**SECOND WIN**

**Chiefs Add Scalp At Bovina, 46-6**

The Friona Chieftains took advantage of three first quarter breaks for a quick 27-0 lead, and went on to a 46-6 win over the Bovina Mustangs in a game at Bovina Friday night.

The Chieftains recovered three Mustang fumbles, and took over another time following a short punt. The team scored after two of the fumble recoveries, and also after the punt.

Halfback Ted King scored three TDs. Dale Parsons scored twice and quarterback Clay Bandy added a pair of touchdowns, besides passing to Parsons for a TD.

The game was just over a minute old when Mitchell Wiseman hopped on a Ray Martinez fumble at the Bovina 26. Five plays later, King raced 26 yards around right end for the score, and Davy Carthel kicked his first of four PATs for a quick 7-0 lead.

The Mustangs fumbled on their first play from scrimmage, and Friona was back in business.

A 15-yard penalty stalled the drive momentarily, but Bandy hit Parsons in the flat, and he rambled 46 yards for the TD. Carthel's kick made it 14-0.

The shaky Mustangs fumbled again on the second play following the touchdown, but this time Bovina braced to hold the charge and took over on their 16-yard line.

However, a moment later, Friona put together a three play drive that covered 37

yards. King went 25 yards up the middle, and Carthel's third straight kick made it 21-0.

Apparently not understanding the options, the Mustangs refused a fourth down penalty against the Chieftains, giving Friona the ball at the Bovina 38. On the first play, Bandy raced 38 yards on a quarter-back option run, and it was 27-0 with 13 seconds left in a wild opening quarter.

Parsons became Friona's man of the hour on the next drive. He ran 24 yards to the Bovina 37, then made a pretty catch on a 20-yard pass from Bandy to the Bovina 17. Four

plays later, he fought his way up the middle 13 yards for the score and a 33-0 Friona lead. This turned out to be the halftime score.

King, the leading rusher with 151 yards, got 44 of them on Friona's second offensive play of the second half. The 160-pounder took a pitchout that Bandy flipped his way after a perfect fake. Carthel's kick was blocked, but the score became 33-0.

At this point, Bovina came alive. Paced by the running of Bryan Filpott and Elbert Shelby, and an 11-yard pass

**State Requires Physicals For School Bus Drivers**

Friona School Superintendent Alton Farr has already had major problems in attempting to hire school bus drivers and substitute drivers for the school year just underway, then early this week received information that further tightens restrictions for drivers.

At the school board meeting Monday night, the major part of the meeting concerned the new driver requirements. Number one on the list is a very stringent physical examination required for all drivers, including substitutes, before they are allowed to drive the bus.

According to the requirements, persons are eliminated if they have or have had any type of heart disease or problem, including high blood pressure or taking medication to correct high blood pressure or drugs with sedative effect. Also diabetes, hearing problems that can't be corrected with a hearing aid; vision problems that can't be corrected to 20/30 with glasses; color blind; persons with an artificial limb; at least two fingers and a thumb on either hand; epilepsy or convulsive disorder; speech defects; persons with a mental disorder, drug addiction or alcoholism; tuberculosis or other communicable disease or other defects which would affect his ability to drive a school bus.

Following a lengthy discussion, the school board agreed to pay the cost of the physical examination for all prospective drivers who pass the examination at the hospital but agreed to not be liable for an examination for persons who fail to pass the physical.

A tragic bus wreck early this year in a nearby county is thought to have been the major factor prompting the new physical requirements for drivers.

Also coming under much discussion was the school fire last month where a portion of the elementary school was destroyed in an early evening fire. The August 8 fire destroyed the library and a darkroom and did other minor damage throughout much of the school.

Damage estimates are above \$87,000 at this time, with some figures to come in, and possibly will go over \$100,000. At least \$6,000 in library books were destroyed, with the final figure unavailable at this time. Damage estimates were revised in some cases, and the school inside repair has been completed at the time of the meeting. Roofing is expected to be completed in the near future.

An approved amended budget was signed by members and tax collections were discussed by Porter Roberts, tax assessor-collector for the system.

Luncheon funds and use were among the items of discussion as well as the school activity fund and the new purchase orders required to be put into use.

The superintendent said the school had purchased a Scott Air Pack for the Friona Volunteer Fire Department for "outstanding work in containing the school fire and preventing further damage to the rest of the school." Superintendent Farr said the fire department still needs at least five air packs to bring the number up to the amount needed by the fire department to effectively provide a safeguard for firefighters. The air packs allow the firemen to go into extremely smoky buildings with relative safety.

The superintendent also told board members that the Friona Student Council has asked for a bonfire prior to Homecoming

**Record 222 Enter Football Contest**

A record-breaking 222 people entered the first week of the Friona Star's annual football contest, as the event kicked off a 13-week series.

Shaun Aguirre, 306 Jay Ave., Friona, emerged as the winner of the first week's contest, and \$5,000 in cash. Aguirre and Charles Wilkins, also of Friona, were the only two of the 222 entries to correctly pick as many as 13 games right on the side of 16 games.

Aguirre won the first-place money on the basis of his

**City May Stop Fire Calls In Country**

The probability of Friona's Volunteer Fire Department limiting its calls to fires within the city limits was discussed at length during the monthly Friona City Council meeting Monday night.

City Manager Jake Outland cited figures which showed that over 60 per cent of the department's calls during the past year were outside the city limits.

The department is reimbursed to the extent of only \$750 per year by Farmer County for its fire runs to places in the rural areas. It was pointed out that this is the same amount received by three other fire departments, including one at Lazbuddie.

"We cannot continue to make all of the fires in the rural areas on the basis we have been. The re-imbusement does not come close to paying for the maintenance of the equipment," Mayor R.L. Fleming says.

It was pointed out that many individual farmers have made contributions for fire calls to their farms, and the Farm Bureau pays so much for calls to their members. However, the need for more county participation in the fire calls was the main item of concern.

The council is to consider an ordinance at its next meeting which will possibly limit the fire calls by the Friona Fire Dept. to places within the city limits.

In other business, the council gave its final approval to the city budget for 1973-74, and passed an ordinance levying taxes.

Repayment of \$10,870 to developers in the Lakeview Addition was approved, under the old contract with the city. Contract was approved to re-letter the new water tower, with the words "Friona Chieftains and Squaws" in large letters.

Miscellaneous discussion included the city's efforts to purchase land for a sanitary landfill site, and preliminary plans of the Highway Department to widen Highway 60 eastward to the Deaf Smith County line.

A proposal from Pioneer Natural Gas Company, which would allow monthly adjustments in the rate the company charges its Friona customers, was tabled, after a vote of 2-2-1 stalemated the attempt at passing the request.

A bid from Friona Motors for furnishing a new police patrol car was accepted. Their bid of \$2435 exchange was lowest of the two city dealerships.

Motion was passed to purchase a specialized pump for the fire department, to cost \$1295.00.

**C of C Discusses Award Banquet Time Location**

A wrap-up of activities during the annual Maize Days Celebration and the upcoming Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Awards Banquet occupied most of the discussion during the monthly meeting of the CoC Tuesday morning.

The possibility of the Showbarn facility being completed and ready for use at the time of the February banquet seemed remote enough to the directors that the services of the Friona High School Cafeteria will be sought as for past banquets.

Following discussion on the unavailability of building supplies and a possible slowdown in construction due to adverse weather, the directors decided to contact the school and

reserve the cafeteria in order to be assured of a banquet location.

It was decided to continue the Christmas Lighting Contest, with special emphasis this year to be put on special awards for 'block lighting.' Details on the contest will be released as they are worked out during the next meeting or two.

Peggy Bryant, Chamber of Commerce secretary, said a group from the Lubbock Women's Chamber of Commerce Tour will be in Friona at 10 a.m. on Thursday, September 27. They will have coffee at the bank and tour Missouri Beef Packers and possibly a feed yard before going to Hereford for lunch.

That reminds me of driving up behind a travel trailer one time which had a sign on the back, "You just caught up with the Joneses."

But back to the Digest. I am fearful that we are becoming a "digest" generation.

I mean by that, we are allowing someone to read, think and digest things for us and then we get the product and "idea" that they produce...I don't like to think of my sirloin strip coming in the form of a capsule, either.

I REMEMBER A PERIODICAL which was offered to the pastors some time back which was dedicated to the reading of certain articles, hearing the messages and addresses given by certain men in the world of theology, etc--and then would condense their thought and print a summary in this little booklet and we could buy this service.

This would be much like the mother who--before baby food was canned and jarred--would put a bite of food in her mouth, mull it around for a while and then give it to the baby. It just seems to me that some food value was lost in the exchange....

Now don't get me wrong. I'm not against Motherhood or the practices of a good mother. I've never been in that position.

**CHARMING TOYS** sometimes present danger--in the form of "swallowable" parts.

Often a young child's first impulse is to taste a toy. Should a small part on that toy break away, the child will likely swallow it.

With so many toys to choose from, it's important that parents and other consumers examine a toy thoroughly before purchasing it. Unfortunately, packaging partially prevents this--as with items enclosed in plastic or boxed up.

Responding to this need, the

Food and Drug Administration has proposed to ban those toys meant for children under three which have parts small enough to swallow.

Concerning toys intended for older children, FDA suggested they carry or display warnings of potential danger if used by babies or toddlers.







## AT REEVE'S 1974 Chevrolets To Make Bow Thursday

Chevrolet Motor Division takes new strides forward as the industry's manufacturing and sales leader with important advances in sturdiness and road-ability in its seven different passenger car lines for 1974.

On the way to a third consecutive record "three million-plus sales" year, Chevrolet will introduce its new cars and trucks in dealership showrooms across the country on Thursday, September 20.

Locally, auto fans can see the 1974 Chevrolets and Oldsmobiles at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds beginning with Thursday's big auto show.

A total of 44 models are being offered by Chevrolet for 1974...four less than in the previous model year.

Greatest change is in the Chevelle line where a new sporty Laguna Type S-3 coupe is added while a luxurious new Malibu Classic series replaces the Laguna series at the top-of-the line. The Malibu becomes the standard series replacing the former DeLuxe designation.

"Improvements all across the board add value to all our car lines," says Glenn Reeve, local manager.

"Later in mid-year of the 1974 model run," Reeve added, "further excitement will be added with the introduction of the special performance Cosworth Vega. Heart of this limited production option," he said, "will be the Cosworth

Vega engine with dual overhead camshafts and 16 valves-four per cylinder.

In addition to the various styling and mechanical advances, Chevrolet is equipping all cars in 1974 with a sequential ignition interlock in the seat belt system that calls for the driver and front seat passenger to be seated with belts buckled before the car will start. Seat sensors and buckle switches operate sequentially to help prevent defeating the system.

### BUMPER CHANGES

There are three distinct bumper systems on Chevrolet cars in compliance with the more stringent government impact regulations.

They include the hydraulic-pneumatic energy-absorbing systems on the regular Chevrolet, Chevelle, Monte Carlo and Nova; the new spring-mounted aluminum bumpers with resilient impact strips on Camaro and Vega; and the body-colored urethane "soft" bumper covers with aluminum and cast iron reinforcement and draw bolts on the Corvette.

Engine power ranges from the Vega's aluminum alloy block four-cylinder 140-cubic inch power plant and the standard 250-cubic inch six-cylinder on up to an optional 454 cubic-inch V8.

In compliance with emission standards, California engine availability will be different from the rest of the nation.

Basically, all California V8s will have four-barrel carburetion. Additionally, Chevrolet is making a four-barrel 400 V8 standard for all big Chevrolet wagons and a two-barrel 400 V8 standard for Chevelle wagons... both for improved performance.

Various sizes of steel-belted radial ply tires are standard on Corvette, Monte Carlo and Laguna Type S-3 and available as extra cost options on all others. Headlining the broad variety of other Chevrolet developments for 1974 are new front and rear styling for standard-size cars; new styling for the Chevelle and Vega lines; new front and rear appearance for the Camaro; and styling refinements for the Monte Carlo.

The five coupes in the standard Chevrolet and Chevelle series have new roof designs. There are new bumper systems using for the first time extruded aluminum bumpers for Camaro and Vega.

Important chassis and structural improvements for greater driveability and durability also have been engineered into many 1974 models.

Other features for 1974 include wear sensors and indicators for disc brake lining and front suspension ball joint; new battery flame arrestor caps; a low internal resistance battery and a more simplified air conditioning system.

# Mustang II Highlights Ford's 1974 Debut

Mustang II, the most changed car in the auto industry this year, will debut along with other new 1974 Ford cars at Friona Motors in Friona on Friday, September 21 and trucks will be shown on Friday, September 28.

The Mustang II is a small, sporty and luxurious car that Ford expects to be the forerunner of a new class of cars. It is 19 inches shorter than the 1973 Mustang and seven inches shorter than the original Mustang introduced in April, 1964.

small car market, Mustang II seems to be coming at the right time," said Troy Young, manager of Friona Motors.

"It brings to the booming small car market the luxurious touches and smooth ride of much larger, more expensive cars," he said.

"Mustang II is a car for the Seventies. The gas mileage of its base engine is especially timely in these days of gas shortages, and the small size and handling make it an especially maneuverable car," Young added.

Standard engine for Mustang II is Ford's new 2.3-liter (140-cubic-inch), four-cylinder overhead-cam powerplant, the first metric engine ever built in the United States. Optional is the 2.8-liter (171-cubic-inch), V-6 engine built by Ford of Germany. Mustang II will be the only U.S. car to offer V-6 performance in a small car.

Included as standard equipment on Mustang II are front bucket seats which provide exceptional lateral support, cut-pile carpeting for the floor and lower door, tachometer and full instrumentation, simulated burl walnut accents, Euro-

pean arm rests and door pulls, and full-width headrests.

Also standard are rack-and-pinion steering, front disc brakes, and a unique sub-frame that provides a big-car ride that helps isolate noise, vibration and harshness from the passenger compartment.

Mustang II offers 45 options, including a digital clock, sunroof, AM/FM multiplex radio and stereo tape, air conditioning, left and right-hand remote control mirrors and steel-belted radial-ply tires.

Among the other Ford car

lines, Torino receives the biggest change with new front and rear bumpers, grille, taillights and new sheet metal in the rear. Also available on Torino are luxury interiors, a large 460-cubic-inch V-8 engine, sunroof, opera window on two-door models, and fender skirts.

All Fords, Thunderbirds and Torinos, equipped with the 460- or 400-c.i.d. engines will feature solid state ignition. A new front seat occupant restraint/starter interlock system will be on all models to provide greater driver and passenger protection.

New options, refinements on light trucks and expanded heavy truck engine availability highlight Ford Division's truck lineup for 1974.

new features for added versatility. They include the 460-4V V-8 engine, optional for the first time in all pickup models, and the two-seat, four-door crew cab F-250 and F-350 available for the first time as a regular production item.

Ranero has a new front end and new options for greater luxury and performance. The 1974 Bronco retains its 92-inch wheelbase and standard two-wheel/four-wheel-drive. A new engine option, the 300-1V Six, for the E-100 and E-200 Club Wagon and Van, highlights new Econoline features. The 1973 Courier, introduced in May, is carried over into 1974.

In heavy trucks, the NTC-350 horsepower diesel is newly available for the W-9000 and LT-9000 trucks. The V-555

medium-duty 210-h.p. diesel is optional for all 8000-series trucks beginning in October. Ford's C-6 automatic transmission is a new option on the C-600 medium truck.



**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS  
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)**

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)**

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 11)**

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)**

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)**

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)**

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)**

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)**

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."







**Beverly Ann Bailey  
Merit Semifinalist**

Friona High School Guidance Director B.E. Duggins has announced that Beverly Ann Bailey will be among students competing for about 3,100 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring. In the eighteen annual competitions completed to date, 34,450 students have won Merit Scholarships valued at more than \$95.5 million.

According to Edward C. Smith, president of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), "The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists are representative of the nation's most academically talented young people, and they bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers, and their communities."

"From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry, and the professions," he said. "The future success of these young people will, however, depend upon their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels that they are capable of attaining."

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in each state on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) administered last October to over one million students in about 17,000 schools nationwide. These students, who constitute about one-half of one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States, will complete high school and enter college in 1974.

NMSC identifies the Semifinalists to all regionally accredited U.S. colleges and universities. Many semifinlists find this recognition useful in seeking financial aid from sources other than the Merit Program and in the process of gaining admission to college.

Semifinalists must qualify as Finalists to advance in the competition for Merit Scholarships. To become Finalists, the Semifinalists must fulfill requirements that include receiving the endorsement of their

schools, confirming their high PSAT/NMSQT scores on a second examination, and by providing evidence of their academic and other accomplishments. Ninety percent or more of the Semifinalists are expected to become Finalists, and each Finalist will receive a Certificate of Merit in recognition of distinguished performance in the competition.

Every Finalist will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1000 Scholarships that are allocated on a state basis, according to each state's percentage of the total U.S. high school graduating class. A selection committee made up of experienced college admissions officers and secondary school guidance counselors judges all information about each Finalist in combination—his high school academic record, accomplishments, leadership qualities, extracurricular activities, as well as test scores. The winners of these one-time awards of \$1000 that are financed by sponsors and NMSC will receive a single payment next fall, after they enroll as full-time college undergraduates.

Many of the Finalists will also be considered for renewable four-year Merit Scholarships supported by some 450 corporations, foundations, professional associations, colleges, unions, trusts, and individuals. Winners of renewable Merit Scholarships receive up to \$1,500 per year which can amount to \$6,000 over the four college years.

NMSC will release the names of the Merit Scholarship winners in 1974 through the news media in three public announcements—winners of standard four-year Merit Scholarships financed primarily by corporations and businesses will be announced on April 11; the winners of one-time National Merit \$1000 Scholarships will be named on April 25; and the announcement of college-sponsored four-year Merit Scholarship winners will occur on May 2.

Bible study requires using the full resources of the mind, as well as the numerous helps which are available for study. The following two articles will be devoted to identifying these aids.

**VERSIONS.** Comparing versions as you study is a helpful practice, especially with "difficult" passages. Versions can often serve like a commentary or paraphrase of the passage that is being studied. Popular versions include the American Standard, the Revised Standard, Philip's, the New English Bible, Today's English Version, and The Living Bible.


**CONCORDANCES.** A concordance lists key words in the Bible along with the places where those words appear. A complete concordance may list every word in the Bible and every place where it is found. With such help, you often need only one or two words of a verse in order to find it. This may save you the embarrassment of being unable to find a verse which you know is in the Bible somewhere. It can also help you to study all that the Bible says on a given subject by referring you to each place in the Bible where that subject is mentioned. Many Bibles have brief concordances in the back. Cruden's Concordance is a good basic concordance, and Young's Analytical Concordance is very complete.

**DICTIONARIES.** A regular English dictionary will be helpful in Bible study if one fails to know word meanings. A serious student will want both a Bible dictionary and an ordinary English dictionary. A Bible dictionary gives full meanings and discussions of words, names, and places that are peculiar to the Bible. Peloubet's Bible Dictionary and Smith's Bible Dictionary are adequate.

The Zondervan Pictorial Bible Dictionary is very good. Next Week—More on Aids to Bible Study

Friona's junior varsity football team opened its 1973 season on a winning note here Thursday, blasting Dimmitt, 22-2.

The B-Chiefs scored in each of the first three quarters, and would have shut out the visitors except for a first-quarter safety scored against the locals.

Friona took the lead early, driving 68 yards for the touchdown behind the running of Kent Miller, Randy Melton, Robin Baize and Henry Graves. Graves had a 16-yard carry in the drive, which was helped by a pass interference penalty against Dimmitt.

Quarterback **Dusty Peters** ran four yards on a keeper play for the touchdown, and then passed to Miller for two points and an 8-0 Friona lead.

Dimmitt scored its safety on the next series, to temporarily cut the lead to six points, 8-2.

However, in the second quarter, Peters climaxed a 71-yard drive by again sneaking

# Chiefs Host Mules In Friday's Feature

Friona's toughest test of the young 1973 football season will come on Friday when the Chieftains host Muleshoe's Mules, which was one of only three teams to dent Friona's record in 1972.

For one thing, it's a jump in classification for the Chieftains, whose first two outings were against class A teams. Not only are the Mules in conference AAA, but they were rated pre-season to be a favorite to win their district, 1-AAA.

The Mules have returning tailback David Wheat, who was the leading ground-gainer last year when the two teams met. Also back is quarterback Don Long.

The Mules' starting wing-

back is a player known by most of the boys starting for the Chieftains. Eddie Waggoner was a standout player here in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades, prior to moving with his family to Muleshoe.

Other starters for the Mules include split end Joe Elizarrez, who caught a halfback option pass for a touchdown against Friona last year, guards George Mitchell and either Danny Vela or Robert Stovall, and tackles Jerry Hodge and Ricky Smallwood or Paul Harbin.

Friona will be out to make up for last year's game, in which they led in virtually every statistical department, but dropped a 14-0 game at Muleshoe. A pair of big plays

won the game for Muleshoe, including a long run with a stolen ball by Wheat.

Playing the game in the friendly confines of Chieftain Field should be an advantage for Friona. Although the Chieftains trail in their series with Muleshoe, 7-14-1, the team has a near even [5-7-1] mark at home, compared to 2-7 at Muleshoe.

The two teams usually have hard-fought games, such as the 1958 contest here, which ended in a 0-0 tie; and the 1963 game at Muleshoe, when the Mules snapped Friona's eight-game winning streak, 13-0.

## 7th Graders Lose Opener

Friona's seventh grade Braves lost their first game of the season to the Farwell seventh grade, 6-0, on a wet afternoon at Farwell, September 6.

Farwell scored in the second quarter for the only score of the game.

The second half saw Friona kick to Farwell and then recover a fumble on second down to take over on the Farwell 36. Friona couldn't move the ball and Farwell took over on downs on the 27, they picked up a first on a pass to their own 44.

On fourth and 15 on the 39 they punted, Friona fumbled the punt and Farwell covered on the Friona 20, but Farwell again fumbled on first down and Friona took over on the 20. Friona was forced to punt on fourth down and Farwell ran four plays and ran out the clock to take the 6-0 win.

## Freshmen Tie, Lose In Season Openers

Friona's Freshman Chieftains lost their first game of the season here Thursday, 14-6 to Dimmitt.

A week earlier, the team had tied Farwell, 0-0 on a rainy, soggy practice field at Farwell.

In this week's game, all of the scoring came during the second half. A short drive produced Dimmitt's first TD, and a 6-0 lead when the PAT try failed.

The very next time the 'Cats had the ball, a 44-yard run paid off for another six points. The conversion made it 14-0 in favor of the visitors.

In the final quarter, Friona took over following a short punt. Clint Mears passed to

Keith Martin at the Dimmitt four. Two straight cracks at the line by Leslie Broadhurst paid off with the TD. Martin's try for two points running was stopped, but Friona was on the boards, trailing 14-6.

Friona's inside kick attempt failed, and Dimmitt was able to run out the clock.

In the Farwell game, each team threatened, but was hampered considerably by the weather. Friona drove to the Farwell eight in the first half, but lost the ball on downs.

Late in the game, Farwell drove to the Friona three, but failed to score, as a driving rain began to fall.

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
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


### Rail Crossing To Be Improved

Parmer County is included in six railroad grade crossing protection projects in the Lubbock district which have been announced by the Texas Highway Commission.

Part of a program authorized by the 63rd Legislature, they will cost an estimated \$116,000. The projects, under the supervision of District Engineer George C. Wall, are in Bailey, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock and Parmer Counties.

Under the \$1.5 million 1974 Railroad Grade Crossing Protection Program, all are upgrading projects of AT&SF crossings. They are on US 70 in Muleshoe, estimated to cost \$20,000; FM400 in Plainview, \$22,000; US 385 in Littlefield, \$14,000; FM1264 in northwest Lubbock, \$14,000 and FM835 in southeast Lubbock, \$14,000 and US 70 in Farwell, \$22,000.

The program calls for the state to pay 90 percent of installation costs and the railroads to pay 10 percent.
