## Thurmond Rips At Civil Rights Laws In New York Talk

NEW YORK—(P)—Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina told New Yorkers Wednesday that "If we need a federal law for murder by lynchers, you need a federal law for murder by gangsters.

The States' Rights candidate for President, in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Overseas Press Club, argued

against the civil rights program and declared:
"Neither the people of New York nor those of South

Carolina approve murder.

Thurmond, making his only speech of the campaign in the North, declared the prehibition amendment was an instance of failure of "policing by the federal government."

"You here in New York," he said resented the effort, by a federal police power, to make this city dry, even though the federal agents were acting under authority of a constitutional amendment. What About Harlem?

"Well, let me ask you how you Democratic President at that, seeks not by a constitutional amendment, but by legislative fiat, to use a federal police power to take over our election machinery, abrogate our segregation laws, and impose employment restrictions contrary to the wishes of both employer and em-
