Mrs. Ken Regan Will Launch Campaign For Husband's Reelection







It will probably continue for about 100 feet, and then run another drillstem test-unless some petroleum shows are encountered above that point. 

Finesse Is Needed

A fight between two boxers who have no defensive skill is usually a rough affair. Each will take a punch to land one, slugging toe to toe without science or finesse.

The result usually has the spectators in a howling frenzy of excitement. But it is never a brilliant illustration of the manly art of self-defense.

A political fight of this nature seems to be shaping up between the President and Congress. Truman has called the present Congress the worst, or maybe the second worst, in the country's history. Some congressmen have returned the compliment, without any qualifications.

Thus each indirectly admits the other is right. Truman doesn't claim that he has been the best President in our history, nor do the legislators boast that the 80th Congress has the proudest record. They have thrown defense aside and are all out for attack.

This does not promise to be an edifying spectacle. And when the President hints that there may be more of the same "when things warm up and we get into politics," many voters will feel a chill of apprehension. For it promises to rob the coming campaign of the vestige of sanity which usually survives the solemn quadrennial ceremony of choosing a new Chief Executive and body of lawmakers.

The prospect of a debate on whether we really have had the worst government in our history during the last two years is somewhat degrading. It also threatens to becloud certain important issues and deepen the normal partisan divisions of an election year by artificial means.

Any such theme for a campaign debate would tend to degenerate into a Democratic-Republican argument. That, of course, is not what it really is. It is a White House-Capitol Hill argument. There are partisan aspects to the feud, but there are also partisan activities that contradict

Standard radio equipment is all that s needed in a plane where the system is to be used, and Mallory believe pilots have no business flying at night unless they have two-way radio communication. Therefore, use of his invention would necessitate no expensive additions to plane radio equipment. The electronic tone generator, for pilots who prefer it to mechanical whistles or notes produced by their own lips, weighs only a pound and a half. The inventor has no way of determining, as yet, what it will cost to produce the unit for general use, but he hopes to be able to sell it

Lights Right Runway When the receiver is connected with wind T's, it will automatically light up the right runway for pilots; if the wind is changing, blowing in gusts from different directions, two runways will be lighted. If the unit fails for any reason, it will automatically turn on the lights at the moment of failure and the lights will be left burning until the receiver is repaired. Such are some of the elaborate safety measures Mallory has built into his invention. He has tried to give every part of the equipment-tubes, wiring, and other parts - as high a safety factor as possible.

"Even a safety device has to have its own safety devices," he says. He doubts whether he will make much money from the invention, even though it proves highly practical, but he believes he may prevent a lot of pilots from suffering the fear he felt the night he landed in San Antonio in the dark.



WARSAW-(P)-Poland's health agencies are fighting a hard war against tuberculosis. It has been claiming as high as 18,000 lives monthly-more than 200,000 year. Millions of Poles are sufferng tuberculesis in some form.

The health ministry, assisted by

the Danish Red Cross, the Nor-wegian Red Cross, the Polish Red Cross and other agencies, plans cuberculosis examinations within the next two years for approximately 2,000,000 persons aged two-to 18 years. The Children's Emer-gency Fund of the United Nations is slated to give substantial aid in this big drive to detect, arrest, curs or prevent tuberculosis.

Instead of injuring private business, TVA's friends insist that the system has created a new frontier of consumer demand so great that it may take years to

Floyd Jones, manager of the Gibson County Co-Operative, with headquarters at Trenton, Tenn.. believes that he can show any visitor, with facts and figures, just what a big boon TVA has been to private enterprise in his

"Pet Milk Company has opened a dairy processing plant in our neighborhood," Jones says. "It's processing 67,000 pounds of milk a day from 949 farms in four "At present there are only four

milk coolers on those farms-but 125 others are in the market for milk coolers. At present only 15 have dairy water heaters—but approximately 300 others want dairy water heaters. Only a few have hay driers and feed grinders now-but most are in the market for hay driers and feed That's Business

"That's business," Jones says, "private business, private enterprise. It's business for the big manufacturers of electrical equipment." And it all can be traced directly to the work of TVA and the presence of TVA power, he

added.
The Gibson County Co-Operative, which Jones manages, is the world's largest electrical co-operative from the standpoint of members. It has 15,000 rural members. It started 10 years ago with the aid of \$25 borrowed from the Farm Bureau to pay its charter expenses.

It operates in a territory of West Tennessee where electricity wasn't available, outside of a few small municipalities, prior to TVA. The co-op, with the assistance of Rural Electrification Administration lines and TVA power, has pushed service out to its 15,000 members.

Many of them, like the soy bean mills at Tiptonville or the strawberry processing plants at Bells, are home-grown enterprises - started by local business men to serve a need and a market that were neglected before. Others, such as the Humboldt Full - Fashioned Hosiery Mill, at Humboldt; the Rutherford Garment Works, at Rutherford; or the Brown Shoe Company plant, at Selmer, are branches of outside industries which established plants in rural areas that were predominantly agricultural before.



Mars is 1,52 times as far from the sun as is the earth, he stated, and therefore the intensity of the sun's rays striking the outer atmosphere of Mars is much less in-tense than that falling on the

Summer on Mars at 43 degrees latitude, said Tikhov, corresponds to Winter on the earth at the same latitude. (Portsmouth, N. H. and Milwaukee, Wis., are located at about this latitude.)

Martian atmosphere is thinner and absorbs less, said Tikhov. This, he said, "creates special con ditions for plant growth."

Izvestia explained that Tikhov had come to his conclusions after through powerful telescopes as well as study of plant growth in

cold areas of the earth. The paper said Tikhov plans an expedition to the subarctic soon for observation of Mars.

New York has provided three special colleges to accommodate 6,200 veterans, and has helped 52 regular colleges and universities to house and care for more than 100,-000 new students, which more than doubles the ability of the state's institutions to educate veterans without neglecting youngsters just out of high school

Taxes have stayed just about where Dewey found them when he took over after years of Democratic administration. Gov. Herbert H. Lehman had cut the state income tax in half. Dewey kept it there until the veterans' bonus was au-thorized. Then he insisted on providing to pay that off, and as a major part of the financing program the personal income tax was raised by 20 per cent.

Instead of cutting taxes greatly, Dewey chose to pay off state debt and lay up reserves to pay off post-war state construction. He has cut the state's debt by \$136,000,000, and saved more than \$600,000,000 for public works.

His publicists claim credit for simplifying the income tax. He has done that, but in general the state's simplification has followed that of the federal government. Its short form return is about as easy to handle as Uncle Sam's, but the long form, for those who want to or must report in full, still is more

complicated. The state's mental institutions which were in pretty bad shape, have been vastly improved since Dewey took office. State aid to education has been increased by 80 per cent. Administration of relief to the needy has been streamlined so that the deserving can ge


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
