Reuther's Plan

When the Bureau of Labor Statistics announced the cost of living has dropped for the fifth straight month, there were predictions that this might put a crimp in union labor's 'fourth round' demand for postwar pay increases.

Some 10 days before the BLS figures came out, UAW President Walter Reuther said his union wanted new contracts with provisions for pensions and social security as well as higher pay.

On the legislative front we can expect to win only basic national minimums for all our citizens, Reuther added.

It is the UAW's perennial contention that auto makers' profits are too high, and that pay rises can be given without increasing prices.

At any rate, 30 cents an hour more for anything like 1,000,000 workers would increase the auto industry's costs by hundreds of millions of dollars.

This would inevitably do something to those inflationary pressures that Reuther was talking about. It would do something to counteract the lower cost of living which government figures show and which Reuther concedes.

Moreover, his union's efforts on behalf of legislation for pensions and health and medical insurance would, in effect, be lobbying for a double tax on millions outside the UAW.

Everyone will admit the desirability of security in old age, illness and jobless periods, and for broader health care at a fair price.
