

SUN TO TEST OIL SECTION IN SW SUREY PROSPECT

Production tests are to be made at Sun Oil Company No. 1 Emil Schaeff, Southwest Sundry County prospective oil discovery from a Pennsylvanian lime.

This venture, seven miles south-west of Snyder, and 1,900 feet from south and west lines of section 18E, block 37, T&T survey, drilled the plug on T-inch casing which had been set at 6,854 feet, when the total depth was at 6,859 feet.

Operator cored from 6,859 feet to a new bottom at 6,891 feet. There was a 100 per cent recovery. The material was lime, with excellent signs of oil. No water was indicated in any of the cores.

A string of tubing had been run and a production packer was to be set so that the yielding ability of the open hole can be investigated.

This prospector had good oil saturation in the lime from 6,816 feet to 6,859 feet, and drillstem tests run on that interval, before the casing was set, developed interesting amounts of free oil.

FLACID TO TRY TO MAKE WELL AT C-SW ANDREWS VENTURE

Flacid Oil Company (H. L. Hunt), No. 1 E. C. Nix, Central-Southwest Andrews County exploration, 12 1/2 miles southwest of the town of Andrews is bottomed at 3,455 feet in the lower Permian lime.

It has set a string of 5 1/2 inch casing at 7,300 feet, and will make production tests on several sections which have shown some signs of oil and gas. The testing will be through perforations in the pipe.

Informed observers say the project has its best chance of making an oil well, and a new discovery in the upper Fullerton lime at 6,978-7,002 feet.

A drillstem test was run on that same for one and one half hours. Recovery was 90 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud; 2,800 feet of mud cut oil and 100 feet of salt water.

Another drillstem test was taken at 7,384-7,432 feet. The test was open three hours and 15 minutes. Recovery was 90 feet of light oil and gas cut mud, and 270 feet of heavy oil and gas cut mud.

The venturer is to go down to 7,455 feet and took a two and one half hour drillstem test with the packer at 7,432 feet. Recovery was 270 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud. No water has been developed in the current operations.

This development is 1,200 feet from south and west lines of section 21, block A-47, psi survey.

SOBGO NO. 1-A NIX IS SHUTDOWNT BY OPERATORS

Shandling Oil & Gas Company No. 1-A E. C. Nix, near the north and 1,985 feet from east lines of section 21, block A-47, psi survey, tested through casing perforations at 7,940-80 feet. Recovery was 50 barrels of water, and no oil, in 48 hours. The project is shutdown for orders. This development produced water in the Ellenburger above 11,532 feet. It plugged back and set casing at 7,940 feet, to test the lower Permian. So far it has shown only water. That section had some free oil on a drillstem test before it drilled on down to the Ellenburger, but since plugging back operator has not been able to make the venture show any of that oil.

NO. 1 PRAY IS TO PLUG BACK AND TEST IN FUSSELMAN ZONE

D. D. Feldman Oil Company, Inc., et al, No. 1 Max Pray, Sundry County wildcat, which developed salt water in the Ellenburger in a drillstem test at 11,788-945 feet, is slated to plug back to about 11,805 feet, and test through blankets; 1,720 feet of gas cut water blanket, and 300 feet of gas and oil cut drilling mud, in a two and one half hour investigation. The drill pipe unloaded some fluid while being pulled.

This prospector is 600 feet from south and east lines of the west 120 acres of the south half of section 38, block Y, TCRH survey, and three miles west and slightly north of the discovery well for Ellenburger production in the Benedum field.

SPOC TO DRILL DEEP WILDCAT IN CENTRAL CROCKETT

Sinclair Prairie Oil Company No. 1-94 University is to drill to 9,000 feet, as a wildcat to test the Ellenburger in Central Crockett County. It will be 600 feet from north and west lines of the north half of section 30, block 30, University survey.

Problem Of Defining Enemy Confronts Draft Planners

WASHINGTON (AP)—The limited peacetime draft due to go into operation this fall poses a double-barreled morale problem for the armed services.

The first arises from the relatively small number of men to be called; the second from the absence of any identified enemy threatening imminent invasion.

An Army troop information and education expert said Wednesday both of these factors are being taken into account in plans for handling the new draftees.

On the first point he noted that selective service will call up only a handful of men. "Thus some draftees may feel that they are being singled out when few of their friends are called."

It will be the task of the information and education section to make the draftees understand why a uniform has been put on him.

As for the second difficulty, the expert said it is easier to get a soldier in a fighting mood when the teacher can point to a known enemy and tell the recruit what that enemy is planning to do.

Diplomatic delicacy keeps the Army from being too definite about what nation or nations might be potential enemies.

In general, the draftee will get the same program of information that all troops are given, but with some of it slanted toward the inductee.

He will hear talks and see educational movies about adjusting himself to military life; he will be told that everyone, not merely soldiers, are subject to discipline, but that the United States Army is "an army of citizens."

He will hear and read discussions on the Army's mission to seize and occupy land areas in war, and to stand occupation duty when a war is over.

And in this connection he will be told why it is necessary to maintain outposts as first lines of defense against sudden attack.

That will bring him up to the topic of geopolitics, a "science concerned with the dependence of the domestic and foreign politics of a people upon the physical environment."

And that brings up the matter of Russian international behavior—which is why the draftee will be in the Army, although the troop information and education section prefers not to state the case so baldly.

Devil's River Trees Midland Fishing Party

By STANLEY FRANK A group of Midlanders on a Fourth of July fishing trip came within a few feet of mass drowning in the roaring flood waters of Devil's River Sunday morning.

For six black hours they huddled in trees and watched the swirling tide. Time after time they climbed higher, and the water climbed after them until there was no more room for ascent. They reached topmost branches of their refuges just as the flood reached its own peak.

Eight Midlanders were in one tree. They were Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Attaway and their three-year-old son, John Francis, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Nicholson, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Gardner, and John Patterson.

This group left Midland Saturday and made camp near Pecan Springs, between Juno and Comstock. On one side of the camp was Devil's River; on the other side was an arid stream bed called Dry Devil's River. It was when the latter became flooded, about 1:30 a. m. Sunday, the party was marooned on an island.

Heard River Boating "I woke up and heard the water roaring, louder than ever, about 5 o'clock," Mrs. Attaway said. "It had been raining since shortly after midnight. I awakened my husband and he began moving camp supplies back from the rising waters. When he saw the river was coming up faster than he could move things to high ground, he awakened the rest of the party."

"Very quickly, the water was running into our cars. We moved to higher ground, taking what medicine and food we could grab as we ran, but the water came up until the highest point on our island was knee deep in water."

"We all climbed a tree. The flood covered up our car and that of the Nicholsons and Dan Gardner. It finally became about seven feet deep under our tree, and we had climbed as high as we could without breaking the tree down."

On the same island with this party was Don Colvin. He, Herb Franklin, Vern Chapman, Mr. Derben Eberhardt, Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Franklin and Bill Little, all of Midland, had camped in the same vicinity as the Attaway party. When the rest of Colvin's group left the camp site for safer ground, Colvin remained on the island, trying to (Continued on Page 11)

Eisenhower Boom Ebbs To Whisper

By JACK BELL PHILADELPHIA (AP)—President Truman's aides moved Wednesday to cut off any gallery attempts to start a nomination stampede at next week's Democratic convention.

This maneuver obviously was aimed at preventing a spectator chant from reviving the collapsing boom for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Leslie L. Biffle, convention sergeant-at-arms, announced 50 Philadelphia policemen and up to 50 private detectives will be on hand to keep galleries from influencing delegates in their choice of a presidential nominee.

In the face of indications that Eisenhower supporters are not giving up despite the general's statement he couldn't take the nomination, Democratic leaders began hedging the Eisenhower boom with fresh praise for President Truman.

Chicago Democratic Chief Clerk Jacob M. Arvey appeared to be veering in that direction.

Arvey told reporters that while he has been "pro-Eisenhower" he has been "pro-Truman" as well. In Washington, Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said Truman has no plans yet to appear at the convention which opens here Monday.

Although Democrats in such widely separated areas as California and New Jersey declined to take Eisenhower's "No" as final, the feeling in this convention city was that it is all over but the shouting.

He was born April 6, 1920, in Santa Anna, Texas, but had lived in Midland practically all his life. He attended public schools here and graduated from Midland High School in 1937. He entered the Air Force Feb. 1, 1942, and served as a C-47 pilot in the South Pacific. He was awarded the DFC and the Air Medal.

Survivors listed include the parents, and two sisters, Mrs. J. W. Starr and Mrs. Howard Chamblee, both of Midland.

Cox Advocates Drastic Moves To Curb Polio

AUSTIN (AP)—Drastic measures to combat polio were urged Wednesday by Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

Reported cases in 55 counties reached the "alarming total" of 589 during the first six months of 1948, compared with 292 cases in 68 counties in 1946, the last bad polio year.

Last week, 67 new cases were reported compared with 78 the week before.

"This staggering increase in polio in a brief two-year period evidences a need for drastic measures in all communities to combat the disease," Doctor Cox asserted.

"It is the responsibility of the people of the state to report themselves to their doctors whenever they recognize symptoms of polio. It also is their duty to give wholehearted cooperation to clean-up drives in their communities."

He urged immediate medical attention, especially at this time of year, for such symptoms as headache, fever, stiff neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. These, the health officer stated, are symptoms of polio.

Doctor Cox said that the first line of defense against polio is a carefully conceived and thoroughly executed clean-up campaign in all communities.

"Local police power should make such clean-ups mandatory," he said.

U. S. Attorneys Rush Court Action Plans To Halt Coal Walkout

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government attorneys rushed preparations Wednesday for possible court action to stop the strike of 40,000 miners in the steel industry's own coal mines.

Steel producers already have curtailed operations because of the threatened fuel shortage.

The 24-hour-old strike in the so-called captive mines started because the steel companies refused to sign the contract with John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers Union accepted by the rest of the coal producers.

Steel okayed the \$1 a day wage hike and 20 instead of 10 cents a ton Miners' Welfare Fund royalty but claimed a union shop clause in the agreement violated the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

Odessa Is Out Again

DALLAS (AP)—Odessa is out again. Odessa is a 20-year-old woman, not to be confused with the West Texas oil city of the same name.

An early Tuesday morning search for the young woman, punctuated by the flourishing of firearms and the battle cry, "Where's Odessa," broke the peace of two downtown hotels and a cafe.

Jewish Extremists Kidnap Five Britons

LONDON (AP)—The Foreign Office reported Wednesday that five British subjects were "kidnaped" in Palestine Tuesday night by Egun Zvi Lomax, a Jewish Communist organization.

A spokesman told a new conference the Britons were taken from a "building on which was hoisted the flag of the United Nations Truce Commission." He could not further identify the building.

"We take a serious view of this incident," he said.

Rumblings Behind Iron Curtain Add To Kremlin Woes

By The Associated Press U. S. planes flew coal Wednesday into besieged Berlin while the Kremlin masters read three notes from the Western Powers demanding an end to the blockade.

The Communists announced a two-year plan to tie Berlin economically to the Soviet occupation zone of Germany. They warned Berliners not to pin their hopes for the future on the Western air bridge over the Soviet blockade. The Communists also announced they were drawing up a constitution for a German republic—their answer to the projected Western German Constitutional Assembly.

The Russians were troubled with stirrings behind the iron curtain. Soviet Union Communists refused an invitation to attend the Yugoslav Communist Congress July 21, saying Premier Marshal Tito and his followers now are "outside the family of Communist parties."

Moscow said Albania has taken strong measures to guard her frontier with Yugoslavia and defied a Yugoslav demand to resume trade relations. Czechoslovakia again cheered former President Benes, who resigned without signing that country's Communist constitution.

Troop Movements Rumored The U. S. State Department had under careful study rumors of Soviet troop movements in Romania and Bulgaria toward the Yugoslav border. They also disclose a revival in Europe of the old speculation that Russia may try (a) to annex Romania and Bulgaria as Soviet republics and (b) to put the Red Army back into Czechoslovakia, from which it withdrew at the end of the war.

The rumors are receiving careful study at the State Department and national defense establishments. Military Force Unlikely The prevailing opinion among Washington officials seems to be, however, that the Russians will try to solve their difficulties without resorting to the open use of military power.

The view that Russia will refrain from any outright military move also is expressed by officials here in discussing the Berlin flood blockade.

There the Soviets have run headlong into a stone wall of opposition from the Western powers.

Paralleling evidence of the Western power determination to strengthen their position in Europe was given Russia in the conferences just started here on ways of providing American military support for the Western European Union.

Thus the Soviets' appeal for the moment to be in essentially defensive positions on both the Eastern and Western fronts of the cold war.

In Washington, the U. S. consulted with Canada and the five nations of the Western European Union over American military support. The Moscow newspaper Pravda charged the U. S., Britain, France and the low countries made (Continued on Page 11)

For nearly 100 years, the costumes worn by the famous quadrille had followed the uniform line—gay billowing skirts worn over frothy white, lace-edged, ribbon-threaded petticoats; frilly panties, long black silk stockings, and giddy garters. The whole thing ran into more than 30 yards of material.

Aumont's New Look, which includes the strapless bodice and the detachable skirt, made its debut this month at the Ches Carrere, the exclusive night club patronized by Princess Elizabeth and her hus-

other costumes, including the wispy ones for the Bal Tabarin's nude beauties which can barely be seen even at the Bal Tabarin.

"Naturally, I purposely retained the 19th century atmosphere in the new costume," he explained, "otherwise it would no longer be a Can-Can costume. But I introduced such modern features as strapless bodices and skirts which can be shed instantly for acrobatics. Few people realized how heavy the old-type costumes were and how much of an added strain they put on the girls dancing what has been recognized as the fastest dance routine in the world."

Army's Greatest Press Officer Was Pal Of All Correspondents

This is the fantastic record of a slim, 50-year-old veteran of two world wars, a man war correspondents proclaim as the greatest press relations officer the U. S. Army ever had.

Vessels is now a Texan. He stopped in Austin for dinner one night last February and is still there. He works on the Austin-American and has a two acre plot which sports the sign: "Dead Cow Ranch—breeder of pure-bred, white faced scorpions."

Native of Kentucky and long-time newspaperman, Major Vessels headed the press camp of the 12th Tactical Fighter Command, Wick Fowler, Dallas Morning News feature writer, was with him in Africa, Italy, Southern France and Germany. And this is the story Fowler told us recently:

Vessels (Fowler began) was the most unorthodox officer in the Army, a fast-talking bird with a little black moustache, pink cheeks, and brown eyes. If there was a rule he didn't violate, we never found out what it was. He ran his press camp for newspapermen, not for the Army. He called the newspapermen his clients and for them he never failed to supply the best of food, drink, housing, transportation and ready access to news.

Just Sit At Bar
A war correspondent could go see the fighting in one of Vessels' planes or cars or he could just sit at the bar Vessels provided and Jay would bring the war to him. It was a beautiful setup, and all the correspondents, men such as Ernie Fyle, Hal Boyce, Roland Norgaard and Kenneth Dixon were nuts about Jay and didn't want to be in any other press camp.

Vessels was the finest scrounger the Lord ever made—this means that he miraculously produced an air fleet, automobiles, wonderful chow and the finest liquors without ever signing his name to anything and without saying how he did it. A month before Rome fell Vessels was writing and telephoning for hotel reservations there. And all of us believe that as long as a year before Hitler surrendered, Jay's air fleet was flying cognac and champagne out of Berlin for his "clients."

When we took Naples, Jay quickly obtained a seven-story apartment hotel, one of the most exclusive in the city. We moved in and named it "Vessels Violent Villa." It was high on a hill, surrounded by sock sack guns and directly in the bomb run of German planes. During the air raids, while people with judgment sought safety, Jay would stand on the roof and go into ecstasies over the beauty of the sock sack. He had an utter disregard for danger. In those days he often flew piggy-back on F-8 fighter missions. His own son was a bombardier. Jay was a man who could have stayed at home.

Radar Nose
We credited him with a radar nose—he could stand on a perch of his apartment house, watch the ship's creep into Naples Bay and actually sense which ones carried fresh pork chops. That evening he would disappear for a while, and for days afterward the ice box would be heavily stocked with pork

chops. We called it 'moonlight requisitioning.'

Interviews with fighter pilots were always good, and 30 minutes after the hot pilots landed, they would be sitting in Jay's big bar, with correspondents around them. Vessels was supposed to be plugging the Air Force, but he brought in Ground Force heroes as well. And his planes ran regular runs to Anzio Beachhead for any writer who wanted to spot the ground action there.

I'll never forget those wonderful dinners in the Naples apartment. There was an absolute rule that rank was to be left outside the door. It was funny to see a private at one end of the table, shouting an argument with some general at the other. Officers who pulled rank weren't asked out—they were thrown out.

No Report
Jay had one period of worry. Washington got wind of the goings on at his Violent Villa and sent an inspector clear from the U. S. Vessels met him at the airport, feeling very shaky, but when the visitor asked about the crews' of barrage balloons Jay knew he had him. At once Jay began his confusing brand of double talk. Then the correspondents gave the inspector the same treatment. He left after a week, thoroughly confused and, as far as we ever learned, he never turned in any report.

Vessels had one rule—that a war correspondent's stories should be gotten out at all cost—by radio, by plane, by car—but gotten out. After the invasion of Southern France, it was Jay who smuggled out stories, not only for his own clients but for the men of other press camps. And he shielded and sheltered many newspapermen from other press camps who came to him begging for aid.

After marriage she's on her own. And what she doesn't do for herself, very likely doesn't get done.

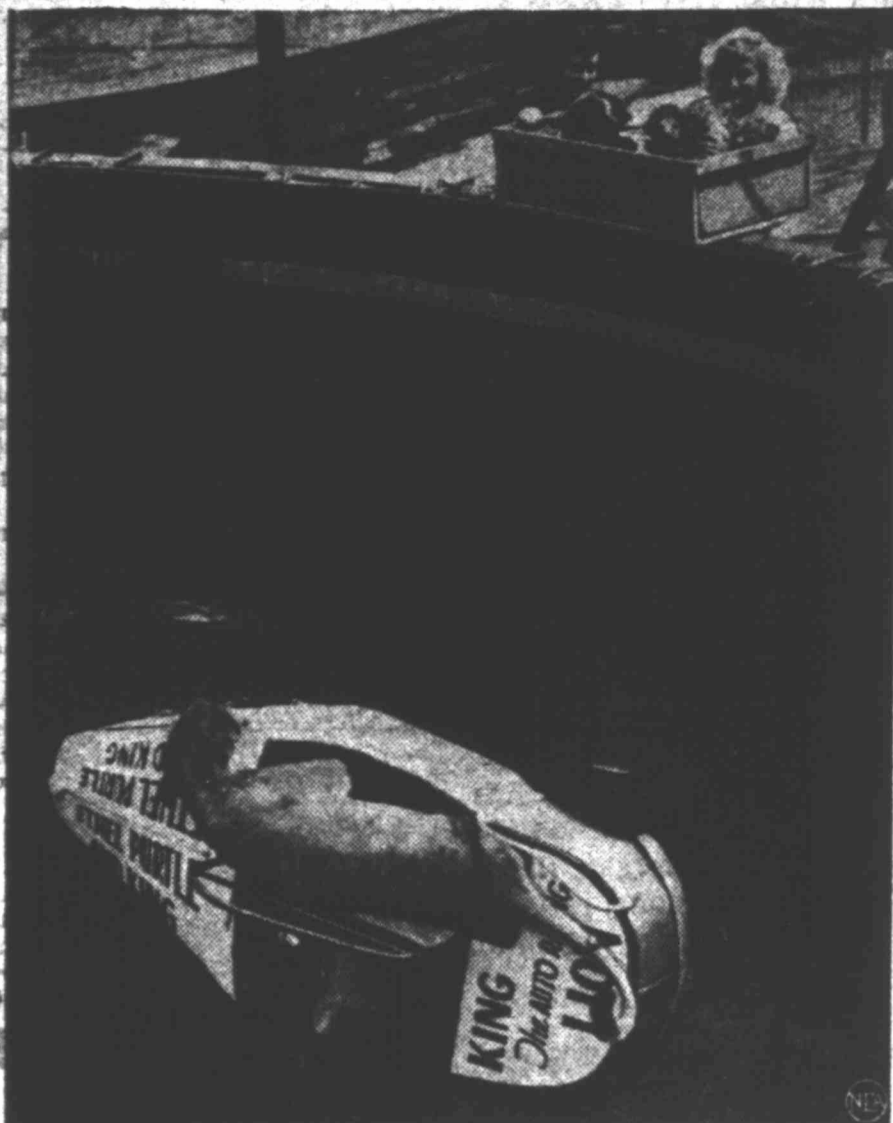
Before marriage a man will jump to wait on a girl, but after marriage his favorite phrase is probably, "Honey, while you're up would you mind getting so-and-so for me?"

Many GIs Who Don't Look Ill Suffer From Tropical Ailment

Dependent Kids Take Germany In Stride

CHIEF LAKE, GERMANY—(AP)—You have to be a family man to get into the U. S. Army-run hotel on beautiful Chief Lake in Southern Bavaria.

Bachelors are taboo in this strictly "family" resort. So are single women.
The Chief Lake rest center is the Army's answer to an occupation family's dilemma—how to have a cheap, enjoyable, and restful vacation with a batch of children.
The resort, one of the few in Europe designed to come to the aid of the harassed family man, has a special play area for small children, high chairs, cribs, and eight nursemaids.

On busy weekends the German nurse maids have their hands full with an average load of 50 young Americans—no snap for these "Kinderarten schwester."
"American children are very spoiled," says 22-year-old Ingrid, a German refugee from the Russian zone. "I think their parents are not strict enough."

Ingrid says she has little trouble in making herself understood. Her main difficulty is in making her self obeyed. She says she'll never forget little George, five-year-old little "Ami" who was at the hotel around Christmas time.

"He bit me in the arm and spit into my face," recalls Ingrid. "I tried to talk to him, but he kicked me. The next day his mamma gave me permission to spank him and he was quiet after that. He said it was the first time he ever had been spanked."

The German waitresses in the hotel's dining room find American children "very well behaved."
They're also much taken with the ways of American fathers.

"Most of the fathers," says waitress Betty, "feed their small children while the mother eats. A German father would never do this."
"We also find it touching that American fathers push the baby carriages and carry their little ones on their arms. In Germany this is considered unmanly."

Adolf Hitler undoubtedly never thought back in 1938 that the "Rasthaus am Chiemsee" would cater to American Army lieutenants pushing baby carriages. According to an inscription on the entrance, the hotel was built "by special order of Adolf Hitler."

Lt. Col. Paul E. MacLaughlin of Gloucester, Mass., who is in charge of the hotel, thinks it is one of the best liked Army resorts in Germany.
In keeping with theater-wide directives, officers and civilians pay \$1 a day room rent. Enlisted men and children are charged half price.

POLIO CASES TOP 100 MARK
HOUSTON—(AP)—The number of polio cases in Houston topped the 100-mark Wednesday. Three new cases were reported Tuesday.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An authority on tropical diseases says a million Americans who don't really look ill are suffering from some ailment picked up during military service in the tropics.

Many of them, says Dr. D. Thomas Mackie, Winston-Salem, N. C., have been told by their pursued doctors that they have malaria or are psychoneurotic. On the other hand, he says thousands of veterans are wrongfully collecting compensation for malaria attacks. He says what little malaria they really have is a simple, domestic disease, mild and no more troublesome than a cold.

Two of the ailments the GIs brought home from the Pacific Islands, the C-B-I theater and the Middle East—amoebic dysentery and hookworm—are a real threat to U. S. Public Health, Mackie said in an interview. Of veterans treated at his school of tropical medicine he says 61 per cent had parasitic infections, of which 36 per cent were amoebic dysentery and 10 1/2 per cent hookworm.

"Amoebic dysentery is very dangerous, and there is never a recovery without medical treatment," Mackie says. "I have seen an enormous amoebic dysentery of the liver develop 19 years after infection. Serious Health Problem"

"Every hookworm species under our study was identified as uncaria, a foreign hookworm more disabling and with a greater disease-making capacity than the American variety. This is potentially a very serious health problem, particularly in the Southern states. And the scandalous thing about these patients was that not one had had an accurate diagnosis, let alone proper treatment."

Mackie, a Veterans Administration (VA) consultant and war-time head of tropical medicine at the Army medical school, is considered the foremost U. S. specialist in his field. He says thousands of veterans and their families are still suffering from imported skin infections—chronic fungus diseases—which could be cleaned up within a week with proper diagnosis and treatment.

Mackie said the Southern states, popularly believed to have virtually rid themselves of their more notorious diseases, still have far to go. Among 1,000 patients examined at the Veterans Baptist Hospital last year—few of them charity patients—6 per cent had hookworm and 12 per cent amoebic infection. As for malaria:

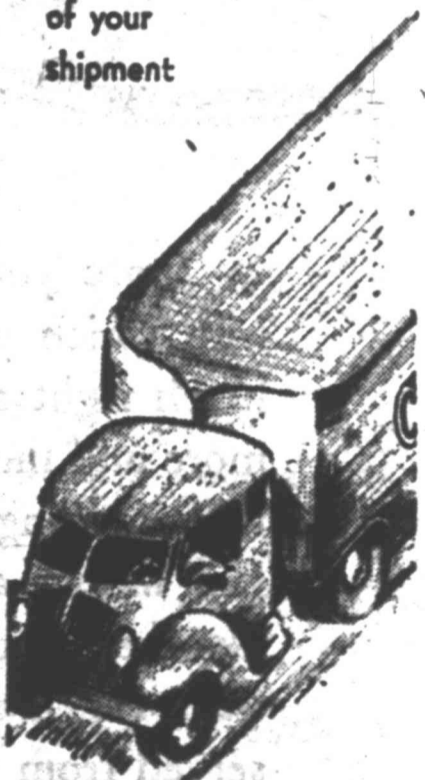
Hazards Exaggerated
"I have yet to see, in a year of treating veterans at Winston-Salem, a single individual showing any valid evidence of disability from malarial infection. The hazards of malaria have been terrifically exaggerated, especially as regards late relapses. The dangerous type that kills in the tropics very rarely relapses more than once or twice. The malaria cases without exception have proved to be the simple vivax malaria that we have in the United States, with no more than two or three days of illness a couple of times a year."

For the future, Mackie recommends:
1. A survey to determine the true incidence of tropical diseases. He estimates infected veterans at about 1,000,000.
2. Training of doctors and laboratory specialists in tropical medicine. At present, he says, the U. S. has only 12 doctors in this field, most of them with the VA.
3. Meanwhile admit proven cases of tropical diseases to the VA hospitals most convenient to the physician qualified to give treatment.
4. Offer "common decency and fairness to the boys who had to tough character and guts to insist on being evacuated when ill in the tropics. Many of these men have no military hospital record and can not get free veterans medical assistance.

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Bolshevists Near Showdown With Western Nations

The battle of Berlin between Russia and the Western Allies is moving towards a showdown.

The blunt demand made by America, Britain and France that the Reds immediately lift the food blockade against Western Berlin is calculated to bring things to a head. This blockade of course represents a savage attempt to force the Democracies to evacuate the city by torturing the German people. Having gotten the Western Allies out of the way, the Bolshevists could form a separate state in Eastern Germany, with Berlin as its capital.

Washington, London and Paris have called Stalin's hand, and at a time when the iron curtain is showing considerable wear and tear at vital points like Yugoslavia, Finland and Czechoslovakia.

Equally impressive was the announcement in Washington that the ambassadors of Canada and five Western European Nations had been called into conference with Undersecretary of State Lovett. The five Europeans are Britain, France, The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg, which recently formed an alliance. These conversations have to do with possible American military support for the Western European bloc.

Anxious Time For Reds
There can be small doubt that the general European situation provides an anxious moment for the Muscovites. The defiance and dislike being registered by the three satellite states comes from countries which are strategic points in Russia's battle front through Europe.

These signs of weakness developing in the Bolshevik battline certainly don't lend strength to the Russian campaign against the Western Allies in Germany. When the battle line still seemed unpaired it was quite clear Moscow was prepared to force the issue against the Western Powers by all means short of actual gunfire. Russia hasn't wanted war, but in order to further her Red revolution in Europe she has been willing to take many risks in an effort to browbeat the Democracies.

The Allied notes calling for an end to the food blockade should force the Soviet to disclose whether it has carried its challenge as far as seems smart at this juncture.

NEW YORK—(AP)—The cry toward war gets louder. It goes into the bars, it reaches into the homes.

It comes down on the elected heads of the people, and it reaches into the hearts of the men who may have to lead the American nation in the next war—if it comes.

One who considers it with no enthusiasm is the man whose orders cost more American lives in the second World War than any other commander.

His name is Gen. Omar Nelson Bradley, the Army's Chief of staff. He is a tall, gaunt, homely man from Missouri.

General Bradley was the architect of victory in the field of Europe during the second World War but didn't get overseas during the first fracas.

He once said he had spent the intervening period explaining why he hadn't. And when he was asked how he could order hundreds of thousands of soldiers to undertake missions that might mean their deaths, he replied soberly:

"I spent 30 years of my life preparing for this."

It was said in complete honesty and sincerity—is typical with General Bradley.

Loyalty From Heart
From El Guettar in Africa to the River Elbe in Germany, no field commander had more to do with the Allied triumph. He was Eisenhower's right hand.

General Bradley commanded more fighting troops overseas than any other man in American history.

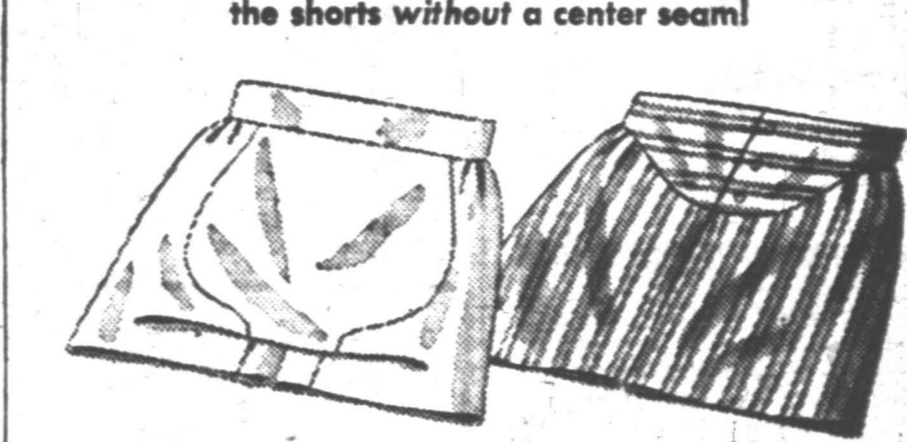

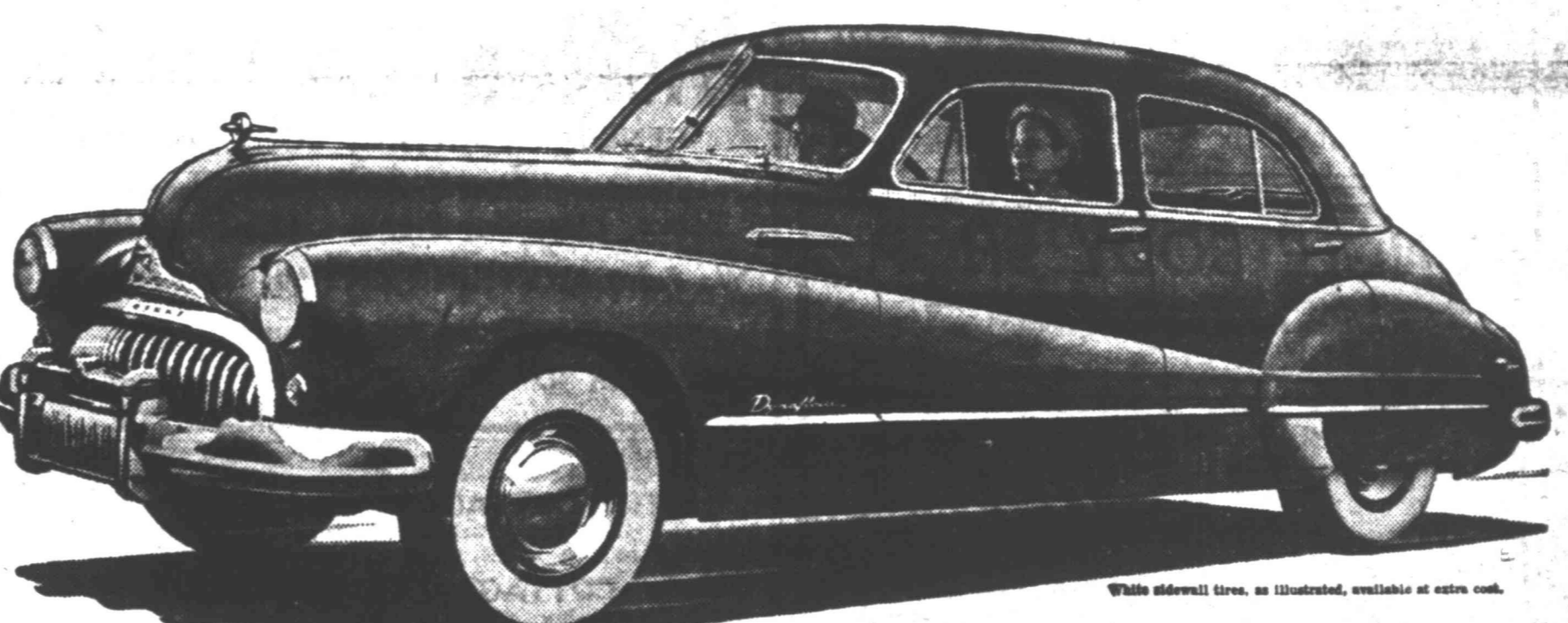

"Whereupon you went out, the unappreciated husband, chased around and wound up out here, is that it?"

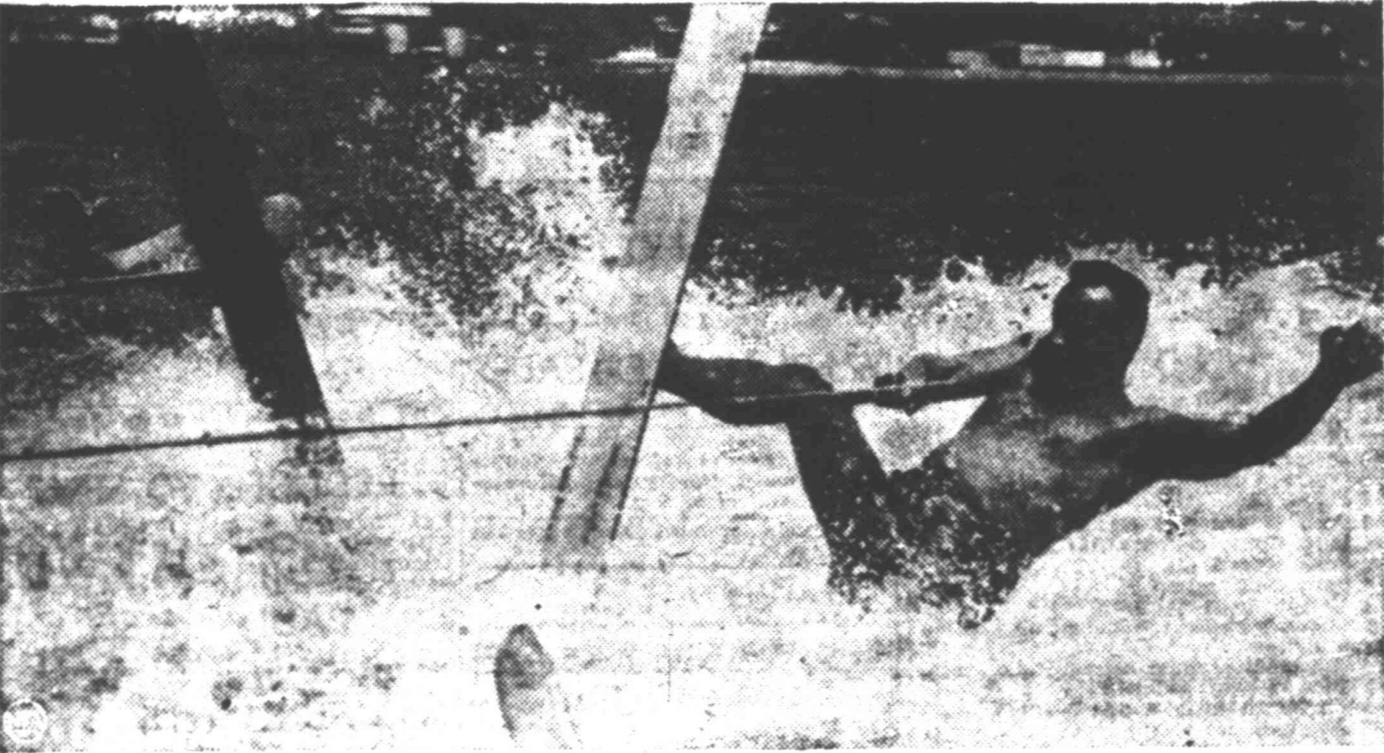
"If you want the record straight, I sat around a while, listened to the news on the radio, came out here in a taxi to stay overnight and have some morning golf."

McKenney on Bridge

Today's hand, which was played in the world-championship masters individual tournament, is one of the most sensational hands to come out of a championship tournament.

I happened to kibitz George Rapee, of New York City, when he played the hand. It certainly looked as if West was correct in doubling the four-spade contract.

Against Rapee the six of clubs was opened. East did not put up the king. He played the ten-spot, so South won with the jack. The queen of spades was led and won by West with the king. West returned the queen of hearts. Rapee won, cashed the ace of clubs and ruffed the small club in dummy with the four of spades.

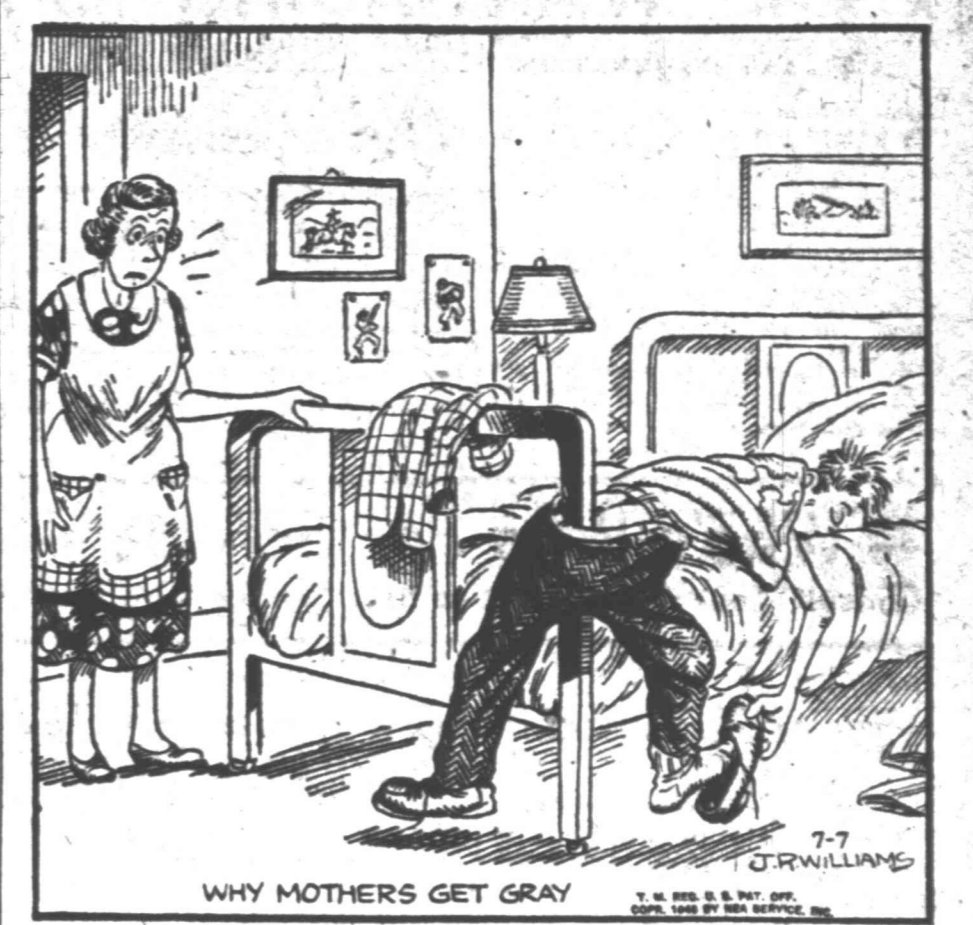
His next play was a diamond to the ace, then a small diamond with the queen and the king of diamonds cashed, on which Rapee discarded his last club. Then a small heart was ruffed.

At this point he was down to the jack, ten, seven and six of trump, while West was down to the ace, nine, eight and three. Rapee led the jack of spades, and no matter how West played, he could make only two more spade tricks. If he took the jack, he would have to give West another spade trick. If he ducked, declarer would lead the seven of spades.

The hand was discussed a great deal, as to whether or not any defense would defeat it, and I believe that the following play, which was not made by any West player, will defeat the contract. Lead the king of spades, and when it holds, continue with the nine of spades. Now declarer cannot ruff a club or get in two club finesses. However, I do not think that any good player would suggest that line of defense without knowing the hand.

Name-Calling Becomes Favorite Pastime Of U. S. Senate Hopefuls

Here's a handy little round of name-calling in the U. S. Senate race. So far, George Peddy is the champion name caller and hasn't been called any names in return. Coke Stevenson has done less name-calling than anybody but has been the number one target for barbed oratory.

Lyndon Johnson has slung sarcasm at the Junction ranchman, but has never punched Peddy.

Peddy has called Stevenson "a professional politician who has eaten at the public trough 30 years, a fence straddler, platform avoilder, a pussyfoot."

He has referred to Johnson as "a Johnny-come-lately" in recognizing the Russian crisis.

Of Johnson's helicopter, he said: "When they speak of the Johnson City windmill, are they referring to the machine or its occupant?" and commented: "An ape man could attract better crowds."

"Johnson," he said, "flies like the bird that flies backward. He doesn't know where he's going."

Stevenson also took a crack at the helicopter: "It has not been necessary for me to engage in side-show stunts."

Seek Peddy Votes Johnson labeled Stevenson "a crafty do-nothing, a silent, backward, pipe-puffing has-been." He also spoke of him as "the frightened candidate." Also, as "a pipe-puffing old man."

Peddy once lumped his opponents together as "two professional office holders who have much - touted political organizations."

Robert Wear, staff correspondent of a Texas daily newspaper had this to say about why he believes neither Johnson nor Stevenson are heeding Peddy:

"Both Stevenson and Johnson followers have told news writers, in almost identical words, their measure of George Peddy of Houston as 'a good fellow, but he doesn't have a chance.' Both camps admit frankly they'd like to get all of the Peddy votes we can in the second primary."

"Consequently, both Stevenson and Johnson have refrained thus far from making any reference to Peddy in their public statements."
