PARIS-(AP)-Soviet Russia, faced with a stiffening American attitude, offered Tuesday to "put our cards on the table" in the East-West dispute over arms reduction proposals.

U. S. Delegate Warren R. Austin accused Russia in the United Nations Political Committee of balking efforts to solve the Berlin crisis. He said the Soviet battle cry in the world today is "wreck and destroy."

Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky made the cards-on-the-table offer in a reply largely conciliatory in tone.

*He said Russia would provide full information on her arms and armed forces if the United Nations adopted the Soviet proposal for an imme-diate one-third cut in Big Five armaments.

in a blunt, but unofficial, warning to the financial trade by Wisconsin's GOP Senater Joe McCarthy, vice chairman of the joint congressional housing committee.

But even as McCarthy took his stand, the Federal Reserve System was sending out notices to member banks to cut down on home loans as a deflationary measure. This will virtually put an end to GI loans, since banks have been turning down most veterans anyway in favor of loans with higher interest rates.

In many cases, this has been a deliberate squeeze play to force up the interest rates on GI loans. An increase from 4 to 4-1/2 per cent is permitted by law, provided it is approved by the Secretary of the Treasury and the Veterans Administration or Federal Housing Administration - whichever agency guarantees the loans. This new provision in the law was inserted this year by Congress to encourage banks to make GI loans. It has had the

opposite effect. A spot survey right in the nation's capital revealed that 23 out of 25 Washington banks refused even to consider an application for a GI loan. The situation is growing steadily worse.
