## Sinclair Discovers Oil From Shafter Lake Ellenburger

Sinclair Prairie Oil Company has found commercial production from the Ellenburger in the Shafter Lake region of North-Central Andrews County.

This is the fifth zone to be found productive in that region. All of the five zones will not produce in all wells in the field—but they might in some of the projects that may be undertaken.

The Sinclair Prairie discovery showed a recovery rate of 6.536 feet, or 15 barrels of clean oil during a three hour drillstem test in the top of the Ellenburger at 11,695-745 feet.

No Fluid To Surface  
There was no water. No fluid was flowed out during the test period. Additional recovery was the 4,300-foot water blanket which came out ahead of the oil.

Gravity of the oil is approximately 41 degrees. There was very little gas. Open flowing bottom hole pressure ranged between 1,970 pounds and 4,030 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 30 minutes was 4,815 pounds. Hydrostatic pressure was 5,260 pounds.

Operator plans to drill 30 feet deeper and take another test.

This development is 1,960 feet from north and 500 feet from east lines of section 24, block 13, University survey. It is adjacent to wells which have been dually completed from the Wolfcamp and the Devonian.

Has Higher Production  
The new zone for commercial production from both of those zones, and is the first exploration in that area which has been carried into the Ellenburger.

The new zone opener is about five miles northeast of the nearest Ellenburger producers in the Fullerton field.

In addition to the Wolfcamp and the Devonian, the Ellenburger, the Clear Fork of the Permian, and a sand in the Pennsylvanian, have also been found capable of making oil in at least one exploration—Texas Pacific No. 1-P University.

That project is now at a 9,775 feet in the Devonian, taking a drillstem test. That section has already shown for commercial production.

## Stanotex 1 Brown Finds Better Pay

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 1 Jesse Brown, Northwest Henry County, which has already shown for around 40 to 50 barrels of oil per hour flowing from sand and lime section in the Pennsylvanian, has found a deeper and better pay from which it flowed 101.5 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil in one hour through a one-half inch bottom hole choke.

This important development is nine miles northwest of Snyder, and is 1,880 feet from north and 1,180 feet from west lines of section 440, block 7, H&TCo survey.

The drillstem test on which the latest flow was made was at 6,367-6414 feet. Test was open one hour and 46 minutes.

Flows Gas, Mud and Oil  
Gas showed at the surface in three minutes. Mud came to the top in eight and one-half minutes and the drill pipe started flowing out oil in ten minutes.

The flow was gauged into tanks for the last 90 minutes of the test, and it was during that time that the 101.5 barrels was recovered. There was no water.

Surface working pressure was 270 pounds. Gas-oil ratio ranged between 544 and 644 to one. Operator was pulling the 2 1/2 inch drill pipe at last report.

It is expected that the project will bottom at 5,414 feet and operator will run casing and complete the discovery.

## Pay Opener in Coke Goes On Production

Sun Oil Company No. 1 P. W. Millican, West-Central Coke County, 12 miles west of Robert Lee, has been officially completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 376 barrels of 45.4 gravity oil, from pay in the Strawn strata, reef lime, between 5,948 feet and 5,970 feet.

The flow on the potential test was through a one-quarter inch tubing choke. There was no water. Flowing tubing pressure was 1,075 pounds. Flowing casing pressure was 510 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,075.

The pay section had been treated with 2,000 gallons of acid. The new field opener is nine miles south of the Jamison field, the nearest known producing area, and it is 600 feet from north and east lines of section 226, block 2, H&TCo survey.

## Tom Green Wildcat Tests Ellenburger

Humble Oil & Refining Company drillstem tested its No. 1 Wardlaw, West Tom Green County, deep wildcat, in a formation unofficially identified as the Ellenburger.

The tool was open two hours at 1,850-7,085 feet. Recovery was 600 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

Operator has now drilled to 7,112 (Continued on page 11)

# Hideki Tojo Is Sentenced To Hang

## Six Other Jap Leaders Also To Die

TOKYO —(AP)—Death on the gallows was decreed Friday for Hideki Tojo, the cold, calculating Japanese who led his country to ruin in the world's bloodiest war, and six of his 24 top leaders.

Life imprisonment was meted out to 16 others, including the Marquis Kouchi Kido, close adviser to the emperor.

A seventeenth, Shigenori Togo, foreign minister at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack, drew 20 years in prison. Aging, peg-legged Mamoru Shigemitsu, the statesman who hobbled aboard the battleship Missouri to sign the surrender terms in Tokyo Bay, got seven years imprisonment.

An 11-nation court convicted all 25 defendants of war crimes. It sat more than two and a half years.

Sir William Webb of Australia, president of the court, pronounced the sentences in a deathly silent and packed courtroom. Each man

HIROHITO LISTENS IN  
TOKYO —(AP)—Emperor Hirohito watched on his radio Friday to hear the verdicts in the war crimes trials.

Aides said he listened intently and seriously. He had no comment.

He sat in a room in the palace, filed in separately and stood in an otherwise empty prisoner's dock to hear his sentence. Each attempted to subdue emotion but varied reactions were noticeable.

Takes Sentence With Smile  
Tojo took his death sentence with a wry smile. He bowed politely to the court as did most of the other men.

Seventy-four-year-old Gen. Hiro Minami, former war minister, seemed surprised at his sentence of life imprisonment. Gen. Hiroshi Oshima, former ambassador to Germany, stood arrogantly and was sentenced to life and stalked away without the police bow.

Japanese greeted the sentences in varied ways. Some said they thought more would be hanged and others said they were sorry for the defendants.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Allied occupation commander, set November 12 as the deadline for petitions in behalf of the defendants to be submitted to him as reviewing officer of the tribunal's decision.

No date for the carrying out of the sentences was set. Sentenced to hang were: Former Premier Tojo, the balding little man who tried to commit suicide after the war; American blood plasma saved his life. Gen. Kenji Doihara, 64, the Japanese (Continued on Page 12)

## Next Round Of Wage Boosts To Be Last, Says Labor Official

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Predictions of a fourth and final round of postwar wage boosts came Friday from an Administration official.

The policy shaper, who asked not to be quoted by name, said he looks for the pay increases to average between seven and ten cents an hour.

But he qualified his final round forecast by pegging it to another— that living costs are about to level off.

If they do, he told a reporter, future wage talks will shift emphasis from prices to productivity. His contention is that only by boosting output can workers be sure of meeting their earnings upward, once their pay has caught up with prices.

Taft-Hartley Problems  
The Administration labor official said preliminary plans being readied for President Truman's study call for a "reasonable compromise" on labor legislation and a greatly strengthened Labor Department.

On the issue of what to do with the Taft-Hartley Act—which the Democrats are pledged to repeal and replace—the official marked down two provisions as the toughest to remove.

He listed them as (a) the provision dealing with national emergency strikes—such as industry-paralyzing coal mine shutdowns—and (b) the requirement that labor leaders disavow Communist affiliations.

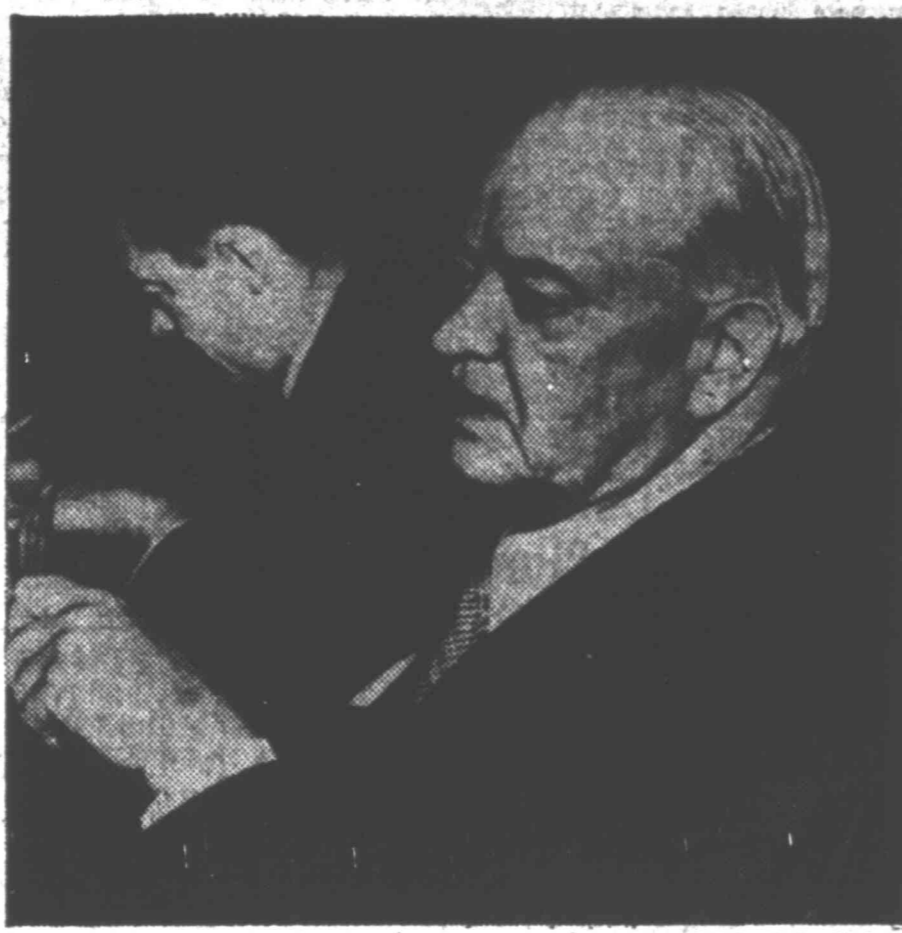
## American Woman Missing In Germany

## Rumors Of Truman, Stalin Conference Called Propaganda

PARIS —(AP)—High Western delegation sources said Friday Russia has launched a new "propaganda peace offensive" around the world. The West, they said, plans to meet it at every point.

One leading delegate to the United Nations Assembly told reporters privately Russia is exploiting the reported possibility of a meeting between President Truman and Prime Minister Stalin for such propaganda purposes.

"The delegate, who would not permit reporters to identify him, said the Russians are becoming more and more disturbed because, despite their propaganda, the line-up in the Assembly against them is 52 to six. Their propaganda had more effect when the Assembly was meeting in New York, the delegate said, but here the West consistently has won bigger majorities.

Know Nothing About It  
Therefore the Russians seized upon the Truman-Stalin conference idea in an effort to dent the Western position, and turned all their propaganda guns loose on it, the delegate added.

The United States delegation to the Assembly, meanwhile, refused to say anything on the reports of a possible meeting of Stalin and Truman. They maintained their position that they knew nothing about it.

The delegation spokesman would not confirm or deny that the subject would be discussed by U. S. Secretary of State Marshall and President Truman when Marshall returns to Washington.

There was no indication at the UN headquarters when Marshall will return to the United States. Informed sources said they expected the secretary of state would remain in Paris as long as developments warranted.

## Fire Razes \$100,000 Hotel In Gladewater

GLADEWATER —(AP)—The St. Clair Hotel, a 40-room two-story structure, was destroyed by fire here early Friday.

All guests escaped without injury. The fire broke out at 2:30 a.m. and seven hours later still was burning, threatening an adjoining building. The hotel was owned by Mayor Carl Bruce, who estimated the loss at \$100,000. Bruce said the fire started from a faulty exhaust fan in the coffee shop.

The building, one of the largest in this East Texas oil center, was located across the street from the railroad station.

Fire hose laid across the Texas and Pacific tracks delayed four passenger trains and one freight train three hours. Finally, the hose was stretched through a tunnel under the tracks to permit the trains to proceed.

Fire companies from Logview and Kilgore aided the Gladewater department in fighting the flames. The structure also housed a liquor store, an infant ready to wear store and a beauty shop, all destroyed.

## Chiang's Loyalists Halt Red Advances

NANKING —(AP)—Savage Nationalist attacks reportedly routed nine Red columns at the Grand Canal Friday in the mammoth Szechow battle.

The Communists, pro-government newspapers said, withdrew in disorder, leaving 37,000 dead and wounded. They had tried to sneak 135,000 Tsinan veterans across the canal for an attack on Szechow's left flank, 30 miles east of the government bastion.

The fight at the canal was bloody. The Nationalists were credited with turning back more than 20 Red charges. The Reds, reports said, were using what the Chinese call "human sea" tactics—waves of men charging almost shoulder to shoulder.

Automatic weapons and low-flying strafing planes took a heavy toll. The newspapers called it a major victory. But observers agreed that at best it might only delay the Red timetable by three weeks at most. The big battle of Szechow, largest in Asiatic history, still is to be decided.

More than 1,000,000 combatants have been committed by the warring Chinese factions.

The Catholic newspaper, Yi Shih Pao, said President Chiang Kai-Shek flew to Szechow, 170 miles to the northwest, during the canal battle. This report was not confirmed. But it was obvious the government now was throwing as many planes as possible into the struggle.

American Diplomats in Nanking  
Foreign diplomats in Nanking generally expected Chiang to order the capital transferred southward in view of his decision to carry on what he calls his "eight years of war" against the Reds.

Foreign diplomats were leaving in U. S. Air Force and Marine transport planes from the same busy Nanking Air Field. They were being flown to Shanghai and Tientsin to board ships for home.

Addressing Russia's Ambassadors  
Foreign diplomats in Nanking, originally numbering about 1,000, were expected to be out of the troubled city by midnight.

U. S. consular officials urged American women and children to Tientsin to evacuate because of the spreading hostilities. Americans in the Peiping-Tientsin and Shanghai-Nanking areas had received similar advice a week ago, but Tientsin had been considered the safest place in China because of the presence of U. S. warships.

Free, Unfettered Elections  
Addressing Russia's Ambassador Y. Vishinsky directly, Osborn said: "The people of the United States are the masters of their government and the people of the United States want peace. They would not permit a war of aggression."

"Certainly after the events of last week, Mr. Vishinsky knows the American people can speak in free, unfettered elections."

He referred to President Truman's election and said the Russian people "have no such opportunity to choose their leaders."

When the Russian people gain this privilege, he added, it will be "a milestone in human progress."

## Crash Landing Ends Texas Flyers' Shot At Endurance Record

LONGVIEW —(AP)—The attempt of Endurance Flyers Fred Vinmont and Bert Simons to crack the world's record of 728 hours ended Thursday night in a crash-landing.

The two men had been in the air 529 hours when they were forced to come down about 11 p.m. Vinmont suffered a fractured nose in the landing. Both men were hurt from the plane.

Houston, lead ground chief for the flyers, said the plane's engine "froze" at between 900 and 1,000 feet. The pilots radioed they were coming down.

The landing occurred approximately a mile and one-half from the Gregg County Airport, their operations base.

The two men were starting their fourth week in the air. They had taken turns flying the specially equipped single-engine plane they had dubbed "Miss Texas."

The record of 728 hours was set in 1939 at Long Beach, Calif.

## Greyhound Workers Set Strike Sunday

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—APL bus drivers and station attendants Friday threatened to strike. Greyhound Lines in seven Western states at midnight Sunday.

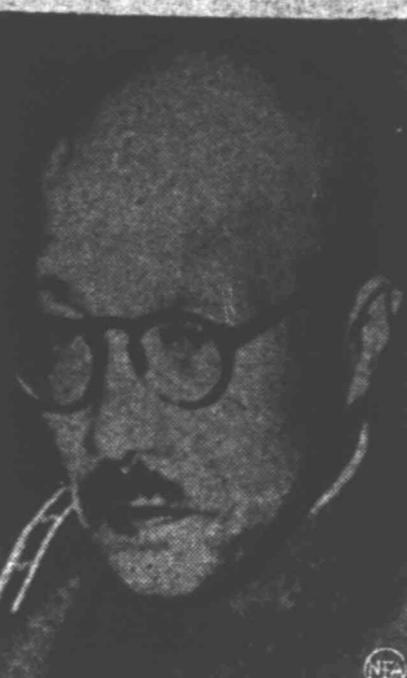
In a letter to the company, the union said the strike would be called unless an "acceptable" wage offer is forthcoming before the deadline.

Affected would be 2,800 drivers and 600 station employees in California, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas.

The letter said drivers "will be instructed not to take out any schedules after midnight, November 14."

## Condemned

## Duck Hunters Prepared As Season Opens

Probably the most flourishing business in Midland Friday was on Federal duck stamps as hunters prepared to start shootin' when the season opened at noon. More than a hundred stamps had been sold at the Post Office before 10 a.m. and business was picking up all the time.

Legal shooting hours Friday are from 12 o'clock noon to one hour before sunset. All other days of the season, which ends December 16, the legal shooting hours will be from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

The limit on ducks this season is five in the aggregate per day and possession is limited to two day's kill. The only exception is on American and Redwatered Mergansers which are seldom seen in this area.

Use of live decoys or taking from automobiles or aircraft is prohibited. No shotgun larger than 10 gauge may be used and no automatic shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, including those in the magazine and chamber is allowed.

All persons over sixteen years of age must have a Federal stamp to hunt ducks. Stamps may be purchased at the Post Office.

Hunters report that the lakes and tanks south of Midland, and in Martin County are literally covered with ducks. However, the law forbids taking them from any enclosed private property unless the owner has given his consent.

Most of the hunters in this area are expected to be out early Saturday morning in order to get a few shots before sunrise, which is listed officially at 7:15 a.m.

Shooting time closes officially at 4:31 p. m. Friday since the official table lists sunset at 5:31 p. m.

## Two Baytown Men Die In Plane Crash

NAVASOTA, TEXAS —(AP)—Two Baytown men were reported killed Friday in a plane crash near here.

Employees at the Humble Pipeline Company pump station four miles from Navasota reported the crash and tentatively identified one of the victims as Roy Miller, 28, former Robert E. Lee High School football player in Baytown.

## GOP Solon Asks Special Session Call

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Senator Bridges (R-N H) Friday urged President Truman to call an immediate special session of Congress to consider aid for China.

Bridges said: "Those Communist forces now spreading over all of North China are no simple group of indignant patriots, but are controlled from the Kremlin in Moscow, and are part of the worldwide Communist movement."

Bridges said the Chinese Communists now are "gnawing out the vitals of our friend and ally, China."

He added: "Even the U. S. State Department, chief advocate of our previous, contradictory and do-nothing policy toward China, now admits the situation there is 'deteriorating' very fast and there is a grave problem."

Bridges made the suggestion in a statement issued from his office here. Bridges himself was in Des Moines, Iowa, for a speech.

Bridges said he fears that unless American aid is made effective immediately the Communists will take over the whole of China, lock, stock and barrel.

A special session of Congress, he said, would allow the Administration "to place the real facts before Congress and the American public" regarding the Chinese situation.

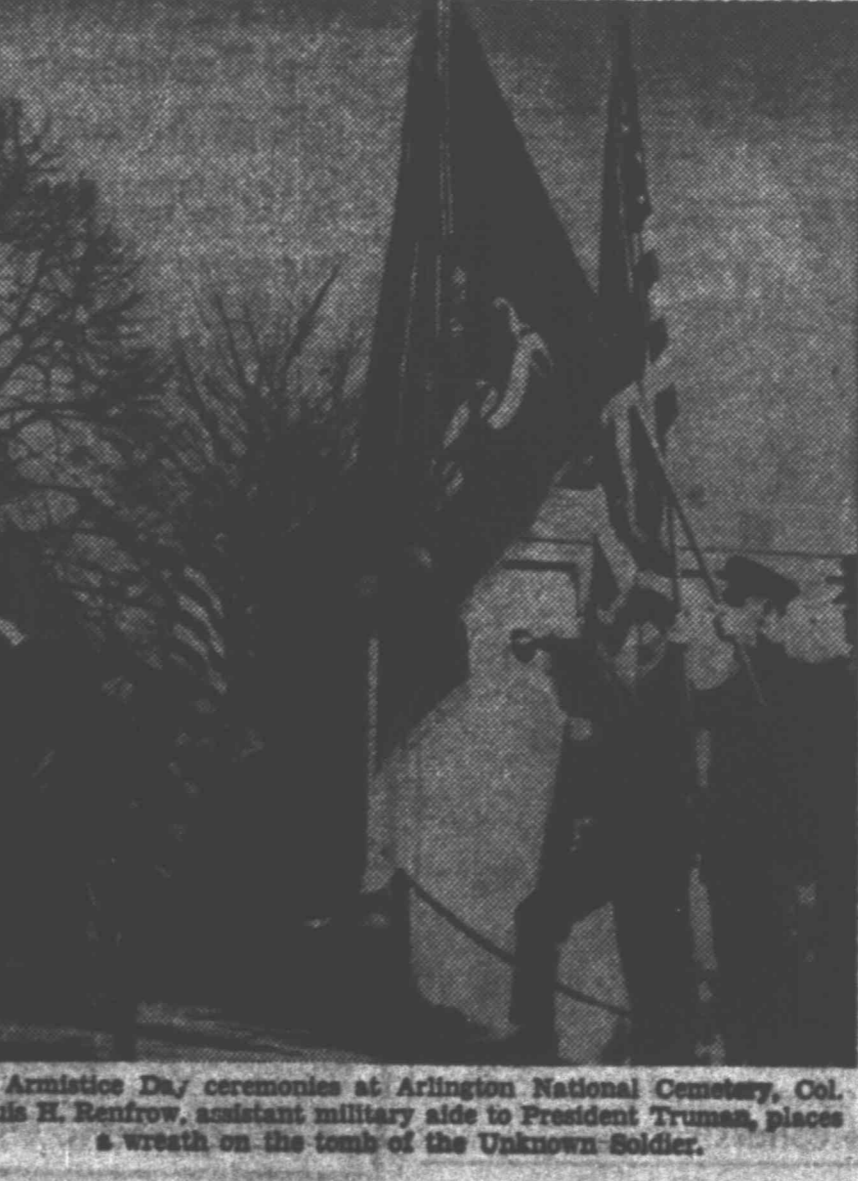
## New Postal Route Is Authorized In Northeast Midland

A lady named Mrs. Bj Kidd (yes Bj) has written a book saying that it's all right not to worry if you're a woman who can't keep your checkbook straight and can't seem to keep within your budget.

Mrs. Kidd, who is a successful advertising executive in Philadelphia, has written a book called "Women Never Go Broke." She explains, in 200 pages, this whole business of men, women and money. I think her book is the greatest thing of the year because I'll never worry about a bouncing check again.

She says that one of the main differences between men and women is money. When a woman looks at a greenback she really is seeing an olive green oche of fur felt with a ooc feather, or a doctor's bill marked "paid," or Junior receiving his diploma from Yale.

When a man sees an engraving of George Washington, he's thinking about it as part of his fortune, whether it's a little one or a big one. Money is a medium of exchange to women—good, for only what they can receive, for it. Money to a man is power and position.

Mrs. Kidd isn't quite as flat about the thing as that, but that's the general idea. She points out there's bound to be quite a lot of confusion as a result, because most bankers are men, and most of the people with money to spend are women. She's even pulled together some figures, about how women spend 85 per cent of the money, women own 50 per cent of corporation stock, and so on.

Most females go around all their lives feeling a little guilty because they can't figure out all the to-do about finances. They try to understand all the forms and fill out all the papers their husbands and bankers seem to think are very important.

The thing I liked best about the book—next to the comfort and

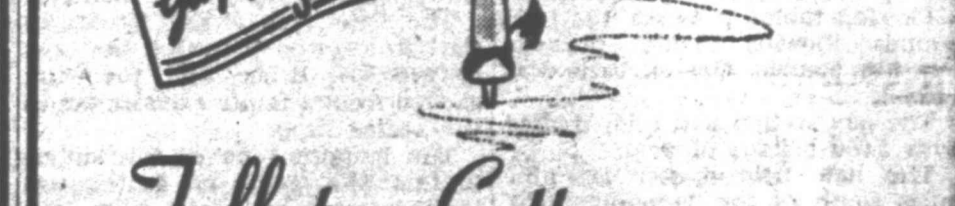

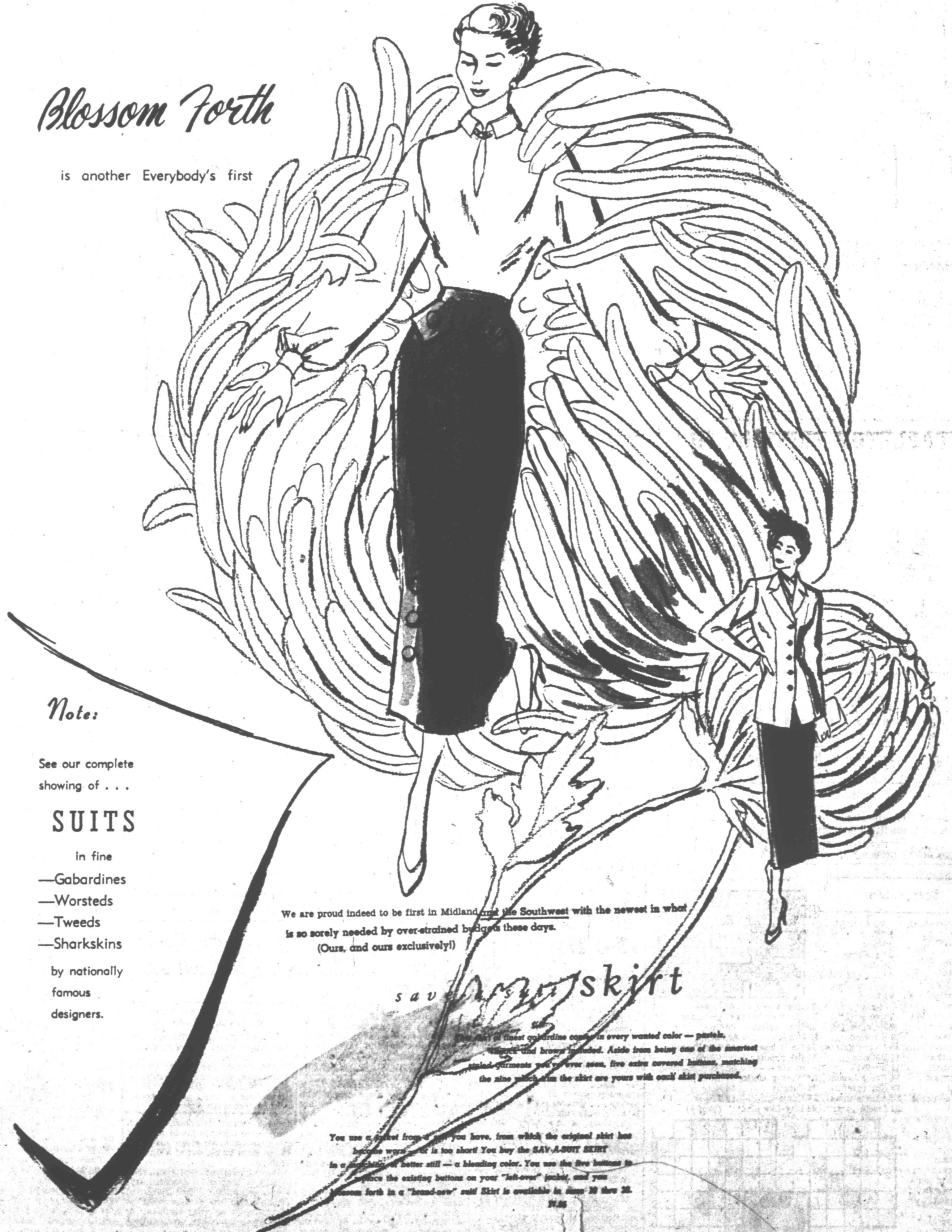

### Paris Newspaper Man To Be Honored On 84th Birthday

**PARIS, TEXAS**—(AP)—Judge A. W. Neville of Paris—a grand old man in every sense of the term, his friends describe him—will celebrate his 84th birthday and the official publication date of his second book November 27.

On that November day the entire community will honor the man who has lived with them, worked with them and for them for 60 years.

"Neville Day" in Paris will extend birthday anniversary greetings and congratulations to the judge through posters in business houses, a luncheon, a special edition of the Paris News and open houses in the vine-covered home of the judge and his wife.

Judge Neville has been with the Paris News 46 years, the last 20 as editor. Despite his age, he works regularly, in excellent health and is an alert newspaperman.

Then And Now  
 His second book is "The Red River Valley—Then and Now." It is not history, but a collection of tales about this section of the Red River Valley. It is a kind of expansion of some of the better of his "Backward Glances" columns which have been running in the Paris News for more than 20 years. The book is designed and printed by Carl Hertzog, the well-known type expert of El Paso. It contains 27 drawings by the Mexican artist, Jose Cisneros.

His first book, "History of Lamar County," is considered an authoritative reference book on this county. It was published in 1927.

Recorded History  
 Judge Neville was born in Salem, Va., and came to Paris with his mother and other members of the family Dec. 6, 1878, after the death of his father. He has lived here ever since and has worked in the printing business for almost 60 years.

Glancing backward over the years, Judge Neville's newspaper stories recorded history as it came to Lamar county—the late western plane ever seen in Paris—the first electric railway—the first automobile—the hanging of eight early day desperadoes—the last execution of an Indian under the old Indian law—a negro lynching—and the great fire of 1916 which destroyed nearly half of the city of Paris.

 That night marked the first talk about a spectacular secret conference to be held at Casablanca.

At the mention of names the caliber of Roosevelt, Churchill, De Gaulle, Hopkins, Grand Tedder, Pound, and Mountbatten I tinged with anticipatory excitement. The general certainly would be a star delegate and I most certainly would drive him. It seemed a sure thing. It soon was evident, however, that the only female guests would be those capable of super stenographic work. I wasn't invited to the biggest party in Africa.

Still more disturbing news—that Dick had been transferred up to II Corps and was irrevocably assigned to the front—was irrevocably confirmed by a blessed gift from the illustrious store of Eisenhower thoughtfulness. When he heard Dick was coming to Algiers on brief corps duty, the general called me in. "Kay," he said, "I understand Dick's coming to town?" I nodded. "Well," he continued, "you two can't talk or have much privacy up there at the billet with other women hanging around." He smiled. "When Dick arrives, tell him I want him to stay at my villa, as my personal guest, as long as he's here."

"Thanks," is such a tiny, clumsy word for a man who can take time from directing an historic army to realize that his driver and her boy friend would appreciate soliloquy. Both Dick and I tried to emphasize our appreciation, but the general only countered by tossing a special dinner for us one night; Butch, Ethel, and a few other friends added. "I understand," he said, "that other air raid which reminded me, soberly, Dick was going back to the rear."

Shortly after the Casablanca conference and its iron demand for unconditional surrender by the Axis, we were invaded by an army of V-I-Ps who wanted to visit the general and Allied headquarters before returning to their respective homes. Unfortunately, Mr. Churchill failed to appear, although scheduled, and all of us were particularly disappointed that President Roosevelt hurried home without a visit to Algiers. But I did meet General Sir Alan Brooke again, warning to that friendly personality which ways counts as a surprise to anyone expecting Colonel Blimp on being introduced to the "Chief of the Imperial General Staff." With him and General Eisenhower, it was "Brookie" and "Ike."

Also renewed acquaintance with the only one of General Eisenhower's friends or associates who never got around to calling him Ike—General Marshall, who invariably, despite their long and close association, talked to Ike as "Eisenhower." In retaining this formality General Marshall was in character. He always greeted me immediately and shook hands in outward cordiality, yet I never could quite overcome what amounted to a touch of fear of him. Perhaps it was because of his military bearing, his careful speech, his somewhat fatherly attitude toward General Eisenhower; perhaps it was because General Marshall was my boss's boss. Regardless, even though I came to know him quite well in the months and years ahead, I felt there was an unapproachable barrier, a barrier unequalled among all the scores of celebrated persons I met during the war. Nonetheless, I shared the universal respect for General Marshall's military genius and found him always the perfect military officer, the perfect Southern gentleman.

And I respected him even more after General Eisenhower told me his boss had ordered Butch to see that the supreme commander took better care of himself, that he pay less attention to extra-office-hours and more to his health, that he get a place in the country and try

### Second Roosevelt Memorial Unveiled In Great Britain

**LONDON**—(AP)—The second memorial to the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt dedicated this year in London was unveiled in Westminster Abbey Friday.

The specially designed plaque is a more modest symbol of remembrance than the heroic statue unveiled in Grosvenor Square last April by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

It is, however, an unusually significant memorial in that the late President is the first head of a foreign state ever so honored in Westminster Abbey.

The inscription, suggested jointly by Prime Minister Clement Attlee and former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, reads:

"To the honored memory of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 1882-1948. A faithful friend of freedom and of Britain. Four times president of the United States. Elected by the government of the United Kingdom."

## U. S. Aid Like Bucket Of Water On China's Conflagration

By DEWITT MACKENZIE  
The question of what—if anything—America can do within reason to save Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist regime from utter collapse in face of the Chinese Communist onslaught has received no satisfactory answer thus far.  
Hourly the situation becomes more critical.  
Actually not only the fate of Manchuria is in the balance in current battles but control of all North-Central China.  
On top of this military crisis the political and economic situations continue a shocking deterioration. China is in a state of chaos.  
The first major shipment of American guns and ammunition to China since the Red victory in Manchuria is said unofficially in Washington to be nearly ready for departure. Of course any help is good help—but it will take more than a bucket of water to halt the Chinese conflagration.  
That's what makes America's position so difficult. How can she give worth-while aid without going to the unthinkable extreme of taking over the military burden herself?  
Framing Suggestion  
The most promising suggestion I have run into came from Dr. Chen LI-FU, vice president of the Chinese National Parliament, when he was in the United States three months ago. He told me he believed the Chinese government's military success must be premised on economic reform.  
Chen figured it was useless for the government to keep on chasing the Reds all over the place, expending men and materiel under present conditions. Without economic reform the war could run on indefinitely. Therefore, he would drive all the Chinese Communists north of the Yangtze River and then hold the line of the Yangtze while Southern China was put on its feet economically. Once economic rehabilitation was achieved, the government could conquer the Communists in North-

ern China and reunite the country. As things now stand, China must assume most of the burden of working out her own problem. She has had much help from America, and she is getting more. However, there is no indication the United States intends to take over the job of cleaning out the Chinese Bolshevists.

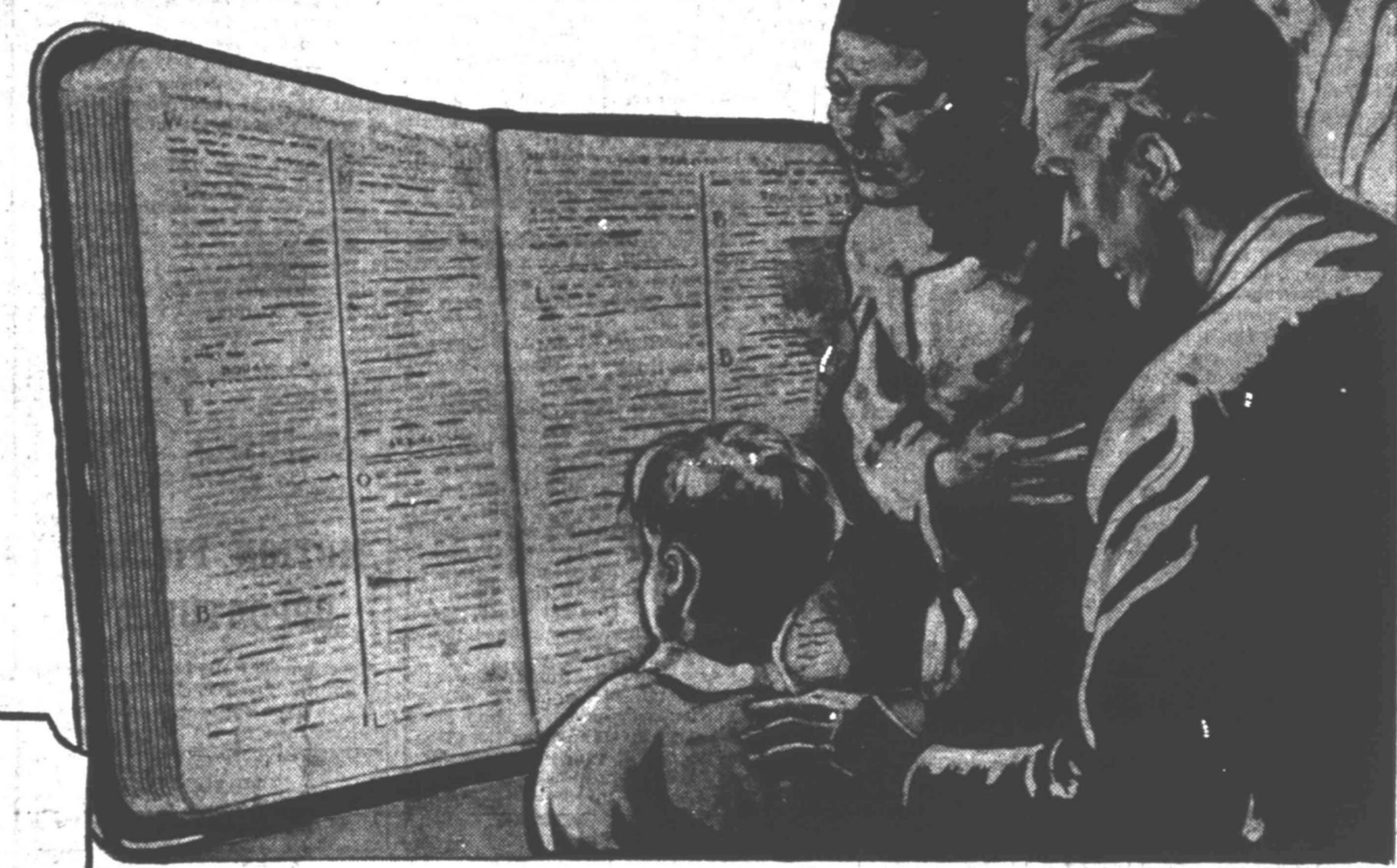

Abundance Of Feed To Mean More Meat On America's Table
CHICAGO—(AP)—Corn now is fed to hogs with a shovel instead of a spoon. That's the opposite of last year at this time. And it's all right with hogs.
Furthermore, the little pigs of last Spring's crop are going to find living—and eating—just grand. In comparison with the number of animals to eat it, there's never been so much food around for livestock.
It isn't just hogs which will enjoy this increased feeding. Cattle and poultry also will share in it. And, eventually, it will mean more food for humans.
By now, nearly everyone knows about the record-breaking corn. But there's a lot of oats, barley and sorghum grain. These probably will be a good supply of molasses—it's sprayed on coarse grains because then the livestock eat more of them.
Feeding Profitable
The Agriculture Department Friday estimated "the total supply of all feed concentrates for the year which began in October is 23 per cent larger than the 1947-48 supply.
Much lower prices already have made it more profitable to feed corn to livestock than sell it as grain, even though hog prices are slipping. The spooning out of corn last winter, following the short crop, so long as necessary.
In October, the Agriculture Department said, the average price received by farmers for each 100 pounds of live hogs was equal to about 17.8 bushels of corn. This compared with long-time October average of only 12.7 bushels.

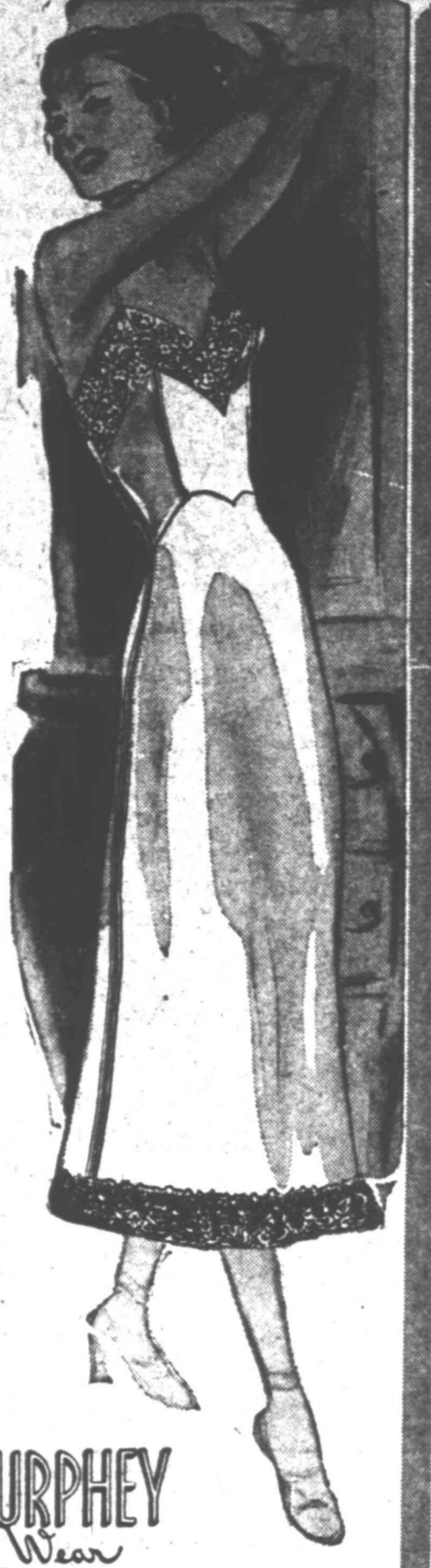
