Magnolia Investigating Oil Stains With DST

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-A TXL, North-Central Upson County wildcat, about 30 miles south of Midland, and 600 feet from north and west lines of section 31, block 40, TP survey, T-4-S, logged some signs of porosity and some slight oil stains in drilling to the current bottom of 10,100 feet in a Pennsylvanian lime, and was running a drillstem test on the interval at 10,090-100 feet.

This venture is scheduled to continue until it reaches and tests the Ellenburger.

Midland Wildcat Drills Ahead Through Simpson

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E Wilson Bryant, 14 miles south of Midland, in Central Midland County, and 600 feet from north and west lines of section 36, block 39, TP survey, T-3-S, had progressed under 12,996 feet in Simpson lime and shale, and was continuing to make h/e.

Tide Water Flanker Cuts Off Tools; To Sidetrack

Tide Water Associated Oil Company No. 1 White and Shelton, flanker to proven production from the Clear Fork of the Permian in the North Riley field of West-Central Gaines County, and 600 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 404, block G, CCSD&RGNO survey, had cut off stock tools at 4,677 feet, and was preparing to set a whipstock to drill in San Andres lime when the tools were stuck. Efforts to extract them have been underway for several weeks. The exploration is slated to drill to around 7,000 feet to explore into the section which is making oil in nearby wells.

Scurry Prospector Drills Plug Prior To Testing

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Winston, South-Central Scurry County prospective discovery from some oil saturated sections in the Pennsylvanian, and four miles south of Snyder, had set a 5-inch liner on bottom at 1,965 feet in the Ellenburger, with 180 sacks of cement, and is to drill the plug and start testing shortly.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 2 Lee, Southeast Dawson County exploration, which is slated to go to 10,800 feet—unless it gets good oil—has drilled to the lower Permian, or other zones above the projected deep destination—had some shows of oil and gas in a drillstem test in the Sprayberry section of the Leonard zone of the Permian at 8,457-8,445 feet.

Official Senate Vote Count Starts

Newspaper Reports X-Day For Seizure Of Berlin By Reds

BERLIN —(P)— A liberal Democratic newspaper here said Monday "X-Day," for achieving Communist seizure of Berlin has been fixed for some time after the November presidential elections in the United States.

The newspaper Montagsche asserted the Russians have given German Communists orders to step up riotous demonstrations to seize control of the city because Moscow wants no four-power settlement of the 80-day-old blockade crisis.

A highly informed source in Moscow said Sunday night resumption of four-power talks there on the Berlin crisis is "quite likely" this week. The informant made this prediction after the return to the Russian capital of Francois Seydoux, political and diplomatic adviser to Lt. Gen. Joseph Pierre Koenig, French military governor in Germany. Seydoux left Moscow August 31 for Berlin, taking important documents to the three Western military governors.

Until "X-Day," Montagsche said, the Communists aim to "seize every opportunity to promote riots, strikes and demonstrations" to worsen the local political situation.

A Communist source said the date for Communist seizure of control had been fixed at a meeting of leaders of the Communist-dominated Socialist Unity Party (SED) during the last week. These leaders, the paper said, convened after receiving instructions from Soviet occupation officials.

Meanwhile, German Social Democrats in the Russian occupation zone addressed a "cry for help" to the Western Allies. They pledged a "continued struggle for freedom" and asked the Western Powers to help us—but help us quickly. The message was read at a meeting of 1,100 German and Foreign delegates from 11 countries attending the annual German Socialist Party convention in Duesseldorf.

Some 120,000 Germans assembled in the Russian sector of Berlin Sunday to hear Communists harangue the United States. American armored cars patrolled the city's streets in anticipation of another march on the Allied Control Authority building in the U. S. sector, but no disorders were reported.

Indian Troops March Into Moslem State

NEW DELHI —(P)— Indian troops invaded the princely state of Hyderabad from all four sides Monday. The declared purpose was to restore order.

The Dominion soldiers, spearheaded with tanks and armored cars and covered with air support, advanced swiftly, mostly against negligible opposition, a government statement indicated.

A Madras dispatch said Indian forces striking from the East advanced 40 miles to within possibly 60 miles of Hyderabad City, the state capital.

The first Indian communique said her troops made "steady progress in all sectors." The bulletin said several columns of undisclosed strength penetrated the state.

Indian planes operated over Hyderabad all day against what the communique said were military objectives. A Bombay dispatch said Indian planes made two minor raids on airfields at Warangal and Bidar, two important Hyderabad towns.

India Seeks Plebiscite

India asserted disorder is rife in Hyderabad and that the fabulously rich nizam had refused to disband private armies such as the Razakars. The state and dominion have been at odds for months because the nizam, Gen. H. E. H. Sir Mir Osman Ali Khan, a Moslem, had refused to accede to India.

About four out of five of the 16,338,234 people of the rich state are Hindus. India has demanded a plebiscite to determine the future of Hyderabad. The state is in South Central India and surrounded by Indian territory.

The invasion was launched within 48 hours of the death of Gov. Gen. Mahomed Ali Jinnah, the founder of Pakistan and the main force in the partition of India. New Delhi sources said they expected Jinnah's death to ease differences between India and Pakistan.

Johnson Lieutenant Suffers Light Attack Of Ptomaine Poisoning

FORT WORTH —(P)— Jerome Sneed of Austin, Lyndon Johnson's representative on the subcommittee that will count senatorial race returns, suffered a light attack of ptomaine poisoning Monday several hours before the committee met.

State Senator Alvin J. Wirtz replaced Sneed on the subcommittee. Sneed collapsed the lobby of Fort Worth's Blackstone Hotel and was taken to Methodist Hospital.

Dr. A. I. Goldberg, the attending physician, said: "Mr. Sneed's condition is not serious. Something he ate caused his illness. You might call it a light attack of ptomaine poisoning."

Sneed signed over his proxy to Wirtz while he lay on the floor of the hotel lobby, in front of the elevator, and was sufficiently recovered to sign the document before being put on a stretcher for the trip to the hospital.

Three Major Strikes Continue Unsettled

The nation's three major strikes—involving oil, shipping and trucking industries—continued Monday with participants showing little inclination to patch things up.

Federal conciliators sat in as negotiations re-opened between striking CIO Oil Workers and six major West Coast oil companies.

Even as talks seeking to end the 10-day-old strike of 16,000 oil workers began, gasoline deliveries to West Coast service stations were cut 25 per cent in a conservation move.

Five attorneys and Stevenson's brother, Pierce Stevenson of Austin, were here to press the former governor's case against the injunction sought by Stevenson's senatorial opponent, Rep. Lyndon Johnson.

The enlarged program of the orphanage, an institution supported by Baptist churches, was discussed by Evans, who described the new Buckner Boys Ranch being opened in Burnett County.

The Rev. Cecil Rhodes, pastor of the West Side Baptist Church of Big Spring and moderator of the association, is in charge of the annual meeting. The annual sermon Monday morning was by the Rev. Arthur DeLoach of Odessa, M. S. A. L. Teaff of Midland discussed church libraries, and Mrs. P. D. O'Brien of Big Spring conducted a memorial service.

The afternoon program was devoted to separate sessions of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Men's Brotherhood. The afternoon session followed a luncheon in the church's educational building.

U. S. Naval Plane With Five Aboard Is Missing In Canada

OTTAWA —(P)— A U. S. Naval plane carrying five persons, two of them classified as "very important," is missing between Churchill, Manitoba, and The Pas, the U. S. Embassy said Monday.

Four aboard were American military personnel and one British. Names were withheld until kin can be notified.

The plane left Churchill Sunday morning for Ottawa and has not been reported since. The embassy said the plane, a two-engine Naval Beechcraft, normally was based at Ottawa and used by the Naval attaché.

The Canadian Air Force is hunting the bleak, open country of Northern Manitoba. Churchill is the joint services winter experimental base where several hundred Canadian and about 100 American troops are based.

Olson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leif Olson, 709 West Kansas Street, suffered injured knees and feet and multiple cuts and bruises. Mrs. Garraway suffered extensive lacerations of the neck, face and arm.

The wreck occurred about 1:30 p. m., officers said, when young Olson, driving south, turned out into the middle of the street in order to avoid a trailer being backed from a driveway. He was driving a new Ford car. Both cars were wrecked.

Johnson And Ex-Governor Represented

FORT WORTH —(P)— Tabulation of the official returns in the dramatic runoff primary contest between Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson for the U. S. Senate was started at 12:27 p. m. Monday.

FORT WORTH —(P)— The State Democratic Executive Committee convened at 10:47 a. m. Monday to begin the tough task of counting the votes in the August 28 U. S. Senatorial runoff between Lyndon B. Johnson and Coke R. Stevenson. The session started 47 minutes late.

Stevenson, with two of his attorneys, F. L. Kuykendall and Clint Small, Jr., of Austin, was the first of the two close-running candidates to reach the big, dimly-lighted ballroom where the committee met.

Puffing his pipe, he was on hand 15 minutes before 10 a. m., when the session had been scheduled to start.

There was standing room only in the hall.

Stevenson and Johnson leaders huddled with Executive Committee Chairman Robert W. Calvert just before Calvert rapped the meeting to order.

Johnson arrived at 10:35 a. m., along with several friends and campaign workers.

Secretary Vann M. Kennedy called the roll. Only six members were absent. Eight were present by proxy.

Calvert named W. B. Simmons of Orange as chairman of the Senate race vote-counting subcommittee. Others were Mrs. Claude B. Huds-peth of San Antonio, Alvin J. Wirtz of Austin, Mrs. Alma Lee Holman of Baytown, Sidney Johnson of Dallas, Mrs. Joe B. Paris of Daisetta and Holland Russell of Denton.

Hurricane Lashes Bermuda

MIAMI, FLA. —(P)— Hurricane winds approaching 140 miles an hour velocity swept the British island of Bermuda in the Atlantic Monday.

The Weather Bureau's Storm Warning Service at Miami said the center of the severe hurricane was only 65 miles southwest of Bermuda at mid-morning. The storm was moving north-northwestward.

"Winds at Bermuda have reached hurricane force and will continue to increase until the storm passes," forecasters reported.

"The center is expected to pass 40 to 60 miles west of Bermuda during the next few hours."

Although pointed in the general direction of the Virginia Capes, the storm is expected to recurve to the North and Northeast before any effects are felt on the United States coast, the Storm Warning Service stated.

Navy Takes Precautions

The hurricane will sweep the busy coastal shipping lanes with dangerous winds and wild seas. Ships were warned to avoid or flee its path. The recurring movement was expected to begin Monday night.

A Navy task force, including a 22,000-ton aircraft carrier and 12 ships which arrived Friday on maneuvers, left Bermuda Sunday ahead of the approaching hurricane. Planes at the U. S. Air Force Base on the island were ordered to the United States.

The U. S. Naval Operating Base at Bermuda removed boats from exposed areas and tied down all loose lumber. The British Naval Dockyard took similar precautions.

U. S. Jet Planes Crash In Europe

FRANKFURT, GERMANY —(P)— Two U. S. F-80 jet fighter planes crashed Monday near Kaufbeuren while enroute to England to take part in "Battle of Britain" Day, September 15.

Another F-80 jet is missing, the U. S. Air Force Headquarters announced.

Pilots of both the crashed planes were believed to have been killed. The cause of the mishaps was undetermined.

All three planes had taken off in a formation of eight from the Fuerstenfeldbruck Air Base in Bavaria. The other five were reported to have landed safely at Manston, England.

Republican Maine Holds Nation's First State Election Contest

PORTLAND, ME. —(P)— Traditionally Republican Maine cast the nation's first state election ballots Monday with Rep. Margaret Chase Smith seeking a GOP Senate berth in the major contest.

Dr. Adrian H. Scollen, 55, Prairie View, Kan., native and newcomer to politics, is the 49-year-old congressman's Democratic opponent.

Republican leaders confidently expected their seventh straight "clean sweep" of major offices.

The others at stake are the governorship and three House seats. Officially conceding nothing, Democrats looked for a big labor vote. There are two labor bills at referendum that they felt will help them more than the GOP.

Both major parties scanned the election for a hint of how November political winds will blow.

Half-Million Moslems Attend Jinnah Rites

KARACHI, PAKISTAN —(P)— Mahomed Ali Jinnah, founder and first governor general of Pakistan, was buried Sunday night with full military honors.

Jinnah, who was 71, died here Saturday night of heart disease.

His flight of many years for Moslem Pakistan free from Hindu India was crowned with success in the division of the sub-continent August 15, 1947. Jinnah had been governor general of the Moslem dominion since that time.

An estimated half-million Moslems lined the streets for the funeral procession as four cabinet ministers, including the prime minister, helped lift the bier to a gun carriage. Among those who attended the rites in addition to the cabinet were the entire diplomatic corps in Karachi, Mrs. Dinah Wadia, only daughter of Jinnah, and his sister, Fatima Jinnah.

Flood Warnings Issued In Valley

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS —(P)— Flood warnings were issued Monday for the Mercedes-Harlingen area as the Rio Grande continued its steady rise.

A system of canals running off from the Rio Grande cuts through the Harlingen-Mercedes area. The high water already was backing into the canals Monday morning.

A crest of 24 feet was expected at Mercedes late Monday afternoon. The river was rising steadily here and a crest of 19 feet, one foot above flood stage, is expected late Tuesday.

The odds are against them, but Billy Meyer and his Pittsburgh Pirates win the National League pennant, he'll be the first manager in major league history to reach the top with a club that finished last—or tied for it—the preceding year.

Red Sox Lead Dwindles

The A's whipped the Red Sox 10-4 to cut Boston's lead to two games over the Yankees and two and a half over the Indians.

The Yankees trounced the Senator in Washington 10-5.

The Indians defeated the St. Louis Browns 6-4 in the first game of their doubleheader in Cleveland.

The second game was a 3-3 tie with darkness ending the contest after 12 innings. The two teams will replay the game Monday.

In the other American League game, the Chicago White Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers 5-2.

The St. Louis Cardinals moved into third place by a half-game over Brooklyn and New York in the National, losing to the Cincinnati Reds 7-6.

The Giants threw a wrench into Brooklyn's pennant plans defeating the Dodgers 5-3 for their seventh win in their last nine starts against Brooklyn under the leadership of Leo Durocher.

The victory put the fifth-place Giants only 0.005 percentage points behind Brooklyn and six games back of the Braves.

GBS Pops Off Again

The long and generally pleasant relationship between George Bernard Shaw and some of his American admirers is in danger. For the distinguished Irish playwright has come out in favor of liver injections, Henry A. Wallace and five o'clock shadow.

His three new endorsements are further examples of Shaw's famous nonconformity and perverseness. Those qualities even show up in his brief encounter with the liver injections. He wrote the Vegetarians' candidate for vice president that he tried some injections 10 years ago to cure an attack of pernicious anemia.

As a practicing socialist, perhaps Shaw could be as reasonable about Wallace as about vegetarianism and admit, after some reflection, that there is another side to the matter.

Wallace prescribes a diet of appeasement abroad and mild socialism at home. Yet Shaw can look at Czechoslovakia, which partook of the first, and at his fellow Britons, who are munching on the second, and find that the diet does not promote exceptional health.

Russians Ran Danube Parley; U. S. 'Never Had a Chance'

WASHINGTON—The U. S. team of diplomats which took a 7-to-3 beating from Vishinsky's Balkan satellites at the Danube River conference in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, has now come home, tail dragging.

There were only a few lighter moments to relieve the monotony of the three weeks' beating. There was only one party. It was given by Yugoslav Foreign Minister Stanoje Simich.

Most significant development at the conference, from the American point of view, was Russian refusal to consider submitting to the Court any future dispute arising out of the Danube agreement.

Interpretation of the UN Charter and the settlement of disputes between member countries were political matters. Vichinsky maintained, and not legal matters to which the court should be limited.

At one session Durdenewsky rose, walked behind the chairman, behind the Americans, British and French, down to the head of the Romanian delegation.

Immediately thereafter the Romanian delegate rose and read "his views" as given him by the Russian. The Hungarian followed. The whole proceeding was as raw as that.

Working paper for the conference was the Russian draft of a proposed Danube River agreement. The American draft was taken as a basis for amendments only. The Russian draft contained 42 sections.

So they say

The potential role of the United States in world affairs staggers the imagination. Whether or not we fulfill the mission which history has entrusted to us depends upon citizenship more than leadership—upon us as a people more than upon those we elect to office—for in the long run our government is responsive to the will of the people.

There is every reason for sane co-operation between Hollywood and the (British) film-makers, but the British must realize they cannot have both protection for their home industry and a free world market as well.

The American position (at the Nuremberg trials) was constant and uncompromising that it would be stultifying to define a crime as such only when our enemies committed it, and leave the inference that it was no crime when committed by others.

There isn't enough indication of a leveling off (of prices), in my opinion. The only real cure for inflation is production.

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Uncle Sam's Draft Law

(One of a series of questions and answers on the second peacetime military training program. The information was prepared under the direction of Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, Texas Director of Selective Service.)

EXEMPTIONS AND DEPENDENTS
Q—I served honorably on active duty for at least 12 months between Sept. 16, 1940, and June 24, 1948, in the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, or Public Health Service. Am I liable for induction?

A—No, unless there is a declaration of war or national emergency.
Q—I served honorably on active duty for more than 90 days between Dec. 7, 1941, and Sept. 2, 1945 in one of the above named services. Am I liable for induction?

A—No, unless there is a declaration of war or national emergency.
Q—I served in the armed forces of a country allied with the United States in World War II for more than 90 days prior to Sept. 2, 1945. Am I liable for induction?

A—No, unless there is a declaration of war or national emergency.
Q—Since the enactment of the new Selective Service law (June 24, 1948), I have been honorably discharged after three or more years of active duty in the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, or Public Health Service. Am I liable for induction?

A—No, unless there is a declaration of war or national emergency.
Q—I am enrolled in the advanced course, senior division, ROTC or Air ROTC. Am I deferred from induction?

A—Yes, until completion or termination of the course of instruction and so long as you continue in a regular or reserve status upon being commissioned. But you are not exempt from registration.

Q—I am a fully qualified and accepted aviation cadet applicant of the Army, Navy, or Air Force, and have signed an agreement of service. Will I be deferred?
A—Yes, if so designated by the Secretary of Defense, for the period covered by the agreement, but not to exceed four months. You must register.

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THE DOCTOR SAYS
In Studying Atomic Radiation, Medicine Prepares For Worst

The atomic age is just as much of a shock and a problem to physicians as to everyone else. With the possible exception of a few very recent graduates from our medical schools, physicians must learn from the ground up what can or should be done for the victims of any possible atomic bomb attack.

The bombs dropped at Hiroshima and Nagasaki are now known as "baby bombs." It is claimed that models 1,000 times more powerful are now possible. If such bombs were used, they could cause death and injury 500 miles from the place where they fell.

Toll Of Doctors High
Of course, physicians, who would be expected to care for the survivors of any future atomic disaster, do not bear charmed lives. At Hiroshima, 280 of the 300 physicians residing in that city were killed or severely injured by the atomic explosion.

Physicians, as much as any others, hope that any preparation for the care of such victims will prove to be an entire waste of time. But it is not safe to count on the absence of such an emergency, and, consequently, the medical profession is preparing as best it can to meet any disaster of this nature which might develop.

Questions and Answers
Q—What is a Honey Guide?

The violin was not invented until the Middle Ages, so the instrument on which he played, if he played at all, must have been some other type of stringed instrument. Tradition says it was a lute.

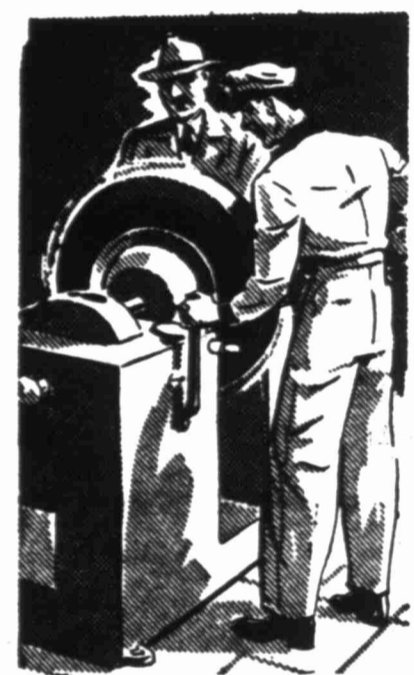

'Beloved Guinea Pig' Helps Teacher Work Out Problems

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK —(AP)—Some 350,000 schoolteachers have quit since 1940. And even more would abandon the field—the average teacher gets on \$1,850 a year—except for children like "the beloved guinea pig." Here is the story of one teacher who didn't quit.
Mrs. Marie Morris Rushing, a former Pasadena, Texas, teacher now living at Fayetteville, Ark., had written out her resignation and had

it in her desk. It wasn't the matter of low salary so much in her case. It was just a feeling that she wasn't helping solve problems of the mal-adjusted children in her overcrowded fourth-grade class.

A query by one student finally convinced her she should toss in the sponge. The query:
"Mrs. Rushing, what does Democracy look like?"
Then she was called to her principal's office and asked to admit a crippled girl to her class.

Mrs. Rushing's first impulse was to say no. But she couldn't refuse the forlorn but proud little figure with twisted limbs who sat there in silence, anxiously waiting.

Polly In Focus
"So Polly, our beloved guinea pig, took her place in room 4B," said Mrs. Rushing. And the classroom immediately became a Democracy in action.
Its focus was the little crippled girl.

"Polly began to make us all aware of our possibilities, both physical and mental," wrote Mrs. Rushing in "The Texas Outlook," a teacher publication.

"Often she did this by referring to her own handicap. She said that in a Democracy the strong protect the weak, that everyone has a voice."

Polly had that gift of truly great personalities—the gift of bringing out the best in those around them. "I found that little by little she was doing away with even my discipline problems," recalled Mrs. Rushing. "She would reproach an offender and cause public opinion to turn against him."

In their turn the children did everything to help Polly. They carried her pucksaddle to the cafeteria. They tried to teach her to walk—and she did learn to take a few halting, fearful steps.

Then the thing happened Mrs. Rushing feared most. A fire alarm sounded, smoke poured into a hall. Quickly the children marched out of the building. And then the teacher and two girls rushed back for Polly, who had been taken to the rest room just before the alarm.

"There coming toward us in long even strides was Polly, her eyes shining with excitement," said Mrs. Rushing.

"Polly was walking alone! Not one step but a dozen! We paused a moment in awe. Then without a word the two girls made their pucksaddle, and I lifted Polly upon it."

This year, opening her desk for another school term, Mrs. Rushing found the forgotten letter of resignation she had written before "the beloved guinea pig" came into her class.

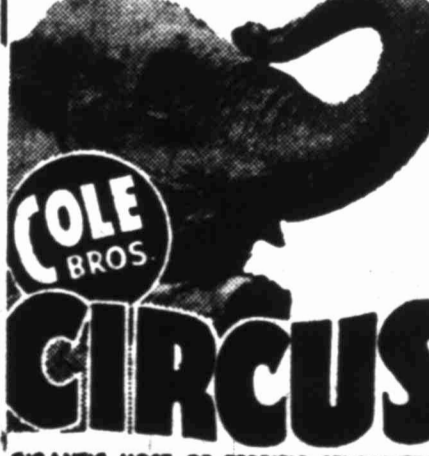
Diplomat's Daughter Guilty On Vice Charges

American Starts New Family Fare Plan

American Airlines Monday put into effect the lowest fares for families in the history of aviation industry, and announced plans for a reduction in roundtrip tickets, Woody Campbell, station manager here, said.

The airline intends to ask permission of the CAB to permit a five per cent discount on roundtrips exclusive of the family fare plan effective Tuesday.

Under terms of the family fare plan wives and children up to 21 years of age are permitted to accompany full paying passengers on half-fare tickets anywhere in the United States over the American system, provided the trip starts between Monday and Wednesday.

The family fare plan, Campbell said, is a measure taken to broaden the field of air travel to include a larger proportion of the population. There is no limit on the number of children in one family who qualify for the new rate. The plan brings the price of tickets for adults to the lowest point in aviation history if they are traveling with full fare paying passengers. The customary practice of carrying children under 12 years of age at half fare is not affected by the new plan.

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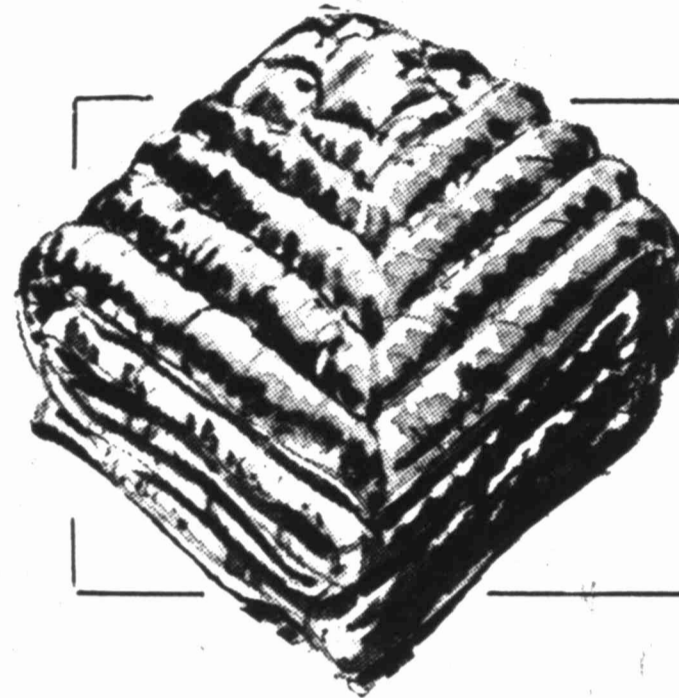
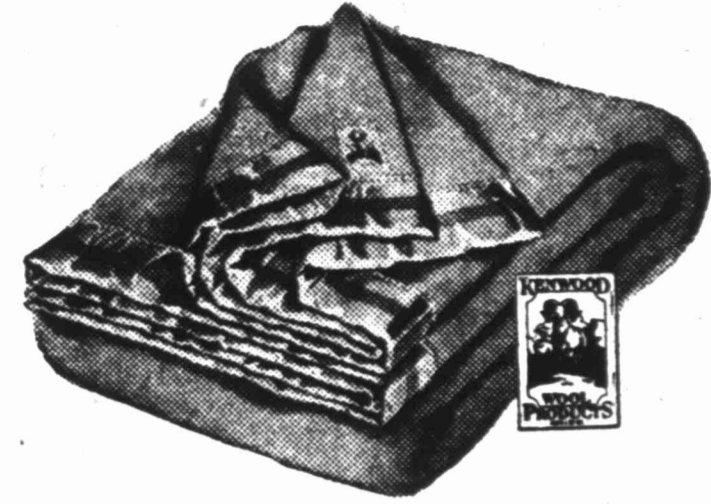

Two Finnish Editors Arraigned For Stories On Zhdanov's Death

HELSINKI, FINLAND. — (AP) — Two Finnish editors were arraigned Monday on charges they published articles casting suspicion on the manner of Andrei A. Zhdanov's death.

They were charged on orders from President Juho K. Paasikivi, with printing stories, under a Stockholm dateline, speculating as to whether Prime Midiste. Stalin might have had a hand in the death of Zhdanov, Politburo member and Stalin's right-hand man, who died in Moscow August 31.

The papers, Keski-Suomalainen and Karjalainen Maa, both are organs of the Agrarian Party.

Under a recently passed law, the Finnish president is empowered to order newspaper editors who publish statements which may endanger Finland's relations with foreign powers to be arraigned. The law provides penalties ranging up to two years imprisonment.

Garry Davis, World Citizen, Moves In On UN General Assembly

PARIS —(AP)— Garry Davis, 26, citizen of the world, is putting his lack of a nationality right up to the United Nations.

"If the UN can't solve a little personal problem, then it can't save humanity," Davis said.

He moved to the front steps of the UN restaurant in Paris Sunday when France refused to grant him permission to stay in the country any longer. Davis, war-time bomber pilot, surrendered his American passport and nationality last May. He is the son of Meyer Davis, American orchestra leader.

UN officials so far have been noncommittal as to what they are going to do about Davis inhabiting the eleven-acre tract of land France have them temporarily for the General Assembly meeting beginning here next week.

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
