

# It's Nigh Election Time Here

It's election time again — or Voters in Muleshoe, Three Way and Bula will trek to the polls next Saturday to cast their ballots for two trustees in each district, and in addition, three unopposed county school board members are to be re-elected.

Then on the following Tuesday, April 6, voters in the City of Muleshoe will go to the polls to pick two city councilmen, one of whom is unopposed.

Interest in the two elections here apparently was light — as only one person has cast an absentee ballot in the school board election up to late Friday, and no absentee ballots had been voted in the city council race.

Patrons of Muleshoe Independent School district will select two trustees out of a field of four. Voting is done on an "at-large" basis. Incumbents are John Smith and Ralph Douglas both of whom have filed for reelection. Also seeking the school board posts are R. A. Bradley and Vic Benedict.

Voting in the school board race will be done at the junior high library.

Both incumbent councilmen, Matt Dudley and Rudolph Wiedebush are seeking re-election. Dudley is unopposed, but Wiedebush will face Royce Garth in the April 6 election. Voting will be done at the city hall, and absentee ballots also can be cast at the City office.

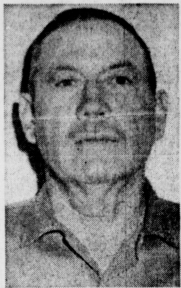
Absentee voting for school board positions can be done until March 29, and in the city election until April 2.

Also being named are three county school board members, but none is opposed. The candidates are: Young, Muleshoe, vice-president at large; Marcis, who lives in part of town for Commissioner's Precinct No. 2, an E. A. Kenley of the Goodland community for Commissioner's Precinct No. 3.

At Bula a lively race for school board members was developing with five persons seeking two positions to be filled there. Neilier Chester Self nor J. Ray Spence, the incumbents, is seeking re-election.

Bula candidates include R. H. Layton, E. M. Astry, Leon Kissler, Edward Crane and Jim my Cannon.

Four men are seeking the two school board positions to be filled at Three Way, including See ELECTION, Page Five



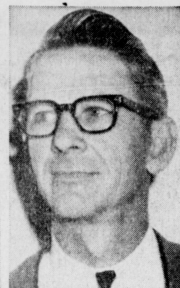

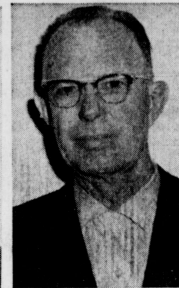

## County's Cotton Allotment Gets 7000-Acre Boost; Feed Grain Plan Signed By 80 Percent Of Growers

Bailey County's cotton allotment for this year will be only 2000 acres below the 1964 mark, it was revealed Friday when reapportioned acres were assigned, Charles Daniel, ASCS manager here, said.

The county got 7,674.1 acres of additional cotton acres, which added to the 96,112 previously allotted, brought the county's total to 103,786.1.

This compared with last year's total allotment, after reapportionment, of 105,332 acres. The original base allotment, however, was only 95,673 last year, but the reapportioned acres totaled 3664.7

farmers signed up for the feed grain program.

The feed grain program already has put more than a quarter-million dollars into the pockets of county farmers, Daniel had not made a final tally, but around 1200 farmers were believed to have signed up for the feed grain plan.

Farmers who signed up for the 1965 feed grain program must make a mandatory 20 percent reduction in their feed grain acreage in order to comply. However, the diversion may be increased voluntarily to 50 percent of the allotment.

Diversion payments have been set up under a two-payment system. The lower rate is 20 percent of the county total support rate, while the higher rate is 40 percent of support rate. The lower pay-

Nationally, Daniel says, average support rates establish for the crop year are as follows: Corn, \$1.25 per bushel; barley 90 cents per bushel, and grain sorghum \$2 per ext. Daniel said castor beans or sesame may be planted as "non-surplus crops" in 1965. However, payments are reduced if either crop is planted.

In the High Plains cotton area, Terry county with 12,236.5 got the biggest share of support rate. The lower pay-

## He Rides A Bull To College!

Eddie Puckett, Muleshoe, rides a mean bull through the halls of college.

The first part of that statement is literal; the last part is figurative.

Puckett climbs on mean bulls for pay. He's a rodeo bull-rider who had done such a good job of his rodeo activities that he's rolled up \$1200 in prize money, and that money is helping him walk the college halls.

Rodeos are Puckett's dish; he'd rather ride a mean bull than a Cadillac. For second best, he takes bareback riding.

Puckett, an agriculture education major, attends South Plains college in Levelland. Next year it's going to be Texas Tech. He's vice-president of the South Plains College Rodeo Club this year, and he's got his

hands full with arrangements for the college's April rodeo. One of the best rodeos ever held in Levelland was last year's rodeo, which brought people from over all of West Texas.

Puckett was born at Amherst, but moved with his parents, to Muleshoe when he was about 4 years of age. The fourth in a family of seven children, Puckett is the only child attending college. He has a strong desire to obtain a college education and to become an agriculture teacher, and also "do rodeo work," he adds.

As a youngster, Puckett's father operated a small grocery store three miles west of Muleshoe and traded horses as a side line business. Puckett says there were usually from 20 to 30 horses around the place at all times. He became interested in horses and cattle and began riding calves when a very young boy and rode his first bull when he was 13, in a Cloy's, N. M. rodeo. He admits he didn't ride very long, but he was not discouraged and contin-

ued to enter rodeos until he learned to more cowably handle the stock.

Puckett's parents have encouraged him in his pursuit of rodeo work and he says he has had plenty of help in learning to ride. "There is always someone around to offer criticism." See BULL, Page Five

## Car Tag Sales Gain As Deadline Nears

Tag buyers started queuing up late Friday as the deadline for buying 1965 plates approached. Jean Lovelady, county tax assessor-collector, said she and her crew were "kept hopping" as buyers swarmed to the courthouse to get their plates before the deadline.

Final day for buying tags is next Wednesday. After that date, owners of automobiles and pickups operating on last year's tags will be subject to arrest.

Persons who fail to buy their current plates before April 1 must put their vehicles into storage and then will be required to sign a statement declaring they have not operated their vehicle this year.

Up to Wednesday, 1775 automobile tags had been issued here and 1158 pickup tags. By Friday noon the total had climbed to 2960 automobiles and 1375 pickups.

And close on the heels of the tag deadline comes another deadline: Operators of vehicles must have had their cars and trucks inspected by April 15. This phase of the program state officers said, is lagging adding, "thousands of vehicle have not yet been inspected."

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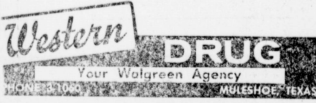
