 feet from east lines of section 18, block K, TTRR survey.

Lario Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Bob Mayo, another report from the Byrd discovery, also in Southwest Floyd County, and 690 feet from south and 1,900 feet from west lines of section 18, block K, TTRR survey, had reached 6,015 feet in shale and lime, and was making more hole. It has not yet penetrated the reef.

H. E. Chiles, Jr., et al., No. 1 Strickler, 1,900 feet from south and east lines of section 19, block K, TTRR survey, and another flanker to the General American producer, at No. 1 Byrd, was making hole under 6,000 feet in lime.

It took a drillstem test at 6,019-17 feet. The tester was open one hour. Recovery was 590 feet of (Continued on page 11)

Death Toll From Polio And Infant Diarrhea Mounts By The Associated Press The death toll from polio and infant diarrhea is mounting in Texas. Polio has spread throughout the state, it was disclosed, and 98 infants have died of diarrhea in San Antonio this year.

Fourteen polio deaths have been reported at Houston, where 122 cases have been treated this year. Two of the deaths occurred Tuesday.

Fort Worth recorded its first polio death Monday and there has been one death from the disease in San Antonio and one at Fort Sam Houston, in San Antonio. Child Has 35 Patients Twenty-five patients are under treatment at the polio clinic at Edinburg.

Arthur Dyer, executive secretary of the Dallas County unit of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Tuesday said: "There is no gap of over 30 miles between counties having polio between the Rio Grande and the Red River. The main concentration remains in the Rio Grande Valley, Nueces County, Harris and Galveston."

Dr. Dyer said more than 400 cases are recorded. "Too much water is being allowed to run down the gutters," he said. He urged residents to be sure every drop of water is utilized.

Thomson said the city is providing almost 750,000 gallons more water daily than at this time last year, but that the system also has many more users. The extremely hot weather the last several days has increased the water consumption to a danger point, he said. Water rationing was in force here last Summer.

The city manager indicated plenty of water will be available when the new supply at the Wadley tract, north of the city, is tied into the system. The expansion program is progressing on schedule and should be completed soon after July 1. In the meantime, citizens are urged to conserve water as much as possible, Thomson said.

Domestic Policies Blamed For Collapse Of Turk Government ANKARA, TURKEY (AP)—The government of Premier Hasan Saka collapsed Wednesday under harsh fire from critics of its domestic economic policy.

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President Ismet Inonu accepted the cabinet's resignation but immediately asked Saka to form a new government. Informed political sources said the new cabinet probably would have new ministers of economics, labor, commerce and perhaps of agriculture.

A "throw-in" in a deal between the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians two years ago, Gene Bearden, loomed Wednesday as the key player in the Indians' American League pennant chances.

The wavy-haired southpaw came along as excess baggage when the Tribe acquired Allan Costel and Hal Fock in a trade which sent Sherman Lollar and Ray Mack to the Yankees. He has proved to be the best pick-up the Indians have made since they plucked Bob Feller from the Iowa sandlots.

The 27-year-old rookie thus far has outshone the great Feller on the mound and currently rivals Bob Lemon as the No. 1 hurler on the staff.

Wins Sixth Triumph

The Los Angeles knuckleballer gained his sixth victory Tuesday night when he pitched the Indians to a 2-0 triumph over the Red Sox in Boston. The victory increased the Indians' first place lead over the Athletics and Yankees to three and a half games.

The Yankees moved into a second place tie with the Athletics, coming from behind to edge out the Chicago White Sox 3-2 in a 12-inning night battle at Yankee Stadium. The Detroit Tigers nipped the A's 2-1 in another close one at Philadelphia.

then tallied twice in the seventh to nip the St. Louis Browns 4-5 in a night game in Washington.

Cardinals Advance

Jimmy Bronson likens the Graziano-Zale battles to those waged 40 years ago by Stanley Ketchell and Billy Papke.

"Those Ketchell - Papke fights were real knockdown and dragout affairs," says Bronson, "and the two previous Graziano-Zale meetings remind me of them. You never could tell who would be on the canvas next."

Bronson, who has refereed 3,000 fights and witnessed many times that number, once was the adviser of Gene Tunney. During World War I he was the U. S. Army's director of boxing wherever the American flag was flown. He was appointed to the post by Gen. John Pershing and hob-nobbed with kings and princes all over the world.

Just as Rocky Graziano and Tony Zale are in a middleweight title fight for the third time, Ketchell and Papke had three bouts with the 160-pound title at stake each time.

In 1906, Ketchell won a 10-round non-title decision over Papke in Milwaukee. Later that year the pair met twice for the title, first in Los Angeles and then in San Francisco. Papke knocked out Ketchell in the 12th round the first time but seven weeks later Ketchell scored an 11-round knockout over Papke.

Their last fight was at Colma, Calif., in 1908 with Ketchell retaining the crown on a 20-round decision.

The following year Ketchell was shot and killed by a ranch hand at Conway Mo. In 1909 Papke killed himself and his wife at Newport, Calif.

Ketchell, known as the Michigan Assassin, is regarded as the all-time slugger of the middleweights. He knocked out 78 per cent of his rivals, scoring 44 kayos in 81 bouts.

Graziano, having stopped 33 of 59 foes, has a 56 per cent knockout average while Zale's is 50 per cent. The 34-year-old Gary, Ind., Poje has stopped 44 of his 88 rivals.

This rubber match may attract about 30,000. People from many parts of the country will converge on Newark. Gate receipts figure to reach \$600,000.

Their last meeting in Chicago Stadium last summer, in which Graziano reversed the six-round knockout of 1946, drew an all-time indoor record of \$22,421 with Zale getting \$182,988 as champion and Graziano \$76,484 as challenger.

Off their two fights, Zale has earned \$230,960 and Graziano \$184,578.

No wonder the two sluggers keep talking in a "kill or get-killed" vein. Next to the heavyweight diamond (the middleweight) crown is worth a pretty penny.

Time For Legal Study

Nobody could blame the Senate Judiciary Committee for seeing red after the raucous, disgusting Red-front protest against the Mundt-Nixon Bill to control communism.

It is hard to believe that the demonstration's ring-leaders are so stupid as to believe that their tactics could defeat the bill. They know the temper of the times and of the present Congress.

So it may be that the loud-mouth leftists really want to see the Mundt-Nixon Bill passed—and quickly. Thus they may hope to have more ammunition to pour at Congress.

At any rate we think Senator Ferguson acted wisely in adjourning the committee hearings on the Communist-control bill indefinitely.

There is a lot of "must" legislation before Congress, but we hardly think the Mundt-Nixon measure fits in the emergency category. It should be all to the good if, when the bill comes before the Senate, the hysterical chorus that parroted Communist William Z. Foster's testimony can be considered in its proper perspective.

For the Senate will do well to remember that the leftists are not the only ones who are against this bill in its present form. There are several who have spoken up against it who cannot be suspected of Kremlin connections—a representative of a Quaker organization, among others.

In the Dewey-Stassen debate in Oregon, the governor argued that this bill would not outlaw communism, while Stassen held that it would. When two men as intelligent as these cannot agree on the basic intent of a proposed law which they have studied carefully, it is safe to assume that there is something fuzzy or ambiguous about the measure as it now stands.

Any law should be put to the test of whether it is proof against unjust use in the hands of the worst possible administrators it might encounter. If the two good legal minds of Stassen and Dewey can't understand this proposed law or what it is supposed to do, it doesn't seem safe to put it on the books without considerable revision.

So now that the tumult has died down, perhaps the Judiciary Committee will give the Mundt-Nixon Bill a thorough legal examination. We don't think the country will suffer if final action on it is put off until next session.

Churchill And Smuts

The case of Jan Christian Smuts in South Africa resembles that of Winston Churchill in the United Kingdom. Both statesmen won deserved world fame for their contributions to the defeat of nazism, and both have now been removed from their high office by the will of their countrymen.

But there is an important difference. Churchill's political downfall obviously resulted from the conservatism of his domestic policies. Marshal Smuts lost out because his domestic policies are, by his opponents' standards, too radical. Yet Churchill's voice has not been silenced or his influence destroyed by political defeat.

Penicillin Used In Treating Scrub Typhus

MANILA —(AP)— A drug from the penicillin family has shown favorable results in treating scrub typhus—the so-called Japanese river bed fever which so far cannot be prevented by present typhus vaccine.

This report was made by a 13th Air Force observer with an army medical research team conducting tests in Kuala Lumpur, Malaya. The drug is chloromycetin. Army doctors so far have treated 25 patients with it and none has developed complications or died.

"The 800,000,000 candlepower searchlights, this year with lights in color, again will be an attraction of the Electric show, along with movies and other entertainment that will appeal to youngsters as well as their parents."

Britain Lays Down Rules For Red Purge

LONDON — (AP) — The treasury has laid down the formal rules for Britain's purge of Communist and Fascist civil service workers from government security jobs.

A worker with a confidential assignment will be removed if he is a member of the Communist Party or a Fascist organization, or associated with either "in such a way as to raise legitimate doubts about his reliability."

The cabinet member who heads the department will be the final judge.

A worker who is removed from a secret job will have the right of transfer to a non-secret branch in his own or another department. However, if he is engaged in such work that no non-secret jobs are available, he must resign or be discharged.

Meets Turtle Every 10 Years, Carves Initials

EAST NEW PORTLAND, ME. — (AP) — Harold E. Atwood and his jackknife have a date in '58 with an old acquaintance—a turtle first encountered 20 years ago. In the Spring of 1928 Atwood and a companion carved their initials and the date on a turtle they found in Weymouth Brook.

Ten years later, Atwood found the same shellback plodding around George Safford's farm, two miles from the brook. He carved '38 and once more released his old friend.

Soviet Paper Claims Russian Discovered Lightning Electricity

MOSCOW — (AP) — Trud, the Soviet Trade Union organ, declared a Russian scientist named Lomonosov discovered the electrical nature of lightning a year before Benjamin Franklin flew his kite.

The paper criticized an article in a Soviet paper which said Lomonosov's studies of the electrical nature of lightning were inspired by the work of Franklin. Trud said that wasn't so.

It quoted Lomonosov himself as claiming the discovery and denying that he was indebted to Franklin's researches.

Encyclopedia Britannica has this to say about Franklin: "He was naturally versatile and as electricity was still in its very infancy, and the theories to explain it were most unsatisfactory, his accuracy and common sense led him to the discovery of the identity of lightning and electricity (1752). He was not the first to think of it but he was the first to prove it."

Historians say he did it by flying a kite up into an electrical storm and touching his knuckle to a key tied to the kite.

GOP Boasts Oldest, Youngest Presidential Candidates In History

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The next president may be the youngest, or the oldest, in United States history.

If 41-year-old Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota wins the Republican nomination and the election, he will be the youngest of our chief executives.

If 88-year-old Gen. Douglas MacArthur is the Republican nominee and is elected, he will be the oldest man to take over the presidency.

Youngest President was Theodore Roosevelt, who at 42 stepped up from the vice presidency after the assassination of McKinley in 1901.

Oldest President was William Henry Harrison, inaugurated 23 days after his sixty-eighth birthday. If General MacArthur becomes the next President, his inauguration will take place six days before his sixty-ninth birthday.

White Horse To White House

President Harrison, old warrior of Tippecanoe fame, rode his white horse from the White House to the Capitol on a windy inauguration day. He contracted pneumonia after standing in a raw wind for an hour while delivering his inaugural address. He died exactly one month after his inauguration.

Next two oldest Presidents were James Buchanan and Zachary Taylor, 65 and 64, at their inaugurations.

Harry Truman was 60 when he succeeded President Roosevelt and if he is elected next Fall will be 64 at his second inauguration.

Second youngest President was Ulysses S. Grant, who was 46 when he took office.

Canada's Socialists Gain Two Seats

OTTAWA — (AP) — Canada's socialist party, the Cooperative Commonwealth Federation, picked up two seats in the House of Commons in by-elections Tuesday at the expense of the ruling Liberal Party.

The Liberals remained the dominant party, however, with 126 seats, to 66 for the Progressive Conservatives and 31 for C. C. F.

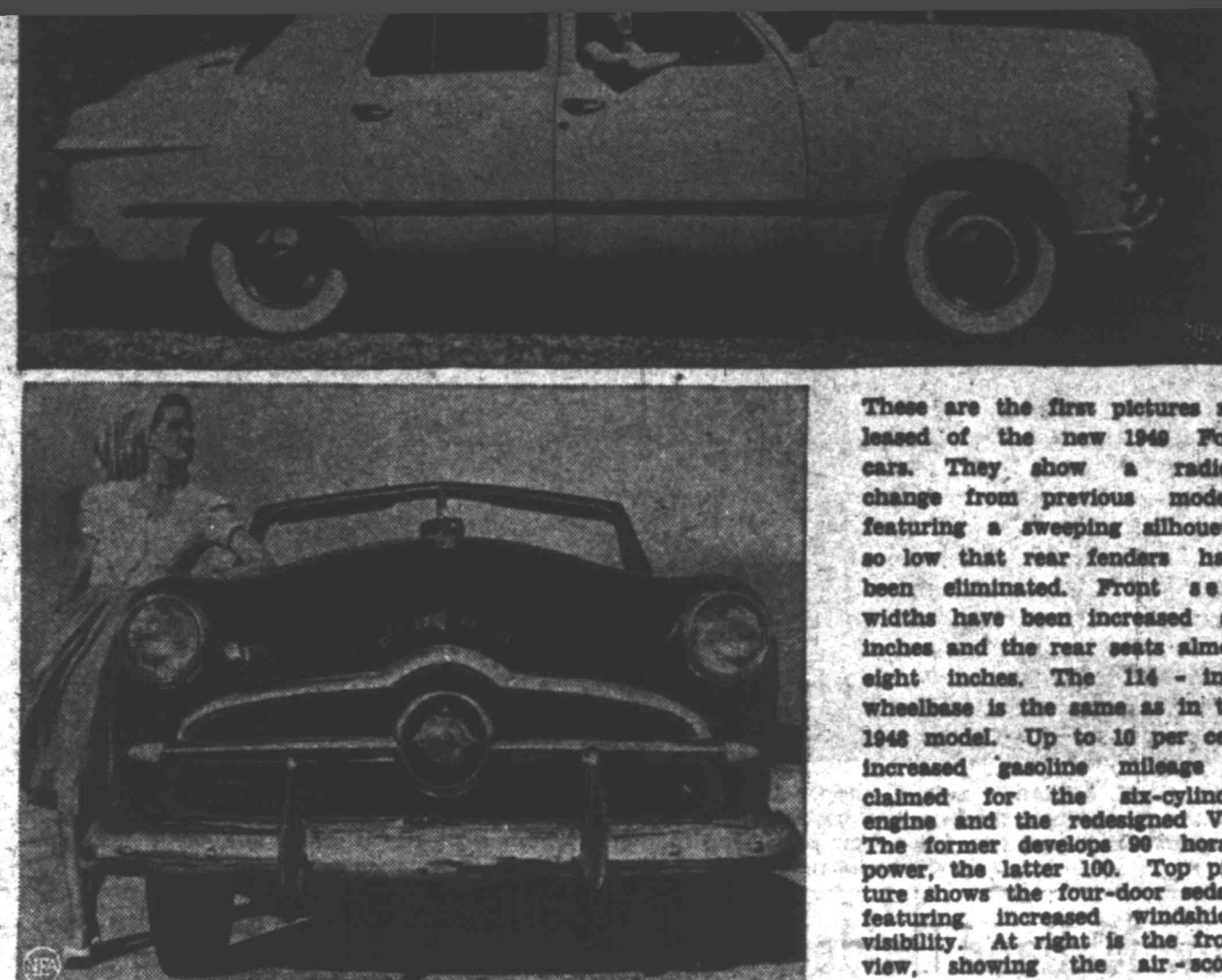

Comic Book Plane Flyer Goes To Boys Ranch; Learned Flying From Father

The comic book merchants won't like this:

Twelve-year-old Ronnie Peterson says he didn't learn to fly a plane by reading comic books.

Ronnie and an 11-year-old pal attracted national attention by borrowing a light plane from an Oklahoma City airport, flying it 120 miles, making two takeoffs and two landings without accident. They learned to fly by reading comic books, they said.

"Now, I don't read comics," Ronnie told Norton Spayde of the Amarillo Globe-News.

"That was Jimmy. He reads 'em. But I don't like anything but the real funny ones. I read western stories and horse stories. (Jimmy is Jimmy Bovard, 11 years old, who went with Ronnie on the flight.)"

Ronnie got into trouble over the plane deal. But he is straightened out now, and the newest hand at Amarillo's Boy's Ranch, famed home for unlearned youngsters.

Step-Father Helped

His step-father Frank Knight, farmer and rancher in the Panhandle, also a flyer, helped Ronnie get to Boy's Ranch. Norton Spayde told the story how Ronnie's dad died when he was nine. His mother married Knight, but two years ago there was a parking, and the mother took the boys back to Oklahoma City. Ronnie had just finished the sixth grade when he got into trouble with the airplane.

When the step-father heard about it he made several trips to Oklahoma, talked with the mother and the juvenile court authorities, and all agreed that Boy's Ranch was the place for Ronnie. Ranch President Cal Farley fixed it up for Ronnie. Knight flew to Oklahoma City, picked up Ronnie and flew him to Amarillo in his Piper Cub.

Knight keeps the plane at his ranch, and it was in the Cub that Ronnie got his first experience in flying. He had "three or four" rides in the plane before he left the Knight place last year.

Any Kid That Reads

"Any kid that reads anything knows the basic principles of flying," says Ronnie.

The Piper that brought Ronnie back to Texas was the only plane he has been in, except the Ercoupe that got him in trouble.

The boy rubbed his hands over the smooth curves of the plane. He loves planes. He loves horses too, and can operate a tractor and most other farm equipment.

Cal Farley says he will make a good hand at Boy's Ranch. His step father is going to help Ronnie finish school, including high school, at the ranch.

Andy Bryon Retires From Army Air Force

M/Sgt. Andy Bryon, USAF, who was one of the first men assigned to Midland Army Air Field in 1942, retired from the service, effective May 31, at Goodfellow Field in San Angelo.

Sergeant Bryon served a total of 27 years, six months and 11 days with the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force. He enlisted at Fort Logan, Colo., May 23, 1915. He was promoted to master sergeant Sept. 15, 1940.

While serving at Midland in August, 1942, he was discharged to accept direct appointment as a first lieutenant. He served through the officer grades through lieutenant colonel, and was separated with that rank on Oct. 30, 1947. He re-enlisted as a master sergeant April 27, 1948.

Sergeant Bryon served overseas in France and Germany for three years following World War I, and later served in Hawaii and the Philippines. He was stationed on the Aleutian Islands from June, 1944, to September, 1945.

Bryon came to MAAF during its activation in 1941. He was transferred to San Angelo with the 34th Flying Training Wing in 1943. He has many friends in Midland.

Dixie Democrats Will Offer Candidate If Truman Renominated

JACKSON, MISS.—(AP)—Southern States' Right Democrats will offer their own presidential candidate if the national party nominates President Truman.

The Campaign Committee of the states' rights announced Tuesday night it will call a convention in Birmingham, July 17, to choose their own candidate if Truman wins at Philadelphia earlier that week.

At the same time the committee said its action did not constitute either a "bolt" from the national party or formation of a third party.

Merritt Gibson of Longview, Texas, committee spokesman, said states' rights will caucus at Washington or Philadelphia prior to the convention and formulate "demands" to be made upon the national convention. If these are refused, he said, state rights delegates may walk out. The specific character of the "demands" was not disclosed.

Gibson Explains Plan "If the convention is not in agreement with certain demands made up to it, the caucus would leave it up to the convention whether or not the delegates would be seated," Gibson said.

"The delegates would decide at the pre-convention caucus whether they would take their seats."

"If the Birmingham conference is necessary," the Texas declared, "it would not be a third party or a bolt. It would merely suggest a man for President and vice president. The support of those men would be a matter to be left to the individual states."

These suggested candidates would be recommended to the party in each state for support, he declared. The campaign committee was created here May 10 at a south-wide meeting of States Rights Democrats.

Gov. Ben Laney of Arkansas was named permanent chairman of the movement.

South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, Arkansas, and Texas were represented at the campaign committee's meeting.
