## Independent Producers To Switch Oil

Independent oil producers and royalty owners who control 324,000 barrels of crude oil production per month in West Texas have decided and agreed to switch their connections to the Phillips Petroleum Company.

The action was taken at a meeting in Midland Tuesday morning attended by 65 persons. A survey showed that they are now running 324,000 barrels per month to purchasers who have not met the 30 cents per barrel price rise announced September 27, by Phillips.

The session was called by G. V. (Cap) Lyman, of Midland, first vice president for Railroad Commission District No. 8, of the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association. He presided.

A resolution, passed by those attending the meeting, commended K. S. (Boots) Adams, president of Phillips, for initiating the price increase, and also expressed appreciation to Barnard Oil Company, Southern Minerals Corporation, and Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation, for meeting the raise.

The group also favored a proposal for starting an educational program by the independent operators to show the public the contributions being made by that segment of the petroleum industry to the general welfare.

Lyman asserted that the price increase of 30 cents per barrel which has been made by Phillips, and met by a few independent purchasers ready to "putting new life into many stripper wells which had been slated for abandonment, and that the increased production taxes which will result from the increase will benefit the entire state, especially public school teachers, as the extra tax should make possible better salaries for that group."

## Mud Is Recovered On DST In Scurry

American Republics Corporation No. 1 Scurry, Northeast Scurry County, 15 miles northeast of Snyder, 2,118 feet from north and 1,560 feet from east lines of section 240, block 2, EPTO survey, had a one-hour drilling test in the straw lime section of the Pennsylvania in 6,902-14 feet.

There was a blow of air for a part of the period. Recovery was 40 feet of drilling mud, with no indications of oil or water.

The venture is slated to core ahead.

## Andrews Venture Is On Contract Depth

Ray M. Fair, et al, No. 1 Frank Orson, wildcat in Southeast Andrews County, six and one-half miles southeast of the town of Andrews, and 600 feet from north and west lines of section 28, block 3, psd survey, was bottomed at 5,510 feet in dry Permian lime.

The prospector had not logged any indications of oil or gas. A Schlumberger survey was to be taken, and the project was to then wait for further news.

## Hockley Wildcat Gets Salt Water

Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Griffiths-Lawton, North-Central Hockley County prospector into the San Andres-Permian, six miles north of Levelland, and 550 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of labor 5, league 730, State Capital Lands, had reached 5,075 feet in lime, and was boring ahead.

A drilling test was taken for four hours at 4,744-4,805 feet. There was a slight blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 120 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas.

Another test was taken at 4,785-4,825 feet. The test was again open four hours. Recovery was 100 feet of drilling mud, which was 50 per cent salt water, and 170 feet of straight salt water. There were no indications of petroleum.

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E Wilson Bryant, Central Midland County wildcat, 14 miles south of the city of Midland, has reached 13,423 feet in Ellenburger lime, and was making new hole.

The development is 600 feet from north and 1,800 feet from west lines of section 36, block 39, TP survey, T-3-S.

# Russia Talks Conciliation In UN

## Dewey Brands Truman Policy Clumsy, Weak

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey Tuesday accused the Truman Administration of "clumsiness, weakness and wobbling" in foreign affairs.

"Time and again, America has been made to appear before the world as a fumbling giant, serving up diplomatic victories which only whetted the appetites of men whose appetites are worldwide," the Republican presidential candidate said.

Dewey spoke at Louisville in the politically-strategic border state of Kentucky on his way to Illinois. President Truman also was headed for Illinois with his plan for an expanded New Deal and "a better way of life."

Dewey charged the Administration with failure to consult Republicans on sudden, vital moves in dealing with other nations although he said the GOP had taken a major role in creating the bi-partisan foreign policy.

Such actions, Dewey said, have always got the country "deeper into trouble" and have been partly to blame for denying the American people the postwar gains they "had a right to hope for."

Even so, Dewey credited the bi-partisan policy with "great accomplishments" and said it had operated whenever the Administration "permitted it." He pledged, if elected, to carry out "a vigorous, competent and effective" drive for a "bi-partisan" foreign policy.

Truman and Dewey concentrated on their campaigns Monday night in major addresses touching on the same topics—the Taft-Hartley Act, minimum wages, social security, housing and the cost of living.

The President told an Akron, Ohio, audience his Republican rival "wants to go to Washington to destroy the New Deal expansion the Democrats propose."

Truman outlined his program as calling for repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act; boosting the wage minimum from 40 to 75 cents an hour; increasing social security benefits 50 per cent and broadening coverage; expanding the nation's health facilities; federal aid to states for education, slum clearance and low-cost housing; and action "at once" against high prices.

## Two Killed, Three Critically Hurt As Auto Strikes Truck

HOUSTON —(P)—Two men were killed and three women were critically injured when their car struck the rear of a pipe-laden truck Tuesday on the Hempstead highway, one mile east of Cypress.

The dead were identified as W. J. Higginbotham and E. B. Caldwell both of Waco.

The two injured women at a Houston hospital are Mrs. Higginbotham, who is unconscious and suffering from chest and head injuries, and Mrs. Caldwell, who is suffering from a broken left arm, shock, and other injuries.

The third injured woman is Mrs. W. W. Smith, also of Waco. They sheared off.

According to John Kitzmann of Cypress, the truck, pulling a load of 30-inch pipe, was beginning a turn off the highway when the accident occurred.

The entire top of the passenger car was sheared off even with the hood," Kitzmann said. "The car swerved away after the crash and climbed a railroad right-of-way embankment."

Kitzmann said the two men were dead when he reached the scene a few minutes later, and three women passengers were unconscious. The truck driver was not hurt in the accident, Kitzmann said.

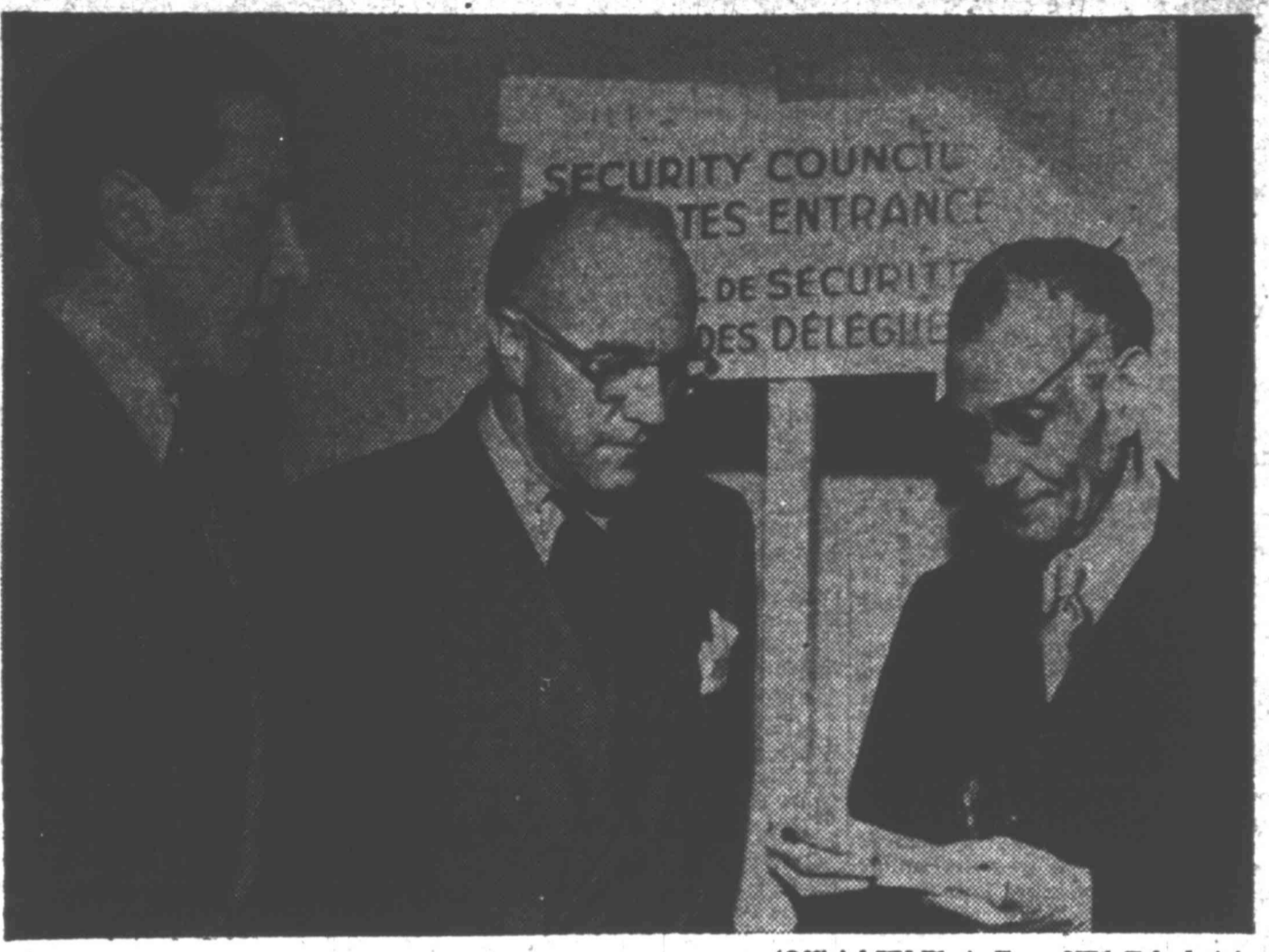

## Oil Industry Will Dedicate Dormitory

ABILENE —(P)—Details of the ceremonies Wednesday at which the American oil industry will dedicate a three-story dormitory at Hardin-Simmons University were announced Tuesday by Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, H-SU president, and V. C. Perini, Jr., president of the West-Central Texas Oil and Gas Association, hosts for the occasion.

Hundreds of U. S. independent operators and executives of major American oil companies will be here for the ceremonies. Hunter Memorial Hall is the industry's gift to Hardin-Simmons in tribute to the late Judge J. C. Hunter, prominent American oilman and church leader from Abilene. At the time of his death in 1945 he was president of the board of trustees of the university.

In honor of Judge Hunter and the oilmen, the Texas Railroad Commission will hold its statewide oil and gas hearing Wednesday morning in Abilene at the Windsor Hotel. Commissioners Ernest O. Thompson, Olin Culberson and William J. Murray, Jr., will conduct the hearing and then go to the university to take part in the ceremonies.

## ABC Fights Back At Fred Allen's Battle On 'Stop The Music'

NEW YORK —(P)—The running battle between Radio Comedian Fred Allen and radio give-aways flared anew Tuesday.

The American Broadcasting Company and the producer of its super-giveaway, "Stop the Music," fired counter blasts to Fred Allen's statement that people who are called during give-aways shows are notified in advance so they'll be sure to be by the telephone. They said it just isn't done on that program or the network's other prize shows.

Allen made his comment Sunday night in his second consecutive broadcast against give-aways. Portland, Me., remarked that every person who is called on a give-away program "is always at home sitting by the telephone—waiting."

Most of Allen's fire has been directed at "Stop the Music," which is on ABC Sunday night while he is on NBC. Charles C. Barry, ABC vice president in charge of programs, declared Allen's statement on advance-notice calls was "emphatically not true so far as 'Stop the Music' was concerned—nor is on ABC Sunday night while he is on NBC."

"We start telephoning at about five minutes to eight to have the first call ready when the program goes on the air—and every call is made after eight except the first one," he asserted.

Allen recently announced he had bonded his listeners against loss—up to \$5,000—if they are called by a give-away while tuned to his program.

## Civic Leaders Told T&P Depot Contract Will Be Let Soon

Plans and specifications for the new T&P depot in Midland are being revised and a construction contract will be let within the next 30 to 60 days, L. C. Porter, Dallas, vice president in charge of operations of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company, told civic leaders at a luncheon-meeting in Hotel Scharbauer here Monday.

Discussions of problems in which both the railroad and the city are interested featured the session which was attended by other high T&P officials and city, county and Chamber of Commerce representatives.

Chester G. Hayes of Dallas, vice president, traffic; J. J. Finagan, Dallas, assistant to the president; J. B. Shores, Dallas, director of public and employe relations; W. T. Alexander, Big Spring, division superintendent; and G. L. Brooks, Big Spring, general agent, were the other T&P officials in attendance.

Porter expressed appreciation to Midland and its citizens for their support and cooperation throughout the years, and said the T&P definitely is a part of Midland and of West Texas.

He pledged full cooperation in the proposed widening of East Highway 80 and in the Big Spring Street underpass proposal.

Shores called attention to the railroad's industrial advising campaign which is designed to attract industry to the territory served by the T&P. He discussed results and future plans of the campaign, on which he said \$225,000 would be spent in 1948.

## Stiffening Stand By U. S. Brings Words, Not Deeds

PARIS —(P)—Soviet Russia, faced with a stiffening American attitude, offered Tuesday to "put our cards on the table" in the East-West dispute over arms reduction proposals.

U. S. Delegate Warren R. Austin accused Russia in the United Nations Political Committee of balking efforts to solve the Berlin crisis. He said the Soviet battle cry in the world today is "wreck and destroy."

Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky made the card-on-the-table offer in a reply largely conciliatory in tone.

He said Russia would provide full information on her arms and armed forces if the United Nations adopted the Soviet proposal for an immediate one-third cut in Big Five armaments.

The firming of the American position centered mainly on the Berlin blockade, but it spread over the many other fundamental differences between Russia and the West. This developed with the return of Secretary of State Marshall by plane from Washington, where he conferred with President Truman.

Britain and France joined the United Nations Security Council to speed up Security Council action on the Berlin case.

The three big Western powers, despairing of mediation efforts by the so-called "Little Six" on the United Nations Security Council, are drafting a resolution for firm action to lift the Berlin blockade, Western sources said.

Marshall did not appear at the UN Assembly headquarters immediately on his arrival in Paris, but he took over again as behind-the-scenes director of American policy in the Berlin dispute.

## Dixiecrats Join Fight On Johnson

SAN ANTONIO —(P)—Dixiecrats will join in contesting seating of Lyndon B. Johnson in the United States Senate and will ask Senator W. Lee O'Daniel to retain his seat until the contest is settled, John T. Spann said Tuesday.

Spann, of San Antonio, advisory committeeman and presidential elector of the States' Rights Party, said: "I am now asking Senator O'Daniel to remain in his place in the United States Senate until a duly elected and qualified gentleman has been seated by the United States Senate to take his place."

Spann, a veteran attorney who practiced law in Dallas prior to locating in San Antonio, said he believed thousands of honest people throughout Texas were concerned over what had happened in Jim Wells, Zapata and Duval Counties in the recent Democratic primary runoff, and that he believed they would insist upon a thorough investigation to learn the true facts. He said he believed the law required Senator O'Daniel to remain on the job until a duly elected successor is seated in the Senate.

## Warren, Boudreau Named Among Five 'Most Virile Men'

CHICAGO —(P)—Candidate Earl Warren, Actors Clark Gable and Victor Mature, Singer Jack Smith and Baseball Manager Lou Boudreau Tuesday were named the five "most virile men in America."

The selections were made by the International Artists' Committee, a group of 40 illustrators. The reason for the survey of American men was given by Reno Blom, committee director, thus:

"Ever since the advent of the new look, artists have needed more virile men as models. An extreme feminine woman needs a very manly opposite to bring out the best points of both.

"These five are about as virile as you can get. They're positively loaded with hormones, or appear to be."

**HOLLYWOOD**—(AP)—I asked two of your favorite comedians if they are worried about television. Jack Benny said: "I'll wait until there's a big coast-to-coast network. Then there won't be anything to worry about. Of course, I'll be on television. After all, I'm only 37."

Eddie Cantor said: "I've been ready for television for the last 35 years. I'm just waiting for it to catch up with me. There's going to be a big change because of television. I'm glad I'm around and didn't die two years ago. It would have been all right to get away from Jessel but not from television."

Jack and Eddie went to Europe this summer and are back now for the fall radio season. Jack played the Palladium in London to new box-office records, just played in Paris and on the French Riviera. Then he did a GI tour of Germany.

The Army rushed him around so fast, Jack says, "I had breakfast in Frankfurt, lunch in Nuremberg and dysentery in Munich."

Distinguished Service  
Eddie Cantor arrived back in Hollywood just in time to be awarded the United Jewish Appeal's 1948 citation for Distinguished Humanitarian Service for his efforts in "Bringing a new era of hope and reconstruction for the Jews of Europe."

Sam Goldwyn made the presentation. Sam was Eddie's boss for seven years. Eddie compares him to Flo Ziegfeld, his boss for 13

years before he came to Hollywood. "Goldwyn," Eddie said, "is never satisfied with a film scene that is good if only money can make it better."

Jack Benny was worried as usual. This time he was worried about some straight lines on his radio show. Jokes don't worry him too much—"We've got a million jokes. It's the straight lines that drive me crazy."

As Jack explained it, "Anybody can have jokes. It's the straight lines leading up to the jokes that make a radio program funny." After 17 consecutive years at the top of the radio heap, Jack should know what he's talking about.

Cantor was worried, too—about all the adverse publicity Hollywood has had in the last few months. He said, "There should be a school for movie stars-to-be where they could learn how to act before they learn how to act."

Benny was still blushing about stepping out of a taxi cab in New York and forgetting to pay the driver. The driver yelled back "So it's true about you, eh, Buddy?" Benny rubbed back and gave him a big tip.

Eddie is conferring again with Warner Brothers about "The Eddie Cantor Story." There's enough for 20 films—we have to pick out the best two hours of 38 years in show business.

Eddie won't play himself, as you know. The film will be patterned after "The Jolson Story" with a newcomer playing Eddie and Eddie doing the singing.

"But," said Eddie, "I think it would be nice to let Jolson play my grandfather."

The only sour note to Benny's Palladium triumph was the simultaneous opening in London of "The Horn Blows at Midnight." Despite the fact Benny himself has panned the picture, it has made money for Warner Brothers.

## Bearden Emerges Hero Of Indians' World Series Win

BOSTON (AP)—Gene Bearden, a carefree rookie with ice water in his veins, is the undisputed hero of Cleveland's first World Series title since 1920.

"We owe it all to Bearden," said Manager Lou Boudreau after Monday's tingling 4-3 victory over the Boston Braves for the championship. "Give him all the credit. That goes back to the play-off game, too."

What else could the boss say?

The handsome southpaw, conqueror of the Boston Red Sox in the pennant playoff game, had just sauntered in from the bullpen to save the series finale.

Starter Bob Lemon was rocking and reeling from the fury of the attack of the Boston hitters, hungry for the winners' slice of the money from record crowds. The Braves had the bases full with one away in the last of the eighth, trailing 4 to 1.

Then came Bearden. Pinch Hitter Clint Conatser, the first man he faced, sent Thurman Tucker to deep center with a fly ball. Tommy Holmes tagged up and raced home, to make it 4-2.

Gene Goes To Work Manager Billy Southworth brought in Phil Masi to hit for Bill Salkeld and Masi hit the boards high on the left field wall for a double that scored Torgeson. Now it was 4-3.

Coolly surveying the situation, Bearden went to work on Mike McCormick, one of the Braves' more dependable hitters in the series. He came in with his knuckler on the first pitch and McCormick bounced it right back to the box for the vital third out.

The eighth was over but the Braves were aroused. Reliever Warren Spahn blazed the ball past three Indians batters, striking out the side, and the Boston club hustled in for another crack at that big winners' pool of \$230,249, some \$76,000 more than the losers'.

Eddie Stanky, the best base-ball wrangler in the majors, led off the ninth. Bearden got him down to 3-2 and then lost him. The tying run was on first and the heat was on.

Southworth sent Sibby Sisti up to bunk and replaced the hobbled Stanky with fleet Connie Ryan. Sisti bunted one foul. Then he took a ball. The next pitch he bunted again and the ball popped into the air about 10 feet high in front of the plate.

Catcher Jim Fegan made the catch and fired to first base for an easy double play. Holmes ended the game and series by flying out.

Best In Tough Spot Joe Gordon, held to three hits in the first five games, helped the Tribe to its early lead with a home run blast off starter Bill Voiselle that broke a 1-1 tie in the sixth. They scored twice in that inning and again in the eighth but Lemon could not hold it.

The Bearden on the final game, carried to the clubhouse on the shoulders of his teammates, was not a sharp as the Bearden of last Friday who shut out the Braves 2-0 on five skyscraper hits, but it was Bearden at his best—in a tough spot.

A mere ball game can't bother a 28-year-old war vet who spent two years in hospitals after the Japs torpedoed the USS Helena. He still carries aluminum plates in his head and left knee.

In years to come, probably the most important thing this series will be remembered for are the money and huge attendance. Sunday's Cleveland game attracted 86,288, the largest throng ever to see a ball game. The day before they had 81,897. A final check of the cash

box showed an accumulation of \$1,633,685.36, a new series record.

Each Cleveland share is worth about \$6,772.05 and each full Boston share is \$4,551.51. The Indians split their 34 ways to 33 by the Braves.

Statistics on the conference race to date issued by James H. Stewart, executive secretary, show Walker to have caught six passes for 186 yards—an average of 31 yards per reception.

He has punted nine times for an average of 37.2 yards and has run four punts back 106 yards.

Goode Faces Punters The leader in pass-receiving, as regards number, is Morris Bailey of Texas Christian, who has taken 14 throws for 167 yards. Next is Ben Procter of Texas, who has caught 10 for 141. Procter has been injured and didn't play at all last week.

Bob Goode of Texas A&M is the leading punter with an average of 38.8 on "boots and Gordon Wyatt of Rice is third with 36.6 on five kicks.

In punt returns George Sims of Baylor sets the pace, averaging 31.5 yards on eight carries. Third is Ross Pritchard of Arkansas with 24.4 on five returns.

Clyde Scott of Arkansas continues to lead the circuit in ball-carrying with 453 yards on 54 carries, with Lindy Berry of Texas Christian second with 313 on 81 runs and Leon Campbell of Arkansas third with 294 yards on 49 carries.

Johansen, Rifle Man John Johansen, Southern Methodist's rifle man, is the leading passer with 444 yards on 26 connections in 34 attempts. Paul Campbell of Texas is second with 346 yards

## Court Finds 'Amber' Boring, Not Obscene

BOSTON (AP)—Kathleen Winsor's novel "Forever Amber" is not obscene, indecent or impure, according to a majority but divided opinion of the Massachusetts Supreme Court.

In upholding a ruling of Superior Court Judge Frank J. Donahue, the Supreme Court found the book did not violate state laws.

Judge Donahue, 67, reported he fell asleep while reading about Amber's love affairs. He called the book "sporadic" and reported "scarcely a plot" and "a point of tedium."

## Nation's Crude Oil Production Reaches New All-Time High

TULSA, OKLA. (AP)—The nation's crude oil production reached another all-time high of 5,542,975 barrels daily during the week ended October 2, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

This total, the Journal said, was 175,630 barrels more than the previous high figure. It was 790 barrels over the previous best daily average production during the week ended September 11.

California, where production had been affected adversely by a refinery strike, approached its normal production with an increase of 162,450 barrels to 912,250 barrels.

Other increases listed by the Journal were: Colorado, up 1,260 barrels to 48,700; Montana, 1,140 to 25,030; New Mexico, 1,485 to 133,310, an all-time high for that state; Texas 25,775 to 2,507,000, also an all-time record; Oklahoma, 3,450 to 430,300; the Eastern area 2,700 to 68,100; Florida 580 to 800, and Kentucky, 600 to 25,100.

The greatest declines included: Illinois, down 1,600 barrels to 180,100; Michigan, off 1,200 to 43,800; Mississippi, 1,155 to 125,295; Louisiana, 2,750 to 482,150; Kansas, 14,300 to 290,750; Wyoming, 1,980 to 158,930.

Indiana was down 100 barrels to 27,400, Alabama dropped 150 to 1,250 and Arkansas declined 875 to 82,300.

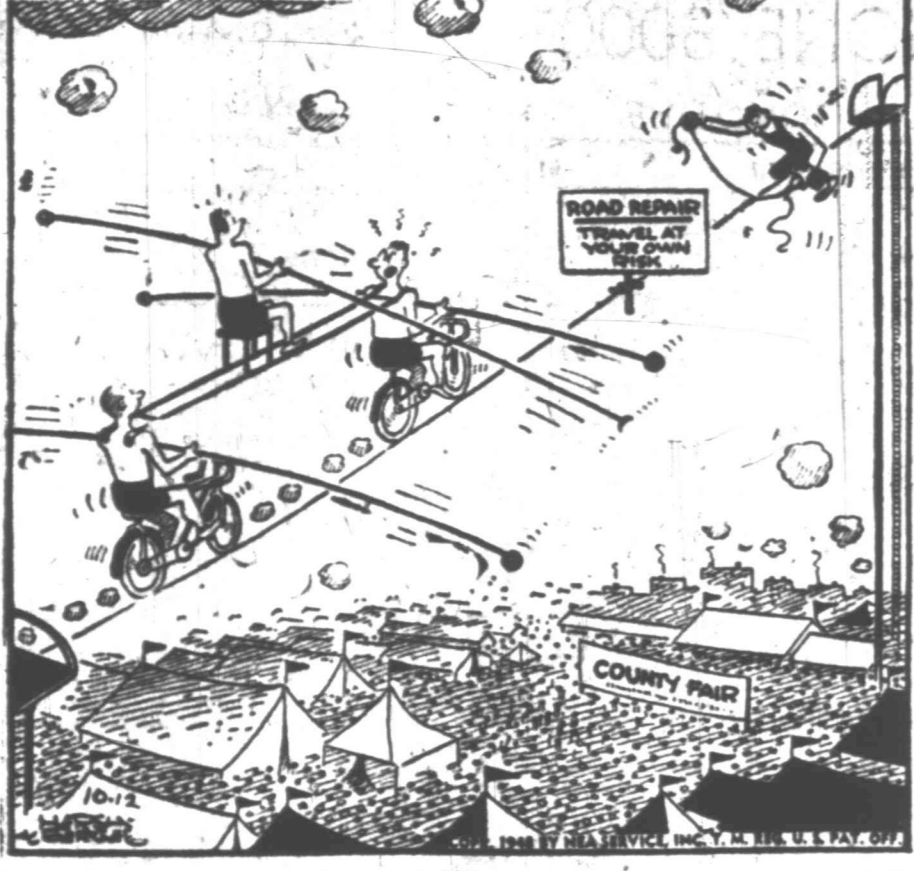

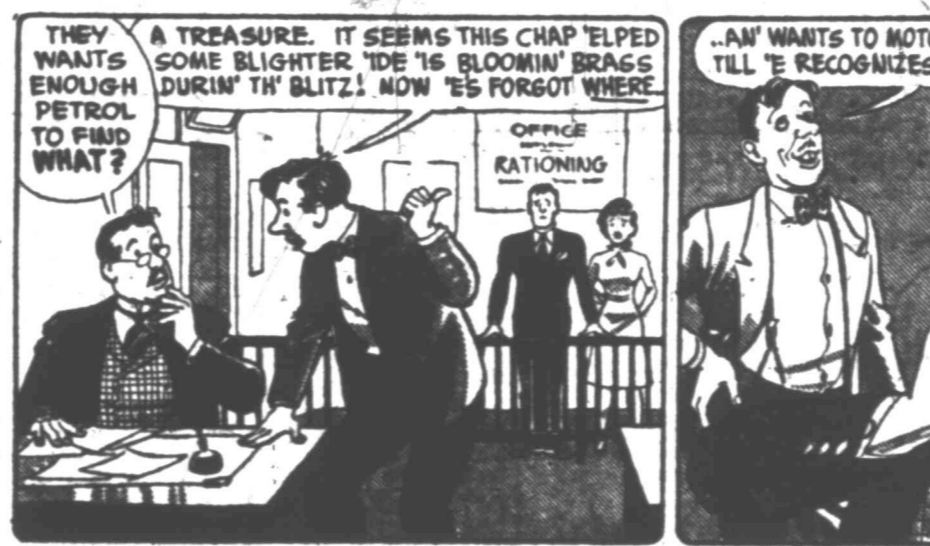

## Farmers, With Top Harvest Underway, Plan More In 1949

WASHINGTON—(AP)—With a record crop volume practically assured for this year, farmers already are turning their attention to planning for another big output in 1949.  
The Agriculture Department reported this in a harvest-time statement estimating this year's total crop production will exceed the 1946 record by eight per cent.  
Favorable weather in September virtually nullified down earlier forecasts that 1948 production will top all others.  
This year's record corn crop will turn out to be larger than the department had previously predicted if its latest estimate is borne out. Monday's report put the crop at 3,567,856,000 bushels—a boost of about 20,000,000 bushels from the September forecast.  
Price Drops Predicted  
Surpassing the 1946 record by 10 per cent, the new corn crop opens the way for a big boost in production of meats, dairy and poultry products. Consumers should feel the benefits in the form of lower prices by late 1949, officials said.  
With farm prices in general now down about five per cent from the January peak, an Agriculture Department economist said Tuesday a further drop of 15 per cent may come by the end of 1949—if peace prospects brighten.

destry has become the Soviet battle cry in the world today. He cited a number of quotations which he said indicated the Soviet Union is guilty of duplicity.  
Austin asserted it is "a misconception to suppose that differing systems cannot live side by side in peace under the basic rules of international conduct prescribed by the charter of the United Nations."  
Vishinsky Complains  
But he said the United Nations must teach the Russian "what is possible and what is impossible in the relationship between the Soviet Union and the world at large."  
A Russian proposal for a one-third arms reduction and junking of atomic weapons was under consideration.  
Vishinsky complained bitterly in reply to Austin that, in the Western view, "Whatever we do is wrong." Every sentence of the Western speeches, the Russian said, "shows blame on us." The Soviet representatives attack nobody, he said.  
Then Vishinsky said he was willing to discuss Marxism and Leninism if Austin wished.  
He said the capitalist and Communist ideologies could live side by side in the same world "if both sides try to understand the other side."  
Years For Cooperation  
"Hence our desire to cooperate," he said.  
"We want to cooperate."  
"We are yearning for cooperation."  
As he spoke the Western Powers, convinced mediation efforts are futile, passed for a showdown in the Security Council on their demand that Russia raise the blockade of Berlin. UN sources said Britain, France and the United States want a Council session Wednesday or Thursday, feeling the time for action has arrived.  
The Kremlin's answer to efforts of the so-called neutral states to mediate in the Berlin crisis still is awaited. Some Western sources said there would have been some hope of a compromise if a Russian answer was conciliatory in tone.  
As a rule, the air moves as wind from west to east in the United States.

## Colin Kelly's Body To Receive Honors

MADISON, FLA.—(AP)—Burial with full military honors will be accorded Wednesday to the body of Capt. Colin Kelly, the first acclimated hero of the war with Japan.  
The body, scheduled to arrive here by train Tuesday, will be escorted by veteran organizations to the Madison County Courthouse where it will lie in state with a guard of honor until Wednesday afternoon.  
Kelly was killed when his plane crashed on the return from a bombing mission against the Japanese Battleship Haruna off Manila three days after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

## It's Time To Mail Overseas Packages

Postmaster N. G. Oates Tuesday announced that Midlanders who plan to send Christmas packages overseas should do so before November 15.  
The Post Office Department has advised that all such packages should be mailed between October 15 and November 15 in order to reach their destinations by Christmas. Packages to Korea and Japan should be mailed not later than November 1.

## COMMEMORATIVE STAMP TO BE SOLD SATURDAY

The stamp celebrates the 100th anniversary of the settlement of five civilized tribes in Oklahoma. Fifty million of these stamps have been printed.

## Supreme Court Says 'Gold Bar' Takings Subject To Taxation

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Supreme Court upheld two lower courts by refusing to review a decision that money obtained by James A. Akers of Bexar County from a wealthy Big Spring, Texas, widow on "gold bars" deals must be considered income subject to federal tax.  
Akers asked the court to review and reverse rulings by a U. S. District Court in Texas and the U. S. Circuit Court in New Orleans, which held that Akers' share of funds collected from the widow was taxable.  
Mrs. Dora D. Roberts of Big Spring gave \$272,000 to Akers from 1932 through 1936, the Justice Department said in a brief.  
The money was for maps, represented as showing the location of "gold bars" buried on her Howard County ranch. The "gold bars" actually were brass bars worth 15 cents a pound, the brief said. It also said the bars were planted on the ranch by Akers, and said Akers and a partner divided the \$272,000.  
Mrs. Roberts felt ashamed of having permitted herself to be so defrauded and did not advise any law-enforcing authority that she had been defrauded," the department said.

## Placid Plugging Back To Test Higher Zone

Placid Oil Company (H. L. Hunt) No. 1 Clark, Northwest Tom Green County exploration, six miles west of Water Valley, ran a one-hour drillstem test in the Ellenburger at 7,634-7,714 feet.  
Recovery was 180 feet of sulphur water and 4,000 feet of drilling mud. There were no signs of oil or gas.  
The prospector drilled on down to 7,838 feet. The samples from 7,714 feet to the bottom did not show any possibilities of oil or gas production.  
It is being plugged back to 1,960 feet, to allow making a production test in the zone at 1,000-80 feet. There were some slight signs of petroleum were noted in some of the drilling samples.  
Informed sources reveal that there is a slight possibility that a small amount of oil might be completed from that horizon.

## Gulf Spuds In Deep Winkler Prospect

Gulf Oil Corporation has started drilling at a 10,000-foot wildcat in Northeast Winkler County to explore into the Ellenburger.  
The prospector is Gulf No. 135-E Keystone. It is 600 feet from north and 1,800 feet from west lines of section 2, block B-1, pel survey.  
That puts it seven miles north and east of the nearest completed oil wells in the Keystone-Ellenburger field.  
Location for this venture was reported several months ago, but operations were not begun until the current week. The project had spudded to 310 feet in redbeds.  
As soon as surface casing is run and cemented the exploration will start drilling ahead.
