

### Franco Is Out On Limb

James A. Farley has returned from Europe with the conviction that we ought to establish diplomatic relations with Franco Spain. And he told the Overseas Press Club in New York that on his recent tour he didn't meet "any person of any importance" who disagreed with him.

The former postmaster general blames "a group in the State Department" for our present policy. He thinks that since we disregard communism in making a defensive wartime alliance with Russia, we should make a similar arrangement with Franco with an equal disregard of his unsavory regime

"It's difficult for the Spanish people to understand our attitude," Farley said. "They can't see why we are spending billions of dollars in Germany and Italy, our wartime enemies, and yet are unfriendly enough to bar Spain from non-military conferences on health and aviation.

Our attitude may puzzle Farley and the important people who agree with him as much as it does the Spanards. But American policy really isn't such a mystery.

The billions we are spending in Germany and Italy are not marks of sentimental friendliness. They are being spent for two reasons. The recovery of these two important but war-devastated countries is necessary to European recovery. And they also must be strengthened and supported against the encroachment of postwar com-

But the Germans and Italians are not being included in non-military conferences on health and aviation or other international discussions.

America's first objective in World War II was to them were supposedly too left-wing. destroy fascism in Europe. If Russia and the West had not joined forces, Hitler would never have been defeated by May of 1945, and tens of thousands more lives would have been sacfriced.

We are not at war today. And if war with Russia should come there would be only one place for Spain to go. Geographically—and by a process of elimination, politically—her place is with the West. There is no reason then why we must court Franco. If Spain is in danger of Russian invasion he will have to make bases available to us to save himself.

We've been getting so much "just plain sexiness" the past few years in both movies and novels under the cloak of "art" or "realism" that it would be rather refreshing to see such works more honestly labeled. There are lots of people who buy books and movie tickets under the pretense that what they are seeking is "realism," when what they're actually seeking, paying for and enjoying is "just plain sexiness." Truthful Label

Label a movie or book "just plain sexiness" and it might do a better business among those who don't want anything better and don't kid themselves about it.

But with a truthful label the many people who like to fool themselves wouldn't have any chance or excuse for doing it. Also, it would be easier to keep the kids away from "just plain sexiness," if the movies that offer nothing else proclaimed the fact.

If those who protested had said: "Don't show us movies that can be described as 'just plain sexiness'" they'd have had a talking point. But it looks as though they avoided the real issue when they objected to the advertising rather than to the movie itself.

### Our Economic Aid To China is Food, Clothes and Fuel

By CLARKE BEACH

WASHINGTON-(A)-What has our economic assistance meant to China?

It has meant rice, flour, cotton, petroleum products and fertilizer. China has received \$98,000,000 worth of these supplies from the Economic Cooperation Administration (ECA) during the first six months of the China program. In the next six months it will mean more of the same, plus

two new projects: 1. A "capital equipment and technical services" program which will cost \$70,000,000. 2. A rural reconstruction program, on which Congress has authorized the expenditure of as much as \$27,500,000.

All the rice, 94,586 long tons (2,240 pounds), has been purchased in Siam; all the flour, 17,858 long tons, in the United States. These have been used almost entirely to support rationing programs in mafor Chinese cities, into which hordes of refugees have flocked. With 372,349 bales of American

raw cotton furnished by ECA, China has been able to keep the wheels turning in her largest single industry. Cloth sold abroad helped bring in direly needed foreign ex-

change. About \$20,000,000 worth of petroleum products have been allotted to China's key industries and services, most of it from the Middle East. ECA has furnished about \$1,200,000 worth of nitrogenous fertilizer, purchased in the United Kingdom, Belgium and Canada.

Groundwork Laid The "capital equipment" program is just ready to commence. Groundwork was laid last June by a technical survey which found almost all of China's industrial and transportation facilities suffering

from lack of maintenance. About \$35,000,000 will be spent on replacement of equipment or parts and an equal sum for industrial reconstruction and some expansion. I once asked a woman who had reached the age when hair grows dull what had helped most to preserve the gleam in hers. The answer was: "finger-tip massage of the

That reply will give any woman who thinks that scalp-massage is unimportant a different slant on a routine that is too often neglected. Brushing the hair is important. Brushing helps enormously to keep locks burnished and a lazy scalp active. But bristles cannot do for a scalp what your finger tips can. Bristles are unable to, because they can't dig in as deeply or be moved about with as effective maneuvers. That's why your finger tips should take over when your hand puts down the brush. The trick is to use your finger tips to press into and manipulate the scalp, inch by inch, until the entire area has been manually moved. Start at the front hairline and don't stop until your finger tips have reached the nape of the neck. Then, if your scalp doesn't tingle or feel more flexible, begin all over again and give it a second workout.







### First Calves Forecast Production

Considering only the two extremes, Group One and Group Five, it was shown that breeding stock picked m Group One could be expected to produce, for the next four years, calves that had a yearly average weaning weight of only 404 pounds. But those picked from Group Five should produce calves with a yearly average weaning

weight of 456 pounds, 52 pounds more than Group One. These figures show that later calves are apt to be a repeat performance of the cow's first calf. Cows doing poorly their first calving year continued to produce the lightest group of calves. They were poor risks. Culling cows with light, scrubby first calves would be well repaid in greater profit through more efficient production.



### Daring Boys Die In Berlin Ruins

BERLIN -(A)- Western Berlin's newspapers are waging one of the world's strangest safety crusadesdesigned to stop daredevil children from digging for scrap materials in bomb ruins to earn money.

Under the slogan "Death Lurks in the Ruins," the campaign is prompted by an alarming increase in the accident toll involving young-sters killed or maimed under col-lapsing walls in the city's acres of ruined buildings.

Hardly a day passes but some German is a victim of such an accident, especially as Fall winds and wet weather promote the collapse of weakened masonry. A further hazard is unexploded bombs and shells still buried in the rubble.

The newspaper Sozial Demokrat, leading the safety campaign, has demanded criminal prosecution of adults who hire children to go picking scrap metals and wood out of tuins. The newspaper also demanded action against parents who permit their children to engage in this business and of scrap metal dealers who buy from children.

Some adventurous kids are said to make neat earnings in their scrap hunting. But they have to be daring-or just foolish. Some are seen climbing up pipes to reach third and fourth story balconies or along ledges to pry out surviving window frames. They often clamber where experienced salvage crews, equipped with ropes and safety belts, hesitate to operate.


