Political Timetable

Ex-President Hoover is now heading a commission which is looking for ways to improve efficiency in the executive branch of the government.

We're thinking about presidential campaigns. The conventions are held in late June or early July.

The candidates, meanwhile, are also immersed in politics. In 10 of the 13 campaigns of the twentieth century, one of the candidates has been President.

It is up to the candidate and his board of strategy to determine the length and intensity of the campaign.

The question is whether it is either good or necessary to have such a long campaign. Perhaps it didn't matter back in the leisurely days of Benjamin Harrison's, or even Cal Coolidge's, administration.

It might be hard to change this tradition of mid-summer conventions. Quite naturally a candidate and his advisers are not going to pass up any chances.

But the fact remains that long presidential campaigns usually generate more heat than light. They exaggerate antagonisms and promote disunity.

Since American unity is becoming increasingly important, and since the presidency of the United States, as the world's most important job, deserves a comparable attention, we think the Democratic and Republican high command would be doing the country a service if they agreed to limit presidential campaigning to, say, two months—beginning in 1952.

DREW PEARSON ON 'The WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND'

WASHINGTON—Congressman J. Parnell Thomas of New Jersey, chairman of the Un-American Activities Committee, is a most suspicious person. Not only has he investigated all sorts of Communists, but he also sought to investigate a policeman who arrested him.

Thomas is not, however, at all happy over the current FBI investigation of himself and the Rickards he received from four women who returned all or part of their government salaries to him.

Complaining about the incident in a letter to W. Lee Egan, Maryland Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Rep. Thomas wrote:

The trooper phoned headquarters for instructions, and was told that since Congress was not in session, Thomas had no congressional immunity. The congressman was then taken before Magistrate J. Howard Hugh at Port Deposit where, despite his plea that he was in a hurry to keep important engagements in Washington, he was fined \$17.50.

Apparently, Trooper Kaplow was such that State Trooper Kaplow was suspicious. He didn't really think the congressman was an Un-American Communist, but he did think he might be Un-American in jeopardizing the safety of other vehicles.

The congressman's own description of the matter is much more graphic than anything that could be written by a columnist. He came to Ward County in October, 1931, and claimed last year to have lived in the county longer than any other person.

He became county surveyor in 1914, after having engaged in farming and ranching. In 1916 he was re-elected to the surveyor's office. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Monahans 35 years, and was a charter member and first master of the Grandfield Masonic Lodge. He also served as district deputy grand master and was three times worthy patron of the Order of the Eastern Star.

In 1907 he married Lily Sewell of Midland, who survives. Other survivors include one son, S. Ross Carr of Fort Worth; three daughters, Mrs. E. P. Van Raab of Holbrook, Mrs. John Murchison of Arlington, and Mrs. Pat O'Brien of Wickett; two brothers, Zack Carr of San Antonio and T. N. Carr of Fyote; one sister, Mrs. W. L. Fuller of Bastrop; six grandsons, and two granddaughters.

All of this touched off the congressman's suspicions. A suspicious soul concluded that there was something dire and forbidding in the action of the policeman. Probably he was Un-American. So he asked the Maryland Commissioner for an official investigation.

"I appeal to you for an investigation of this case," he wrote Egan. "I do not want any favors. I am perfectly willing to take my medicine along with everyone else, but I am convinced that there were aspects to the case that were not only unduly annoying but which led to suspicion."

The congressman was so suspicious that he also got the support of his own colleagues. Congressman Dudley Rose of Maryland, who wrote Commissioner Egan that Thomas was "a very outstanding member of congress and a warm personal friend of mine."

"He has been driving a car for thirty years," continued Rose, "and I am convinced that there were aspects to the case that were not only unduly annoying but which led to suspicion."

Rain, Cold Weather Threaten World Series Opener

American Champs Are 5-1 Favorites To Tumble Braves

BOSTON —(P)— Fans going to the opening World Series game Wednesday afternoon were advised by the Weather Bureau to bring a topcoat instead of a raincoat as a storm swinging up the coast veered out to sea before reaching Boston.

BOSTON —(P)— Prospects of chilling rain and mid-50 temperatures threatened Wednesday's World Series opener at Braves Field with Bobby Feller of the Cleveland Indians and Johnny Sain of the Boston Braves primed for a classic duel.

Rain or not, the rollicking American League champs with the bristling power in their batting order are strong 5 to 1 favorites to beat off the stubborn Braves with their Sain-Spahn pitching pair in the best-of-seven series.

The Indians, who won the pennant from the Boston Red Sox Monday in the first tie playoff game in the league's history, are about 5 to 7 in the man-to-man wagering to take the opener behind Feller. Game time is 12 noon (CST) with a full house of some 36,000 assured.

Long lines clogged the streets around the Braves ticket offices Tuesday night as they put on sale 2,500 standing room permits.

Some 1,500 seats in the "jury box" bleachers in right field also have been sold as well as about 12,500 grandstand tickets at \$5, about 12,500 pavilion seats at \$5 and 1,800 boxes at \$8.

Feller's first series
It adds up to a gross gate of around \$246,000. After the taxes, most of the remainder goes to the players, who are counting on a fat payday.

Boston's last series was in 1946 when the Red Sox met the St. Louis Cardinals at Fenway Park, but the Braves' loyal fans have been waiting since 1914. That was the year George Stallings' "Miracle Men" upset the highly favored Philadelphia A's in four straight games.

Feller, the farm "boy" who now is a personal corporation with a six-figure income, will be realizing one of his few unfulfilled ambitions in pitching a series game. He already is the all-time strikeout leader and is generally accepted to be the top paid player in the game. Sain Has 24 Wins

Manager Billy Southworth naturally leads with his ace—Johnny Sain, the curve-balling righthander from Belleville, Ark., who won 24 and lost 15 for the Braves. That's five better than Feller's final mark of 19-15.

All season long, the Braves heard they didn't have a chance in their own league. Even when they were eight games ahead in July they were expected to "blow." When the chips were down they had it and they don't figure to be the kind to fold in rough going—not even

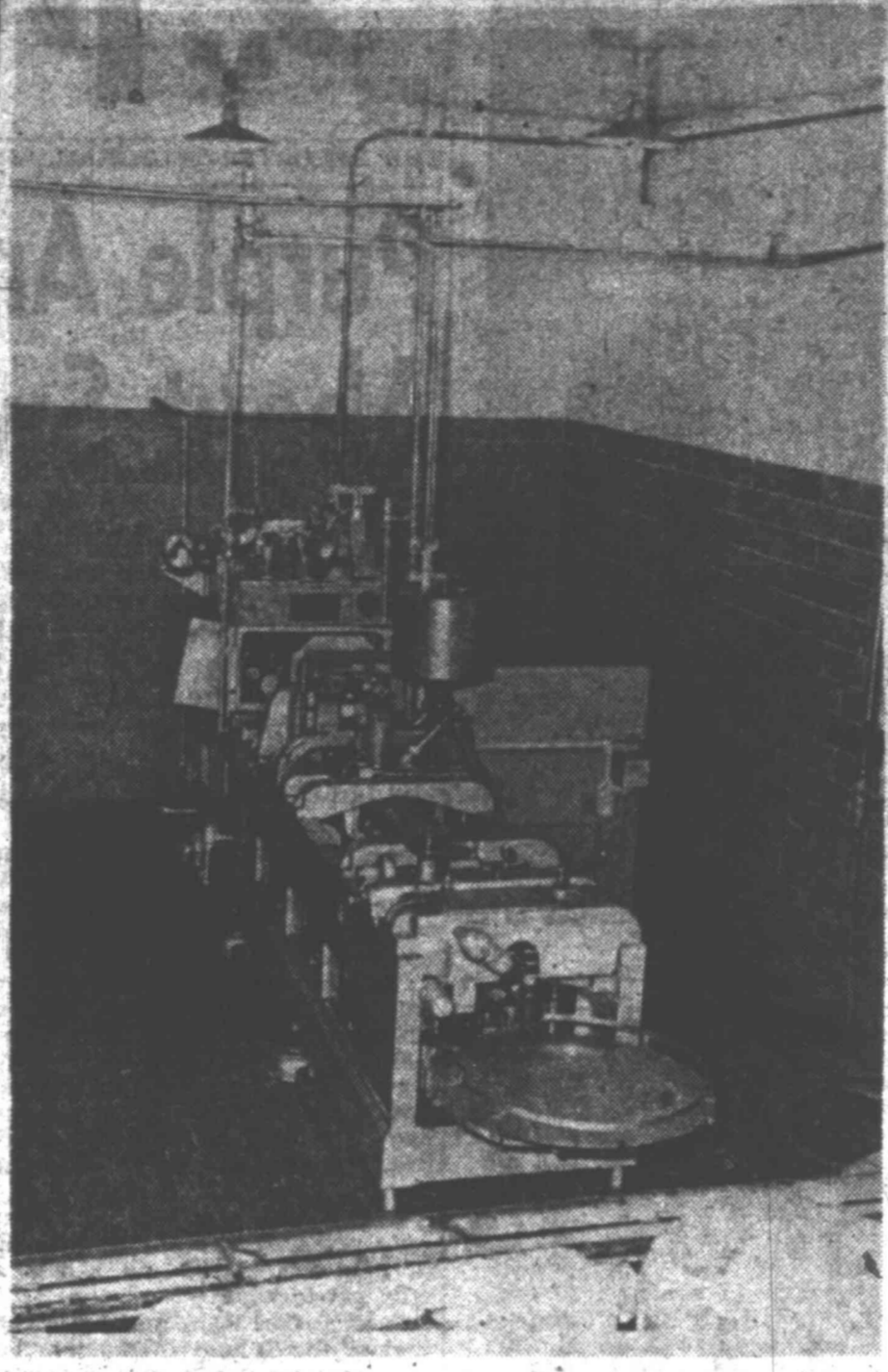

they took it on a USO tour. I asked him if there are any definite rules which should be followed in arranging music. He said that there are some rules which it is advisable to follow, but that at times, one might completely disregard standard practice. "I think that probably holds true in bridge also," he said. And it certainly does.

You all know the rules about never finessing your partner's lead, second hand low, third hand high, and so on, but in today's hand you have to violate one of those sound principles. On the opening lead of the six of diamonds, declarer played the eight-spot from dummy and West went up with the ace, because the rule is, do not finesse your partner's lead. Third hand should play high. You can see what happened. Declarer played the four from his hand. West came back with the jack of diamonds, North played the five. West then continued with the deuce of diamonds. North won with the king, and when he took the club finesse and it lost, there was no play West could make that would defeat the contract.

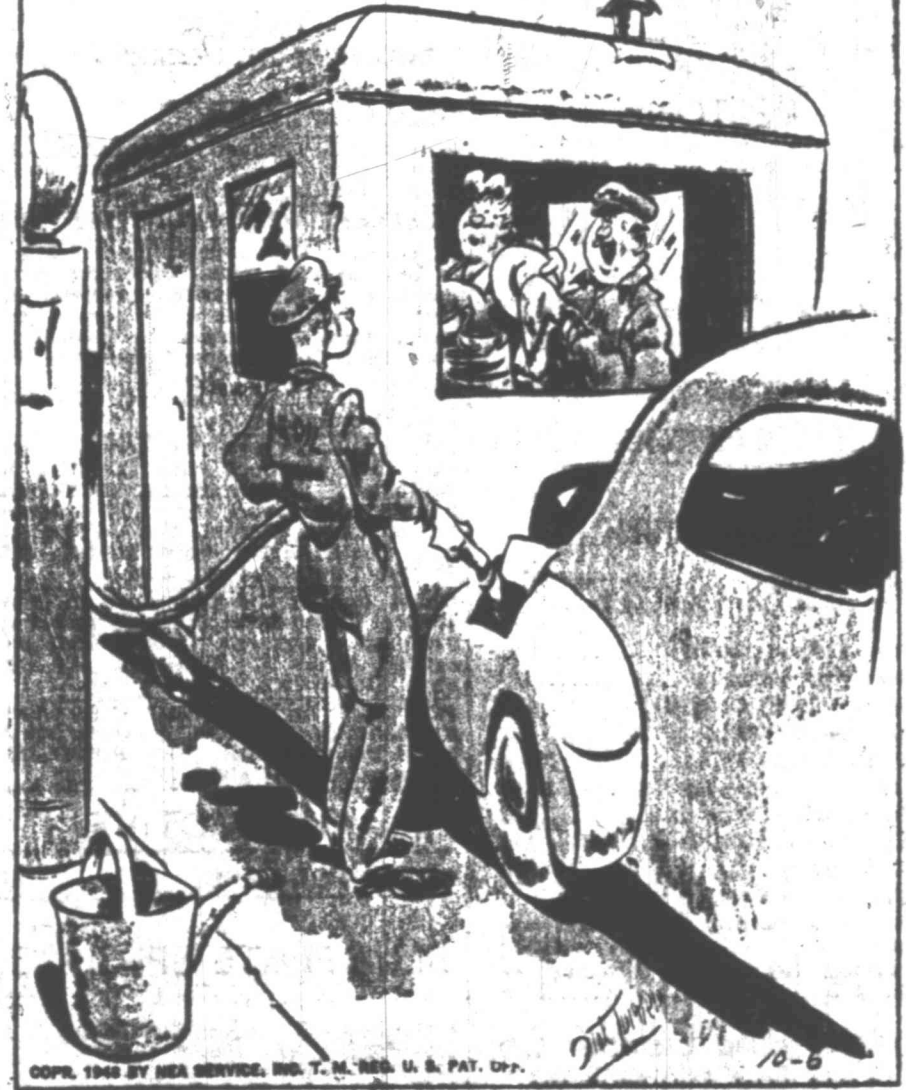
If, contrary to the general rule, West had played the jack of diamonds instead of the ace on the first trick, few North players would refuse to win the trick with the king. East could easily hold the ace of diamonds and in that case the hand would go down to defeat.

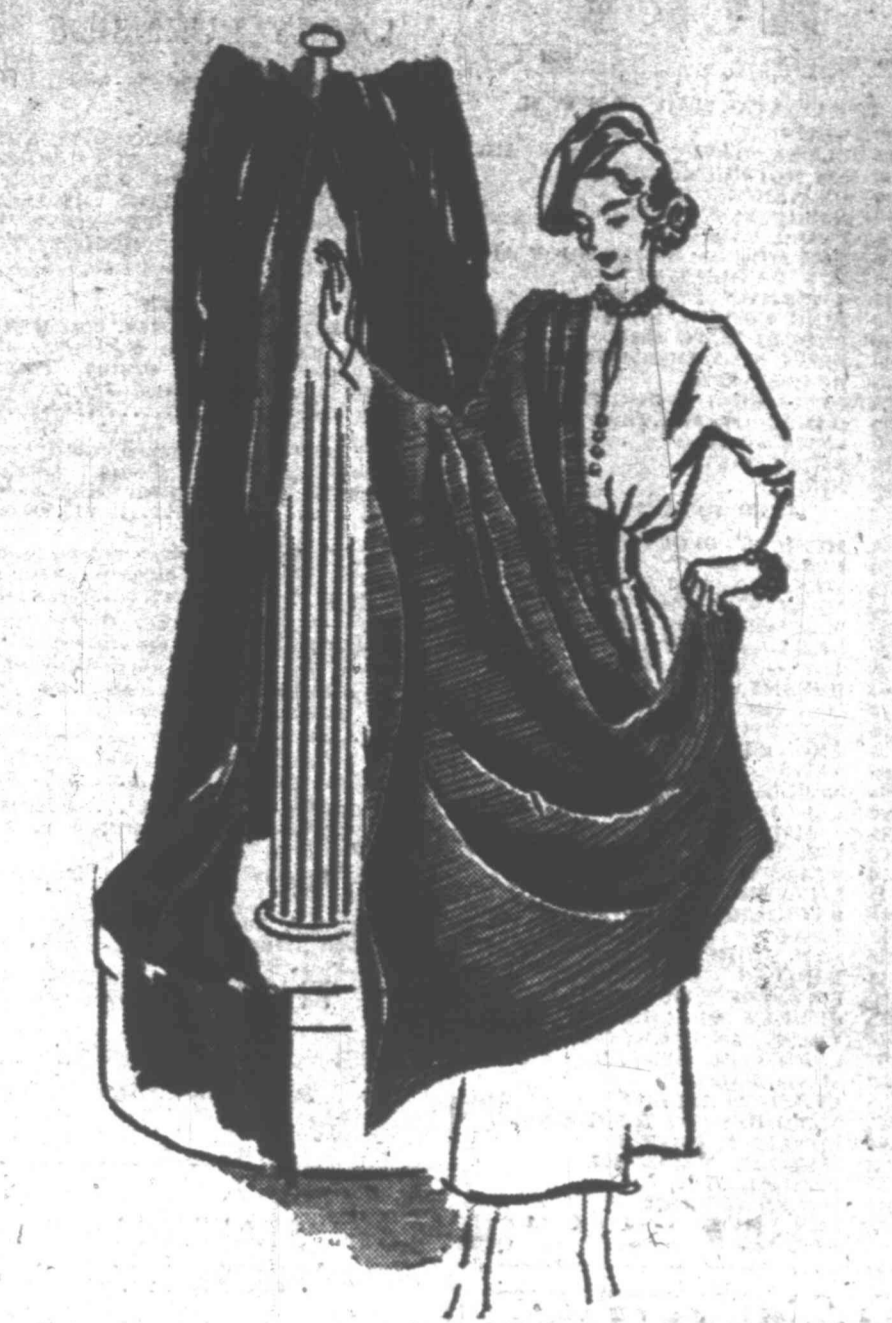

The drastic action is planned, fish and game officials said, because the man-made reservoir is overpopulated with trout, pike, bass, sturgeon, catfish, perch, crappie, ling, bullheads, gold-eyes and drums.
