





Super-Union Idea

James C. Petrillo played some variations on an original theme for the American Federation of Musicians convention in Asbury Park, N. J. Last March, when he lifted his ban on union music for television and renewed his contract with the networks, he explained that the broadcasters "simply said that they couldn't give us more men

and more money, and I took them at their word."

But the AFM president told the convention that he had failed to get them more work and money for grimmer reasons. He said no union is strong enough to win a strike today. He said that if an employer gets into trouble he can go to the U.S. Attorney General, and that "if you go on strike they slap an injunction on you and you go to work anyway.

"You take what some bum offers you who knows nothing about your business," Jimmy told his boys. "An employer has the right to sue you for anything."

We don't know which is the feal reason why the usually leonine Petrillo behaved like a lamb last March. But he is obviously exaggerating, as most union executives do, the horrors of the Taft-Hartley Law.

Unions can and do win strikes today. They are not forced to take anything offered them. The Taft-Hartley Law has now made a contract as binding on a union as on anyone else, and an employer can sue for breach of contract and resulting damages. But he cannot "sue you

Petrillo also knows how many injunctions have been slapped on how many unions. He knows the government has ordered the miners and railroaders to keep working because they would stop the country in its tracks if they didn't.

But all this lamentation—and Jimmy got so worked up at one point that he wept-was a buildup to a call to arms. He warned that many unions would be wiped out icy questions. They range all the if organized labor-AFL, CIO, railroad brotherhoods and independents—did not band together to save itself. He called for one big union of 20,000,000 workers.
