





## Former Ruhr Steel King Goes On Trial

KOENIGSTEIN, GERMANY -(A) - Fritz Thyssen, 74, former Ruhr steel king who broke with Adolf Hitler at the outbreak of the war,

went on trial Monday before a German denazification court. Thyssen fled to Switzerland the day before the outbreak of war in 1939. He telegraphed Hitler that he opposed Nazi war policy.

From Switzerland he went to Monte Carlo and Southern France. The Vichy government extradited him to Germany, where the Ges-tapo sent him to a concentration camp.

He was "liberated" by the American Army. Prosecutors in the International War Crimes Trials at Nuernberg did not want him, but German authorities held him to face denazification charges.

## A Bank Views Advertising

Ever alert for ideas which will benefit the Permian Basin area, Midland, and business in general, our friend Carl Wevat recently returned from a trip to New York state with some sound advice. He brought a clipping from the Utica, N. Y., Daily Press concerning advertising.

The Utica Daily Press pointed out that American in-

surance companies recently have crossed the Canadian border to invest in Canadian bonds.

They have observed that Canada has less inflation than we do and may have concluded that Canada's business is on a fairly even keel. For that reason it is interesting to observe that the current letter of the Bank of Canada discusses advertising as a tool of business."

The Bank of Canada's letter says in part: People don't make a beaten path to the mousetrap maker's door unless they know he has made a better mouse trap and has a stock for sale at a price they can pay.

That is what the advertising business is all about. Mousetraps and pig iron, automobiles and breakfast foods are useless if people remain in ignorance of their existence and unaware of how they may be used. Advertising serves the man who produces, by enabling him to dispose of his goods, and the man who consumes, by telling him what is available to add to his satisfaction in life.

The question is sometimes asked—and not only by ersons with queer economic ideas—"Why advertise? The answer can be given by drawing three circles: a big one, a smaller one inside it and a smaller inside that. The little circle indicates the number of prospects that can be met personally by sales force, the next larger shows the wider group that can be reached by a well-built mailing list, while the outer circle shows the extent to which prospects can be canvassed by advertising in its various forms of publication and display.

One of the first positive rules is that advertising is an investment, not a speculation. Gambles in advertising, followed by disappointment and retrenchment, are wasteful. They upset the economic equilibrium. They give business that air of starts and stops so well summed up in the terse telegram of the conductor of the often-derailed train: "Off again, on again, gone again: Finnegan."

Another rule is that advertising is fruitless if the advertiser does not offer something which will genuinely serve some human want.

The third rule is not to expect overwhelming returns in the way of sales from the first ad or two. Advertising does not work that way. It deposits in the mental storehouse of the prospect impression after impression until he has a well-defined picture of the product and the service it will perform for him.

## Scientists Urge Parley To Solve World Problems

LONDON —(P)— Scientists from 10 countries recommended Monday that the United Nations call a scientific conference to see what science can do about the present state of the world.

It should, they said, convene qualified representatives of the social sciences and psychiatry, appointed by their governments, to inquire into existing international tensions and to make relevant proposals."

The declaration was contained in a 44-page statement of the Preparatory Commission for the International Congress on Mental Health. It was made public with the opening of a six-day mental hygiene conference, part of the congress. Science, it says, can help in "adapting human institutions so that men can live together as world citizens in a world community."

"World citizenship can be widely extended among all peoples through the application of the principles of mental health," it states. Mental Health Services

"The concept of world citizenship implies loyalty to the whole mankind. Such new loyalty need not conflict but rather embraces traditional loyalty to family, community and nation. x x x"

It urged that the U.S. establish mental health services in occupied Germany "to deal with the disastrous effects of present conditions there, which are a threat not only to the welfare of the country, but The document notes that men




